

Should the property be sold within five years from the time of purchase or should the buyer cease to occupy the home as principal residence of purchaser, 100% of the home buyer's assistance fees paid by the Economic Development Corporation shall be re-paid by the assisted buyer to the Corporation. be sold within five years Corporation.


