Tigers Win Squeaker Over Follett Panthers, 32-30

Homecoming 1992 for the Groom Tigers and Tiger fans will be remembered as one of the best games seen in Groom in a long time. The Tigers were determined last Friday night, as they played host to Follett for

homecoming, but more importantly the game was key to the district matchup; they could not afford to lose.

Follett was one of three teams picked in District 1-A this year along with

Groom and McLean to contend for the district championship.

The comeback victory 32-30 against Follett was the largest hurdle to date for the Tigers' quest for a championship.

As halftime approached Friday night, the near capacity crowd of Tiger fans were beginning to feel that their first loss of the season was at hand. They saw the Tigers fumble away the ball their first three possessions and assisting Follett to a 30-12 halftime lead.

Then came halftime and Coach O'Dell's wakeup call.

"The defense played an excellent second half holding Follett scoreless while Senior running back Paul McLaughlin made his move gaining 326 yards on 27 carries," said Coach O'Dell. "His supporting cast did an excellent job."

Follett led the entire game until 2:03 left in the game when McLaughlin broke loose for a 55 yard touchdown run to give the Tigers the lead. The Tigers were called and penalized for celebrating in the

Bea and Brent Stephens visited with the board concerning disciplinary procedures concerning overdue library books. The confusion resulted from a change in policy from last year.

Previously past due books were levied a fine and if the book is not turned in, the student's report card was withheld.

This year students will be charged a fine and if the book is not turned in by a reasonable length of time a detention will be issued.

The Stephens asked the board to consider a change in this policy. In a unanimous decision the board voted to retain the policy.

Grandview-Hopkins Adopts Means For Payment Of School Taxes

The Board of Trustees of the Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. met in regular session on October 10, 1992, at 8:00 PM in the school cafeteria. The board

approved the minutes of the previous meeting and voted to approve the bills presented for payment.

The board heard reports on the installation of the new telephone system. An additional line has been installed and the school is now on a rotary system so calls can go through more easily. The board also considered purchase of an additional computer for the administrative offices. Computer Solutions was selected as the vendor for this item.

By unanimous vote, the board adopted procedures for payment of taxes. The following will apply for 1992-93.

Grandview-Hopkins I.S.D. will grant only the following exemptions, as approved by voters on August 10, 1991.

1. Granting the exemption of an additional 20% of the market value of a residence homestead with a \$5000.00 minimum.

2. Granting the additional \$10,000 exemption for taxpayers 65

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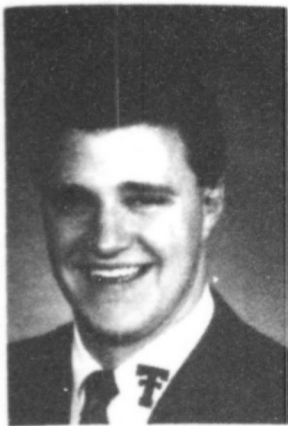
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Weinheimer Selected For Who's Who

County Sheriff's Report

Eight persons were booked into the Carson County Jail over the past week. Three were charged with DWI, one on DPS Warrants, one for Amarillo Police Department Warrants, one for Fugitive Warrants, one for out-of-state warrants and Possession of a Prohibited Weapon and one for Possession of Marijuana.

Deputies assisted other agencies in the county with arrests and investigations and backed up local ambulance services on medical emergencies. Officers were called to

investigate prowlers reported south of Panhandle and in Conway and to handle domestic disputes in Fritch and Groom.

The Carson County Sheriff's Department assisted the Randall County Sheriff's Department in tracing the location of a subject who had been released from Canyon and outfitted with an ankle-attachment warning device

which alerts Randall County when the subject is not complying with the restrictions of his release. The subject was located at his place of employment.

Commissioners Court Meeting

Carson County Commissioners Court held a meeting on Monday, October 12.

All members were present and the bills were paid.

Tracy Lowery, Carson County Extension Agent-Home Economics, invited the court to the Gold Star Banquet Awards Program, at the Borger Country Club on November 9th, at 7:00 p.m. Carson County will have two individuals from the county receiving awards.

The court reviewed and acknowledged the installation of a 4" gas pipeline to be installed in Prec. #3, north-west of Panhandle. Judge Roselius explained the 9-1-1 road markers and signs to the court. Letters will be mailed Friday, October 16th to county residents living outside the city limits. The letters will inform residents of their new emergency

response address. "All of the new addresses will be placed into our computers in the sheriff's office in order to identify the locations." "The emergency response address (or number) is independent of a persons mailing address. There is no connection. The sole purpose of the program is to get emergency vehicles to a location as fast as possible."

An agreement with the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, Pardons and Paroles Division was approved by the court. "This agreement will allow Carson County to move individuals who have been arrested and who are also being sought by the state to a detention facility operated by a private organization under local government code section 351.101.

The meeting was adjourned.

Hutsell Attends Conference

Steve Hutsell, head of Groom's Mathematic department was recently picked to attend a conference in Austin with about a dozen other math teachers from across the state.

The Conference was to discuss the format for a test designed by the state as an "end of course" mastery test. These types of tests are destined to become the norm as educators feel the need to prove mastery of the major curriculum areas of study.

"Texas is not the first state to try to prove that its graduating students have had some degree of consistency in the more important basic courses," said Hutsell. "Although we

are unsure if these will be correlated with the TAAS Tests, we do know that this type of "end of course" exam is being planned for Algebra I, Biology and Second year English," he added.

Uncertain at this time if these tests would mean pass or fail even if daily work is adequate, Hutsell was sure that the result would be included in the Districts Evaluation.

"This is the way of the future," he said.

"Educators must document that the students have mastered a course in order to allow them the credit. Essentially we are putting our money where our mouth is!" stated Hutsell.

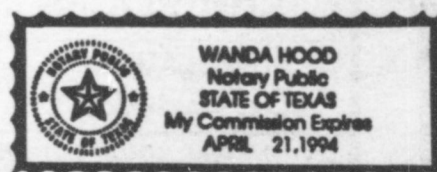

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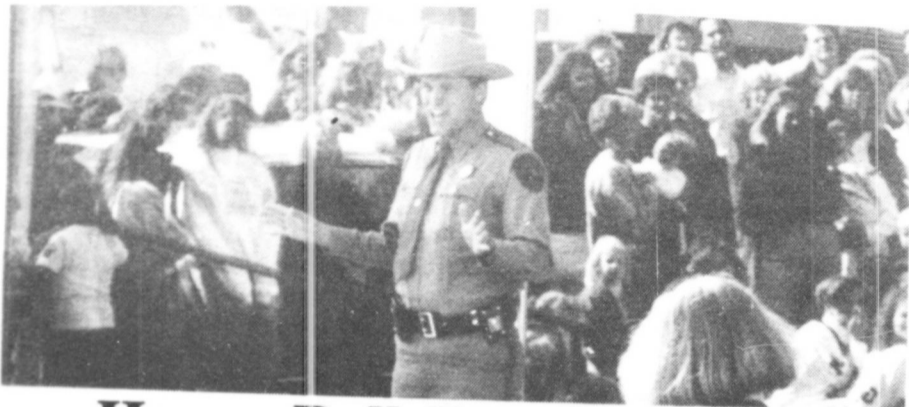

RURAL TEXANS RECEIVE

HOUSING ASSISTANCE

"During the 1992 fiscal year the TEXAS FmHA made new loans to rural residents which totaled over \$22 million for the purchase of single family dwellings," stated State Director, Neal Sox Johnson. In addition, TEXAS rural families were provided homes from the sale of inventory properties totaling over \$124 million. Home repair assistance in the form of loans and grants provided to very low-income and elderly residents in rural Texas amounted to \$1,525,000.

Fiscal year 1992 was the first full year for the new FmHA Guaranteed Rural Housing Loan Program whereby FmHA guarantees 90 percent of the loan from a participating commercial lender to an eligible low or moderate income family for the purchase of a rural home. Texas now has 61 Approved Guaranteed Rural Housing lenders, including the Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs. FmHA's Guaranteed Rural Housing program offers additional opportunities for local lending institutions to meet the housing needs of rural communities.

TREE SEEDLINGS

AVAILABLE

The McClellan Creek Soil and Water Conservation District is now accepting orders for tree seedlings. The conservation tree program enables farmers, ranchers and rural landowners to obtain trees at a nominal cost. The program's aim is to protect buildings, cropland, feedlots, control erosion or enhance wildlife.

Species that are available this year from Texas Forest Service are Red Cedar, Ponderosa Pine, Austrian Pine, Rocky Mt. Juniper, Southwestern White Pine,

Available from Colorado Forest Service are Austrian Pine, Colorado Blue Spruce, Red Cedar, Piron Pine, Ponderosa Pine, Rocky Mt. Juniper, Scotch Pine, Caragana, Coneaster, Honeysuckle, Lilac, Native Plum, Sumac, Sand Cherry, Nanking Cherry, European Sage, Ash, Siberian Elm, Hybrid Cottonwood, Golden Willow, Honeylocust, Russian Olive, Lombardy Poplar, and Lacebark Elm. To obtain desired species, it is suggested that orders be submitted early. Trees will arrive in late March. Tree applications can be picked up at the local conservation office. Phone 537-3504.

The Story

Route 66 is a 2,400-mile highway that linked Chicago, Illinois, with Santa Monica, California. This highway, one of the best examples of the 1926 national highway system, traversed eight states: Illinois, Missouri, Kansas, Oklahoma, Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, and California. Nearly all these states are developing ways to interpret, preserve, and commemorate portions of the road, which demonstrates the enduring national interest in the highway. Several associations have been organized to perpetuate public appreciation and understanding.

The history of Route 66 begins in 1926, when a national route-numbering system was devised that included a shield sign to mark the new U.S. highway system.

from 1926 until 1984 Route 66 played an important socioeconomic role. It served as the major avenue for migration to California during the Dust Bowl years. It channeled millions of men and women to military bases or armament factories on the west coast during World War II. During the 1950s and 1960s when American workers found themselves with more leisure time, it became the major road west and attracted millions of vacationers, providing major economic stimulus. Small businesses such as gas stations, motels, and restaurants developed in the rural Midwest and in the sparsely populated Southwest to provide services for travelers. Renewed interest in the highway during the last decade has attracted foreign visitors hoping to experience travel along the famous "mother road." Americans have begun to look to Route 66 as a tourist destination. The road has become a symbol of the automobile age because it encompasses both the geography of the westward migration and the need to symbolize the mobility and independence of the American people.

The Legislation:

On September 28, 1990, Congress passed Public Law 202-400, the "Route 66 Study Act of 1990." The act recognizes that Route 66, one of the earliest examples of the 1926 National Highway System Program, has become a symbol of the American heritage of travel and search for a better life. Although remnants of the road are quickly disappearing, significant structures, features, and artifacts associated with the road remain. Numerous state offices and private organizations are interested in the road, its history, and its role in American popular culture.

The Study:

The Denver Service Center of the National Park Service has been assigned to carry out the study, which will be coordinated by the Southwest Regional Office of the National Park Service to comply with the congressional intent expressed in the above legislation.

The study will:

- provide Congress with a range of options for preservation and use of remaining segments of the road
- provide Congress with a range of options for preservation and interpretation of significant features associated with the road
- describe planning efforts by federal, state, county, community, and private entities
- consider private sector preservation alternatives
- identify management objectives and roles

The study will not:

- be a master plan
- specify an acquisition program
- be a complete inventory of resources related to Route 66
- present the definitive history of Route 66

The Opportunities

Currently the management of the cultural resources associated with Route 66 is a mosaic of nonprofit organizations, state agencies, and private ownership. While some resources are well maintained, others are on the verge of collapse. Comprehensive management objectives will be developed for state, city, nonprofit organizations, and private owners along with the identification of any possible role for the federal government. Emphasis will also be placed on possible roles for the various Route 66 organizations. Management objectives will address resource protection and visitor use.

Currently there is little or no coordination between public and private entities interested in the preservation of Route 66. The study will identify mechanisms that would foster closer coordination between these organizations and describe the role of possible partnerships with the federal government.

Interpretive themes will be developed to guide the preparation of alternatives and analysis. Data collected on existing and proposed educational and interpretive efforts will be incorporated into the study.

The resources associated with the road such as historic structures, sites, road segments, and landscapes, exhibit varying degrees of preservation needs. These needs will be evaluated, and existing and

proposed preservation efforts will also be evaluated.

Emergency Farm Loan Applications Being Accepted

Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by Excessive Rainfall, Hail, High Winds, Thunderstorms and Flooding which occurred between May 1, 1992 and June 20, 1992 are being accepted at the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA) office located in Amarillo, TX, FmHA County Supervisor August H. Hesse III said today.

Potter, Carson, Moore, and Hutchinson Counties are four of the twenty-seven counties in Texas recently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from excessive rainfall, hail, high winds, thunderstorms, and flooding.

Farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actual losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or \$500,000, whichever is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.

As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in

determining their loss.

Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until May 24, 1993, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possible over into the new farming season.

The FmHA office in Amarillo, serving Potter, Carson, Moore, and Hutchinson counties is located at 3002 East 3rd, Amarillo, TX, is open Monday through Friday, 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. The phone number is (806) 376-2271.

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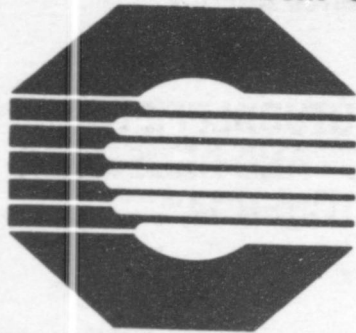
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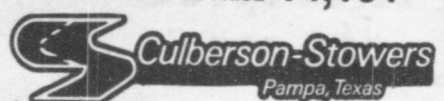

McLean Cubs played Higgins on October 15. They won 12 - 6.

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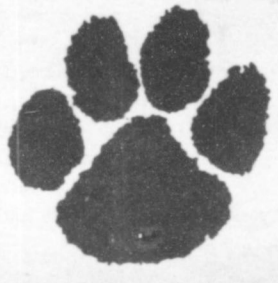

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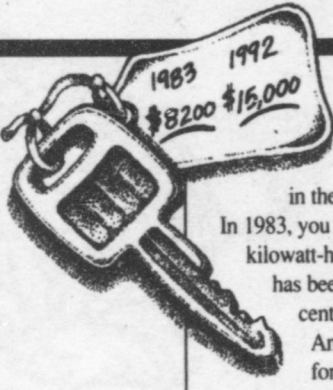
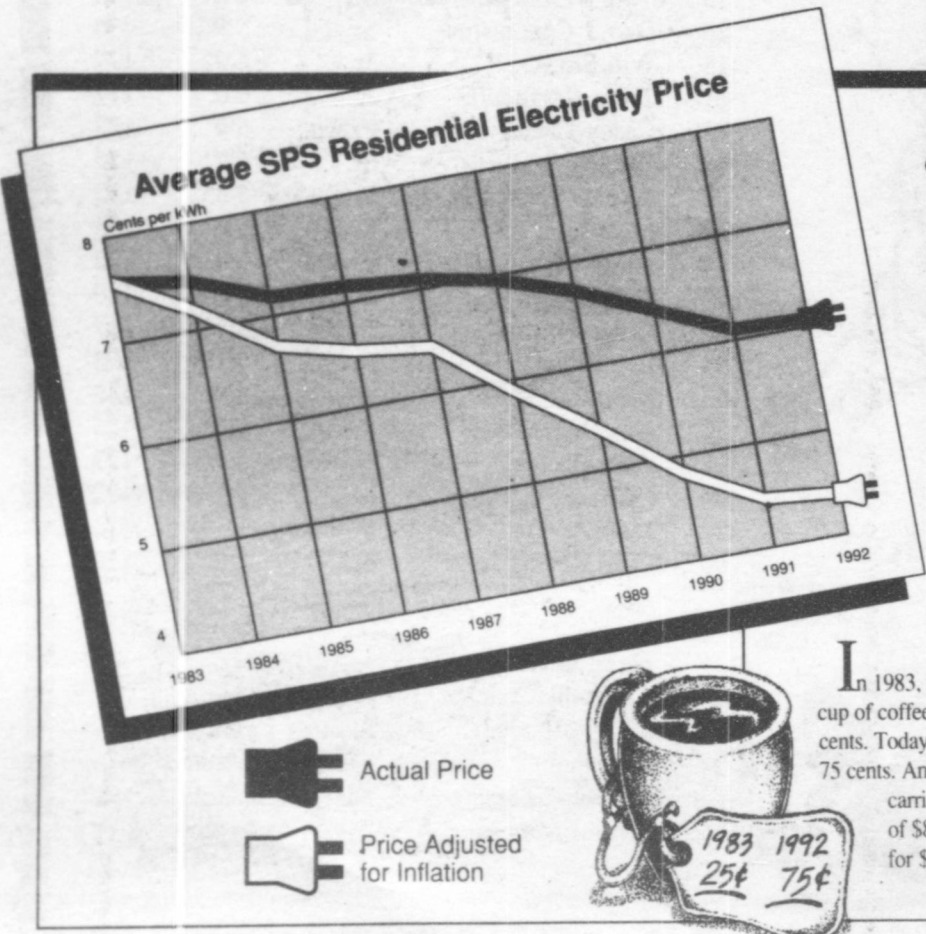
