The minutes of the December meeting were approved.

All motions were unanimously approved unless otherwise stated. 

Bob Martin stated that the streets in some of the Cities around us were a lot worse than ours. He said that the City would try to have a plan in effect for this situation in the future. Ann Pierce wanted to add the Law Enforcement offices to Robbie Sanderson added again it was

important that in front of the EMS really needed to be cleared, she had to ride with Clifford in a four wheel vehicle to get to the people who needed them. stated that her concern and her reason for getting on the agenda was for the EMS to be able to get out of the ambulance barn to people who needed them.
