

Q. What will happen when Jesus returns?

A. Many events will occur. Every eye will see Him (Revelation 1:7). The wicked will be separated from the righteous (Matthew 25:31-46). The righteous will be rewarded and the wicked punished (2 Thessalonians 1:6-10). The dead in Christ will be raised and the righteous on earth will be caught up in the clouds with them to meet the Lord in the air (1 Thessalonians 4:13-18).

Some have concluded from the visions of Revelation that Jesus will set up a kingdom on earth followed by a period of tribulation and then He will return a third time.
