ee Lockridge Resigns Post

No detai's were available as to why Carson County Commissioner Lee Royce Lockridge, Precinct 4, resigned his elected position to County Judge Jay Bob Koseiius last week. The only reason stated to the Commissioner's Court and gathering on Monday by Roselius was Lockridge re-signed for personal reasons.

Lockridge has served three years of a four year term and would be subject to the March 13, 1990, democratic primary election and the general election in November.

Roselius expressed his appreciation to Lockridge for his dedicated service to the county and the Commissioner's Court stating his personal regret to accept the resignation.

Roselius further stated: -"Election announcements will be coming next week ... until January 2. Lockridge's position is up for election. When a resignation is hand-





He was out there on the equipment himself a -workin'. When a man is a working man, he's a tryin' to do right in my estimation. If there was anybody in our community, in and around White Deer and Skellytown, who done any more work than Lee Lockridge, I don't know who it is. That's all I've go to say. That idea of waiting to see who makes an announcement before making the appointment is a good idea, and a good indicator of who is interested in the job. If he isn't interested in the job, he's not going to do nothing anyhow. He's just in there for the pay," Kreis concluded.





Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.

Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.



Dr. Neil Postman, New York University, says it "Appears to be shortening the attention span of the youth as well as eroding their linguistic powers and their ability to handle symbolism. mathematic Kate Moody, author of "Growing Up On Television", we now have evidence that haditual viewing can negatively affect "a young person's basic outlook and sensibilities, predisposition to violence and hyper-
