


Both Groom's offensive and defensive team controlled the line. "We are hoping that

Tigers. He also recovered a fumble and had six unassisted tackles.


Dean Fields a running back and linebacker had seven unassisted tackles. He also rushed three times for 53 yards.

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
J.V. Beats Clovis Christian Eagles



Funds Available For Housing In Rural Areas Steven A. Carriker,

The direct home ownership loan is designed to provide very low and low income families with financing to build, purchase, repair or refinance homes and building sites that meet local codes and provide adequate affordable housing.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture has approved Gray county for emergency haying or grazing on acreage enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program.

CRP participants in an approved county must request and receive approval from their local Farm Service Agency office prior to grazing or haying eligible acreage. CRP participants that do not own or lease livestock may rent or lease the haying privilege to an eligible livestock producer in an approved county. Eligible participants cannot hay and graze the same acreage nor can the hay be sold.





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Go Back To School Safely

We've all heard the saying, "kids say the darndest things!" Well kids do the darndest things, especially around school zones. With school resuming again, there's sure to be trouble

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afoot. Now is the time for drivers to start thinking about the traffic dangers this presents, says Trooper L.B. Snider, Public Information Officer for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

Whether you drive in school zones occasionally or daily, you must never forget certain lessons. One is you have to use better judgement than the children about you. "It's

that kids are not small adults and don't think like adults. They lack experience with traffic and don't always react logically. When you sound your horn, for instance, they may think it is okay to cross the street in front of your vehicle," Snider adds. Children also have

important to remember limited perceptual skills.

Sometimes they can't tell if your vehicle is stopped or in motion. They can't judge the speed or distance of vehicles, advises Snider.

"Elementary school children often are not tall enough to be seen on the other side of a parked car, or as they move between vehicles to cross the street before being picked up.

Snider reminds drivers that it is the driver's responsibility to be aware of what is happening about them while driving. Drivers must be alert for kids entering the streets, especially at the

beginning and end of the school day. Drivers must also stop for school buses when the flashing red lights are activated and remain stopped until the flashing red lights are off. "Let's slow down for school zones and school buses to give our kids a break to continue their education," concludes Trooper Snider.

Victim Rights: Right For America

More than two decades after the genesis of America's victims' rights movement, victims' voices are being heard loud and clear as never before. To date, 29 states, including Texas, have passed state-level constitutional amendments establishing the rights of crime victims.

Crime victims in Texas have a right to be protected from further harm or threats as a result of their cooperation with prosecutors. They have a right to a separate and secure waiting area when they must testify at trial, and it is their right to have their safety considered in the setting of bail. Crime victims have a right to information about court relevant proceedings, about defendant's right to bail, and about the procedures in a criminal investigation. They have a right to be provided information about the parole process and to be notified of the offender's release.
