## Latinos Confront GOP Leader Over Social Security Comments

**N**ational Hispanic leaders are labeling as "shocking" and "unbelievable" comments made by House of Representatives Ways and Means Committee chairman suggesting that race and gender should be among the determining factors in allocating Social Security benefits.

Thomas made the remarks during an interview Jan. 23 on NBC News' *Meet the Press*. As the highest-ranking House Republican overseeing Social Security legislation, he spoke during the Sunday morning talk show intending to clear up his earlier comments that criticized President Bush's plan allowing individuals to create private Social Security accounts.

Reiterating a potential need to consider gender in allocating benefits, Thomas added, "We need to examine the question of race in terms of how many years of retirement do you get based upon your race."

Meet the Press host Tim Russert probed, "Do you think Congress, Mr. Chairman, would accept any formula that said that people would be treated differently because of gender or their race?"

Thomas responded, "If we discuss it and the will is not to do it, fine. At least we discussed it."

Brent Wilkes, national executive director for the League of United Latin American Citizens, called Thomas' comments "outrageous and unbelievable."

Wilkes commented to Hispanic Link News Service that the suggestion was intended to tell different ethnic groups that


there are different payoffs so each can see different benefits.

"I think it's a terrible idea," he said.

In a letter addressed to Thomas, U.S. Rep. Xavier Becerra (D-Calif.), who serves on the Social Security Subcommittee on

because those who would be most affected under such a proposal are those who need the benefits the most.

"I can't imagine there would be any Democrat support for such proposal," he added.



Ways and Means, and Rep. Stephanie Tubbs Jones (D-Ohio) wrote, "We hope that you will immediately clarify your previous statements regarding benefit cuts and the role race and gender should play in any Social Security proposal."

Becerra related to Hispanic Link that he was "shocked and scared," especially

Mario Lopez, executive director for the Republicans' Congressional Hispanic Conference, told Weekly Report that the chairman's comments suggest that race and gender should be included in the Social Security discussion and not that benefits should be weighed by race or gender.

## Latinos Enfrentan el Dirigente Republicano por Sus Comentarios Sobre Seguro Social

Dirigentes hispanos nacionales tiendan de "chocantes" e "inconcebibles" los comentarios del director de comité de medios y arbitrios de la Cámara, el representante Bill Thomas (republicano por California), que sugieren que la raza y el género deberían estar entre los factores determinantes al distribuir beneficios del Seguro Social.

Thomas hizo los comentarios durante una entrevista el 23 de enero en el programa de noticias de NBC llamado "Meet the Press". Como el republicano de mayor categoría con autoridad sobre la legislación del Seguro Social, habló durante el programa matutino del domingo con la intención de aclarar comentarios que había hecho anteriormente que criticaban el plan del presidente Bush que permitiría que los individuos crearan cuentas privadas de Seguro Social.

Al reiterar la posible necesidad de considerar el género al distribuir los beneficios, Thomas añadió, "Debemos examinar la cuestión de raza en términos de la cantidad de años que uno recibe en base a su

raza".

Locutor del programa, Tim Russert, hizo ahínco en el comentario, "¿Le parece que el Congreso, Sr. Director, aceptaría alguna fórmula que dijera que se trate de manera distinta a las personas por razón de su género o su raza?"

Respondió Thomas, "Si lo discutimos, y la voluntad de hacerlo no existe, está bien. Al menos lo discutimos".

Brent Wilkes, director ejecutivo a nivel nacional de la Liga de Ciudadanos Latino Americanos Unidos, dijo que los comentarios de Thomas eran "escandalosos" e "inconcebibles".

Wilkes le comentó a Hispanic Link News Service que la sugerencia tenía el fin de avisar a los diferentes grupos étnicos que existen diferentes recompensas para que cada una vea diferentes beneficios.

"Me parece una idea terrible", dijo.

En una carta dirigida a Thomas, el representante demócrata por California, Xavier Becerra, miembro del subcomité de medios y arbitrios del Seguro Social y la representante demócrata por Ohio, Stephanie Tubbs Jones, escribieron, "Esperamos que de in-

mediato clarifique sus declaraciones previas sobre los recortes de beneficios y el papel que deberían jugar la raza y el género en cualquier propuesta referente al Seguro Social".

Becerra le dijo a Hispanic Link que le resultaba "chocante y de temer", en particular por lo que los más afectados bajo tal propuesta serían los que más necesitan de los beneficios.

"No me imagino que haya apoyo alguno de parte de los demócratas por una propuesta así", agregó.

Mario López, director de la Conferencia de Congresistas Hispanos Republicanos, le dijo a Weekly Report que los comentarios del director sugieren que la raza y el género deberían incluirse en la discusión sobre el Seguro Social y no que los beneficios se determinen en base a la raza o el género.

"El director Thomas con razón siente preocupación por la disparidad en base a la raza y el género del sistema actual, y los peritos de una amplia gama de perspectivas reconocen que es un problema", explicó.

Los comentarios de Thomas aparecieron tres días antes de una rueda de prensa del presidente Bush en la que explicó su programa por establecer cuentas de jubilación de administración personal como parte de su plan de reformar el Seguro Social.

Thomas declaró que los legisladores deberían considerar factores como el género, ya que las mujeres viven más años que los hombres. "No hemos debatido nunca ajustes al Seguro Social en base al género", dijo.

Jennifer Crider, vocera de la dirigente demócrata de la Cámara de Representantes, Nancy Pelosi, (demócrata por California), le comentó a Hispanic Link que están esperando respuesta a su propia carta enviada a Thomas que también pide una explicación.

"Pedimos que clarifique sus declaraciones anteriores en apoyo a recortes de beneficios para la mujer trabajadora de los Estados Unidos, y que explique cómo su objetivo de privatizar el programa del Seguro Social facilita, y no dificulta, el que la mujer logre la seguridad financiera que se ha ganado y que ha pagado durante su vida laboral", dice la carta.

Esta carta la firmaron 27 miembros demócratas de la Cámara, incluyendo a las representantes por California Linda Sánchez, Grace Napolitano y Hilda Solis.

Martha Burk, directora del Consejo Nacional de Organizaciones de Mujeres, dijo que a las mujeres hispanas en particular les afectaría negativamente una propuesta así, ya que ganan menos dinero. Según los datos de este grupo, la ganancia de la mujer hispana es, en promedio, 52.5 céntimos del dólar que gana el hombre blanco, no hispano.

Esta organización, que representa a unos 200 grupos de mujeres, también envió una carta a Thomas diciendo que si los beneficios del Seguro Social toman en cuenta el género, que sea de forma que compense a las mujeres.

Security program makes it easier, not harder, for women to achieve the financial security they have earned and paid for during their working years," read the letter.

The letter was signed by 27 Democratic House members, including California Representatives Linda Sanchez, Grace Napolitano and Hilda Solis.

Martha Burk, chair of the National Council of Women's Organizations, said that Hispanic women would be particularly affected negatively by such a proposal because they earn less money.

According to the group's data, Hispanic women's earnings are on average 52.5 cents on the dollar of those non-Hispanic white males.

The organization, which represents some 200 women's groups, also sent a letter to Thomas stating that if Social Security benefits will take into account gender, it should be done in a way that will compensate them.

## Hispanics are Hot!

Hispanics are hot and if your business in Lubbock isn't marketting to Hispanics, you may be missing out on a \$880.5 million dollar market. This according to 1999 estimates by the City of Lubbock reporting Hispanic aggregate yearly income. Taking into consideration a 6% growth rate since 1999, this \$880.5 million could have grown to over \$900 million by this year.

Further evidence of Hispanic are hot is shown by an article in Businessweek (January 17, 2005) that describes Hispanics as hot, hot, hot, there can be no doubt that something is happening in Hispanic marketing. According to the article, Hispanics' wealth and population is rising three times faster than the U.S. average.

In Lubbock the evidence of businesses realizing the importance of Hispanic business can be shown by the flourishing of Spanish speaking media outlets. In the past couple of years three new radio stations have opened in Lubbock. One station owned by Lamar communications follows the major communications stations' trend toward putting importance on the Hispanic market.

"RAMAR Communications has recognized the strength and growth potential of the Hispanic market for many years beginning with the launch of Telemundo in 1988, the first Spanish language station on the air in Lubbock to the top rated Hispanic radio station Magic 93.7 and now with a second FM station on the air for nearly a year with Estereo Latino 97.3 FM," said stations manager Chuck Heinz.

Although the buying strength has become obvious, many of Lubbock's majority owned business have failed to capitalize on striving to get their business.

Heinz claims that businesses in Lubbock are starting to realize the potential and importance of Hispanic buying power. "I do think businesses recognize the power and are trying to reach the Hispanic community. I do think many are behind when it comes to their marketing effort and that it's a whole approach in terms of the type of product, customer service and simply making folks feel at home when shopping at their stores or businesses."

One business that has seen the potential has been American State Bank who this month hired Victor Salazar to the position of Vice President of Multi-cultural Marketing and Business Development. The position is unique to American State, with no other financial institution in the region offering such market-specific leadership.


The trend to go after Hispanic business can be seen throughout industries. A recent report in the Detroit news reports that automakers think that the fiercest battle for new vehicle sales in the coming years may be fought over Hispanics.

The article states that "the nation's 40 million Hispanics account for 6 percent of the U.S. auto market today. Up more than 25 percent from five years ago, according to Polk Automotive Intelligence."

# Al Tener Amigos Cpo,p ;ps Demócratas, No Hace Falta Tener Enemigos

¿Cómo va el dicho? ¿Con amigos así, quién necesita enemigos?

Durante la temporada de elecciones del otoño, se acordarán de toda la dulzura que los candidatos del partido demócrata susurraban a nuestros oídos latinos en cuanto a ayudar a los inmigrantes con legislación federal que nos permitiría ganarnos un salario decente y protegernos de la explotación.

Se acordarán cómo el partido, conocido por su defensa de los derechos del que menos tiene y del obrero, prometió, al dirigirse a nosotros, que sería primera prioridad rescatar de los nativistas republicanos sin corazón los millones de latinos de clase baja que no podían comprobar la veracidad de sus documentos.

Bueno, la semana pasada (el 24 de enero), dirigente demócrata del Senado, Harry Reid y su junta alegre de visionarios compasivos de la cámara superior, llamaron la prensa a acudir al Capitolio para revelar las diez prioridades para el partido durante el Congreso número 109.

Y ahora, ¿qué? Ni asomo de la reforma de las leyes de inmigración.

el demócrata de Massachusetts, Kennedy, y el republicano de Arizona, McCain, podrían formular un proyecto de ley bipartidario que se podría apoyar.

Ah, sí. Y no nos olvidemos cómo otra adalid del partido demócrata, John Kerry, se ganó su mayor aplauso extendido en los eventos auspiciados por los latinos cuando juró por su honra que presentaría legislación de reforma inmigratoria durante los primeros cien días de su presidencia. Legislación justa, prometió, importante a la economía estadounidense que ofrecería un sendero a la residencia legal para 8 millones de personas, que en lo demás vivían en cumplimiento de las leyes, cautivos de un limbo peligroso.

Bueno, al volver a nuestra sala de redacción, el reportero llamó a la oficina del senador Kerry para preguntar si el senador menor de Massachusetts, aún de voz poderosa en el Capitolio, pensaba presentar el tipo de legislación que había prometido durante la campaña por el voto hispano.

Qué pregunta tonta. Claro que no. April Boyd, secretaria de prensa de Kerry, dijo que no tenía tal intención el senador. Pero si se presentaba un proyecto de ley favorable, quizás lo firmaría como co-aspaldor.

Obviamente Kerry había desecharlo lo poco que aprendió durante la campaña en referencia a las necesidades hispanas nacionales y comunitarias.

Es irónico, pero nuestra última esperanza por cualquier alivio migratorio yace con el descripto "enemigo", el hombre que venció a Kerry por 3 millones de votos. Defendiéndose de oposición sería de muchos de los de su propio partido, el

presidente George W. Bush sigue promoviendo un plan de reforma de la legislación de inmigración que podría llevar a la residencia de aquí a varios años para los inmigrantes indocumentados que cosechan suficiente uvas y algodón.

Ha estado promoviendo su plan ya hace varios meses. La pregunta es, ¿recorrerá el tramo del diablo al hecho? Y, además, ¿podrá encontrar a suficientes miembros del Congreso para recorrerlo con él?

Los dirigentes del Congreso republicanos también sacaron la semana pasada sus diez prioridades, sin dar asomo allí tampoco la reforma de las leyes de inmigración. De hecho, director del comité judicial de la Cámara, James Sensenbrenner de Wisconsin, ya está presentando un sin fin de cosas anti-inmigrante en la cámara inferior que se habían borrado del proyecto de inteligencia de la sesión anterior - cosas como completar la valla fea, poco amigable, a lo largo de la frontera de Estados Unidos con México y prohibir que todos los estados emitan licencias de conducir a aquellas personas que no pueden probar su residencia legal.

Mal agüero. Pero queda otra voz más que podrá influenciar el tema: la del público votante. Durante la realización de encuestas en el pasado, esta voz con cierta consistencia se ha delineado hacia el devolver a los inmigrantes indocumentados a su tierra con el medio de transporte más próximo.

Sin embargo, parece estar transformándose esta actitud.

Algo extrañada entre los informes sobre los resultados de la encuesta de enero 12 al 16 realizada por ABC News-The Washington Post, que entrevistó a 1,007 adultos, fue la siguiente pregunta sobre la reforma migratoria:

"¿Piensa usted que los inmigrantes ilegales que viven y trabajan hoy en los Estados Unidos deberían tener la oportunidad de mantener su posición laboral y en un futuro solicitar la residencia legal, o piensa que habría que deportarlos a su país de origen?"

Los resultados sorprenden: el 61 por ciento dice que se quedan, mientras que sólo el 36 por ciento dice que se larguen.

En cuanto a los temas de envergadura emocional como la inmigración, los funcionarios elegidos de Washington toman cuenta de las encuestas públicas con regularidad y por lo general votan por lo que no moleste a muchos electores.

Si los miembros del Congreso número 109 lean esta última encuesta y dejan de cohíbirse con los nativistas alharquitos, es posible que tenga la oportunidad de ser aprobado un proyecto de ley de reforma migratoria después de todo.

## What a horrendous start for 2005 between two neighboring countries.

First Mexico distributes a comic book providing life saving information to Mexican nationals bent on crossing the border through rugged terrain and deadly deserts. Some US elected officials, anti-immigration organizations, popular TV, radio and print anti-immigrant commentators take exception to the comic book saying the Mexican government is promoting illegal entry to the US. Then the US releases a Consular Information Sheet cautioning US citizens on the dangers of kidnappings and killings in Mexican border cities. Most Mexican officials, TV, radio and print commentators take exception at the release of such "defaming" information suggesting it is "payback" for not supporting US foreign policies.

Justifying the comic book, Mexicans point out that the government spends a great deal of money on radio advertising the dangers of border crossings and recommending their citizens not do it. They set up information kiosks along the Mexican border giving information on the deadly dangers including pictures of human and animal cadavers victims of the desert so as to discourage crossers. But still they cross.

The comic book style booklet, Mexicans say, reinforces that it is against US laws to enter their country illegally and the danger to their very lives posed by human smugglers and desert heat. However, knowing they will still cross and deaths pushing 3000 since 1994, graphic advise is provided on surviving the desert

heat, or swimming across treacherous rivers or canals. But it also counsels that for those who make it through, how to avoid detection by obeying local laws, and not going places other than to and from work. In short, avoid contact with others as much as possible.

It's this last part that raises the dander of so many in the US. "It's an encouragement that will lead to more illegal aliens coming," said Rick Oltman, a spokesman for the Washington-based Federation for American Immigration Reform (FAIR), a John Tanton founded anti-Mexican immigration organization. The sentiments are echoed by the other Tanton affiliated organizations such as Numbers USA, American Patrol, and politicos like Congressman Tom Tancredo. All of them dismiss the Mexican government's claim that the 32-page booklet was designed to reduce deaths along the border.

"The idea is to reduce the number of people who die in the attempt," said Alfonso Nieto, spokesman for the Mexican embassy in Washington, D.C. "The main objective of the guide is to inform Mexicans the appropriate way to do it, and the risks of doing otherwise."

Thus the feeling in Mexico is that in the US little care is given that border crossing deaths went over 400 in 2003, continuing an almost 10 percent annual increase. It seems that human value of Mexicans is a low priority.

On the heels of the Mexican booklet, the US Consular Information Service published a Mexico Public Announcement, which in part reads:

"Violent criminal activity along

the U.S.-Mexico border has increased as a product of a war between criminal organizations struggling for control of the lucrative narcotics trade along the border. The leaders of several major criminal organizations have been arrested, creating a power vacuum. This has resulted in a wave of violence aimed primarily at members of those trafficking organizations and criminal justice officials. However, foreign visitors, including Americans, have been among the victims of homicides and kidnappings in the border region in recent months."

This type of Public Announcement has the profound effect of discouraging tourism and other commercial activities along the border. It also affects tourism to the interior of Mexico that is the country's 3rd biggest industry.

Thus the Mexican government took exception to the "warning." On the one hand, Mexican say, drugs are bought and used in large quantities by US citizens that in turn has brought Mexico the criminal activity we now suffer. We cooperate and spend a great deal of human and financial resources in the war to stop such illicit activity. Police officers, prosecutors, investigative journalists are killed by drug trafficking gangs in Mexico's effort to keep drugs out of the US. And this is the thanks we get!

Mexican journalists have gone as far as suggesting that the accusations that American citizens are being kidnapped by "drug traffickers" are false and made up to embarrass the Mexican government and discredit the candidacy of Mexican Secretary of Foreign Relations Derbez to the Presidency of the Organization of American States.

Before President Fox announced the candidacy of his cabinet member, Collin Powell

had announced the US support for the former President of San Salvador. This was viewed as a repayment for that country's support for the US's Iraq policies and in fact for sending a token military force to Iraq. So the US saw, it is said, Mexico's launching its own candidate for the OAS presidency as one more rebuke to the US's Iraq policies.

Adding credibility to this theory is that the Americans "kidnapping" in the city of Nuevo Laredo (bordering Texas) was reported by the New York Times (Ginger Thompson) and the Washington Post (Mary Jordan) almost the same day. And apparently the two reporters traveled to the same city at the same time and interviewed the same people, but came out with two versions of the same story.

Al Giordano and Bill Conroy of NarcoNews, an Internet publication, followed up on the story by interviewing some of the same people the NYT and WP reporters had interviewed. They in turn report that the parents of one of the American citizens who disappeared in September of 2004 in Nuevo Leon, have not received a ransom demand and have not heard anything about their daughter since her disappearance. They told the NYT and WP reporters their story, "...but they decided to publish something different."

Mexican suggest that the US Secretary of State's office decided to use the NYT and WP stories as the basis for issuing the Consular alert though there is no merit to the drug cartels kidnapping of US citizens. This being the case it is nothing more than a payback to teach the Fox administration who is boss.

Meantime, here we are, citizens of both countries who must live with one another until the creator through Mother Nature decides otherwise, held captive to political capriciousness and racial biases.

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## With Friends Like Democrats, Latinos Don't Need Enemies

What's the saying? With friends like these, who needs enemies?

During the fall election season, remember all the sweet nothings that Democratic Party candidates were whispering in our Hispanic ears about helping immigrants with federal legislation that would provide us a living wage and protection from exploitation?

Remember how the party known for defending the rights of the underdog and the working stiff promised when addressing us to make it a top priority to rescue us from uncaring GOP nativists millions of underclass Latinos who couldn't prove their papers were in order?

Well, last week (Jan. 24) Senate Democratic Leader Harry Reid and his jolly band of upper chamber compassionate visionaries called the press to the Capitol to reveal the party's 10 priorities for the 109th Congress.

Guess what? Immigration reform wasn't even on their radar screen.

Instead, they wallowed around in left-over campaign rhetoric borrowed from the GOP promoting "core American values" such as "security."

When a Hispanic Link News Service reporter raised the issue of immigration reform to Reid, he quickly shooed it away by saying Massachusetts' Edward Kennedy, a Democrat, and Arizona's John McCain, a Republican, might come up with a bipartisan bill they could support.

Oh, yes. And do you remember how Democratic standard-bearer John Kerry drew his biggest ovations at Latino-sponsored events when he vowed on his honor to introduce immigration reform legislation in his first hundred days as president? Fair legislation, he promised, important to the U.S. economy that would provide a path to legal residency for some 8 million otherwise lawful residents living in perilous limbo.

Well, arriving back at our newsroom, the reporter called Senator Kerry's office to ask whether the junior senator from Massachusetts, still a powerful voice on the Hill, was planning to introduce the kind of legislation he promised on the Hispanic campaign trail.

Silly question. Of course not. April Boyd, Kerry's press secretary, said the senator had no such plans. But if the right bill came along, he might sign on as a co-sponsor.

Obviously, Kerry had already trashed what little he learned on the campaign trail about national and Hispanic community needs.

Ironically, our last hope for any immigration relief lies with the described "enemy," the man who defeated Kerry by 3 million votes. Pending off serious opposition from many in his own party, President George W. Bush is still talking the talk about an immigration reform plan that just might lead to residency several years down the road for those undocumented immigrants who pick enough grapes and cotton.

He's been talking the talk for several months. The question now is will he walk the walk? And will he find enough members of Congress to walk with him?

Republican congressional leaders came out with their 10 priority issues last week, too, and immigration reform wasn't on their list, either. In fact, House Judiciary Committee Chairman James Sensenbrenner of Wisconsin is already introducing all kinds of nasty anti-immigrant stuff in the lower chamber that was deleted from last session's intelligence bill - things like completing an ugly, un-neighboring fence along the U.S.-Mexico border and banning all states from issuing driver's licenses to individuals who can't prove legal residency.

Not a good sign. But there's another voice that may be of influence on the issue: that of the voting public. In past surveys, it has fairly consistently taken the position that undocumented immigrants should be sent back where they came from on the next means of transportation available.

But this attitude appears to be shifting.

Somewhat lost in reporting the results of a Jan. 12-16 ABC News-Washington Post poll of 1,007 adults was this question on immigration reform:

"Do you think illegal immigrants who are living and working in the United States now should be offered a chance to keep their jobs and eventually apply for legal status, or do you think they should be deported back to their native country?"

The results were surprising: 61 percent said let 'em stay, while only 36 percent said kick 'em out.

On emotional issues such as immigration, elected officials in Washington check public polls regularly and usually vote for what doesn't rile up too many constituents.

If members of the 109th Congress read this latest survey and stop being intimidated by noisy nativists, maybe a genuine immigration reform bill will have a chance to pass after all.

## Republicans launch an early push for Private-School Vouchers --

It looks as if the private-school voucher lobby wants to strike quickly this session in the Texas House, pushing a bill containing a voucher program to the floor as an "emergency" matter. Gov. Rick Perry, Republican of Haskell, paved the way with a call for vouchers in his "state of the state" speech this week. The governor pressed all the rhetorical buttons signaling support for vouchers, claiming that students are "trapped" in "failing" schools run by a "monopoly" - by which he means your neighborhood school. The only answer, said Perry, is "school choice" - as if a wide array of choices did not already exist within the public schools.

The Speaker of the House, Republican Rep. Tom Craddick of Midland, meanwhile reportedly has been squeezing House members in back-room meetings at the capitol to back a draft education "reform" bill containing private-school vouchers. Craddick and his lieutenants are saying they want to bring this measure to a vote as early as February as possible. Another voucher bill already referred to the House Public Education Committee is HB 12 by Rep. Frank Corte, Republican of San Antonio. Corte's bill is portrayed as a limited-scale, pilot voucher program, but in fact it would introduce vouchers on a massive scale in major urban districts, at huge expense to Texas taxpayers.

With the voucher push starting early and the capitol already crawling with hired-gun voucher lobbyists, it is time RIGHT NOW for all of us to start pushing back hard with letters and calls to our legislators. You will find an anti-voucher letter on the TFT Web site [at http://www.unionvoice.org/ct/1qX6xS1Xcr/](http://www.unionvoice.org/ct/1qX6xS1Xcr/).

Just click on the prompt to "visit the legislative action center," and you'll find the anti-voucher letter ready for you to send straight from the TFT Web site to your state representative and state senator. You also can call your legislators on the TFT toll-free line to the state capitol switchboard: 1-888-836-8368. Just give the name of your state rep or state senator to the capitol operator and ask to be connected to that legislator's office.

Do not doubt the impact of your letters and phone calls. Exactly this type of grass-roots campaign has stopped the voucher lobby in its tracks session after session. Here's a preview of the anti-voucher letter:

I urge you to oppose public funding for private-school vouchers or voucher equivalents. Vouchers in any form would drain taxpayer dollars from public education at a time when our public schools already face a budget crisis.

Voucher legislation would erode the foundation of our state's success in public education - the funding needed to help our students meet high standards. Every dollar siphoned away for private-school vouchers would be taken from the funding pool that could pay for smaller class sizes, extra help for at-risk students, and better compensation to reduce the teacher shortage.

The claim that Texas schoolchildren are "trapped" in failed neighborhood public schools is false. The fact is that only a tiny handful of neighborhood schools have been rated low-performing for even two years. The consistently failing schools are charter schools - privately run operations that already have cost Texas taxpayers more than \$1 billion and that offer just a foretaste of what a private-school voucher program would look like. If parents want higher academic standards, their children

## Mexico starts DNA sampling to identify undocumented people

The Mexican government started in San Diego a DNA sampling program to identify undocumented people who die without carrying documents when crossing the California border, informed diplomatic sources today.

The consul of Mexico in San Diego, Luis Cuaron Goatherd, said that the program is based on a computerized system of DNA information of the unidentified victims to establish bonds with their relatives.

The program is coordinated with San Diego County's forensic office, in charge of identifying and making autopsies to the mortal remains found at the border strip as well as in the rest of the jurisdiction.

The first DNA sample for the

system by the consulate of Mexico in San Diego will be the one of an unidentified man, whose corpse was located last Sunday afternoon in the waters of the Tijuana River to the US side of the border.

Claudia Smith, Director of the California Rural Legal Assistance Foundation (CRLAF), said that around three thousand 300 undocumented people have died in the border from October 1, 1994 when they started the border control operations.

Smith estimated that 900 people lacked identification when they died in rivers, mountains, deserts or accidents while crossing the border, due to operations Guardian in California, SafeGuard in Arizona, and Rio Grande in Texas.

## El jege de gobierno del DF anuncia una movilización nacional

Andrés Manuel López Obrador, jefe de gobierno del Distrito Federal, anunció que convocará a una movilización pacífica nacional el día en que la Cámara de Diputados decida debatir el desafuero que enfrenta, con el propósito de que se le permita defenderse de un proceso que considera políticamente contaminado.

"Voy a convocar a una manifestación pacífica el día que se decide el asunto en el pleno de la Cámara de Diputados. Ese día si voy a pedirle a la gente que nos acompañe, sólo esa manifestación, pacífica y siempre a actuar en forma responsable", anticipó.

"Se van a ofrecer alegatos, pero no se ve que haya voluntad de hacer justicia", dijo el político que en reiteradas ocasiones ha señalado que la idea del desafuero es tratar de evitar la posible búsqueda de una candidatura presidencial.

En caso de que la comisión legislativa, conocida como Sección Instructora, concluya que el desafuero del alcalde es procedente, la Cámara de Diputados —integrada por 500 legisladores— tendría que erigirse en tribunal para votar a favor o en contra del proyecto.

Aunque no hay plazos para que la Sección Instructora concluya el proyecto, su presidente ha dicho que podría estar listo alrededor de marzo.

De proceder el desafuero, el político tendría que enfrentar en los tribunales una acusación de abuso de autoridad y de alargarse el proceso penal hasta 2006 estaria impedido de buscar una candidatura presidencial, pues la Constitución señala que ningún ciudadano que enfrente un proceso penal puede ser candidato a un puesto de representación popular. El gobernante capitalino aclaró ante la prensa que las marchas de protesta por las calles del país se desarrollarán en paz absoluta, puesto que "no voy a llevar a la gente a la confrontación".

Los reporteros le preguntaron si ha medido las consecuencias de tales manifestaciones de inconformidad, tomando en cuenta que seguramente sería multitudinaria la participación y, por tanto, muy alto el riesgo de que la pasión política se desborde.

## Los Latinos se Enfrentan con Dirigente Republicano por sus Comentarios

Dirigentes hispanos nacionales tildan de "chocantes" e "inconcebibles" los comentarios del director de comité de medios y arbitrios de la Cámara, el representante Bill Thomas (republicano por California), que sugieren que la raza y el género deberían estar entre los factores determinantes al distribuir beneficios del Seguro Social.

Thomas hizo los comentarios durante una entrevista el 23 de enero en el programa de noticias de NBC llamado "Meet the Press". Como el republicano de mayor categoría con autoridad sobre la legislación del Seguro Social, habló durante el programa matutino del domingo con la intención de aclarar comentarios que había hecho anteriormente que criticaban el plan del presidente Bush que permitiría

que los individuos crearan cuentas privadas de Seguro Social.

Al reiterar la posible necesidad de considerar el género al distribuir los beneficios, Thomas añadió, "Debemos examinar la cuestión de raza en términos de la cantidad de años que uno recibe en base a su raza".

Locutor del programa, Tim Russert, hizo ahínco en el comentario, "¿Le parece que el Congreso, Sr. Director, aceptaría alguna fórmula que dijera que se trate de manera distinta a las personas por razón de su género o su raza?"

Respondió Thomas, "Si lo discutimos, y la voluntad de hacerlo no existe, está bien. Al menos lo discutimos".

Bren Wilkes, director ejecutivo a nivel nacional de la Liga de Ciudadanos Latino Americanos Unidos, dijo que los comen-

tarios de Thomas eran "escandalosos" e "inconcebibles".

Wilkes le comentó a Hispanic Link News Service que la sugerencia tenía el fin de avisar a los diferentes grupos étnicos que existen diferentes recompensas para que cada uno vea diferentes beneficios.

"Me parece una idea terrible", dijo.

En una carta dirigida a Thomas, el representante demócrata por California, Xavier Becerra, miembro del subcomité de medios y arbitrios del Seguro Social y la representante demócrata por Ohio, Stephanie Tubbs Jones, escribieron, "Esperamos que de inmediato clarifique sus declaraciones previas sobre los recortes de beneficios y el papel que deberían jugar la raza y el género en cualquier propuesta referente al Seguro Social".

Becerra le dijo a Hispanic Link que le resultaba "chocante y de temor", en particular por lo que los más afectados bajo tal propuesta serían los que más necesitan de los beneficios.

"No me imagino que haya apoyado alguno de parte de los demócratas por una propuesta así", agregó.

Mario López, director de la Conferencia de Congresistas Hispanos Republicanos, le dijo a Weekly Report que los comentarios del director sugieren que la raza y el género deberían incluirse en la discusión sobre el Seguro Social y no que los beneficios se determinen en base a la raza o el género.

"El director Thomas con razón siente preocupación por la disparidad en base a la raza y el género del sistema actual, y los peritos de una amplia gama de perspectivas reconocen que es un problema", explicó.

Los comentarios de Thomas aparecieron tres días antes de una rueda de prensa del presidente Bush en la que explicó su programa por establecer cuentas de jubilación de administración

personal como parte de su plan de reformar el Seguro Social.

Thomas declaró que los legisladores deberían considerar factores como el género, ya que las mujeres viven más años que los hombres. "No hemos debatido nunca ajustes al Seguro Social en base al género", dijo.

Jennifer Crider, vocera de la dirigente demócrata de la Cámara de Representantes, Nancy Pelosi, (demócrata por California), le comentó a Hispanic Link que están esperando respuesta a su propia carta enviada a Thomas que también pide una explicación.

"Pedimos que clarifique sus declaraciones anteriores en apoyo a recortes de beneficios para la mujer trabajadora de los Estados Unidos, y que explique cómo su objetivo de privatizar el programa del Seguro Social facilita, y no dificulta, el que la mujer logre la seguridad financiera que se ha ganado y que ha pagado durante su vida laboral", dice la carta.

Esta carta la firmaron 27 miembros demócratas de la Cámara, incluyendo a las representantes por California Linda Sánchez, Grace Napolitano e Hilda Solis.

Martha Burk, directora del Consejo Nacional de Organizaciones de Mujeres, dijo que a las mujeres hispanas en particular les afectaría negativamente una propuesta así, ya que ganan menos dinero.

Según los datos de este grupo, la ganancia de la mujer hispana es, en promedio, 52.5 céntimos del dólar que gana el hombre blanco, no hispano.

Esta organización, que representa a unos 200 grupos de mujeres, también envió una carta a Thomas diciendo que si los beneficios del Seguro Social toman en cuenta el género, que sea de forma que compense a las mujeres.

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

## Seis Latinos, Cuatro Películas en Español, Competirán en Los Oscar

Cuando se anuncien en Hollywood los premios de la academia de cinematografía el 27 de febrero en el teatro Kodak, estarán compitiendo, sin precedente, seis cineastas latinos.

Un récord de cuatro películas en español ganaron seis nominaciones al premio el 25 de enero, incluyendo la categoría de mejor actriz protagonista para una novel actriz colombiana.

Catalina Sandino Moreno se convirtió en la tercera mujer latinoamericana en competir para el Oscar de mejor actriz protagonista con su nominación por la popular película María llena eres de gracia.

Dos películas en español más compiten en dos categorías cada una.

Diarios de motocicleta, del dramaturgo puertorriqueño José Rivera está nominada en la categoría de guión adaptado, y su canción temática, Al otro lado del río, le otorgó la candidatura a la categoría de mejor canción al cantautor Jorge Drexler, de Uruguay.

Como era de esperar, la entrega oficial de España, Mar adentro, ha sido nombrada a la categoría de mejor película de habla no inglesa. También se llevó una nominación por maquillaje, para los artistas Jo Allen y Manolo García.

La cuarta película en español nominada es A las 7:30 a.m., del director Nacho Vigalondo, que compite en la categoría mejor corto documental de ficción.

El número de nominaciones hace empate con el récord del 2003, cuando hubo tres películas en español y una en inglés de temática latina que se llevaron seis nominaciones.

Incluyendo al director de Mar adentro, Alejandro Amenábar, son seis los individuos latinos entre los nominados - el número más alto en los 77 años de la presentación de los premios.

Dos latinos nominados que viven en los Estados Unidos estaban comprensiblemente emocionados con su nominación.

En Nueva York, Sandino Moreno dijo que hablaba por teléfono con su mamá, que está en Colombia, cuando vio su foto y oyó su nombre durante el anuncio por televisión.

"Salté de la felicidad", le explicó a El diario/LA PRENSA de aquella ciudad. "No, no puedo explicar en palabras concisas cómo me sentí en ese momento - es un 'mixture' (mezcla) de emociones".

La actriz, nacida en Colombia, debutó en la película María, del cineasta de Nueva York, Joshua Marston, una bomba el año pasado en el festival de cine Sundance y que ha triunfado en varios eventos más. Sandino Moreno ganó la categoría de mejor actriz protagonista durante el festival de cine en Berlín el año pasado.

La película vuelve a competir en una categoría similar este año durante los premios Independent Spirit (espíritu independiente), donde está entre las primeras de la competencia.

Se presentó la película María el año pasado como candidata colombiana a mejor película de habla no inglesa, pero fue rechazada por la Academia de Artes y Ciencias Cinematográficas porque la mayoría de sus cineastas no provenían de aquel país.

Nunca antes había sido nominada una latina a mejor actriz protagonista. Las únicas concursantes anteriores de esta categoría

fueron Fernanda Montenegro, de Brasil, por Central do Brasil (1998) y Salma Hayek, de México, por Frida (2003). Sandino Moreno es la primera actriz en ser nominada en base a una presentación en español.

Diarios es el primer guión de José Rivera en hacerse película general. El residente de Los Angeles dijo a La Opinión de aquella ciudad que un amigo lo despertó antes del amanecer cuando se anunció su nominación.

"Para mí, significa mucho que habrá más gente que verá la película ahora, y que quizás haya mayor comprensión de quién era Ernesto Guevara", dijo Rivera.

## Six Latinos, Four Spanish-Language Films, will compete for Oscars

When the Academy Awards are announced at Hollywood's Kodak Theatre Feb. 27, an unprecedented six Latino filmmakers will be involved in the competition.

A record four Spanish-language films earned six Academy Award nominations Jan. 25, including a best actress nod for a debuting Colombian thespian.

Catalina Sandino Moreno became the third Latin American woman to compete for a best actress Oscar with her nomination for the festival hit María llena eres de gracia.

Two other Spanish-language films compete in two categories each.

Diarios de motocicleta earned Puerto Rican playwright José Rivera a nod for adapted screenplay, and its thematic Al otro lado del río gave a best song candidacy to Uruguayan singer-songwriter Jorge Drexler.

As expected, Spain's official entry Mar adentro is up for best foreign language film. It also took a makeup nod, with nominations going to artists Jo Allen and Manolo García.

The fourth Spanish-language nominee is A las 7:30 a.m. de la mañana, a film from Spanish director Nacho Vigalondo that competes for best live-action short.

The number of nominations ties the record set in 2003, when three Spanish-language films and one English-language Latino-themed movie took six nods.

Including Mar adentro director Alejandro Amenábar, there are six individual Latinos among nominees for the 77th annual Academy Awards - the highest number ever.

Two Latino nominees who live in the United States were understandably excited by the nominations.

In New York, Sandino Moreno said she was speaking on the phone with her mother in Colombia when she saw her picture and heard her name called out during the televised announcement.

The four other Latino nominees live and work in Spain, although two of them were born in South America.

Drexler, a native of Montevideo,

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
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## All i's dotted, t's crossed so Sosa becomes O

Sosa loved his 13 years with the Cubs, yet he happily put all that behind him Wednesday upon joining the Baltimore Orioles.

"I gave Chicago everything that I have. It was a beautiful experience for my wife and family," he said. "I had a great time in Chicago, but you have to move on. This is my new house, and I love it."

Sosa joined the Orioles after commissioner Bud Selig approved the deal and the slugger passed his physical. Chicago received second baseman Jerry Hairston Jr. and two minor leaguers, second baseman Mike Fontenot and right-handed pitcher Dave Crouthers.

Sosa was peppered with questions about his final days with the team and his shaky relationship with Cubs manager Dusty Baker. Sosa insisted that, while he will take nothing but fond memories from his days with the Cubs, it was time to start anew.

"My legacy is there, but I haven't finished yet. The best of Sammy Sosa is coming now," he said. "I wanted to finish my career there, but it didn't happen. I'm here now in Baltimore and I'm going to win the crowd."

## Esperanza contra el mal de Alzheimer

Las neuronas de ratones se recuperaron rápidamente al quitar ciertas placas cerebrales características del mal de Alzheimer, generando esperanzas de que el tratamiento beneficie a pacientes de la enfermedad, dijeron el jueves investigadores de la Universidad Washington.

Los resultados del estudio aparecerán en la edición del 5 de febrero del Journal of Clinical Investigation.

No se sabe con certeza si la placa pegajosa —péptido beta amiloide— es la verdadera causa del Alzheimer, una enfermedad degenerativa del cerebro que priva a quienes la padecen de la memoria, la capacidad de comunicarse y de cuidar de sí mismos.

Pero la placa es uno de los principales sospechosos, y varios laboratorios farmacéuticos están desarrollando drogas para combatir la acumulación.

Los investigadores en la Universidad Washington inyectaron ratones con un anticuerpo que eliminó la placa en partes del cerebro. Al quitarse la placa, desapareció rápidamente la inflamación en ramas de células nerviosas, dijeron los investigadores. Advertieron que estos resultados son alentadores, pero se necesitan mayores estudios para determinar si sucederá lo mismo en seres humanos.

La remoción de la placa "condujo frecuentemente a la recuperación de la estructura normal en pocos días", dijo Dave Holtzman, autor principal del estudio y jefe del departamento de neurología de la universidad.

Esto confirma las bondades de los tratamientos antiplaca y "también nos obliga a volver sobre las teorías acerca de cómo las placas dañan las células nerviosas", añadió.

Holtzman y otros científicos consideraban que los daños causados por la placa a las células nerviosas eran irreversibles. Pero estos resultados, dijeron, indican que la placa no sólo causa el daño sino que lo mantiene activamente.

El investigador Robert Brendza dijo que preveía que el daño cesaría una vez removida la placa. "Pero vimos algo mucho más notable: en apenas tres días se produjeron reducciones del 20% al 25% en el número o tamaño de las inflamaciones existentes".

La capacidad de las células de recuperar rápidamente su estructura normal indicaría que las células

## Pats scored with Brady; What Were Others Thinking?

This is what we know about Tom Brady, quarterback of the New England Patriots: He hasn't lost a playoff game, he hasn't lost a Super Bowl and he hasn't lost to Peyton Manning.


NFL talent evaluators didn't see greatness in Tom Brady during his Michigan days. (Getty Images) So why did everyone but New England miss on the guy?

Brady wasn't the first quarterback taken in the 2000 draft. He wasn't the second or third. He was the seventh, chosen in the sixth round with the 199th choice. Ahead of him, in order, went Chad Pennington, Gio Carmazzi, Chris Redman, Tee Martin, Marc Bulger and Spergon Wynn.

Yes, Spergon Wynn.

Brady might have slipped past the Patriots, too, were it not for quarterback coach Dick Rehbein, who pushed hard for his selection but died from heart problems in August 2001 before the QB made it big. The Patriots were considering two quarterbacks, Tim Rattay and Brady, and it was Rehbein who argued the case for the Michigan quarterback.

"He stood on the table and said, 'If we're up to me this is my guy,'" said a source close to the




Patriots.

Now, Brady's the Patriots' guy. He's 8-0 in the playoffs, 2-0 in Super Bowls and a two-time Super Bowl MVP. Yet, as pro scouts pointed out, he might not be here were it not for Mo Lewis sideling then-quarterback Drew Bledsoe with a vicious hit in 2001, forcing the club to turn to its backup.

Tom Brady.

But that's how it sometimes happens. The Rams won Super Bowl XXXIV with league MVP Kurt Warner, a former Arena League quarterback who took over after Trent Green tore knee ligaments in a preseason game. You have to be lucky and good, and the Patriots have been both with Brady.

"I think one of the problems is

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

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## Gonzales is Hispanic role model, Republicans say

Confirming Alberto Gonzales as the new attorney general "will resonate throughout the Hispanic community" despite Democratic complaints that he is connected to the Bush administration's policies on foreign detainees, Republicans said today.

"This is a breakthrough of incredible magnitude for Hispanic-Americans and should not be deluded by partisan politics," said Florida Sen. Mel Martinez, the nation's first Cuban-American senator. "Judge Gonzales is a role model for the next generation of Hispanic-Americans in this country."

GOP senators continued to praise Gonzales through Senate speeches the day before his confirmation vote in that chamber to become the first Hispanic attorney general. Democrats have already said they won't filibuster the White House counsel and former Texas Supreme Court judge, although as many as 30 could vote

against his confirmation on Thursday.

Martinez, the former Housing and Urban Development secretary who broke with Senate tradition by giving part of his floor speech praising Gonzales in Spanish, said the confirmation would mean a lot to young Hispanics who have never seen one of their own in the top four Cabinet positions: secretary of state, defense secretary, treasury secretary or attorney general.

Gonzales' confirmation "will resonate through the Hispanic community, just as it has resonated throughout our community that he has been the president's lawyer," Martinez said.

Republicans said part of the reason the vote is happening on Thursday is because Democrats don't want to give President Bush a success to tout in his State of the Union speech.

"They want the bully pulpit all the way up to and after that to try

to taint this nominee with the perceived sins of the Bush administration," said Sen. John Cornyn, R-Texas.

The Senate's top Democrat said Tuesday that Democrats won't try to filibuster Gonzales' nomination, but will hold extensive debate over his role in developing the Bush administration's policies on foreign detainees.

"There will be an up-or-down vote" and no blockage, Senate Minority Leader Harry Reid of Nevada told reporters after the Democrats huddled for their weekly planning session.

Democratic opposition to Gonzales derives "from the nominee's involvement in the formulation of a number of policies that have tarnished our country's moral leadership in the world and put American soldiers and American citizens at greater risk," Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., said during Senate debate Tuesday.

Gonzales, who served as White

House counsel during Bush's first term, would be the nation's first Hispanic attorney general.

"I'm confident that Judge Gonzales will be confirmed with bipartisan support," Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., said. "And I'm confident that as attorney general, Judge Gonzales will continue to build on the successes of the last four years that we've seen in reducing crime and in fighting corporate fraud and upholding our civil rights laws."

Reid predicted that at least 25 or 30 Democrats would vote against Gonzales but said "there was a decision made not to filibuster."

A filibuster, a parliamentary tactic for delaying Senate action, would require Republicans, who hold a 55-44 majority in the Senate, to win over at least five Democrats — or four Democrats plus Vermont Sen. James Jeffords, an independent — to gain the 60 votes needed to end debate and then confirm Gonzales.

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
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
