Maps Show Undocumented Migrants Best Routes

exico's National Hu man Rights Commission will print and distribute at least 70,000 maps showing immigrants the saf est routes to cross the border into Arizona, officials said Tuesday.

The project, which immediately drew fire from groups organized against illegal immigration, is aimed at reducing the number of people who die trying to cross 50 miles of Sonoran Desert to reach highways in southern Arizona, according to Humane Borders, the Tucson-based humanitarian group that created the maps.

Steel barriers and stepped-up border patrols in California over the last decade have pushed immigrant smuggling routes east to more sparsely populated stretches of the Arizona border. Summer temperatures there routinely surpass 100 degrees.

"We can close the border with enough money and political will, which I don't think we have, but we don't have to kill people by forcing them out into the desert," said the Rev. Robin Hoover, president of Humane Borders.

The Mexican government said 441 of its citizens died last year on the border, most in Arizona.

The new maps will show spots where people have died — presumably discouraging some prospective migrants - as well as main roads, rescue beacons and the locations of water stations maintained by Humane Borders.

The Pima County Board of Supervisors this fall approved spending \$25,000 to support the group's water stations after administrators argued that it was cheaper than the \$300,000 the county spends recovering and storing the bodies of immigrants who died in failed desert crossings.

Hoover said work on the desert maps began in May using government

data and donated mapping software. The maps also show how far an average adult can walk in one, two or three days.

"The idea is to put the fear of God into some of these migrants so they'll stay in the main corridors and don't go where there's no water," said Hoover, pastor of the First Christian Church in Tucson.

Jose Luis Soberanes, president of Mexico's human rights commission, thanked Hoover and his group Tuesday, saying they have been saving the lives of migrants.

> The group last year compiled safety tips for desert crossings that covered proper clothing and how much water to bring for each day's journey. Mexico was criticized for printing a million of the 32-page booklets for migrants headed to the United States.

Jack Martin, special projects director for the

Federation for American Immigration Reform, said the maps and other efforts only encourage illegal immigration.

"The fact that there's an American group doing this," he said, "sends the message that there are Americans who think that it's perfectly acceptable to enter the U.S. illegally, and probably will be down on the border aiding and abetting the illegals when they get in the U.S."

The U.S. House of Representatives approved a bill in December that would add 700 miles of border fencing and make illegal immigration a felony. The bill is expected to reach the Senate next month.

Local Immigration Enforcements Dangerous Substitute for Comprehensive Federal Action

The absence of leadership from the Bush Administration and the enforcement-only approach taken by the U.S. House of Representatives have emboldened state and local legislators to attempt to enact immigration policies of their own.

Much of the legislation has been restrictive and overwhelmingly negative in scope. It has been opposed vigorously by the Mexican American Legal Defense and Educational Fund and other Latino immigrant rights, religious and labor organizations. As the U.S. Senate begins to take up comprehensive immigration reform, litigators and advocates need to pay close attention to state and local legislatures as well.

Under the U.S. Constitution, the setting of immigration policy belongs under the purview of the federal government. Typically, in cases that interpret the Constitution's Supremacy Clause, the responsibilities to naturalize new citizens, enforce land and sea borders, and grant

or deny admission to the United States are deemed to be federal functions.

On that basis, last summer MALDEF successfully helped challenge the actions of two New Hampshire local police chiefs who sought to apply state trespass laws against eight Latinos allegedly in the United States illegally and thus, according to the police, were in their towns without permission.

Had the Hudson and New Ipswich police in New Hampshire prevailed, sheriffs and police chiefs in cities and towns across the country - with no training or understanding of immigration categories or documentation - could have attempted unlawfully attempted to apply similar laws in their jurisdictions.

Local law enforcement of immigration laws by untrained officials can easily lead to racial profiling, with police demanding documentation from individuals they perceive as "looking foreign" regardless of their citizenship or immigration status. This has been the experience with employer sanctions, where, for

La falta de liderazgo de la administración de Bush y el enfoque sobre ejecución de la ley de inmigración a exclusión de otras medidas que propone la Cámara de Representantes han resultado en envalontar a legisladores estatales y locales a intentar poner en acción políticas propias de inmigración.

Mucha de la legislación ha sido restrictiva y de sobremanera negativa en su alcance. El Fondo Mexicano Americano de Defensa Legal y Educación (MALDEF) y otros grupos defensores de los derechos de inmigrantes, religiosos y de trabajo se han opuesto vigurosamente a la legislación. En la medida en que el Senado estadounidense se prepara a presentar reformas comprensivas del sistema de inmigración, abogados y defensores deben prestar mucha atención a las legislaturas estatales y locales también.

Según la Constitución de los Estados Unidos, el establecer políticas de inmigración pertenece a la competencia del gobierno federal. Típicamente, en casos que interpretan la Claúsula de Supremacía de la Constitución, las responsabilidades en la naturalización de nuevos ciudadanos, ejecución de leyes referentes a las fronteras y el mar, y el otorgar o denegar entrada a los Estados Unidos se consideran funciones federales.

Sobre esta base, MALDEF el verano pasado ayudó a contrarrestar exitosamente las acciones de dos jefes de policía en Nueva Hampshire, quienes querían aplicar leyes estatales contra la intrusión en propiedad ajena a ocho latinos supuestamente en los Estados Unidos ilegalmente y por ende, según la policía, en sus pueblos sin autorización.

Si los casos hubieran prevalecido, los jefes de policía en ciudades y pueblos por todo el país - sin capacitación ni comprensión de las categorías de inmigración ni la documentación - sin el amparo de la ley habrían podido

aplicar leyes similares a la de intrusión en sus propias jurisdicciones. La ejecución de leyes de inmigración por parte de agentes del orden locales sin capacitación puede llevar al fichaje racial, en el que la policía exija la presentación de documentos de individuos que perciban "parecen extranjeros", sin hacer caso de su estado de ciudadanía o inmigración. 

Consolidation in Media Swallowed Jobs

California Chicano News Media Association is the first organization of journalists of color to be founded in this country. Last October in Los Angeles it held its 27th **Journalism Opportunities** Conference, the largest annual journalism job fair on the West Coast for people of color.

Over the years the conference has grown from a Latino-only event into a multicultural conference that includes all people of color. It has brought in as partners the Los Angeles chapters of the Asian American Journalists Association and the Black Journalists Association of Southern California.

Southern California's Annenberg School of Journalism, which has

housed CCNMA for more than 25 years, became a part of the conference, and the job fair was expanded to three days.

While the number of young people looking for opportunities in journalism remains strong, the number of recruiters attending the JOC continues to dwindle. At its height in the early 1990s, nearly 100 recruiters representing about 80 companies attended the CCNMA job fair. This past year we had about 60 recruiters representing some 40 companies.

The decrease in recruiters can be attributed primarily to two things: the consolidation of media companies and the shrinking workforce in journalism. Where in the past we had recruiters from several newspapers or TV stations owned by the same chain, we now often see a single recruiter representing the chain and all of its newspapers or broadcast stations.

Clearly it is more difficult for one person to recruit for several properforts, particularly at newspapers, where the presence of journalists of

color remains below 14 percent, according to the 2005 newsroom census by the American Society of Newspaper Editors. Meanwhile, the overall population of people of color continues to grow. It's currently at more than 30 percent of the total population.

Consolidation is also responsible for the shrinking number of jobs at newspapers. Since 2001, newsrooms in the nation's English-language dailies have lost a net of more than 4,100 jobs, according to the ASNE survey, and a tally this year by Editor & Publisher.

We also lose experienced journalists who know the Latino community. In Los Angeles, Frank Sotomayor, with more than 30 years of service, and editorial writer Sergio Muñoz, a former editor of the Los Angeles Spanish-language daily La Opinión, have both accepted buyouts to leave the Los Angeles Times.

Money is at the root of consolidations and layoffs. Fewer employees and economies of scale mean higher In the late 1990s, the University of ties, and that has hurt diversity ef- profits, which seem to be the primary motivation for many of these companies. Profits are obviously impor-

tant for a newspaper to continue publishing, but how much is enough?

ASNE has set a goal having the percentage of people of color working in newsrooms nationwide equal to the percentage of people of color in the nation's population by 2025. That goal will be difficult to reach, even with the shrinking newsrooms, which can artificially increase the percentage of journalist of color.

It is easy to be pessimistic about the future of journalists of color, in particular, and of journalism, in general. But when you see the enthusiasm and commitment from young people who attended CCNMA's job fair, it still gives hope that things can turn around in this industry.

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Puestos de Trabajo en los Medios de Comunicación Fueron Tragados por la Consolidación

Julio Morán a California Chicano News Media Association (CCNMA) es la primera organización de periodistas de color en fundarse en este país. En octubre realizó su vigésima séptima conferencia sobre oportunidades en el periodismo, en Los Angeles, la feria de trabajo más grande anual para personas de color en la costa oeste.

A través de los años la conferencia ha pasado de ser un evento de participación latina exclusivamente a convertirse en una conferencia multicultural que incluye a todas las personas de color. Se ha unido con los capítulos en Los Angeles de la Asociación de Periodistas Asiáticos Americanos y la Asociación de Periodistas Negros del sur de California.

A fines de los noventa, la escuela de periodismo Annenberg, de la Universidad del Sur de California, en la que reside CCNMA desde hace más de 25 años, formó parte de la

conferencia, y se extendió la feria de trabajo a tres días.

Si bien sigue fuerte el número de jóvenes en busca de oportunidades en el periodismo, el número de reclutadores que atienden la conferencia sigue en declive. En su auge a comienzos de los noventa, unos 100 reclutadores en representación de unas 80 empresas asistieron a la feria de trabajo de la CCNMA. Este año que pasó nos tocó registrar a sólo unos 60 reclutadores en representación de unas 40 empresas.

La reducción en el número de reclutadores se puede atribuir en parte a dos cosas: la consolidación de las empresas mediáticas y la reducción en la fuerza laboral del periodismo. Mientras que en el pasado tuvimos reclutadores de varios periódicos o estaciones televisivas propiedad de una misma cadena, lo que vemos con frecuencia hoy es un solo reclutador en representación de la cadena y todos sus periódicos o estaciones de televisión.

Resulta claramente más dificil para una persona reclutar en nombre de varias propiedades, lo cual ha perjudicado los esfuerzos por aumentar la diversidad, en particular en los periódicos, en los que la presencia de periodistas de color se mantiene en menos del 14 por ciento, según el censo de salas de redacción del 2005 que realizó la American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE), mientras que el total de la población de personas de color sigue en aumento, actualmente en más del 30 por ciento de la población total del país.

La consolidación también tiene como resultado la reducción en el número de puestos en los periódicos. Desde el 2001, las salas de redacción en los diarios en inglés del país han perdido un total de más de 4,100 puestos de trabajo, de acuerdo con la encuesta de la ASNE, y con un recuento que este año realizó la organización Editor & Publisher.

También hemos visto la pérdida de periodistas con experiencia que conocen la comunidad latina. En Los Angeles, ambos Frank Sotomayor, con más de 30 años de servicio, y redactor editorial Sergio Muñoz, anterior editor del diario en español en Los Angeles, La Opinión, han aceptado indemnizaciones para irse de The Los Angeles Times.

La raíz de todas la consolidaciones e indemnizaciones es el dinero. Menos empleados y escalas de economía significar mayores ganancias, que parece ser la

motivación primordial de muchas de estas empresas mediáticas. Las ganancias evidentemente son importantes para que un periódico continúe publicando, ¿pero hasta dónde decimos basta?

ASNE se ha propuesto la meta de alcanzar que el porcentaje de personas de color que trabajen en las salas de redacción sea igual al porcentaje de personas de color de la población nacional para el 2025. La meta será dificil de alcanzar, aun con las salas de redacción contrayéndose, lo cual puede aumentar artificialmente el porcentaje de periodistas de color.

Es fácil ser pesimista sobre el futuro de los periodistas de color, en particular, y sobre el periodismo, en general. Sin embargo, al ver el entusiasmo y el compromiso de los jóvenes que asistieron a la feria de trabajo de la CCNMA, surge la esperanza que las cosas puedan cambiar en esta industria.

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What Kind of City do We Really Live In?

That there is a responsibility to be assigned for the freezing deaths of an elderly couple is a foregone conclusion. Where that responsibility lies remains the unanswered question.

What is certain is that there is no reason whatsoever for a tragedy of this dimension to happen in any city, let alone this city. We often hear or read about this kind of tragedy taking place in a large urban area and exhale with a sense of relief that we live in a city that is still small town, one which still values and takes care of its own; at least that's what we hear.

Can we really continue to say that though when just last December, a mother, Brittany Lilly and her son Devin died in a house fire caused by using improper heating equipment and kerosene heating units because they could not afford to properly heat their home? Can we continue to say that if we just witnessed what happened?

The deaths of the elderly couple, Ida and Alfredo Quiroz, serve as a vivid, living example of what happens when we lose focus of the things that really matter. Until we regain our focus and stop pretending that the potential for things like this happening do not exist in this city, we will always be in danger of these things reoccurring.

What strikes me is that public comments do not reflect the severity of a situation like this. News accounts in the mainstream media are sketchy at best; comments from utility company spokespersons seem more interested in explaining their policy rather than expressing their regret about what happened to these two individuals and ensuring that these types of situations do not happen again.

As residents of this city, most of us look to our government officials to have a vision of a certain quality of life in this city that takes all people into consideration. That's one of the benefits of investing in a city by paying taxes. But when great plans are devised that will for example, grow commercial development or increase property tax rolls, or regulate commerce, too often people like the Quiroz are left out of that equation. Are we more intent on ensuring financial profits as opposed to protecting our human resources?

But in case you think I am assigning blame, think again. Rather, it seems to me that it might just be proof of the kind of society we have become. Perhaps we have reached that point where profits come before people; where survival of the fittest once again rules.

Before we promote this city as a wonderful place to live, as being the "Shangri-La" of the west side of Texas, we better make sure we are a city that protects and helps the less fortunate among us.

Whatever the reason and whomever or whatever is to blame for this tragedy, when will we recognize that without the preservation of our most important resource, the human kind, people like the Quiroz or the Lilly's, we will not be able to continue to grow as a city or as a society; at least not with a clear conscience.

Rather we are destined to become a city just like any other, a city of strip malls and housing developments, and ordinances designed for those fortunate enough to enjoy them.

All the while, leaving those that also matter, the elderly, those living in poverty, and the less fortunate among us, to their own devices to survive by whatever means necessary?



Study on hypertension indicates racial disparity among Hispanics

Hispanics in America who selfidentify as Black are suffering higher rates of hypertension than their Hispanic counterparts who identify as White, according to research conducted at Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health. However, the study found that on the whole, U.S. Hispanics have lower rates of high blood pressure (16.8 percent) than non-Hispanics (24.7 percent).

The study suggests this apparent health advantage could be an artifact of the U.S. Census grouping of all Spanish speaking people into a single category (Hispanic) without regard to race. According to Luisa Borrell, DDS, PhD, assistant professor of Epidemiology at the Mailman School and author, "In fact, the research confirms that the 'protective effect' of being Hispanic does not extend to Black Hispanics." Dr. Borrell's research is the first to examine hypertension along racial lines within the Hispanic ethnic group.

'The idealized Hispanic health advantage disappears when race is accounted for," she observes.

Dr. Borrell analyzed data collected in the National Health Interview Survey conducted by the National Center for Health Statistics. The survey asked participants if they had been told by a doctor or other health professional if they had high blood pressure, and included interviews with more than 12,000 Hispanic adults. "Overall, Blacks, regardless of their ethnicity, exhibited the highest prevalence of hypertension," Dr. Borrell indicated.

As a first step toward explaining how health is affected by race, Dr. Borrell's findings beg the question, what is it about being black that makes the difference? "This kind of comparison could help tease out the effect of race as a marker for inequality in opportunities and, further, as a cause for existing health disparities," Dr. Borrell said of these findings.

According to Dr. Borrell, hypertension has been found to be associated with discrimination and racism among non-Hispanic Blacks. She suggests, "because of the racialized society in which we live, Hispanic Blacks could face a double jeopardy - discrimination both from outside the Hispanic community and from within. Such discrimination may lead to inequality in opportunities and life chances which can translate into poorer health."

Dr. Borrell's work was supported by the National Institute of Dental and Craniofacial Research and the Robert Wood Johnson Health and Society Scholars Program.

The full study findings are published in the Winter issue of the journal, Ethnicity & Disease.



Los Latinos en las Artes: Un Breve Adios al 2005

Un golpe fuerte a un espectáculo musical latino con destino a Broadway se compensó con la primera vez en la historia que una artista mexicana recibiera un premio Tony, en el 2005.

Sara Ramirez, nacida en Tijuana, ganó el premio Tony en junio por su actuación como la dama del lago, con laudes de los críticos, la única protagonista mujer en el espectáculo musical exitoso de Monty Python, Spamalot. Ramírez se llevó el Tony en la categoría de mejor actriz principal en un espectáculo musical - uno de tres premios Tony que ganó Spamalot.

Ramírez no fue la única artista mexicana con un éxito en Broadway en el 2005: celebridad de la televisión, Eugenio Derbez, protagonizó la puesta en escena corta, pero exitosa, de Latinologues, que estrenó en el otoño en el teatro Helen Hayes. La obra la creó el artista Rick Nájera, nacido en San Diego, con dirección de Cheech Marin.

Sin embargo, una de las grandes decepciones en Broadway en el 2005 fue la cancelación del espectáculo musical que costó \$12 millones, The Mambo Kings, a sólo escasas semanas de su fecha de estreno en Nueva York. Con base en la novela de Oscar Hijuelos, premiada con un Pulitzer, que trata el tema de músicos cubanos en la década de los cuarenta en Nueva York, el espectáculo, con

los estrellas Jaime Camil y Esai Morales, recibió malas críticas en los ensayos de verano en San Francisco.

En el 2005 estrenaron dos exposiciones importantes sobre culturas pre-colombinas en museos estadounidenses.

La exposición, Los Señores de la Creación: Los origenes del reinado sagrado maya, abrió el 10 de septiembre en el Los Angeles County Museum of Art, donde estuvo hasta el 2 de enero del 2006. Contiene unos 150 objetos, incluyendo a unos 70 que prestaron México, Guatemala y Honduras nunca antes vistos en los Estados Unidos. Este año la exposición se transfiere al Dallas Museum of Art y al Metropolitan Museum of Art en Nueva York.

Una exposición itinerante de mucha importancia, que considera los retratos latinoamericanos desde épocas precolombinas hasta el siglo XX se detuvo en Miami y en San Diego antes de llegar a su penúltimo destino en octubre a la Galeria Nacional de Retratos, de la Smithsonian Institution, en Washington, D.C. viene de la primera Asi ha ocurrido con sanciones laborales, en las que, por unas dos décadas, muchos patrones de obreros latinos han pedido documentos más allá de lo que la ley requiere.

Una consecuencia aun más peligrosa de la participación de agentes locales del orden en la ejecución de las leyes de inmigración es el perjuicio que surte sobre las relaciones entre la policia y la comunidad. Por ejemplo, los agentes locales del orden tienen dificultad en instruir y asegurar a las víctimas de la violencia doméstica y sus defensores que el mismo policia que responda al llamado de auxilio no usará su nueva autoridad en la ejecución de las leyes de inmigración para presionar a los testigos o a miembros de la familia a cooperar en una investigación.

Cualquier jurisdicción que quiera ejecutar leyes de inmigración debe cerciorarse de instruir a los miembros de la comunidad sobre el alcance legal de su autori-

dad. En gran parte las jurisdicciones locales se quedan tanto responsables de defender sus acciones como sujetas a pagar por ellas.



St. Elizabeth Designated Historcal Building



Dedicated on March 29, 1936, the church was named for St. Elizabeth to honor the mother of Papal Contess Katherine Price, who contributed greatly to the building project. 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Local Immigration Enforcement is Dangerous

This has been the experience with employer sanctions, where, for almost the past two decades, many employers of Latino workers have made excessive requests of documents beyond what the law requires.

A more dangerous consequence of involving local law enforcement in immigration laws is the damage it does to police-community relations. For example, local law enforcement officials are hard pressed to educate and reassure domestic violence victims and their advocates that the same officer who responds to a call for help will not use his new immigration authority to pressure witnesses or family members to cooperate in an investigation.

Any jurisdiction that seeks to enforce immigration laws must take great pains to educate its community members on the legal scope of its authority. For the most part, local jurisdictions are left with both the responsibility to defend their actions and the liability to pay for them.


In the mid-1990s, when officials in Chandler, Ariz., conducted sweeps jointly with the then Immigration and Naturalization Service (INS), predictable turmoil followed in the local Latino community. The City of Chandler, not the federal government, had to pay \$500,000 to community members whose civil rights were violated.

Another area where local ordinances interact with immigration laws is the prohibition of day laborers seeking employment by gathering around high traffic areas. In 2005, MALDEF obtained court orders blocking the implementation of ordinances in two Southern California communities. It continues to monitor day labor ordinances and fight unwise restrictive proposals.

More recently, the cities of Herndon, Va., and Burbank, Calif., have promoted privately run temporary labor centers that are safer for workers and reduce the potential for disturbances to neighboring homes or businesses.

In addition, the City of Los Angeles is contemplating what many consider to be model legislation that would require temporary worker centers to be co-located on the premises of very large home improvement stores. As long as small employers in the construction, home improvement and related industries seek out and hire temporary workers, the workers not all of whom are here illegally will gather to meet them. This workable approach allows local officials to advance safe and secure hiring without involving themselves in the federal act of setting immigration policy.

The Bush Administration and Congress must address our nation's immigration problems with a comprehensive solution that includes necessary improvements in enforcement as well as legal channels for undocumented workers to adjust their status and continue contributing to local communities.

La administración del presidente George Bush, que en principio había negado la licencia por considerar que violaba las leves actuales del embargo contra Cuba. aceptó el pasado viernes que el equipo de la isla jugara.

"A ganar o a perder luchando alli, no vamos a decir que somos los mejores, ya lo hemos demostrado, les hemos ganado a ellos", afirmó.



If Alexander gets mega-deal, it's Seahawks who should offer it



By Clark Judge Nobody is in a better position today than Seattle running back Shaun Alexander.

He was the league MVP. He set an NFL record for touchdowns. And he helped propel Seattle to its first-ever Super Bowl. It doesn't get much better than that, but it will for Alexander, because now comes his reward for a year's hard work.

The only question is: When? And it's one that has Alexander, his agent and much of Seattle in a quandary. If Alexander is so valuable -- and a nationwide panel of writers named him the league's most valuable player -- why haven't the Seahawks moved to

keep the guy? His contract expires in a month, and Seattle promised not to protect him by designating him its franchise or transition player for 2006. Which means, yep, Shaun Alexander, who scored 28 times this year and led the league in rushing, could be playing his last game for Seattle in Super Bowl XL.

The thought isn't as inconceiv-

able as it sounds. The Seahawks were willing to peddle him last year after he produced a franchise-record 20 touchdowns and was the league's second-leading rusher. But you have to believe that somewhere between now and March 3, the Seahawks come to their senses and lock down their most valuable player -- correction, the NFL's

most valuable player -- and keep him off the free-agent market.

What I don't understand is why it has gone this far.

"I really don't know," said agent Jim Steiner, who attended the Seahawks' NFC Championship Game win last weekend. "It's just one of those strange occurrences."

Typically, clubs try to extend star players one or two years before their contracts expire, but that hasn't happened here. Alexander has made it known he wants to remain in Seattle, and the rapport he seems to have gained with coach Mike Holmgren this season can only help his cause.

But why are we even having this discussion? Alexander could've been tied down to a longterm deal long ago. Steiner said he first addressed the idea with the Seahawks two or three years ago, but talks went about as far as Seat- signed. tle went in the playoffs -- which was nowhere.

"And it could have been to their

advantage," Steiner said. He's right about that. Look at how Philadelphia gained strength the past five years, and you understand why. The Eagles identified key players or potential stars, then signed them to long-term deals -with benefits to both sides. The player gains a wad of guaranteed money early, while the club gains a discount on the average salary.

That might have happened with Alexander, except the two sides never reached an agreement. So

Alexander was left to play this season wondering if it was his last in Seattle, and all he did was produce the biggest and best numbers of a six-year career that's been as consistent as it has productive.

Twice he scored four times in a game. Four times he scored at least three. He produced his fifth consecutive season with 16 or more touchdowns. He won his first rushing title. He broke Priest Holmes' single-season record for TDs. He averaged a career-high 5.1 yards per carry. He led the Seahawks to a franchise-best 13-3 finish. And he ran for 132 yards and two scores in a 34-14 shredding of Carolina in the NFC title game.

"The only thing better would be to have a long-term deal in place." said Steiner. "It just hasn't happened yet."

That doesn't mean it can't. Or won't. In fact, you have to believe the Seahawks make Alexander's contract a priority no matter what happens in Super Bowl XL. Steiner said the two sides spoke during the season but agreed to table talks until it was over -- which means there will be no news on the Alexander front for at least a couple more weeks.

Tim Ruskell, the Seahawks president of football operations, has said that he would make an evaluation of Alexander as the year progressed and that any talk of a contract was premature. OK, fine, so he has another week and a half before renewing negotiations. But there is no decision here.

He demonstrated why this season. He demonstrated why last weekend. Shaun Alexander has nothing left to prove. He'll make megabucks somewhere next season. It's up to the Seahawks to make sure it's in Seattle.

"Do I think it will happen?" said Steiner. "I don't know. I can't read this, so I'm unsure. Obviously, I'm not concerned about his value (on the open market), and I'm sure the Seahawks know how Shaun feels. It's really in their control on whether he comes back or not."

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
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


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
The Lowrider History
