At age 9, I realized with a certain adult pride that I would no longer have to venture out, shoe box in hand, to pluck grass from the neighbor's lawn. Such childish pastimes were behind me now.

Not so fast, said Mom. "If you want to find any presents next to your bed tomorrow, you better get grass for the camels."

"But, Mom," I replied, "there are no camels."

"You heard me," Mom said, handing me a shoe box. My mother, the extortionist.

At age 19, home in Santurce, Puerto Rico, for Christmas vacation after my first semester of college-cooked dorm food, I emerged from my bedroom to encounter my mother approaching and brandishing a shoe box.

"But Mom, I'm in college now." "You know what I want," said the extortionist sweetly.

Shulking around the bushes next to the parking lot (my parents lived in a condo now), I cursed my mother's holiday obsession. What was she trying to prove? What could she possibly accomplish by making her fully grown son pick at grass like a cow?

Now I am 23, out of college and reporting for a newspaper in Chicago, far from Santurce.


rodeaban al Niño y consus finos pétalos acariciaban sus piecitos desnudos impregnándolos de aroma.

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

**CAPIROTADA  
(bread pudding)**

• 1 c. sugar • 2 c. water • 6 slices toasted bread  
• 1 t. cinnamon • 1/2 c. grated cheese • 1 c. raisins  
• 2 t. fat

Melt sugar until lightly browned. Add water and cinnamon and boil until sugar is dissolved. Place a layer of bread in a casserole. Add cheese and raisins. Repeat until all ingredients are used. Pour syrup over mixture, add fat and bake in a moderate oven until the syrup is absorbed by the bread.

**BISCOCHITOS  
(cookies)**

• 1 1/2 c. pure lard • 3/4 c. sugar • 2 egg yolks (optional) • 1 t. anise seed • 6 c. sifted flour • 3 t. baking powder • 1/2 c. water • 1 t. salt - Makes 10 dozen cookies

Cream sugar and lard until light and fluffy, add anise seed and beaten egg yolks beating for a few seconds. Sift flour, baking powder and salt together, add to mixture. Add water and knead until well mixed. Roll out, Cut with cookie cutter and sprinkle with a mixture of sugar and cinnamon. Bake in 350 degrees oven, twelve minutes or until golden brown.


**TAMALES DULCES  
(sweet tamales)**

• 4 c. masa harina • 1 c. sugar • 1 t. salt • 3" crushed stick cinnamon • 2 c. lard, room temp. • 4 c. boiling water (to make dough soft) • 1 c. raisins • 1 c. blanched almonds, whole or halved • red vegetable coloring

Mix the Masa Harina, sugar, salt, cinnamon, and add the lard and boiling water; stir and beat until dough is soft but not runny. Add raisins and almonds and beat them in with a spoon. Cool for ease in handling. Just before putting dough into husks, stir in a few streaks of vegetable coloring about 1/4 t. do not mix in, stir only a few times, to make dough streaky. Use about a soupspoonful of dough to each small tamale. Use the smaller husks for wrapping. While the fillings can only improve by being made a day or so before, the doughs never should be made more than an hour or two before cooking, and should be kept warm and spreadable.


**EMPAHADAS  
(turnovers)**

**CRUST:** • 3 c. flour • 1/4 c. shortening • 1 t. salt • 1 egg, well beaten • 5 T. water • 1 T. vinegar

Cut shortening into flour and salt. Beat egg, water and vinegar together. Pour liquid into flour mixture all at once. Blend with a spoon just until flour is all moistened. This is an easy crust to handle and can be rolled without toughening. It also keeps in the refrigerator for up to two weeks. Roll out chilled dough 1/8 inch thick and cut into four or five circles (three inch circles for miniature turnovers).

Spoon filling on one side of each circle. Dampen edges of dough, fold over, and press edges together with fork. Brush with butter if you wish. Bake at 400°F for about twenty minutes or until browned. If you wish you may roll the hot turnovers in sugar mixed with a little cinnamon. Makes twelve to fifteen turnovers, or three dozen miniature size.

**PUMPKIN-RAISIN FILLING:** Combine in a pan 1 c. canned or fresh cooked pumpkin, 1/4 c. sugar, 1/2 c. raisins, 2 t. anise seed and 1/4 t. salt. Bring to boil and simmer ten minutes. Cool before using.

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

Maybe I first should explain what I'm doing writing to you about a sports matter, especially because I'm a professor of theology here at SMU.

What in the world does a religion teacher have to do with a football program, you must be asking, and that's a good question (after all, what in the world does religion have to do with Christmas?).

Well, Santa, a lot has happened to our football program since last year. Yeah, I know, we were in trouble last year, but we're in a lot more trouble now.

Last month, a bunch of us teachers got together and rounded-up 200 signatures on a petition calling for an end to "Quasi-professional athletics" on campus.

There was a big uproar, but three days later, a couple of additional scandals broke. One football player allegedly was paid to play and another football player reportedly received a rent-free apartment.

And about a week later, the president of the University quit. More recently, the Athletic Director and the football coach also quit.

All that happened while SMU was already on a three-year probation that limits scholarships and bans television and bowl appearances.

In fact, the idea that the NCAA could actually suspend football here for a couple of years is not far-fetched.

Well, like a professor giving a lecture, I've wasted some words. But all I'm asking for is a big-time college football program whose athletes are also students.



### Check Safety To Make The Holidays Bright



- Before hanging strings of lights, spread them on the floor and check for frayed or bare wires, cracked insulation, loose connections, and damaged plugs or light sockets.
- Check extension cords for wear or damage and don't run them across walking areas.
- Test lights before putting them on the tree. Unplug them before making repairs or replacing bulbs.
- Overloading circuits with too many lights can cause fire. Follow manufacturer's instructions about the number of lights allowed on one circuit.
- Choose a fresh, green tree, trim its base and keep it in plenty of water. If the needles are brown and break off easily, it could be a fire risk.
- If you buy an artificial tree, make sure it has been tested for flammability by Underwriters Laboratories (UL).
- Place your tree away from the fireplace or other heat sources and out of the traffic pattern.
- Never string lights on a metallic tree. Light strings with damaged insulation can electrically charge a metallic tree. Instead, shine unattached colored floodlights or spotlights on the tree.
- Always turn off lights before leaving home or going to bed. You'll save money and be safer, too.
- Never use lighted candles on a tree or near evergreens. And don't burn evergreens in the fireplace.
- Do not use inside lights on the outside. All outside lighting equipment, including lights, cords and plugs, should be waterproof and made for outdoor use. Also, hang sockets downward and don't leave a socket empty.
- When hanging lights on the rooftop or in tall trees outdoors, stay clear of electrical lines. Make sure you or your decorations don't come in contact with them.
- Should you receive a CB radio or television this Christmas, let a qualified serviceman install the CB base unit or television antenna for you. This delicate job is best left to the professionals.
- Be sure electrical toys are tested for safety. Look for the UL mark.


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
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
