City Federation Will Begin Beautification Work on Park

A large and enthusiastic group of women met at the clubhouse yesterday afternoon to discuss plans that lay before the City Federation, Mrs. J. I. McDowell, president, presided.

The first part of the meeting was devoted to reports of standing committees. Mrs. J. B. Young, chairman of the tournament committee, announced that \$40 was cleared on the last bridge tournament and that another tournament would be announced for the near future.

Mrs. W. H. Martin, chairman of the library committee, announced that 700 books had been collected in the recent city-wide canvass for books for the public library, and many magazines had been voluntarily offered.

Mrs. L. L. Freeman, chairman of the membership committee, reported several teams to be heard from. Mrs. C. W. Cunningham told the Federation of the plans for the improving of the two-acre park site donated by Mrs. W. R. Settles. The plans include the immediate planting of twenty trees. The City Commission has promised, she said, to assist in the beautifica-

tion in every way. Mrs. W. R. Settles was present and presented the deed to the park to the Federation. The park has been donated with the understanding that \$100 annually will be spent on it for five years. The park, which is at the end of Main street, south of the Dixie Camp, is well situated for its particular purpose and the women of the Federation expressed their appreciation of Mrs. Settles' interest in the town's appearance and promised to take full advantage of her gift.

Mr. Watson, secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, was present and announced the coming farmers short course to be held on March 11 and 12, and asked the women to attend the lectures and to appoint a committee to serve as hostesses. Mrs. Fox Strippling, Mrs. W. W. Paulsen, Mrs. Bud Brown and Mrs. W. R. Settles were appointed.

A shower was announced for the clubhouse to replace the annual library tea this year. Among the gifts suggested for the clubhouse were kitchen equipment, a linoleum for the kitchen floor, draperies for the auditorium windows, chairs, and tables. A full list of what is needed will be published later so that the Federation members can be selecting their gifts early. The shower will be held during March.

It was decided to revive tag day which was omitted last year because of plans for building the clubhouse. April 20 was set for the date.

The Federation voted to take over the management of a luncheon on March 21 in the clubhouse during the nurses' convention and to charge one dollar a plate. The women will donate, the food and the proceeds will go toward paying off the building debts. Mrs. J. J. Butterfield, Mrs. A. M. Rippe, and Mrs. J. C. Douglas were appointed to take charge of the luncheon.

The women also voted to endorse Mrs. Joe Edwards' suggestion that Mrs. Barker, who has had experience in directing plays in the Northeast Texas tournaments, be instructed to work up a play for the benefit of the clubhouse, with the idea of later developing a little theatre or drama department of the Federation.

Mrs. R. Homer McNew took charge of the program and presented to the members the details of a civic program for a clean-up and a beautification campaign for Big Spring that promises to surpass anything the town has ever attempted before. The campaign

SAN OIL FIELD TOWN HAS OVER 4,000 POPULATION

Established, City Water System, Telephone Connections and Other Facilities Give Citizens Every Convenience.

The rapidly growing oil field town, located in the Howard county oil fields, situated 16 miles south of Big Spring, has a population of over 4,000 people. In the fact that this oil field center was founded less than a year ago, it has grown by leaps and bounds, and is now over 50 business concerns in the town.

The owners report favorable business conditions. The west establishment for Forsan is the postoffice. Mrs. Agnes Arnold has received notification that her appointment has been confirmed and she is now a full-time postmistress. The citizens of Forsan will now be given a class postal service and prompt mail delivery.

Forsan has a city water system that adequately services the townsite. An additional 250-barrel storage tank of water has been added to the service and the people are supplied with all of the water they can use from the water well, located on the townsite. They have completed laying a 6,000-foot extension to the water which covers the townsite and takes water where needed.

Extension from the telephone system of San Angelo to Forsan, and gives the people of that community a long distance telephone service.

City has been used in Forsan since a short time after the Texas Electric Service Company having a high line to this point.

People continue to come to Forsan. New business continues to open up, and the town is growing. Stewart, Bruce Frazier and others are interested in the Townsite Company.

You just can't afford to haggle about the price of property in Big Spring if you want to secure possession of favorably located lots. Just recently one firm wanted a certain lot in the business section and had decided to offer \$15,000 for the property believing the price was far too high. Before they could get in touch with the owners they learned someone else had paid \$20,000 for the property.

What Can Be Done About It

Every once in a while an angry automobile owner breezes into the Herald office with a tale of woe about having to pay \$2.50 to redeem his automobile, which had been parked in the business district at night.

There's one thing certain; if we expect the streets to be cleaned, they must be kept clear of parked automobiles. The street sweeping department can't be expected to juggle parked cars—many of which are locked, and all parked cars should be in order to do the street cleaning work.

Signs have been painted on all curbs stating that a time parking limit is being observed—there is no room to print warning of no parking after midnight; and if so the auto owner might not notice it, nor can the city afford to pay a man to warn every automobile owner that parking after midnight in the business section is prohibited. We wonder how other cities meet this problem.

Of course it is hard to make a stranger pay \$2.50 to remind him that parking on our streets is prohibited, but it's hardly fair for him to leave his car out on the street, as a temptation to some automobile thief to nab.

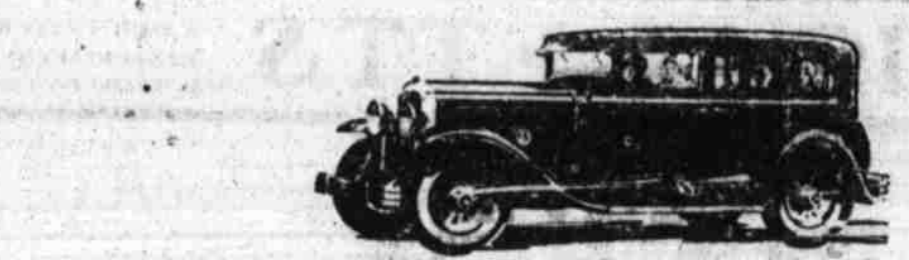
