County Farm Tour Illustrates Ag Diversification

This year's Farm Tour was concentrated in the Western portion of Yoakum County, from just outside the city limits of Plains to the New Mexico stateline. The '98 production year has been brutal on area ag producers; a lack of underground moisture prior to planting dates, fierce winds in the growing season, some spotty but very damaging hail storms, searing, record breaking heat in June and July, irrigation wells pumping off. Despite all the adverse conditions, those riding the tour bus did see some good crops of cotton, peanuts, watermelons,

and even pumpkins.




Texas currently has a statute on the books which in effect, leaves joining a enhanced unitization program in a field up to the working interest owners and royalty owners. There are 33 oil producing states in the country, and Texas is the only state without a compulsory utilization statute. New Mexico passed its unitization statute in 1975, New Mexico Permian Basin formed 33 of the units, producing 280 million barrels of oil. During the same period, lack of the compulsory agreement resulted in a loss of Texas production estimated at 1.4 bil-

An extra special thank you to our EMS, Yoakum County Hospital Emergency Room staff, and Dr. Boyd, who went above and beyond. May God richly bless each one.



Robin Squyres honored by O.C.



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

CDA Warns About Criminal Mischief

Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark said Monday those who think commiting criminal mischief acts are fun definitely need to think again.


"We've had a rash of incidents, and many of them have been committed by juveniles, and we want everyone to be aware these acts can carry some very severe penalties."

Definitions of acts of criminal mischief include damaging or destroying tangible property, tampering with property causing financial loss or inconvenience, markings on property including inscriptions, slogans, drawings or paintings, tampering with property which interferes with the owners proprietary rights.

The penalty structure for criminal mischief ordinarily ties the punishment to the monetary loss; Criminal mischief can result in either a class C, B or A misdemeanor charge, a state jail felony or a third, second or first degree felony, all depending on the dollar amount of the loss. The state takes a very dim view of any mischief acts taken on public service installations of all kinds, and an even dimmer view of acts committed against places

Clark reported a youth was recently jailed on criminal mischief charges resulting in heavy financial loss. "It was a pretty dumb stunt, as he was already on probation for a prior conviction of the same offense."

LOOK FOR PIPELINE MARKERS

Pipeline markers are located throughout the pipeline routes and at sites like roads and railroad crossings to help identify the approximate location of pipelines. Line markers list the commodity transported, the company name, and a 24-Hour telephone number. Our 800 EMERGENCY NUMBER is listed below.

Line markers have limited information and are placed near the pipelines, but not necessarily directly on top of them. The line markers may be surrounded by painted

USE YOUR SENSES OF SIGHT, HEARING, AND SMELL AS WAYS TO **RECOGNIZE A LEAK**

LOOK around the pipeline area for these signs:

- · Accumulation of petroleum products on the ground.
- · Dense white cloud or fog.
- · Spot of discolored or dead vegetation.
- Rainbow colored sheen on the surface of water. Fire and smoke if the petroleum product has ignited.
- LISTEN for unusual noises-from a slight hiss to a roaring sound.

DETECT a strong petroleum scent or other pungent odor.



IF YOU CAUSE OR DISCOVER A PIPELINE LEAK, YOU SHOULD:

- IMMEDIATELY SHUT OFF and abandon any machinery / equipment.
- 2. AVOID creating sparks.
- 3. LEAVE the area at once to a safe upwind location.
- 4. DO NOT drive into or near a leak area or vapor cloud. If your automobile stalls, DO NOT attempt to restart it. Instead, ABANDON the vehicle and leave to a safe upwind location.
- CONTACT the local emergency response agency for assistance.
- 6. NOTIFY the pipeline owner or operator. Give your name and phone number, a description of the leak, and its location.



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
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
