

Adding to the diversification- and revitalization of the County's agricultural scene is the current planting of some 60 acres of spinach, on the Brad Palmer farm some two miles north of the New -Tex Gin. Not the first planting of the crop in the area, following successful years of production in the southern irrigated areas of the county, Palmer and other producers are looking at Spinach as an alternative cash crop.

Thousands of cubic yards of dirt are being excavated, moved and sculpted at the City's sewage disposal facility northeast of town.

West Texas Paving Company of Lubbock is the contractor for the project, which saw the scrapers, dozers and maintainers fire up the middle of last month.

Sharp also announced that property owners who had property damaged by a storm, flood or fire last year may file a special decreased value report that could lower their final tax bills. Property owners may file the decreased value report about their property's condition on January 1, 1996.

Property owners may ask the chief appraiser for additional time--through April 30--if the owners can demonstrate good cause. The chief appraiser must grant owners of property regulated by the Public Utility Commission or the Railroad Commission an extension to April 30 to file the reports and may extend the deadline another 15 days if the owners request it in writing and show good cause.







### Senate Farm Bill A "Sell Out,"

### **Says TFU President**

(Waco): The farm bill passed by the U.S. Senate last week was termed a "sell out of American farm families and Rural America to the special interests of agri-business and a license for a few corporations to further dominate the marketing, processing and trading of agricultural commodities" by Texas farmers Union President Wes Sims. The farm organization spokesman expressed concern that the Agricultural Transition Act--also known as the Freedom to Farm Act--would escalate the move of U.S. agriculture away from its system of independently owned and operated family farms.

Sims stated, "There are unacceptable provisions in the Agriculture Marketing Transition Act which will do great harm to Texas agricultural producers and Rural America," for the following reasons:

\*Farmers cannot stay in business with loan rates of \$1.89 per bushel corn, \$2.58 per bushel wheat, \$5.26 per bushel soybeans, 52 cents per pound cotton, and \$6.50 cwt rice prices, which this program effectively mandates through similar Commodity Credit Corporation loans.

\*Decoupling program payments from commodity prices and yields will set a precedent which is politically indefensible. Taxpayers will not tolerate this approach in a farm bill.

\*There are no allowances for acreage reduction programs in years of over production.

\*There are no provisions for Farmer Owned Reserves to protect national food security and ensure abundant food and fiber in this country.

\*World market prices for commodities will drop dramatically, causing undue financial stress on farmers worldwide and on domestic lending institutions.

\*There are no allowances for an Emergency Livestock Feed Assistance Program. \*Land values will be devastated, as will

the rest of Rural America's infrastructure. \*Farmer input or public debate has not been allowed to formulate this bill.

Farmers Union supports the retention of the current permanent farm law safety net and the reauthorization of nutrition, conservation and rural development programs.

"The bottom line is that the Agricultural Transition Act will drive down commodity prices, lower farm income and make it difficult for young farmers to enter production agriculture," said Sims. "We will urge President Clinton to veto the proposal if it reaches his desk."

"Beyond the devastating economic impact this proposal would have on rural communities, we need to question the long-term consequences of a food supply controlled by a handful of multi-national corporations. We also need to ask ourselves if such\*a system of food production is worth the environmental degradation and the loss of rural businesses and infrastructure," said Sims.

The Yoakum County Soil and Water Conservation District Board of Directors is pleased to announce the winners of their annual Conservation Poster and Conservation Essay contests.


