



Yoakum County Tax Assessor-Collector Jan Parrish recently completed Class One Certification for the Board of Tax Professional Examiners. The class, "Introduction to Texas Property Tax Law" was taught by the Texas Association of Assessing officers in

The training is a five year process of educational schools and tests to become a registered Tax Assessor-Collector (RTA). Once the RTA is earned, continuing education must be earned regularly. The class offers an overview of the entire property tax system, from the process of appraisal of the property to actual collection of taxes. Jan reported, " It was a very intense class. Much of what was taught takes place in the Appraisal District, not in my office, so I had no previous knowledge of their terminology, procedures and requirements. I learned a great deal, and I'm glad to get this first step of my certification out of the way."



flourishes to remind people of the progress we have made in the fight to eliminate cancer. Over the past several decades, we have developed new drugs and surgical techniques to provide cancer suffers improved chances for survival. We need to continue research to improve the treatment for this disease. We can modify our behaviors to lower our risk of cancer. We can eat healthier foods and exercise. We also know cancer risks are increased by abusing alcohol and smoking.

There is another habit we can cultivate which can have a major impact on our health, getting screened for cancer. Today's physicians have a wide range of diagnostic tools which can help us discover cancers early when the chances for successful treatment are high. Many of these screenings should be done on a regular basis after age 50, although those with family histories of certain types of cancer should consult their physician about starting to test even earlier.

We are also aware that cancer affects various groups differently. African-Americans have the highest cancer mortality rates of any group, a factor some doctors attribute to a lack of access to early testing and

ous because they are usually too advanced for easy treatment when they are finally discovered. This is why men should if cancer should strike. get screened for prostate can-

cer. Women should get tested for cervical cancer and get mammograms to detect lymphoma and other types of can-

We should also be on the lookout for the most common form of cancer, skin cancer, which is diagnosed over 1 million times per year in America. The best check up is to keep an eye on skin changes. The best prevention is to avoid exposure to the sun's damaging ultraviolet rays by wearing protective clothing or sunblock lotion.

In addition to adopting healthier lifestyles and getting early screening, we can take other steps to fight cancer.

Many of us donate to organizations such as the American Cancer Society, the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society. We can also participate in their fundraising activities, such as the annual Komen Foundation's Race for the Cure. These organizations support scientific research of Health emphasizes cancer research.

In 2002, Congress enacted my bill, the Hematological Cancer Research Investment and Education Act, which directed the NIH to establish a coordinated blood cancer research initiative to improve our response to this deadly disease. Under this program, MD Anderson received a five-year, \$12.75 million grant to research Leukemia. The grant is funded at \$2.5 million each year, through 2007.

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



Arkansas Governor Mike Huckabee recently said, " Today's employers are looking for individuals who can not only read and write well, but who can think creatively and find creative solutions to difficult problems," He says disadvantaged kids involved in the arts score higher on standardized tests and for this reason, every child should be given the opportunity to participate in the arts.

In Ft. Walton Beach, Florida professional ballet dancer Eric Allen teaches elementary students his vocation. In 1999 he asked the Okaloosa County School Board permission to replicate Citydance, an outreach of the Boston Ballet, for at-risk third graders in Boston public schools. Two years later he was given permission to organize the three year curiculum to teach students French, music, art and ballet everyday, along

Art is not just for highbrows. It is inclusive and solves many behavioral problems by reaching students in ways they are not otherwise being reached. Thsi includes written work, portfolio and performance assessments/ "The creative arts process, imbedded in quality arts instruction, contributes to the social, gognitive and emotional development of children and is fundamental and essential to the education of all children," (written for Oklahoma Arts Assessment Task Force March 26, 2004)

Sir Ken Robinson, Senior Advisor, Education Policy, The Getty Foundation, states, " America needs a workforce that is flexible, adaptable, and highly creative; and it needs an education system that can develop these qualities in everyone. Standardization is the enemy of innovation."

Herein is the dilemma; Teaching to the test is the antithesis to expanding horizons with the arts. Pressure for annual progress shown with test scores is the norm in America's schools. Furthermore, innovation and creativity are being

"Habitat for the Homeless" was the April 25 program chosen and presented by Tsa Mo Ga President Debbie Spears home.
