## CONSTRUCTION ON SCHEDULE NEW WATER STORAGE TANK

In just a few more days, the initial construction of the City's new 350,000 gal. water storage tank will be complete. The long needed tank will help alleviate the chronic late summer shortage of water the city faces in peak demand times.

The new tank, 32 feet in height, with a domed, self supporting top adding another three feet to the overall height, and with a diameter of 44 feet, will give the city a total storage capacity of 450,000 gallons when the old and smaller tank at the construction site is removed. City Administrator David Brunson says this amount of water is sometimes

pumped during the hottest summer days.

When the erection and steel work is finished, the tank will be sandblasted and painted, the interior coated with a special epoxy base paint to ensure longevity.

To utilize the additional storage capacity, a new attempt will be made to drill a successful well on City owned property just west of town. Brunson says a test well will be drilled in the next two to three weeks to check water quality. City officials feel confident this location will produce a well with an abundant supply of water, as there are several

good irrigation wells in the immediate vicinity. Council member Kent Welch stated, "Many times, it is harder to locate water with an acceptable quality than it is to find an adequate amount, because of Governmental standards".

The final drilling of the hopefully producing well is on hold, the result of various governmental environmental questions which are being answered by City Hall. In all probability, the final drilling will not take place for another 45 to 60 days, according to Brunson.

## COWBOYS 2nd, COWGIRLS 7th IN DISTRICT TRACK MEET

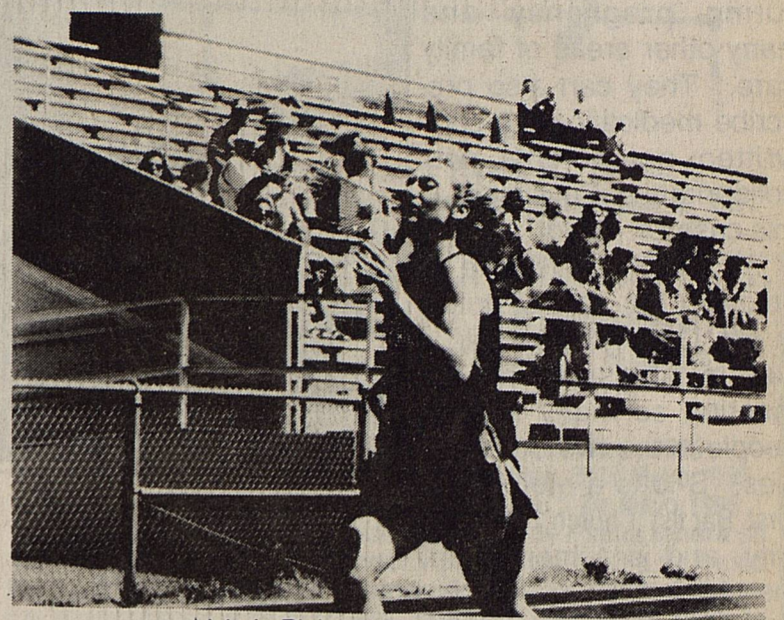

Valerie Blair crosses 3200 finish line.

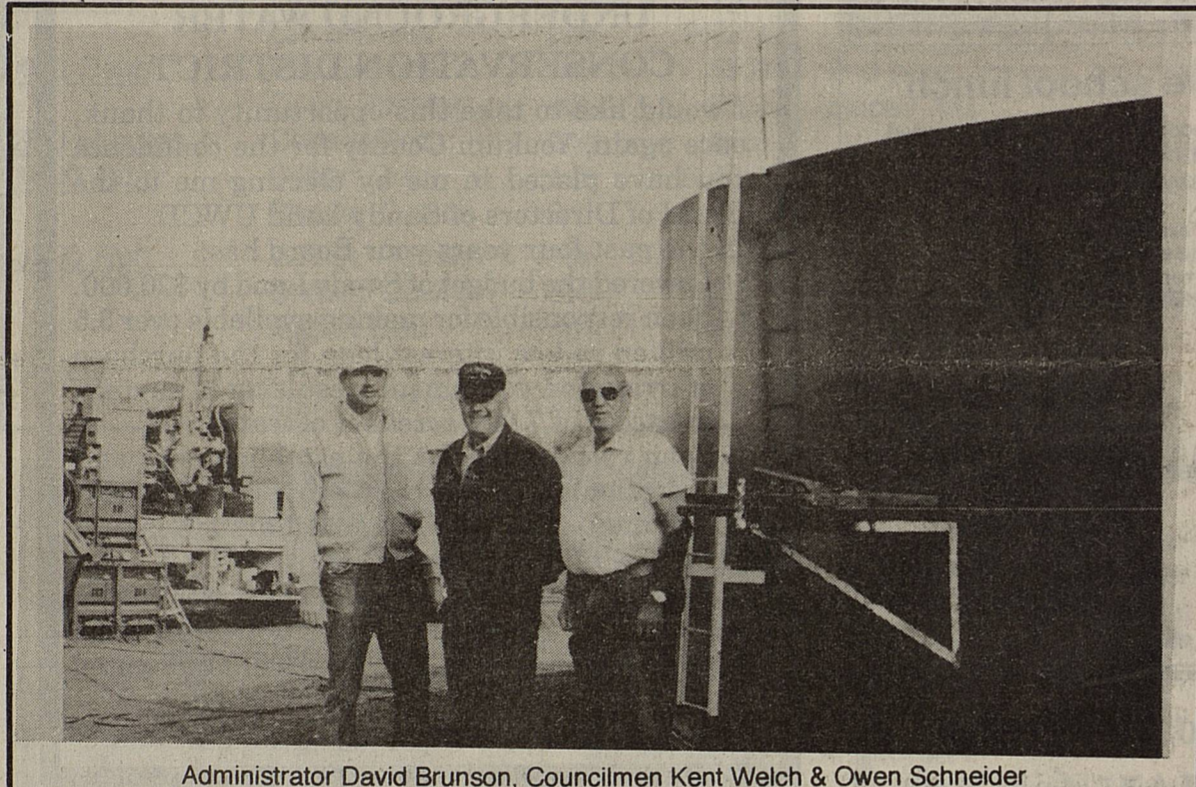
and finished second in the time of 13:23.36, just 12 seconds behind the winner.

## Nurse Practitioner \*\* Anderson Now \*\* Serving Local Clinic

Medical health care services at the local County Clinic has been expanded and improved with the arrival of Family Nurse Practitioner Martha Jo Anderson, now working with Dr. Larry Boyd.

Anderson is currently seeing patients with Dr. Boyd at the local clinic on Thurs. afternoons. Starting May 2nd, she will also visit the clinic each Tuesday afternoon from 1 p.m. to 4 p.m.

Anderson has an interesting and well qualified background. A native of Oklahoma, she graduated from Baylor University in 1964 with her RN degree. She practiced in rural Oklahoma, and in 1977 was a member of the first graduating class at a Family Nurse Practitioner Program at Oklahoma University.

In 1981, she received her Masters Degree in Education from Southwestern Oklahoma State University, and served on the faculty there.

She practiced at a hospital in Mesquite for three years, spent two years in

Dallas with Hospice, Inc., as a Clinical Specialist, and later worked 6 years in Andrews at the Health Department as a Family Nurse Practitioner. Her most recent work experience was in Cisco, where she was the only health provider in the community.

This very stressful condition led her to join Dr. Boyd's staff in Denver City.

Anderson has two children, a 28 year old daughter Tracey, who is married and lives in California. Her 24 year old son Kelly, also married, will soon graduate from College in Oklahoma.

Nurse Practitioners are primary health care providers for children and adults. They stress education of their patients to stay as healthy as possible. Part of their duties and responsibilities include obtaining health histories, physical exams, ordering and interpret lab and diagnostic studies, diagnosis of problems, order therapy, make

## CRIMINAL CASES IN COUNTY COURT

The following is a summary of criminal cases held before County Judge Dallas Brewer on April 12.

## EASTER MUSICAL REASON TO REJOICE !

One of the regrettable aspects of publishing a

weekly newspaper is the impossibility of always being able to report a story in a timely manner. Only rarely does an important event occur on Tuesday, in time to be printed that evening and appear Wednesday morning, when we distribute the paper.

Such is the case for last week's First Baptist Church sponsored Easter Pageant, "Let All Heaven Rejoice". What a pleasure it would have been to hurry home after the performance, and write the story in the manner of a review critic describing the opening performance of a new, hit Broadway play, or musical.

If that had been possible last week, you would have been able to sip your Wednesday morning coffee, and read about "a strong, impressive production"..... "stunning vocals"..... "totally believable acting supported by great music"..... "solo performances gripped the heart"..... "great casting and special effects"..... "strong directing of a talented cast"..... etc.

If you missed this performance, it is your loss. It is amazing a town our size can furnish the quality talent which made "Let All Heaven Rejoice" so memorable. Directed by Patrick Hamilton, the large community choir was superb. Greg McCravey, in the very difficult role of Christ, portrayed the Savior so credibly only a very cold heart could have been un-

moved as he hung from the cross.

The storyteller, Terrie Gressett, not only had to narrate the tale of the last seven days, but sang solo throughout the 55 minute production, without cue cards or prompts. Marc Traweck's strong voice and acting made Satan both believable and frightening.

Every single performer having solo parts sang with feeling and force; Wayne Sisson, Cynthia Blair, Melba Crutcher, Wayne Sisson, John and Lynn Curry, Lindy Rowe, Timmie Johnson, Wadonna Davis, and Susie Powell performed flawlessly.

Patrick Hamilton told me the performers, people working behind the curtain, manning the sound and light console, building the set, sewing costumes, put in approximately 250 hours in the volunteer effort. "Without their untiring efforts, the production couldn't have been performed", he added.

The "Don't Be Afraid Brigade", children's choir joining the finale, spent dozens of hours rehearsing their part.

"Let All Heaven Rejoice" was the perfect vehicle to usher in the Easter weekend, and celebration of Christ's resurrection, and something the entire community should be very proud of. Despite weeks of hard practice, several elated choir members asked Hamilton after the finale, "When can we do it again?"

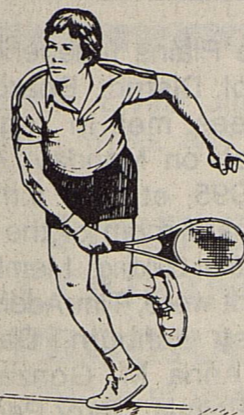

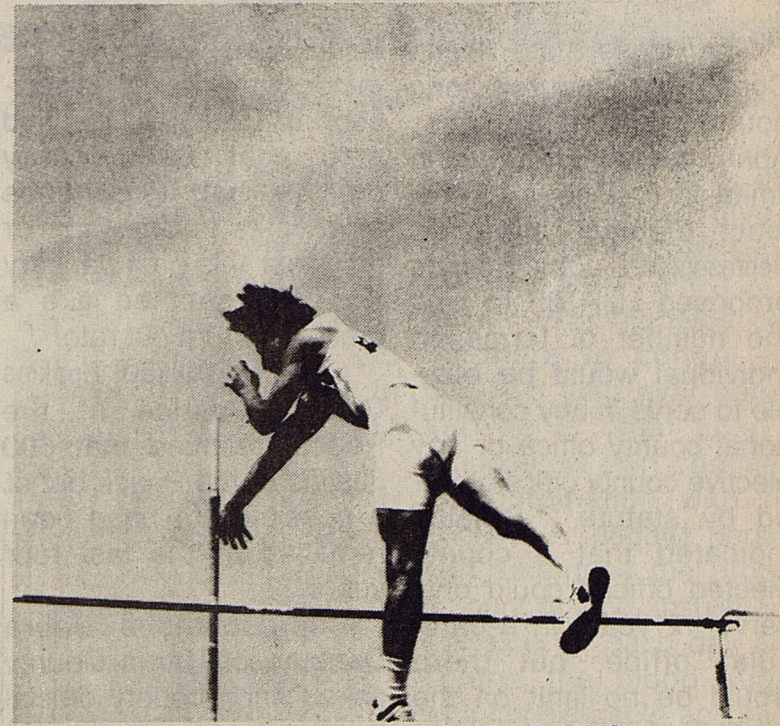

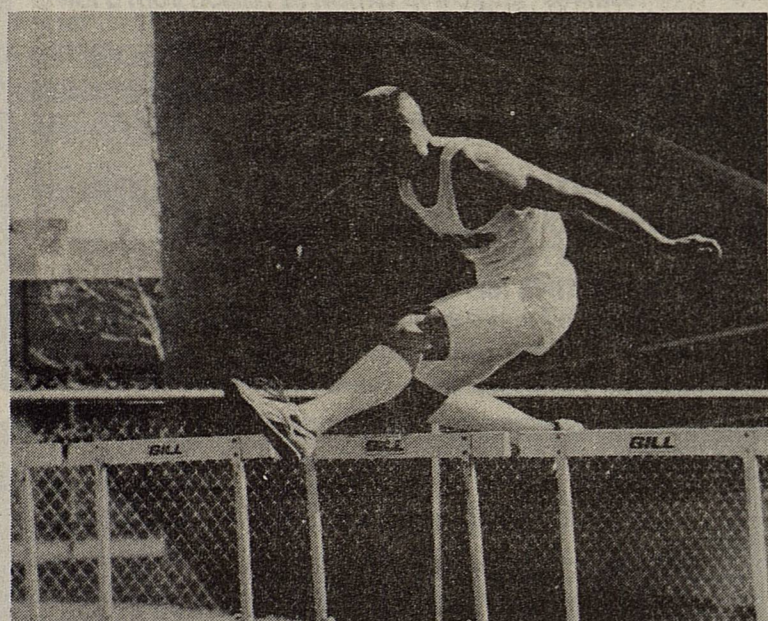

## Term Limits For County Officials Pending in House Committee

The House State Affairs Committee endured long hours of testimony Monday, April 3 but left HJR 86, term limits for county and precinct officials, pending. Representative John Shields proposed HJR 86 to limit the number of terms an individual would be eligible to serve in any constitutional county office or any elective county office created by statute. Shields indicated that a county elected official could only serve 12 years in a particular office, but there would be no limit on the number of different offices that official could serve 12 years in. The measure was proposed with a Jan. 1, 1999 effective date. The long list of county officials testifying against HJR 86 started with Commissioner Neal Sconiers of Pecos County, President of the West Texas County Judges and Commissioners Association. Commissioner Sconiers said in West Texas the voters were in charge and already had a good form of term limits at the ballot box.

Sam Seale, Executive Director of the Texas Association of Counties, testified next that 697 county officials had experience term limits in one form or the other this past January and that seemed like a pretty high turn out rate. Cletis M. Millsap, Hopkins County Justice of the Peace, testified that 600 Justice of the Peace out of a possible 850, had been replaced in the last four years. Representative Debra Danburg of Harris County asked each county official as they testified to please go back to their individual associations and ask for a resolution stating their position. She also asked TAC for resolutions from each individual county commissioners court. This bill is pending in committee and can come out with no further hearing. County representatives are urging officials to write letters to the members of House State Affairs and to Representative Debra Danburg in particular.

Also present were; Pete Simmons, Superintendent, Middle School Principal Ronnie Watkins, Elementary School Principal Joel Haragan, and Pete Simmons. The meeting was adjourned by Board President, Mr. Jerry Parrish.

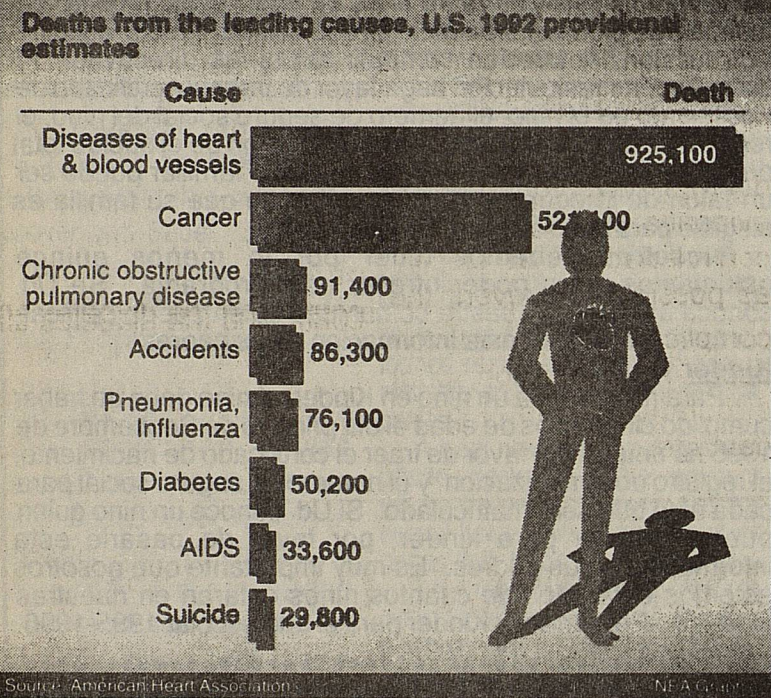

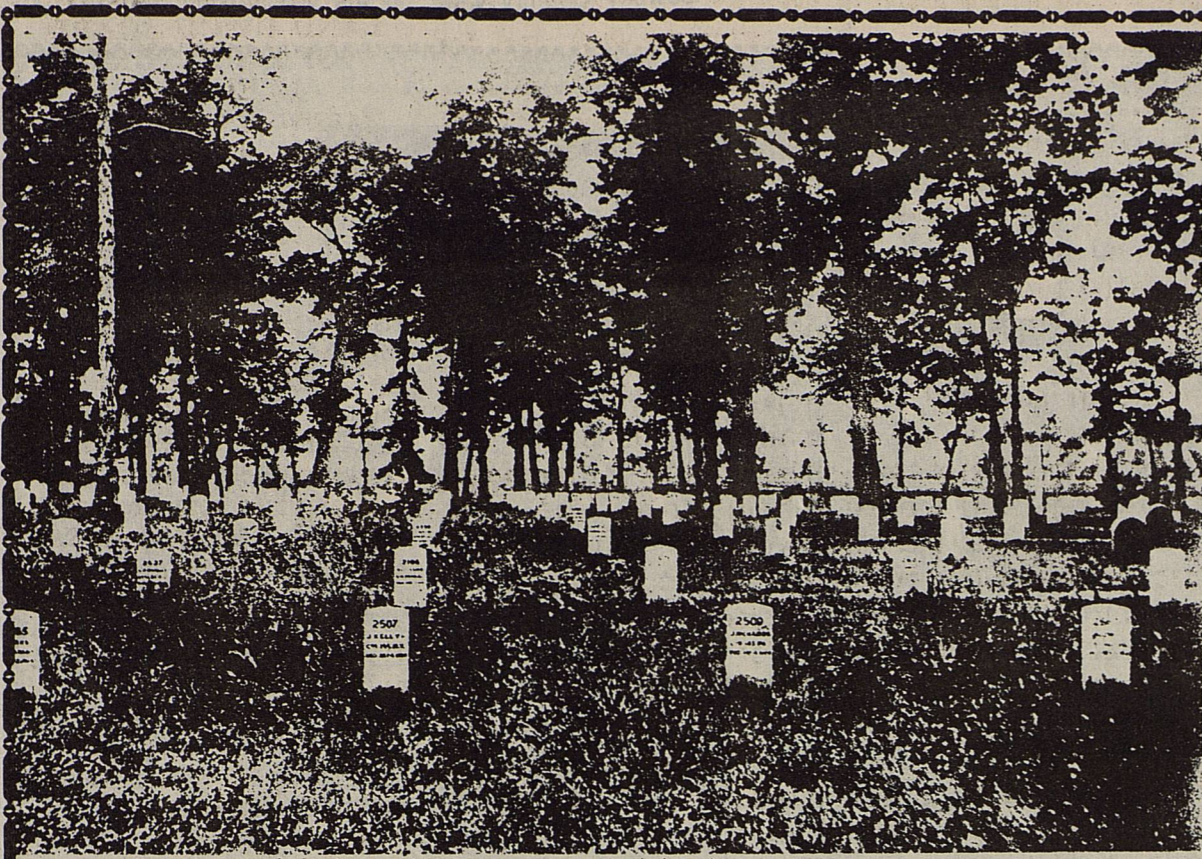

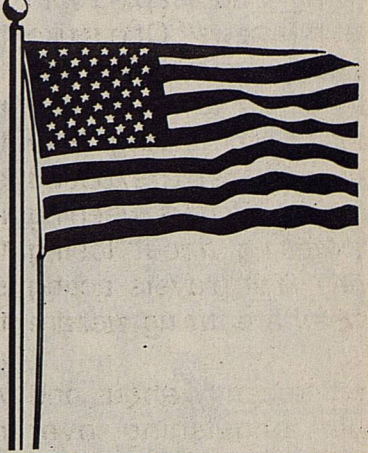

## BLOODY APRIL \* 130 YEARS AGO

One hundred thirty years ago this month, General Robert E. Lee surrendered his sadly depleted, starving Army of Virginia to General U.S. Grant at Appomatox, and while the last shot of the Civil War was still several months away, the most devastating conflict in American history was over at last.

Some 600,000 Federal and Confederate troops fell in the four year blood bath, the greatest loss of life our armed forces have ever experienced. Hardly a family in the entire nation was not affected in the struggle. The Confederate State of Texas, with its short history and sparse battles from Louisiana to Virginia throughout the war, was particularly hit hard in the casualty lists, due to the high percentage of volunteers for the Rebel Cause. The Union was preserved—at tremendous cost.

In 1993, I was appointed a Director of the Brazos River Authority, the governing body administering the Brazos River watershed area covering some 45,000 miles in the State.


