Check Your Credit Load

How can you know if your credit load is within your ability to repay? First, list all loans and creditors you owe except for your home mortgage. List the balance due and the payments due each month for each source of credit. Now add up the total of your monthly payments. your after-tax income. The following calculations credit load before making another credit commitment.

Multiply your monthly net income by .20. Your monthly credit payments, not including a home mortgage, should not exceed this amount. While 20% of your net monthly income is a good rule of thumb, 15% is considpeople.



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
