

ber 18. The Mexican weight limit pounds, compared to the US limit of 80,000. It appears the US will not relax its weight standards, and the Texas Department of Public Safety (DPS) will be hard pressed to enforce these standards. DPS currently has less than 20 weight and safety inspectors working in the valley, and estimate they are currently inspecting only about ten percent of all trucks entering the state from Mexico. An estimate by the Mexican transport ministry itself admits overloaded five axle trucks may weigh as much as 108,000 pounds, and six axle trucks as much as 130,000.
