## Texas Viticulture Short Course At Junction

The first Texas Viticulture Short Course will be held January 12-14, 2005 at the Texas Tech campus in Junction Texas. This three-day short course is offered by Texas Cooperative Extension and Texas Tech University. It carries 21 hours of CEU credit (2.1 CEU's) and a certificate of completion from Texas Tech University. Completion of this. course also provides 5 hours of pesticide recertification credits from the Texas Department of Agriculture.
This intensive three-day course is designed as a comprehensive study of the principles and practices of commercial winegrape production in Texas. Lectures are given by viticulture specialists and faculty members of Texas A\&M University, and the University of Houston-Downtown Pa of Housto will gain Pa ticipants of the baic unde standing of the basic physiol ogy and anatomy of grapevines. Building on this foundation, participants will learn
practical production practice or vineyard establishment and management for high quality fruit production. Topics include site selection, soil properties, variety and rootstock selection, training systems, canopy management, vine nutrition and fer tilization, irrigation scheduling and disease and pest manage ment. Fruit ripening, sampling procedures and harvest criteria will also be discussed. A field trip to a local vineyard will provide a hands-on experience in pruning practices and discus sion of training methods. Enrollment is limited to 50 participants on a first come, first enrolled basis.

## Highway Conditions Web Site Upgraded

To make it easier for motorists to navigate their way around the Lone Star State, the Texas Department of Transportation has launched a more userfriendly highway conditions page on its Web site, www.dot.state.tx.us.
"Motorists have been able to check our Web site for highway condition updates since 1998, but thanks to new technology we have been able to greatly improve the system and make it much er to ", it much easier to use," said Mike Behrens, TxDOT's executive director. "We recommend that anyone planning a trip in Texas check our Web site before they hit the road."
The new Web page features a Texas map that displays in real time highway conditions expected to last more than two hours and either close travel hours and either close travel completely or cause delays of more than a half-hour. Construction, weather problems
such as floods, snow and ice such as floods, snow and ice, along with traffic crashes, fires and other incidents causing significant delays will be displayed.

To use the new system, go to the TxDOT homepage and click on the flashing "Road Conditions" icon on the upper right. That brings up the roadway information portal, where clicking 'view current conditions' under the TxDOT Highway Conditions banner takes a user to the state map containing real-time information. Color-coded dots on the map help viewers get a quick impression of what's going on in any part of the state. The interactive system allows a user to zoom in on a particular area or roadway for a detailed view. "A TxDOT team put in a lot of work to make this feature userfriendly," Behrens said. "Anyone used to navigating the Internet should have little trouble finding their way around this page And now they'll have less trouble finding their way around Texas, as well."

## Pentagon Announces Recommended Mailing Dates

The DoD on Thursday released suggested mailing dates for en suring holiday cards and packages addressed to service members arrive overseas in time for the holiday season.
U.S. Senator John Cornyn, a member of the Senate Armed Ser vices Committee, encouraged families and friends of active-duty military personnel to mail any holiday cards and packages ac cording to Department of Defense (DoD) mailing recommendations to guarantee a timely and safe delivery
"Texas is very fortunate to have so many service members serv ing our country both overseas and our homeland," Cornyn said "I encourage friends and family who wish to send mail to the brave men and women overseas to beat the last minute rush so that packages arrive on time."
In addition to its mailing date recommendations, the DoD also announced various changes in accepting and processing packages sent to service members with military addresses. Among the changes, all packages must be mailed to a specific individual. Boxes will be examined to make sure they do not contain any markings indicating any type of hazardous material. Changes made this year place the safety of the service members as the first priority.

## THC Archeologists Locate Original Presidio <br> La Bahia Wall

## Texas Historical Commission the first line

 (THC) archeologists and vol- fort."unteers recently discovered the location of what they believe to be the original palisades stockade wall at Presidio La Bahia in Goliad. The stockade walls were the first line of defense against attack. Spanish soldiers patrolled the area, protecting the nearby mission and settlement in their efforts to support Spanish colonization.
Built in the mid 1700's, the setting trench on which the wall once rested still reveals footings for the original postholes. THC archeologists earlier conducted a magnetometer survey of the area, leading them to dig in the vicinity in which the setting trench was discovered. "We discovered a line in the survey we wanted to examine survey we wa in this dig," said THC archeologist Jeff Durst. "The location of the palisades stockade wall is
historically important. This was

The trench was uncovered during a public archeological dig, one of the many October Texas Archeology Month activities around the state.
The execution of more than
340 Texans 340 Texans took place in Goliad in the mid 1830's dur ing the Texas Revolution. Vic tims were taken from the fort on the old San Antonio, the old Victoria and the old Capano roads and executed. The THC and Presidio la Bahia are als conducting investigations at two of the possible massacre sites, as well as conducting ar chival research to help locate the third site.
Texas Historical Commission is the state agency for historic preservation. The agency administers a variety of programs to preserve the archeological historical and cultural resource of Texas.

## SPC Receives Educational Grant

South Plains College has been awarded a five-year $\$ 2.48$ milion federal grant from the U.S.
Department of Education, the single largest competitive grant zver received by the college. The grant project, titled 'Build Connections for Access and student Success' was awarded from the Department of Education's Strengthening Institutions: Hispanic Serving institutions Title V program The grant will enable SPC to establish an online supplemenal instruction program to help t-risk students, improve the student information system which tracks student academic progress, improve student reention efforts and expand SPC's outreach to its 15 -county ervice area.
SPC met eligibility requirements to be designated by the Department of Education as a Hispanic-Serving Institution in order to apply for the funds. SPC personnel received notification of the grant last week from U.S. Senator John Cornyn and Congressman Randy Neugebauer,
"This funding will support the education of students at South Plains College by opening doors and providing new ortunities to Hispan and prunites to Hispanc and Cornyn said. "A good education system helps strengthen our society by teaching and instructing young adults, and I applaud South Plains College for working so hard to obtain this important grant."
Congressman Neugebauer also voiced support for the "South Plains College posal. "South Plains College plays a vital role in helping students prepare for a promising career," Neugebauer said. "This grant will help them build on their past efforts and reach out to an even greater number of West Texans."
Dr. Gail Platt, director of the Teaching and Learning Center and the grant's project director, ities to build on what the college has accomplished with a
previous $\$ 1.78$ million previous \$1.78 million
Strengthening Institutions Title III Grant. For the past five years Title III funding has allowed the college to focus on instructional technology and faculty develop ment to enhance student learn ing and success at the college. Students at SPC can access variety of web materials for ev eryday lectures, but providing he online supplemental instuche onine supplemen ion ide SPC plans to explore. "This is breakthrough for our college," said Dr. Platt. "Online supple mental instruction has not been attempted by very many shools.
SPC will receive $\$ 498,000$ to fund the first year of the grant. During that time, the college will bring in experts on supplemental instruction and focus on developmental math. "Experts will be brought in to demonstrate that each faculty member can teach at-risk students and improve overall effectiveness. There will be a lot of exploration going on here," Dr. Platt noted. "Each year, we will target a different academic discipline."
At-risk students at SPC are defined as those who fail to meet the college placement standards in reading, writing and/or math. To improve student retention efforts, a retention team will be formed to look at the overall retention rates and develop a system-wide strategy for retention, determine what information should be gathered, and how student academic progress can be tracked, noted Dr. Platt. The college intends to develop an invasive advisement system as part of the project
The third focus of the grant will be to expand SPC's outreach efforts within its 15 -county service area, focusing on its northern tier counties. The college plans to expand its distance education network to deliver intor, struction to communities in this
