"It's extremely important to all animal agriculture, not only poultry," said Grimm. "We're extremely pleased that Texas was given the federal funds to put it in place."

Located adjacent to TVMDL's main lab, the 1,890 square foot BSL-3 lab has a leek counters that bear sophisticated computers and testing equipment. At \$650 per square foot, the lab was expensive to build because of its safety features, which include an air filtration system that filters air twice to remove bacteria and viruses before releasing it outside the lab, Gayle said. The lab has its own water collection system and its own generator, in case of a power outage.

During a November 2004 tour, visitors could enter the lab in street clothes because the lab was not fully ramped up to BSL-3 but was at BSL-2, a level where technicians do not work with highly infectious diseases.

When the lab is fully operational at BSL-3, expected by January 2005, technicians will enter the lab through a 'red zone' that includes men's and women's locker rooms, where they will remove street clothes, shower and don laboratory clothes, Gayle said.
