"Riders To The Sea"





Air Bag System Guidelines

The safety of all vehicle occupants is a primary concern for all Texans. Everyone needs to understand how to properly position and restrain all vehicle occupants, especially children. Always wear and require passengers to wear safety belts (front and back seats).






