On March 12 this year, the Plains Volunteer Fire Department sped to the scene of a devastating fire at the rural residence of Raymond Crain on the state line. When the fire was finally contained, the home was a total loss, despite the frantic efforts of the department. Many of the fire fighters were totally frustrated. Fire Chief Charles Diamond felt there was a very good chance the house could have been at least partially saved if the men had not run out of water for their trucks.


