

Tax deferral for elderly, disabled

Texans aged 65 or older or disabled Congressman, Randy high school students. They may postpone paying delinquent and current property taxes on their homes. They may take advantage of a tax option called "tax deferral" by signing an affidavit at the

> This special form of tax relief also halts a lawsuit filed to collect delinquent property taxes on an older or disabled Texan's home. "To stop a delinquent tax suit," Stephens said, "the over-65 pr disabled homeowner files the deferral affidavit with the court in which the suit is pending. If the affidavit is on file, an older or disabled homeowner cannot lose a homestead because of delinquent taxes," Stephens said. Stephens stressed tax deferral for elderly or disabled only postpones paying delinquent taxes on the home, it does not cancel them. During the deferral time, taxes and interest of 8 percent per year continue to add up, she said. "When the elderly or disabled taxpayer no longer owns or lives in the home, the taxes become due. If the taxes are not paid, taxing units can then sue to collect all taxes and interest."

There is no penalty on the delinquent taxes during the deferral time. but filing the deferral affidavit will not forgive penalties that were already due. Also, if the taxes remain delinquent more than 90 days after the deferral ends, a taxing unit may charge an added penalty if the account goes to a delinquent tax at-

The deferral forms are available at the appraisal district office. "The homeowner should fill out the form and have the signature witnessed by a notary public," Stephens said.
