



#### DAYS LITTLE BETTER THESE DAYS SCHOOL

"In 1904, Percy Roberts and his family settled southwest of Plains. Soon after they arrived, lumber was hauled by wagon from Big Spring to build a small one room school house. This was the first school in the county, and was located near what is now known as the Old Hicks place. The Roberts and Hurst families supported this school for their children. A Mrs. Brooks, from Gomez, was the first teacher". This paragraph and picture appeared in the 1957 issue of YOAKUM COUNTY HISTORY, 1907-1957, a publication sponsored by the TSA MO GA Club, and Yoakum County Historical Committee.

The little frame building is in dramatic contrast to the present Plains ISD sprawling, modern facilty. We were intrigued by the youngsters pictured. We can detect only one smile on the faces of the thirty eight students, that of one Jewel Bess, the first girl on the left of line three. Perhaps the reason for their grimness is they realized they would have to go back inside the small, cramped building, probably very poorly lit, and always too hot or too cold.





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

#### YORKUM SWCD TO ELECT **DIRECTORS FOR ZONES 1 & 2**

\*EDITORS NOTE: According to Mario Avilo, District Conservational, the following article appeared in last weeks issue of THE PLAINS PRIDE, contrary to his release date of Oct. 5. He asked us to run the article in case any readers missed the other publication.

The Yoakum Soil and Water Conservation District will hold an election for the Zones 1 and 2 Directors at 8 a.m. on Oct. 6, 1994 at Plains Community Center.

Zone 1 covers the Southeast quarter of the county. excluding a square, six miles by six miles on the Northeast corner. The present director is David Turnbough who has announced that he is retiring.

Zone 2 covers the Southwest quarter of the county, excluding a square, six miles by six miles on the Northeast corner. The present director is Larry Marrow. Larry has indicated he will continue to serve, if nominated and elected. Candidate nominations will be made from the floor, at election time.

In order to serve as a director, a person must first meet the criteria of an eligible voter, as defined below. Additionally, the person must own land within the numbered subdivision for which the election is being held and must be actively engaged in the business of farming or animal husbandry.

Eligible voters for this election are individuals who hold title for farmland or ranch land lying within Yoakum County, which is the area covered by the District, are a resident of the county, and are 18 years of age or older. Title is considered to be owned by both husband and wife in this community property state. If a family farm corporation owns farmland or ranch land in the District the county.


