

## County **Criminal** Court Cases

Three criminal cases were held in County Court last Wednesday, May 15, with County Judge Dallas Brewer presiding, and order Criminal District Attorney Richard Clark representing the state.

In cause #7749, Role Rodriguez Sanchez, 26, pled guilty to the charge of assault. He received a 60 day jail sentence, suspended and probated 12 months. He was fined \$100 and ordered to pay \$157 court costs, and must attend and successfully complete the Batterer's Intervention Program (BIP).

Alejandro Zamarripa pled quilty to the charge of failure to stop and render aid. He will serve fifteen days in jail, and spend additional time in jail in lieu of a \$250 fine and \$192 in court costs.

Ricky Lee Lunsford, 36, in an agreed order involving DWI Breath Test Refusal, the defendants Community Supervision was extended for a period of 12 months beginning May 24, and he shall pay Community Supervision fees of \$40 per month for the extended time.



#### **General Election Information To** Fill Unexpired Term In Office

The office of COUNTY CLERK, UNEXPIRED TERM, must be placed on the ballot for the General Election to be held on November 5, 1996, due to vacancy in the office created by resignation for retirement.

The following applies to candidates for the unexpired term. (All section numbers refer to the TEXAS ELECTION CODE.)

1) Nomination by political party: A person must receive a favorable vote of a majority of the executive committee members present at the meeting. Party must file the Certificate of Nomination by 5:00 PM, September 6, 1996, in the office of the county clerk. (Sec. 145.036-037)

2) An independent candidate must file an application for a place on the ballot with the county judge not later than 5:00 PM on the 30th day after vacancy occurs (Sec. 201.023) accompanied by a petition that satisfies requirements prescribed by Section 141.062. (Number of petition signatures required = 104 (Sec. 142.007)

Write-in candidate must file a declaration of write-in candidacy which satisfies the requirements of Section 141.031 with the county judge not later than 5:00 PM on September 6, and not earlier than 30th day before (August 7): The declaration must be accompanied by a \$600.00 filing fee. ( or petition that satisfies requirements prescribed by Subchapter C Chapter 141. Number of signatures for petition-in-lieu of filing fee = 50 (Sec. 172.025)

Write-in candidate's name will be included on list of writein candidates (not on ballot).

One by one we were called forward to receive the quick hand shake and the sheet of paper we had been waiting 12 years for (in Ox's case, 16 years). When Ox




was called forward, he looked ready to scream with joy. He lumbered across the stage, and suddenly began to reel and stumble. This time I was certain he had been partaking of strong drink.
