



- 1 3-Ounce package cream cheese, softened

2-1/2 Cups confectioners'

1 Teaspoon vanilla 1 Tablespoon milk OR as needed

sugar Beat together eggs, vegetable oil, sugar and vanilla. Sift together flour, baking soda, salt and baking powder. Mix into egg mixture. Blend in dates or raisins, zucchini and nuts. Place onto greased and floured, 15 x 10 x 1-inch jelly roll pan. Bake at 350 about 30 minutes. Icing: Beat cream cheese until fluffy. Blend in sugar, vanilla and milk. Add a little more milk if necessary to reach spreading consistency. Spread over cooled bars.






