

Used system loans are limited to five year repayment terms. The maximum amount a producer can borrow is \$100,000. Producers may also borrow the low interest money to repackage existing systems with more efficient sprinkler packages.

To date, a number of producers have borrowed almost \$200,000 of the newly appropriated funds. Since 1992, Sandy Land has made irrigation system loans totaling almost \$5 million, and to date there have been no defaults. Money for the loans is derived from the Water Development Board thru the sale of State bond packages to investors and institutions.

American Women in the

Military



ore than 200 years ago, Deborah Sampson disguised herself as a man to join the Massachusetts Regiment of the Revolutionary Army. She treated her own combat wounds to keep her secret, but was discharged after her third injury when a doctor discovered she was a

She married Benjamin Gannett, raised a family, managed their farm, and spent many years lecturing about her military service.

There are many stories of women like Deborah Sampson Gannett who served alongside men to gain and preserve liberty, but you will have difficulty finding them in the history books. Nearly two million women have served in military roles since America was founded.

In the Civil War, women both black and white, served as nurses, saboteurs, scouts and couriers. They led troops into battle as color bearers, blew up bridges, cut telegraph wires, burned arsenals and warehouses, and helped prisoners and slaves escape.

The invaluable service of female nurses during the Spanish American War led to the creation of the Army and Navy Nurse Corps. When World War I erupted, nurses braved the front lines to treat the sick and wounded. Other women enlisted in the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard or worked as Army switchboard operators.

Nearly 400,000 women in all military branches took on new roles during WWII, due to the scarcity of manpower and the

urgency of protecting our nation. They served as nurses, stenographers, translators, pilots, mechanics, technicians and cooks. For the first time, women were given military rank as officers.

In 1948, the Women's Armed Services Integration Act gave women a permanent place in the armed forces. Women have since served with honor alongside America's servicemen in peacetime and in conflicts, such as those in Korea, Vietnam, Grenada, Panama and Desert Storm, the largest deployment of military women ever.

It's time to recognize their achievements.

1. A minimum of 1000 words. 2. Typed and double spaced with



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
