## Area cotton crop a pleasant surprise

Three of the four local area cotton gins have finished pro cessing the 1996 crop, and all report the results were a pleas ant surprise for their producer customers and the gins them selves.
Yoakum County Co-Op Gin reported they will set an all time ecord with well over 35,000 bales. Bookeeper Donna Bowers said one customer had some 200 acres to finish striping, so the exact bale count is unknown at this time. She said the gins previous high run was 26,000 bales in 1988. Tokio Co-Op also had an excellent year, producing 37,620 bales. Marc Traweek, gin manager, had earlier predicted some 25,000 bales would be produced. The hefty increase was attributed to an excellent dry land crop, and a good late season for irrigation producers.
Jean Craft of New Tex Gin said they ended the season with 42,071 bales. In the early stages of the crop year, the Craft's were expecting to gin some 30,000 bales of cotton, following heavy losses in area hail storms. Their previous record un was over 49,000 bales.
Independently owned Circle 12 Gin could not be reached but earlier estimated they would produce some 7,000 bales Two other gins in the area, State Line Co-Op and Four Way Gin, both located just in Gaines County, handled cotton rom some Yoakum County producers.
The very shaky start early in the growing season had many cotton experts predicting a much smaller cotton crop. It now appears the state bale count will mark 1996 as an excell ent year for most producers.

## Low interest funds available for irrigation systems and projects

Sandy Land Underground Water Conservation District was recently notified by the State Water Development Board the District had been authorized $\$ 500,000$ in funds for irri－ gation projects to District producers．Loans for irrigation projects are available at a low $4.7 \%$ interest rate，compared o previous years loan rates averaging about $6.9 \%$

Loans can be made for the purchase of new center pivo systems for a maximum term of seven years．Used system oans are limited to five year repayment terms．The maxi－ mum amount a producer can borrow is $\$ 100,000$ ．Produc ers may also borrow the low interest money to repackage existing systems with more efficient sprinkler packages． To date，a number of producers have borrowed almos $\$ 200,000$ of the newly appropriated funds．Since 1992 Sandy Land has made irrigation system loans totaling al－ most $\$ 5$ million，and to date there have been no defaults Money for the loans is derived from the Water Develop ment Board thru the sale of State bond packages to inves ors and institutions

 Women in the Military

More than 200 years ago
Deborah Sampson disguised herself as man to join the Massachusetts Regiment of the Revolutionary Army. She treated her own combat wounds to keep her own combat wounds to keep after her third injury when a doctor discovered she was a woman.
She married Benjamin Gannett raised a family, managed their farm, and spent many years lecturing about her nilitary service There are many stories of women like Deborah Sampson Gannett who served alongside men to gain and preserve liberty but you will have difficulty finding them in the history books. Nearly two million women have served in military roles since America was founded. In the Civil War, women both black and white, served as nurses, saboteurs, scouts and couriers They led troops into battle as color bearers, blew up bridges, cut telegraph wires, burned arsenals and warehouses, and helped prisoners and slaves escape.
The invaluable service of The invaluable service of
female nurses during the female nurses during the Spanish American War led to the creation of the Army and Navy Nurse Corps. When World War I erupted, nurses braved the front lines to treat the sick and wounded. Other women enlisted in the Navy, Marine Corps and Coast Guard or worked as Army switchboard operators. Nearly 400,000 women in all military branches took on new roles during VVVII, due to the scarcity of mane the
