

## Legislators face wide array of bills & topics

will be gaveled to order in instruction of public school problems affecting Texans.

Our District 80 Representative Gary Walker recently furnished CCN a computer generated list of bills which have already been filed in the House, well before the opening session, with many more expected to be filed by January 14.

The 330 bills listed cover a great multitude of issues and problems, some of them sounding on the verge of frivolous, but apparently important enough to be officially recorded. Walker told us "the fact a bill is filed is no assurance it will ever come to the floor for a vote. Many of these and later introduced bills will not get out of the committes and subcommittees they are assigned

Welch said his one greatest fear in rising juvenile crime problems is the growth of youth gangs. He indicated there are gang activities taking place in Denver City now. He said the threat of gang activity in Plains is real and growing, but is probably at the "Wanna Be a Gang Member" stage now. He said "Once a teen, male or female, is coerced, persuaded, even forced into an active gang, takes part in their criminal activities, he or she is virtually certain to be lost to society. Friends, family, schools, churches, organizations, and law enforcement agencies find it impossible to reach. and salvage these kids. It's almost like drug addition, or brain washing."


How does the family serve the community?



Texas' public heliports, 1996

When it comes to transporting critically wounded patients in an emergency or scouring the countryside for dangerous criminals, a helicopter's speed and quick take off and landing capabilities often make it the perfect way to travel. Demand for helicopters in such situations has led to the construction of 39 heliports at Texas hospitals and police stations, accounting for about 60 percent of the public heliports in the state.

Currently about 800 helicopters operate in Texas; most are privately owned and based at private heliports. Only 64 of the state's 400 heliports are publicly owned or operated. Although helicopter use is still rare in the state compared to air travel by plane about one-fourth of the state's 1600 aircraft landing facilities are heliports, due to their small size and ease of construction and maintenance.
