Revenue not available for state employee planned pay raise

In 2001, the Texas Legislature approved a pair of across-theboard stae employee pay raises for the 2002-2002 biennium. The Legislature, however only budgeted $\$ 191.7$ million for state employees and \$157.6 million for faculty employees. That was enough to fund the first raise, a 4 percent increase, first raise, a 4 percent increase, for two years. Funding for the second raise, however, is con-
tingent upon tax revenues tingent upon tax revenues exceeding expectations, which only a sharpeconomic rebound could generate.
Revenues have not exceeded the amounts forecasted by the

Comptroller, naking it unlikely funding will be available fo the second raise. The 2001 Legislature left a number of items, including the second employee raise, on a "wish list" that it hoped could be financed by increased revenues.
The pay raise was placed fifth on the wish list, and only the Legislature has the authority to change the order of the list.

Items ahead of the raise include a financial assistance program for community and technical school students, funding for junior colleges and a judicial pay raise.
"The practical reality is that to get to number five, we would need to have an additional \$191 million in revenue above my revenue estimnate in this biennium," says Texas Comptroller Carole Keeton Rylander. " I have also told the members of the Legislature they should appropriate money each year for a pay raise. They simply did not appropriate the funds for \$2003."
By not funding the raise, problems many agencies are having attracting and retaining personnel are compounded.Non-competitive salaries have led to a state employee turnover rate of
17.6 percent, which has cost the state more than $\$ 1$ billion in training costs, lost productivity and other costs since 1999, according to the Texas Public Employees Association Public Employees Association. Rylander has indicated the state will not have enough additional revenue for the second raise. If conditions warrant, she can inform the Legislature that money is available for additional spending, such as the second raise. But that's not likely to happen. "The funds simply aren't there," Rylander says. " If the Legislature had wanted state employees to have the raise they clearly doserve the raise they clearly deserve, they should have appropriated the money, not left me an I.O.U. to cash."
