



valuation. Under current law, the tax liability on the homestead would be \$525. If the amendment passes in the election, the taxes would drop to \$375, a difference of \$150.

Stephens reminded taxpayers they must file for the homestead exemption, and the deadline is April 30 each year. She explained there are certain provisions allowing taxpayers to file for the exemption after the deadline, and for further information, they should contact the appraisal office.
