

House Passes Farm Bankruptcy Bill Senate Clears \$450 million

Plains received desperately needed rains.

On March 11, the House approved the Short-Term Extension of Farm Bankruptcy Law (HR 808) by a vote of 418-1. the bill allows for bankrupt farmers to continue operation while they reorganize their debts until October 1. The House Judiciary Committee agreed on March 2, to grant a three-month extension to Chapter 12 of the bankruptcy code, a program specifically geared to assist farmers in debt. Chapter 12 was first enacted in 1986 to provide relief to farmers during the 1980's farm crisis; the program was initially set to expire in 1993 but was extended through October 1998. After a bankruptcy bill, which included permanent authorization for the farm program, died last Congress, a six-month extension provision was included in the omnibus spending bill (PL105-277).

House Judiciary Commercial and Administrative Law Subcommittee Chairman George Cekas (R-PA) has introduced a new bankruptcy bill (HR833) which includes permanent authorization for the farm program. However, HR833 could take months to approve and lawmakers did not want the temporary program to expire during the process. The Senate is expected to consider HR808 in the coming weeks.

Further, the Senate cleared a bill (HR822) that would give loan relief to farmers on March 8. HR822, a bill to allow the early release of the \$450 million in reserve funds to farmers while Congress completes work on the supplemental appropriations bill, was introduced two weeks ago by House Agriculture Chairman Larry Combest (R-Lubbock) and Ranking Member Charles Stenholm (R-Abilene) and passed the House by voice vote.

Chairman Combest urged the President to "Sign the legislation (HR822) Congress recently passed to free up nearly \$500 million in loan authority for farmers". The President has not indicated his position on this issue.

Local FSA County Executive Director Gary Six told CCN, " A portion of this \$450 million is earmarked for a number of county producers whose loan requests have been approved. To date, however, we have received no official word on when the funds will be in place. Approval of this money would allow many of our producers to return to their fields with the use of these emergency expedited loans. Receiving these funds would have another county wide benefit, allowing many of these farmers to bring their accounts up to date with many ag related business firms in the area."





Larry Combest Comments

Security. We seek it in every tect American families, and the walk of life. Job security, security from intruders in our homes, security in retirement, and the security most Americans take for granted, security from attack by a foreign nation. Not since Pearl Harbor has a foreign country successfully attacked a target within the American borders. Since then, we have been lulled into a false security. Dramatic advances in weapons technology have led many Americans to believe we have a missile defense system to protect us against attack. The fact is, we don't.

The world is becoming increasingly dangerous. Rogue nations like North Korea and Iraq are developing the missile capacity to strike the U.S. much sooner than previously predicted. A new report just released concludes North Korea now has the capability of propelling a missile to the U.S. Nuclear proliferation and increasing terrorist activity are a dangerous combination for America. According to the CIA, at least 20 nations already have or may be acquiring the capability to launch ballistic missiles and weapons of mass destruction, including chemical, biological and nuclear.

The most powerful nation in the world is defenseless against missile attack. If a ballistic missile is lauched at a U.S. city, there is absolutely nothing the U.S. can do to prevent it striking its target and killing thousands or millions of Americans.

Whether a missile is launched deliberately or accidentally, we have no defense system to pro-

time is long over due to implement one.

In 1995, the Republican Congress passed legislation requiring the administration to deploy a national missile defense system. President Clinton vetoed the legislation and objected to a missile defense system "our intelligence community does not foresee needed in the upcoming decade."

However, with overwhelming congressional support on both sides of the aisle, President Clinton recently announced he will sign legislation before Congress requiring a missile defense system.

For about \$10 billion, roughly two-thirds the cost of Clinton's peacekeeping mission, the U.S. can build a limited missile defense system. With a projected surplus of \$724 billion over the next five years, \$10 billion seems a small price to pay to protect our families from missile attack.

A strategic missile defense plan will make every American more secure. Implementing such a plan means we will be able to put our children to bed each night with a new security we do not currently enjoy. If we do not, the consequences might one day be measured in American lives.

We Get Letters Not all are thrilled with TAAS

No doubt Texas legislators had the best of intentions when they voted for the Texas Assessment of Academic Skills. However, they have unwittingly created a climate in the classroom that is not conducive to real

The truth is that TAAS has led to mediocrity. The curriculum has been narrowed, and the preoccupation with test scores has left little scope for the creative teacher.

In a recent column in the Abilene Reporter-News, Mike Moses, Commissioner of Education for the Texas Education Agency, pointed with pride to the "impressive annual gains on the TAAS"

As a classroom teacher, I can tell Mr. Moses why those impressive gains have been made.

Scores have risen because teachers have been pressured to send a disproportionate amount of time teaching test-taking skills and focusing on preparation for the TAAS.

The pressure is exerted in not so subtle ways. The teacher's own evaluation depends, in part, upon the accountability rating the school receives from the Texas Education

According to Shakespeare, "Comparisons are odious." This is certainly true of the Texas Education Agency School Rating System.

No allowance is made for diversity of backgrounds. Students in a school district in a small rural community with a stable population, with a higher expenditure per student, earn scores on the TAAS that gives the school an "exemplary rating."

On the other hand, students from a school district in an urban setting, one that serves a totally different population, may, despite the best efforts of the teaching staff, score lower. That school will receive an "acceptable", or in some cases, an "unacceptable" rating.

Dirt Gardeners Meet

The Plains Dirt Gardeners held their monthly meeting March 17. Dean Richardson gave the district delegate report. There was some discussion on plans for Arbor Day. Refreshments were served by Debbie Morphis. Those attending were Debbie Morphis, Mary Lou Parks, Jackie Willis, Ruby Sellers, and Dean Richardson.

Finally, there is one fall-out from TAAS that is largely ignored by its supporters and the expanding bureaucracy the testing program has created.

It is the student who has completed all required courses in high school but still is not allowed to graduate because he has not passed the TAAS exit-level test.

Last year in Big Spring, two students could not graduate for this reason.

In Abilene, the number was six. There are many reasons this can happen. Students with some degree of dyslexia, or other learning disability, are in the regular classroom, not in special education, where they would be exempt from the TAAS.

Some students are weak in only one subject, like reading or math. Some students are poor "test takers". They worry excessively, and their anxiety hampers their performance on a test. Whatever the reason, the blow to self-esteem for such young people is unimaginable.

Before Texas legislators vote to increase the amount of state testing, I hope they will study all aspects of TAAS.




