Some of the professional associations he has been involved includes: Chair, C.A.R.E., SPAG Board Member; Chair, CCAV; Chair, LEPC; Texas Commission of Licensing and Regulation; Licensed Court Interpreters Advisory Board Member. He married a Lubbock girl, Cherrie Smith, and are parents of three children. He has two opponents.



Linda DeLeon Resigns From City Council

KCBD -- For the last 24 years Linda DeLeon has devoted her life to public service with the Lubbock Independent School Board and the Lubbock City Council. "I think 24 years as a public servant is more than enough to give back to the community and its time for me to step down and let someone much younger step forward," said DeLeon. On Monday DeLeon announced she will not run for re-election of district one. For the last 6 years DeLeon has been a part of the dais and for 18 years before that, she was on the school board. During her service, she was always known as someone who wasn't afraid to speak her mind. "When I believe in something, I am going to speak up. I can't be intimidated, and I think that's why I had the support from my community and my district and have won by large margins because that's what they want they want someone that's not afraid," said DeLeon. Last month DeLeon and her business All American Concrete were sued for an outstanding balance with another concrete company. DeLeon's business closed last year, due to the inability to collect debts. She says this is one of the reasons for stepping down.

"Those are priorities that I have that I had to consider of all that, I have to look at things that have happened partially because of my politics here so that's part of it," said DeLeon. But now DeLeon says it is time for someone else to step up and be the voice of district one. Councilman Floyd Price says DeLeon is not only a co-worker, but one of his very close friends. "It's bitter sweet for me, I do not want to see her leave at this time, but I can understand 24 years in public life is a long time," said Price. And now DeLeon says she is looking forward to spending more time with her family, and even though she is stepping down from elected office, she says she is not done working for Lubbock. "She will be missed in the city council, she'll be missed in the district, too and people don't understand what you have until it's gone," said Price. "Public service has been my life, so I'm hoping someone will have the passion that I've had for 24 years," said DeLeon. Monday started the filing deadline for city council. Right now no one has filed for DeLeon's seat, but former district one council member Victor Hernandez says he is running and will make it official soon.

An Open Letter To East Lubbock Residents

Dear Mr. Alan Henry, David Langston, Bill Bates, Dustin Burrows, Judge Jim Dulin, Mike Epps, and George Carpenter. With the greatest respect and sincerity, I am writing to you as members of the Charter Review Board to ask the perennial question about North and East Lubbock each time a city-wide initiative is proposed by City Hall. The law-abiding tax-paying citizens of North and East Lubbock have found it necessary to raise these questions precisely because each time we are left out altogether or we are included as an afterthought. Therefore it is essential for the citizens of the long-neglected side of town to ask again; "Will the Charter include provisions for proportional distribution of operations and maintenance dollars?" If so, the City Charter should require 16.5% allocation of city resources in each City Council District. We believe the city is ill-served when one side of town is given preference over the other

side. Each year brings more urban decay to the neglected areas until they become blighted and eventually abandoned. Regardless of the final revisions, North and East Lubbock must be treated equally not because it is good for Lubbock but because it is the right thing to do. A case in point is United Supermarkets AMIGO store. When

we go to Amigo's we get first rate service and are made to feel that we truly are Amigos in its purest sense. Will the 7 members of the Charter Review board be as sincere? I hope this letter will inspire each of you to see Lubbock as one community. Since we are about the task of modernizing the Charter, let us not make it a quick revision but a well thought out process. I

commend the Chairman for his desire to involve the citizens and for starting the whole process without preconceived notions. I believe the people of Lubbock are best served when community coalitions work together to accomplish common goals. I urge the Hispanic-Division of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce and LULAC to take an active role in the public hearings.



From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith Political Oculoglandular Syndrome

There is a new racist political disease today rising out of racial hatred from the past that appears to be affecting the mindset of many of our white brothers and sisters. This disease of a racist herpes simplex virus of the mind and soul's eye could be labeled as "Political Oculoglandular Syndrome". This disease appears to affect those who are associated with movements like the "Tea Party" and the like who appears to lack the intelligence or have the ability to think for themselves and need a leader to market their brand of hatred toward their fellow black and Hispanic Americans.

Case in point: Several weeks ago former Congressman and 2008 Republican presidential candidate Tom Tancredo delivered the keynote speech at a Tea Party Convention in Nashville, Tennessee. Tancredo also told people at the convention that a civics literacy test should be required to be allowed to vote. This was a slap at the "Voting Rights Act" for all led by African Americans. One has to wonder, could he and those whom he was giving the address to be suffering from

racist "political oculoglandular syndrome?"

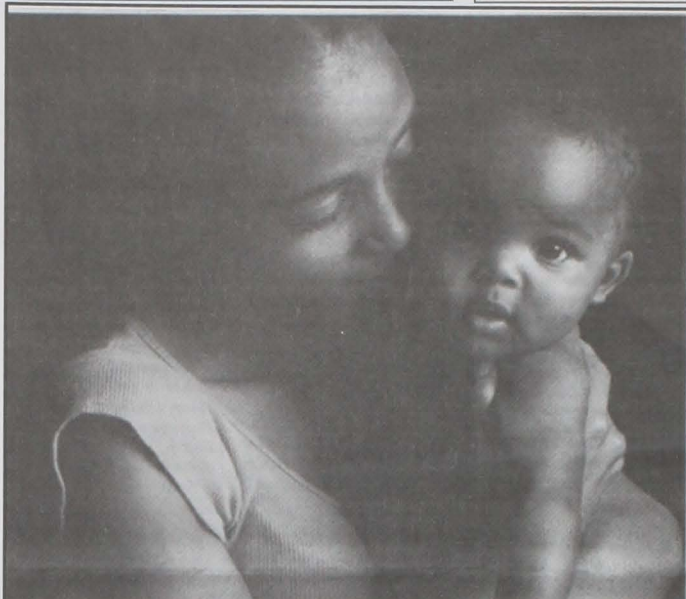

Michael Jackson's Doctor Pleads Not Guilty

LOS ANGELES — Dr. Conrad Murray pleaded not guilty Monday to involuntary manslaughter in the death of the pop star at a brief hearing that had all the trappings of another sensational celebrity courtroom drama.

He was later released from jail after posting \$75,000 in bail, only a few hours after surrendering to authorities on a manslaughter charge.

He appeared in court in a gray suit as Jackson's father Joe, mother Katherine, and siblings LaToya, Jermaine, Tito, Jackie and Randy watched from courtroom seats behind prosecutors.

Neither Murray nor the Jacksons showed much emotion as Murray entered his plea through his attorney Ed Chernoff.

"We need justice," Joe Jackson said outside court before leaving with family members in a fleet of Cadillac Escalades.

Superior Court Judge Keith L. Schwartz set bail at \$75,000.

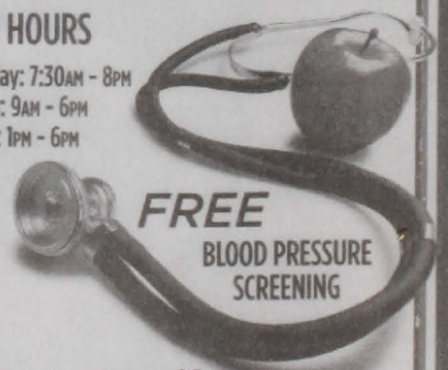

to use Interpol as a "secret police" with the power to knock down doors and arrest law-abiding Americans citizens. No matter that Interpol agents don't even carry guns and have no rights to arrest people, or that its American office boasts all of five people. And the hysteria over the executive order is not confined to the Tea Party movement. It has also reached the highest levels of politics—that is, the US Congress.

... Nutty as this premise sounds, it's proven particularly popular among those who believe that Obama is not an American citizen or who are bitterly opposed to health care reform. The drumbeat has been so loud that a host of states legislators have introduced "state sovereignty" bills declaring their independence from the federal government under the 10th Amendment and threatening to secede in the event that martial law is declared. Sarah Palin even signed one such bill before quitting as governor of Alaska. (A favorite of states' rights proponents, the one-sentence 10th Amendment basically says that any power that isn't specifically granted to the federal government by the Constitution is reserved for the states.)

Why is it that in the former mentioned the name of Ricky Perry, Governor of the great state of Texas rings with the sound: "secede from the UNION, Barack the 'Magic Negro' is coming?" Could this be a form of "political ocologlandular syndrome?"
