Since then he has been employed at White Sands Missile Range for



Lord. Our Theme for this Youth Conference is The Black Church-Key to Black Survival". As we have closed the book on the 1970's and face the 1980's, survival becomes very important to all mankind. As a matter of fact, TIME magazine has already called the 1980's "the decade of survival." in the world, 2/3 of the world's population is trying to exist on little or no food. Others through constant fighting, military conflicts, changing governments, and tyrannial leaders. The U.S. itself is faced with a struggle to endure. As we enter the 1980's we Americans are too fighting a battle for survival. We are taced with economic, moral, and military failure and for the moment things seem sort of dim for us as the moment.

From its very beginning, the Black Church has struggled to provide a shelter, a stonghold, a springboard for setting up and idenity for the Black man, as well as providing hope for his survival. As for bas as the 1700's, when the Black Church was first established, it started toward its plight to becoming a fortress for its people and their rights. The first Black Churches were supervised and controlled by the white slave masters who were once afraid that Christianity would cause the slave to desire freedom from slavery. After the Emancipation Proclamation, the Black church began to grow stronger and it was probably one of few Black organization that the white majority didn't seek to keep under control. This unnoticed, but every-present organization was gathering steam and force to make its voice heard.

Then, the Black church suddenly looled its forces against racial prejudices and injustices during the Civil Rights Era. Black ministers such as Martin Luther King, Ralph Abernathy, Andrew Young and others helped to initiate a movement toward true equality for the darker The Black rother. Unurch became the meeting place to organize and plan strategies. Despite altacks on its propery

the major moves toward true equality.

Today, we see a different Black Church than was present during slavery and the Civil Right Era. The Black Church seems to have lost its strong and forceful voice in the Black man's life. Black Churches presently suffer a lack of attendance as well as lack of effective programs to minister to the needs of its people. In essence, the Black Church seems to have pulled away from its God. As we face the

remaining 1980's and years beyonds, the Black Church must once again become roo ad and ground in Jesus Christ. The Black Church must one again seek the Kingdom of God and His Righteousness nd it will again become strong. With God as our refguge and strength of our life we can say in the words of David in Pslams 66:9-U 'my enemies will be turned back in the day when I call. This I know that God is for me. In God, whose word I praise, in the Lord whose word I praise, in God I

The UNCF Greater New York Campaign encompasses fund-raising efforts in Westchester County and Long Island, as well as

#### An Answer For The Alienated?

Andrew Pulley did not have to pull out of one of the major political parties to be the nominee of President of the United States. Andrew Pulley and Matilde Zimmermann, the Socialist Workers Party's presidential and vicepresidential candidates, were nominated by the SWP at its 1979 National Conventio held in

Oberlin, Ohio.

Oberlin, for historical wizrds, was one of the last stops on the underground railroad. Rampant racism and sexism still exist today in more parts of the country than the muth. Some people truly believe the country could use a new emancipator.

John B. Anderson, Republican congressman and presidential hopefu has just bolded the Republican Party with dreams of delivering the middle class to fredom from stagnation. Standing still and slipping down every now and then is taking a bit off the glamour of living in America for the middle class.

Congressman Anderson says, "The United States should stand for peace, improvement in the standard of living for people, and the pursuit of human rights for all peoples." Mr. Pulley isnot on record as having such an eloquent

statement, However, he and his running mate Matilde have beer participants in the January 12 Labor March for the Equal Rights Amendment (ERA) in Fichmond, Virginia, and marched

against the draft on March 22, in Washington, D. C., nuclear power on April 26 and against KuKlux Klan violence in Greensboro, N.C. Kind of putting their person where the problem is, so the speak.

Andrew Pulley says the Socialist Workers Party's National platform would require mandatory cos-of-living wage increase and automatic cost-of-living adjustments for elderly persons on social security, public ownership of the petroleum industry and elimination of the defense budget.

Mr. anderson couldn't disagree more on that defense spending point according to his published statements "a strong, mobile military establishment, are necessary to preserve and enhance the security of our nation." Actually, defense spending is not the only differnce between the white-haired Congressman and wollyhaired, Chicagoan.

Would-be president Pulley or Anderson must answer one yet unaddressed question for 26 million Black Americans. How do you plan as President to decrease the growing unemployment of Black Americans around the country??

The jobless rate for blacks is 12 percent nationwide and 20 percent plus in some Presumably areas. because Mr. Pulley is a Black American he misht be faster with an answer, after all Anderson still hasn's chosen his Black American female running mate to balance his

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
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

GARDENING

You don't need much outdoor space to have a garden of your own outpaties, terraces, balconies, front doorsteps, even outer sills where permitted, are the solution.

Choice of containers is a matter of taste in appearance. Clay pots come in many different shapes and sizes and provide plenty of air and moisture exchange for good root growth through their porous walls. Plastic pots are inexpensive and lightweight which makes them easy to move around. There is no evaporation through the container sides so water is conserved more efficiently; potting mix must be light and mossy, to allow air circulation to the roots. Choose the heavy, flexible plastic pots for best durability, and pick white or light colors as dark pots absorb too much heat from the sun and can damage roots.

Wood containers are among the most attractive available and, with this material, shapes and sizes are clmost endless. Pick redwood, cypress or cedar for specific types of wood, however, as these woods resist decay and rot. To further prolong the life of wood containers, treat them with a copper naphthanate or opper sulfate pro. ict, or use a clour-drying water seal on inside one outside. Wood fiber containers are much cheaper, but not as durable; even with water more than four passons.

## Publisher Says Blacks Still Suffering

WASHINGTON (UPI) - A black newspaper publisher said Friday blacks still suffer economic and social discrimination and the press should be deligent in exposing it.

John H. Sengstacke said many people who supported full rights for blacks in the 1960's have abandoned the cause to merge into the "establishment." He said despite major progress in human rights in the United States blacks are subject to discrimination in housing and jobs and are victims of police brutality.

The Justice Department's Community Relations Service an agency that works to mediate racial conflicts, says it is receiving so many complaints charging police brutality that it has given the issue its highest priority," Sengstacke said in remarks to the National Press Club.

"We have allowed ourselves to be bamboozled by the well-orchestrated public elations gimmick of a "New South," he said.

Sengstacke is publisher of the Chicago Daily Defender and serves as president of the National N. wspaper Publishers Association, which represents black publishers. He said the group was successful in military service, entertainment, the news business itself and in other areas.

"We have a proud tradition," he said. "Are we living up to it?"

He said the black press was founded to pursue freedom for all and was not chiefly concerned with commercial success.

"We are faced with a different problem," Sengstacke said. "And it is this: The boys who used to shout, "Down with segregation, down with police brutality, down with discrimination in employment," are now conspicuously silent. They are now a part of the establishment.

"Their desertion of the cause affords the black press a golden opportunity to reassert itself and help fulfill the Biblical prophecy that the last shall be first."



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## Stop Smoking

By Dr. Charles W. Faulkner.

I have received many letters requesting information about the dangers of smoking and asking for a method that may be used to stop smoking.

The biomedical effects of smoking are devastating. FACT: More than 300,000 deaths each year result from cancer, heart diseases, and other circulatory ailments that are directly related to smoking

FACT: Lung cancer in woment is expected to replace breast cancer as the leading cause of cancer deaths.

Women smokers who use oral FACT: contraceptives greatly increase their chances of heart attacks. Women who smoke during the last six months of pregnancy tend to have babies with lower average birth weithts than non-smoking mothers.

FACT: Alcohol consumption by smokers greatly increases the risk of cancer of the mouth and lungs. Cigarettes with filters docrease the chance of lung cancer for smokers but increase, by four times, the risk of lung cancer for non-smokers who breathe cigarette smoke.

FACT. Total death rates were lower for low-tarand-nicotine brand smokers than smokers of high tar and nicotine cigarettes, according to one study, but their death rates were still 30 percent to 75 percent higher than for non-smokers.

Efforts to reduce cigarette smoking have met with

FACT: Cigarette smoking by teen-age girls is on the increase but is not increasing for teen-age boys. More smokers than ever want to quit. Six out of 10 have made a serious effort to quit, nine out of 10 would guit if there was an easy way. Health professionals have led the decline in smoking.

Permanent withdrawal from smoking requires that you carnestly want to stop smoking. You must see your self in an ew relationship to your body; your body is like a trusting, innocent child which needs

your protection. If you are to eliminate smoking from your life, you must adopt a new philosophy regarding your body. Bad smoking habits, without such a philosophy, will re-establish themselves later. When you see yourself as your body's protector and relize that you are completely responsible for anything that goies into your mouth, you have begun the movement toward complete and permanent smoking withdrawal.

Follow this procedure: Whenever you feel the urge to smoke, replace it with the stronger urge to protect and respect your body. Repeat these statements

(1) "Smoking is poison to my body." Recognize. the damage that you do to your lungs each time you

(2) "I need my body to live." Your body is the precious physical plant through which you experience

(3) "I owe my body this commitment - to respect it and protect it." Because you want to live your life to its fullest, your body needs and deserves your respect - in the same manner in which you would respect any precious human being.

The urge to protect and respect your body can become as powerful as you desire. It all depends on you and on the dedication with which you make a habit of the above statements. Say them aloud or to yourself and realize what they mean to you in a very

### Sterlization **Method That** Requires No Surgery Being ested

A new method of female sterilization that requires no surgery, no hospitalization and no general anestheria is being tested with success at the Lankenau Hospital in the Philadelphia area. The method will soon be tested on women at eight other

The procedure involves injecting liquid silicone into the Fall plan tubes, which carry the ova from the ovaries to the uterus to be fertilized. Several minutes after injection, the silicone hardens into a rubbery

consistency and blocks the movement of an ovum.

In the new procedure, a tube-like instrument is instit ed into the utenus and then into the Fallopian tubes, and the silicone is pumped through the device. Traditional methods can cost between \$350 and \$1,200. The cost of th new procedure would be \$350

AFRICAN DREAM

(For students of African Folitics)

A review of Black Africa The Economic and Cultural Basis for a Federated State, by Cheikh Anta Diop. Lawrence Hill, Publishers, Westport, Conn., 1978. 99 pages, Paperback, \$3.95.

Cheikh Anta Diop is a professor at the University of Dakar, and more recently has become leader of the opposition in Senegal. He has written extensively in both the social and physical sciences. being a radiocarbons specialist and a researcher in black African history.

Black Africa was published originally in French in 1974 and contains a new foreword by the author in the 1978 edition. The book's principal theme is that of the need for a black African political state comprising most, if not all, of the present national and tribal groupings of Central Africa.

Thus, Mr. Diop's vision becomes an ancient one. He sees "South Americanization," that is, the fragmenting of black Africa, 25 a disease to be rooted out, and envisions a kind of fresh U.S.A. in a United States of Africa.

His book does not claim to be an objective statement. It is, rather, a reasoned plea for political and economically shared interests, rather than self-interest on the part of black Africa, he sees the Republic of South Africa, with its nuclear potential, as representing a major threatand the clearest challenge for the building of a black African lederated state.

Is there some connection between economic worries and heart disease? - Mrs. A.

Dear Mrs. A.: Smoking. disbetes, hypertension, high cholesterol are still the major factors in producing heart attacks, but I still agree that day-today stress is near the top of the list av the reason for deaths due to coronary heart diseare.

There is a comprehensive report by Dr. William A. Check in JAMA's department, Medical News. which indicates that loss of a job and other financial worries are important factors in heart disease.

Until recently there has been no explanation why there's been a decrease in heart disease mortality during the last 10 years. But according to various studies, it seems that e sonomic siumpa can in-

cry's a beart illn' as. time doctor, analyzing Australian corenary fatalities found that they were related to the years preceding, during and following the Depression which began about 1930.

After remaining essentially steady from 1920 to 1930, coronary heart disease increpsed from 1931 to 1975. Due to stress, perhaps increase of smoking and other bad

habits were a factor. In one testimony before the U.S. longress in 1976, it was estimated that a I percent rise in unemployment sustained over six years cou. lead to 37,000 additional deaths.
