Patterson Resigns From Texas Tech

"People may say I'm crazy doing what I'm doing," said T. J. Patterson, Sr., copublisher and editor of the Lubbock Digest, "but I'm not."

He has resigned this week as Assistant-to-the-Associate Dean for Undergraduate Programs in the College of Business Administration at Texas Tech University. After nearly twelve years with the College of Business Administration, "I feel as though I need to be full-time in a field which I really love - the newspaper business," said Patterson.

"No doubt about it, I will miss the University and the fine young people, dedicated staff and faculty who have crossed my path for nearly twelve years. But a man has to do what he has to do - grow."

continued Patterson. "For many years, I've written about economic development, about people doing somethings for themselves, and now it's time for me to do what I've been talking and writing about," he said. "I just can't wait to get out into the business community and represent something I'm part owner."

"The Lubbock Digest will take a complete turn around. It is no longer a 'mom and pep' operation - it's a business! It's a must it become a stronger based weekly newspaper. filling a void which is needed in Lubbock for all people, including blacks and other minorities," declared Patterson.

"One can admire my partner. Eddie P. Richardson, Jr., for holding in there this long. He has hung in there in the early days, now he needs help and support so we can grow," Patterson added.

"In the very near future, we will diversify the efforts of the Lubbock Digest --including typesetting and addressing envolopes and other materials for local businesses," he made known.

"Perhaps my greatest concern is to help develop young people about the newspaper industry. Especially in the area of selling advertisement to the many, many fine businesses in Lubbock and the South Plains of Texas. Many young people, blacks in particular, can't see a future in this area. Mr. and Mrs. Dale Presbyterian Clinic Makes Change

The Presbyterian Center was conceived in 1965 by a group of Lubbock Presbyterian and physicians, who had become aware of the special need within-the community for medical counseling and treatment for people who could not afford the medical help they required and did not qualify for existing

programs. The center is a volunteer-based clinic, providing services in Gynecology, Orthopedies, Dental, Diet, Diabetes and others. The clinic also provides services such as Nuerology, Carreliniogy, Urology and many others. The Center refers. patients to other clinics when needed such as Health Sxiences Centerr, Center, Human Resources Center, Family Planning, and Planned

Parenthood. Presently the clinic operates from 10 a.m. -2

July 20, 1981, two new doctors will arrive and the plinic hours will change to 9-5 daily. These hours will be more convenient for the patients and will also allow for a larger patient load. However, services and medications that were once free wil be placed on a sliding scale, with patients paying according to their neome and family size.

The clinic has qualified volunteer doctors, pharmarists, nurses. aides, and executive director, an all-volunteer board of directors and volunteers for office activities and to pick up and son donated drugs. what do women want? Full Pay for Part-time Work

Many people think fornicate is a bad word, but NOW thinks foreman is in the same bed. A recent study conducted by the reknown Louis Harris and Associates, Inc., pollsters, indicated unprecedented growth for girls, er, women, in the workforce. Recognizing the incredible recent leap of women in the workforce has forced some companies to change their career and occupational names, like first-line supervisors, instead of just plain foremen for the new "Junes."

It is not clear whether Jane is going to replace "John" on the streets of San Francisco and other nefarious places. However, another study by Heidrick and Struggles, master head hunters, has found nearly a third of women officers making \$50,000 or more are divorcees. Four times the national averages. Even those women making half as much money, \$25,000 and above, divorce at twice the national rate. Some stress is obviously involved in making job switches.

Working for women clearly creates the risk of a substantial change in the traditional type of family structure. Somehow, everyone, man, woman and child is convinced this social phenonmenon of a "new place" for women in our society is "here to stay." Lou Harris is one of those experts on changing American experiences, so sold on this "breaking out of the mold" by American women, he was prepared to admit it to a nationwide Public Broadcasting System audience. Mr. Harris releases of the General Mills American Family Report - 1980-81 "Families At Work," was the occasion for a 19 city broadcast around the country. In essence, it said the women of America are out to work, and they ain't going back to the kitchen or no place else, unless they got a mind to! You got that?!!

It was difficult to distinguish what direction General Mills the makers of monopoly sets and Betty Crocker cake mixes was going in the beginning. But it was clear they were lining up with the women, whichever way they were going.

Well, actually what women want most, one finds after digging through figures all over creation, is some type of work other women. Some nerve, now that they get a chance to join men, they want to get away from them again. Oh well. At least they will be happy. In terms of motivation, nearly all working adults, 90% men and 87% women, are working primarily to

achieve a sense of personal satisfaction. In addition, according to the GM Report, 42% of all family members, 49% of working women and 60% of women planning to go to work desired part-time work with full benefits. Oh, and about the children, child care and after-hours care by the schools are here to stay. The U.S. Department of Labor reports that back in 1978, the population of children under the age of 18 with two working parents had crossed over the halfway mark in the country.

Children 13-18, bettern known as teen-agers, by more than a 90% margin agree that both parents should take an equal role in child care. A point more than a few fathers miss when they wife goes to work. While teen-agers can take the absences of mothers from home, even they don't like it while there are children under 12 in the house, one can safely assume, especially if it's them. Teen-agers, nevertheless, believe children of working parents are forced to become more self-reliant and independent. Not at all a bad idea.

Some new ideas will be needed by major U. S. corporations to cope with this changing social movement of majority women into the workforce Minority women have faced the problem of putting children through college for years, with or without a husband. How the majority women of society deal with this growing issue and the reaction of rigid institutions will shape the family and every foundation of America in the future.
