## Black Leaders Speak Out!!

As the Lubbock Digest went to press last week, the Reagan Administration made an abrupt about-face in its decision to grant tax-exempt status to private schools and colleges that practice racial discrimination.

President announced last Tuesday (January 13th) that he regretted that "there had been a misunderstanding" about the decision. Reagan now says he will submit legislation to Congress which will prohibit tax-exemptions for organizations that discriminate on the basis of race.

Although the President went on to say that he has always been opposed to racial discrimination in any form, many blacks in Lubbock have their doubts. "I think he was trying to cover up what had been done once it got out in the open," states Rose Wilson, president of the Lubbock Branch of the NAACP. "I don't think he will ever be able to undo the damage that he has caused," said Wilson.

Vera Newsome told the Digest that she believed Mr. Reagan changed his stance because of pressure from civil rights organizations.

"I agree with Benjamin Hooks when he said that Reagan is doing a lot of things without consulting anyone. I don't think it was an oversight as Reagan said. His entire administration is set on changing things blacks have fought for," Newsome said.

Margaret Randle, president of the Lubbock Black Teachers Caucus said, "I can see how that (granting tax-exemption) would not be good for blacks. It could open the door for other things to happen. Other people could open schools with the intent to discriminate and get a tax-exemption."

The two schools that have been involved in the controversy are Bob Jones University in South Carolina and the Goldsboro, N. C. Christian Schools. The Goldsboro schools do not accept blacks and Bob Jones University has a rule against inter-racial dating among its students.

# Lubbock Woman Abducted!!

A 28 year-old East Lubbock woman was treated and released from Lubbock General Hospital Saturday night for injuries she sustained when the car in which she was a passenger ran over her at 50th Street and Avenue H.

2631 Globe Avenue, and a man got into an argument about 4:15 p. m. Saturday at an automatic laundry at 34th Street and Avenue H. Newton told the Lubbock Digest Tuesday morning that she thought the man worked at the

place (laundry). "He told me he wanted to help me with the dryer since they have not been working properly. This is when he attacked me!"

According to police reports, the man forced Miss Newton into a 1973 Oldsmobile 98. The couple drove south to

50th and Avenue H, where the victim got out or was forced out of the car and was run over by the Oldsmobile.

The driver drove off and traveled south of the city to a field two miles south of Woodrow where the car caught on fire. Authorities were un-

certain whether the vehicle caught on fire from a leaking transmission or it was intentionally set.

The Lubbock Digest has learned that the man in question of the abduction was a graduate of Dunbar High School. At press time a suspect

had not been arrested. Police detectives are asking that anyone who has information about the case to call the Detective Division at 762-6411.

## TEC Seniority System Eliminates Minorities

The Texas Employment Commission voted last week in Austin to use the seniority system to determine which employees will be fired due to budget cuts. The three commissioners voted 2-1 to fire the last 500 employees hired.

Chairman Nolan Ward, who cast the only "no" vote, said that using the seniority system would eliminate too many minority employees and women--many of whom were hired on in recent years because of earlier discrimination.

## Mattox Designates Campaign Treasurer To Explore Texas Attorney General's Race

He served two terms in the State Legislature in Austin where Texas Monthly magazine named him one of the "Ten Best Legislators." In the State House, Mattox served on the Judicial Affairs Committee and he is currently serving his third term in the U. S. House of Representatives where he is on the powerful House Budget Committee and the House Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Committee.

Mattox's campaign slogan in his re-election campaign in 1980 was, "Jim Mattox: The Tough Do Get Going." Texas Monthly magazine described Mattox as "an indefatigable fighter.... (and a) dedicated and effective political organizer."

In a letter to the Secretary of State, Mattox designated A. Don Crowder of Dallas, his former law partner and treasurer in his previous campaigns as the treasurer for this exploratory effort. Mattox raised over \$500 thousand in his last campaign and he said he expects to raise \$750 thousand should he decide to enter this year's race for Attorney General.

The designation of a campaign treasurer is required under Section 14.02 of the Texas Election Code before a person can take any "affirmative action" for the purpose of becoming

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## New Directors Elected Last Saturday

Three property owners at Buffalo Springs Lake won all the open seats on the lake's governing board in last Saturday's election.

Dale Miller, Tommy Fisher and Billy Meeks defeated three other candidates, including two incumbents, by almost a 2-to-1 margin.

The three winners turned back re-election bids by board chairman W. D. "Billy" Sims and Danny Edwards of Slaton. K. G. "Ken" Hurley also lost in his campaign to serve on the board.

Unofficial vote tallies gave Fisher 1,411; Meeks 1,405; Miller 1,424;

Hurley 759; Sims 799 and Edwards 778.

The hotly debated contest surrounded controversy concerning recent increases in the lot rentals lake. The annual rent on a lake front lot jumped from \$350 to \$500, and all other lots were increased from \$250 to \$350 a year.

## Henry Seeks Re-election

Mayor Pro Tem Alan Henry announced Saturday his plans to seek re-election to Place 1 on the Lubbock City Council.

Henry, in an interview with the Lubbock Digest, said that he has done his best to represent not only East Lubbock but all of Lubbock.

"I have worked with various citizens of East Lubbock and I believe

that I have their confidence." Henry also stated that one of the more pressing problems to Lubbock citizens is the reduction of federal programs.

"The federal government is changing its philosophy radically. A lot of federal programs are being phased out and more responsibility is being placed in the hands of the cities. The next few years will be crucial to a council that will deal with the needs of citizens that have been handled by Washington up to this time."

One budget cut that may hit East Lubbock citizens hardest will be in public transportation. Henry says he will do what he can to keep the buses rolling in Lubbock.

"The federal government will be phasing out public transportation operating funds. I will personally be looking at retaining this service so that people can get about to their jobs and other places. I think it's important to have someone on the council who is familiar with the needs of the people and will look out for those needs. I believe I can be of service to the city," concluded Henry.

## Getting Along

Dear Doctors:

I have a 17 year-old son who has just been arrested for the third time for attacking men he believes are homosexuals. Ever since he was 13 he has spoken belligerently about "fags" and "queers." He has some sense of mission about it as he is constantly talking about "gay perverts."

After this last attack he has been placed on strict probation and the judge suggested he get psychiatric evaluation and, if necessary, psychotherapy. My son is refusing this recommendation and says that it is the "fags" who need psychiatric help, not him.

When I try to understand why he physically attacks them, he really can't give a satisfactory answer. He apparently becomes so blind with rage that he loses control. I am afraid he may even kill someone.

The courts have tried to be understanding but he continues to be uncooperative. I am afraid he will be put in jail. What should I do from here? My son otherwise appears to be an ordinary kid although he has had no father since age 3 because of divorce. M. Y., Chicago, Ill.

Dear M. Y.:

You son has a very serious problem, one which makes him a danger to society and, specifically, a danger to the gay community. In many towns and cities, homosexuals have been randomly assaulted and murdered by young men with a disorder similar to

your son's.

Your son has severe homophobia, or fear of homosexuals, which indicates he has serious emotional difficulties. No one is required to like homosexuals, or anyone else for that matter, but when the level of animosity reaches the point of impulsive physical assault it in no way can be construed as an ordinary problem. Regrettable, youngsters like your son may find support among their peers or from adults who feel the same way about gays.

We believe your son is in immediate need of psychiatric help, otherwise he will harm someone seriously and ruin his own life. Often, men with his disorder fear homosexual impulses within themselves and attack gays to defend against similar internal drives.

Talk to your son. If he refuses treatment our recommendation would be that he be jailed and hopefully receive some type of treatment before release.

Dear Doctors:

I'm a 35 year-old black businesswoman who was previously married and divorced in my early 20s. Since then, I have been a bit wary of men. I have been involved, but have kept my distance emotionally. Usually, the relationships are short-lived and never last over a year. Frequently, I go for a long period of time without seeing a man at all.

Last year, I met a married man with six children at work. We started seeing each other and it was nice. There were few demands and we saw each other once a week or maybe once every two weeks. It seemed just right for me and I did not feel threatened. I also felt I was keeping my distance, although I liked him a lot.

Now, I think I love him. But he can't leave his family and I wouldn't ever feel comfortable if he did. We are breaking up and I am so depressed. I cry all the time and can barely work. Should I see a therapist or will this all pass? - N. S., Los Angeles, Calif. Dear N. S.:

You are most likely suffering an acute grief reaction as you face the loss of this man. How severe the grief will be in your case cannot be judged.

You were apparently much more vulnerable than you thought. That is often the case in persons who are cautious about getting too close in a romance. You mistakenly believed that his marital status automatically protected you and then you unwittingly

#### Rates Go Up For Medicare

The Medicare hospital insurance deductible, the amount a Medicare patient is responsible for when he or she first receives hospital in-patient services in a benefit period, will increase to \$260 in 1982. The 1981 deductible was \$204.

Also scheduled to increase are the per-day amounts patients are responsible for after specified lengths of stay in a hospital or skilled nursing facility.

After 60 days of in-patient hospital care in a benefit period in 1982, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$54 a day. The 1981 figure was \$51.

For each reserve day of in-patient care, Medicare will pay for all covered costs except \$130 a day. The 1981 figure was \$102.

After 20 days of care in a skilled nursing facility, Medicare will pay all covered costs except \$32.50. The 1981 figure was \$25.50.

The Medicare medical insurance annual deductible is also scheduled to increase in 1982, the first increase since 1973. The 1982 annual medical insurance deductible will be \$75, up from \$60. Medical insurance generally pays 80 percent of the approved costs or charges for covered charges equaling the annual deductible.

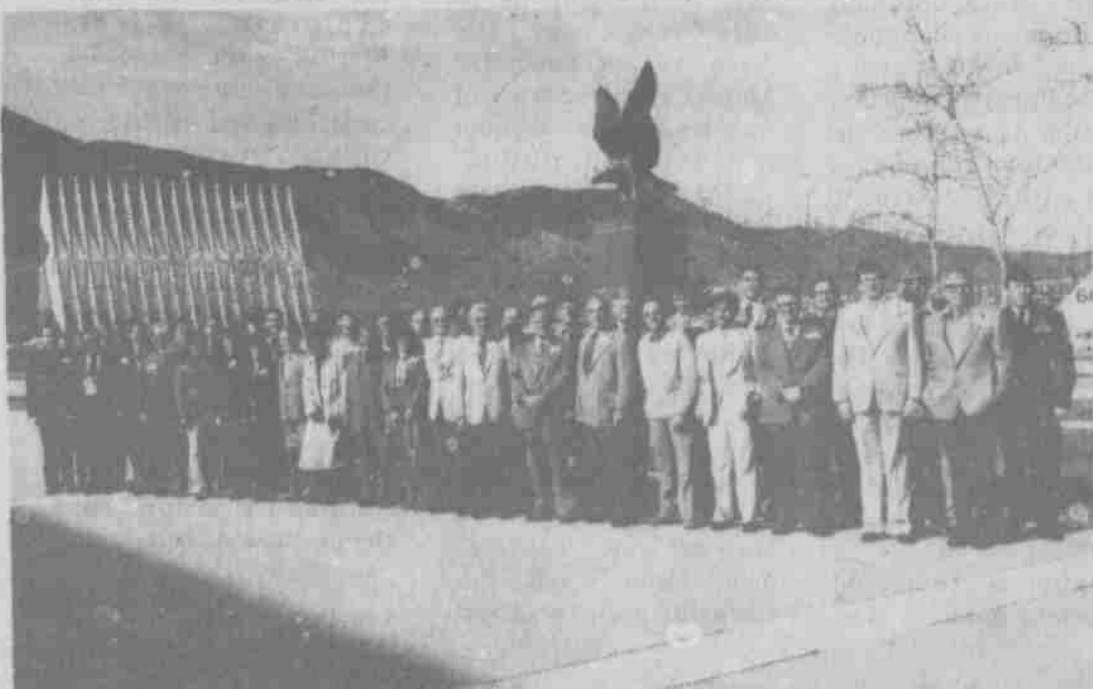
said: "I am honored to have been invited to share with you in honoring a great leader with such magnitude."

### Carbon Dioxide Laser Being Used For Surgery At Methodist Hospital

A carbon dioxide laser is now being used for plastic surgery at Methodist Hospital. This is the first laser unit to be added to the patient care equipment at the hospital.

Neurosurgeons and a

surgeon specializing in plastic surgery have been trained in the techniques of laser surgery and are performing operations with it.

A carbon dioxide laser produces an invisible, infrared beam of energy. When the beam is focused onto tissue, energy is absorbed by the water in the tissue, causing a high increase in temperature which vaporizes the tissue, producing the incision.

Methodist Hospital's \$112,000 system was made in Tel Aviv, Israel. It is the latest model carbon dioxide laser built, since carbon dioxide lasers were first developed for medical use in 1966.

The word "laser" is formed from "light amplification by stimulated emission of radiation."

The technical explanation of lasers becomes complicated, but a simplified explanation is to imagine all the light from a regular light bulb being harnessed and focused into one, small, powerful beam of energy.

Methodist Hospital's system functions by means of the carbon dioxide gas with helium and nitrogen as other gases used in the system, electricity, precisely positioned mirrors within a long articulating arm, an endpiece which the

The film is Milos Forman's richly tapestried "Ragtime" the film which is noted briefly cast-wise for bring James Cagney, 82, out of retirement in the role of the Police Commissioner the early days of the century.

This film, like the big novel, is concerned with people and events at the century's turn. Indeed, the first portion of the movie consists of many clips of old silent newsreels and the novel's plot (thus, the screenplay) is woven around such famous names as Evelyn Nesbit, whose jealous husband Harry K. Thaw shot and killed architect Stanford White at the old Amsterdam Roof Garden Theater in New York City.

In a pivotal plotting the film is concerned with a ragtime pianist, played beautifully by Howard E. Rollins, and the events which spur his social violence brought on by the desecration of his Model-T Ford by a bigoted Irish fire company.

This plunges all principals into the ultimate tragedy of the film with shootings and bombings of firehouses and the taking over of the Morgan Library and the threat to destroy its priceless treasures unless Rollins' demands are met.

There are magnificent portrayals by a host of talented players and in the cast, beside Cagney one catches Pat O'Brian, Brad Dourif, Donald O'Connor, Mary Steeburgen and, even, Norman Mailer, the author, who plays the doomed White.

It is truly director Milos Forman's singularly spectacular triumph and skill in handling the long script, the casting, the direction itself and the perspective of the entire undertaking.

"Ragtime" is a film well worth the seeing. I promise you you won't be bored.

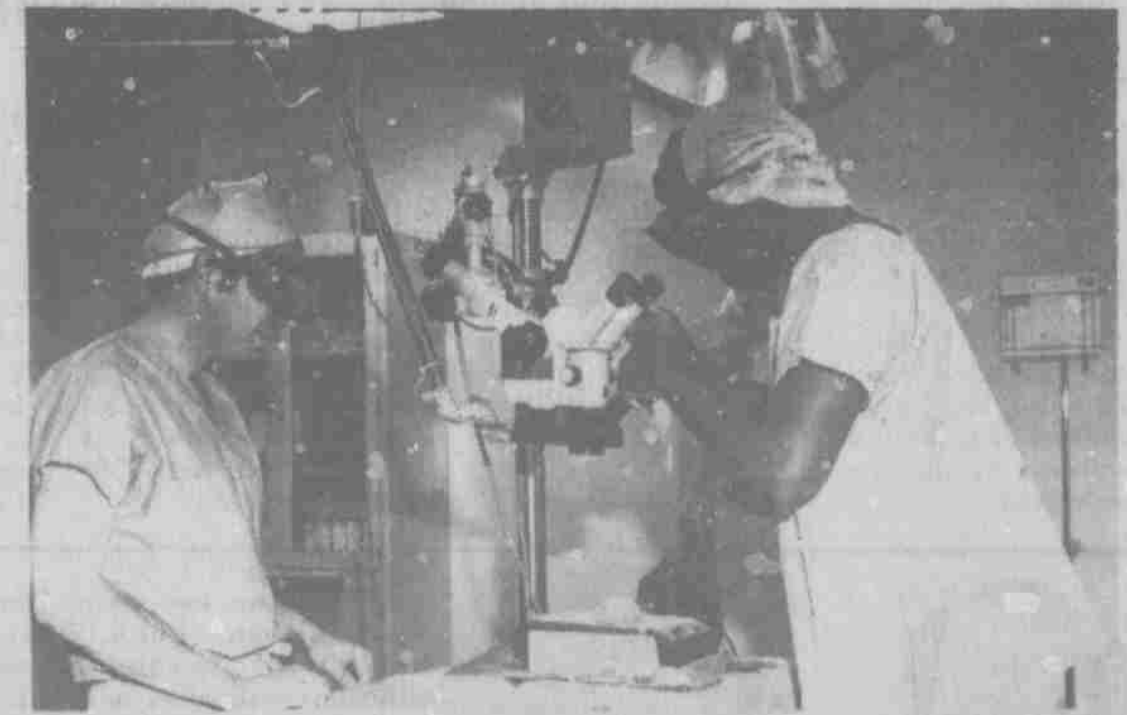

Other advantages of laser surgery include a reduced need for blood transfusions, and patients report less post-operative pain.

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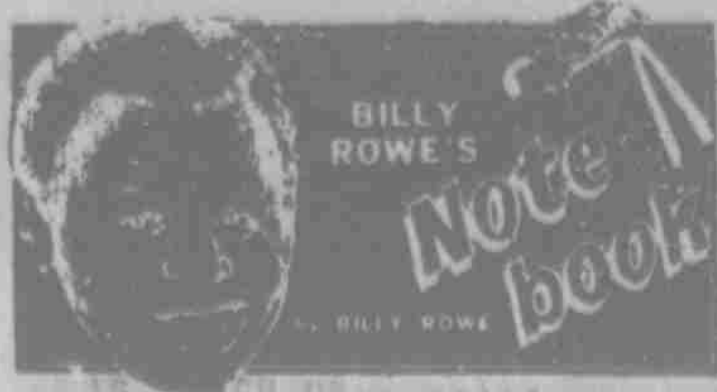
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**A New Year To Make The World Older**

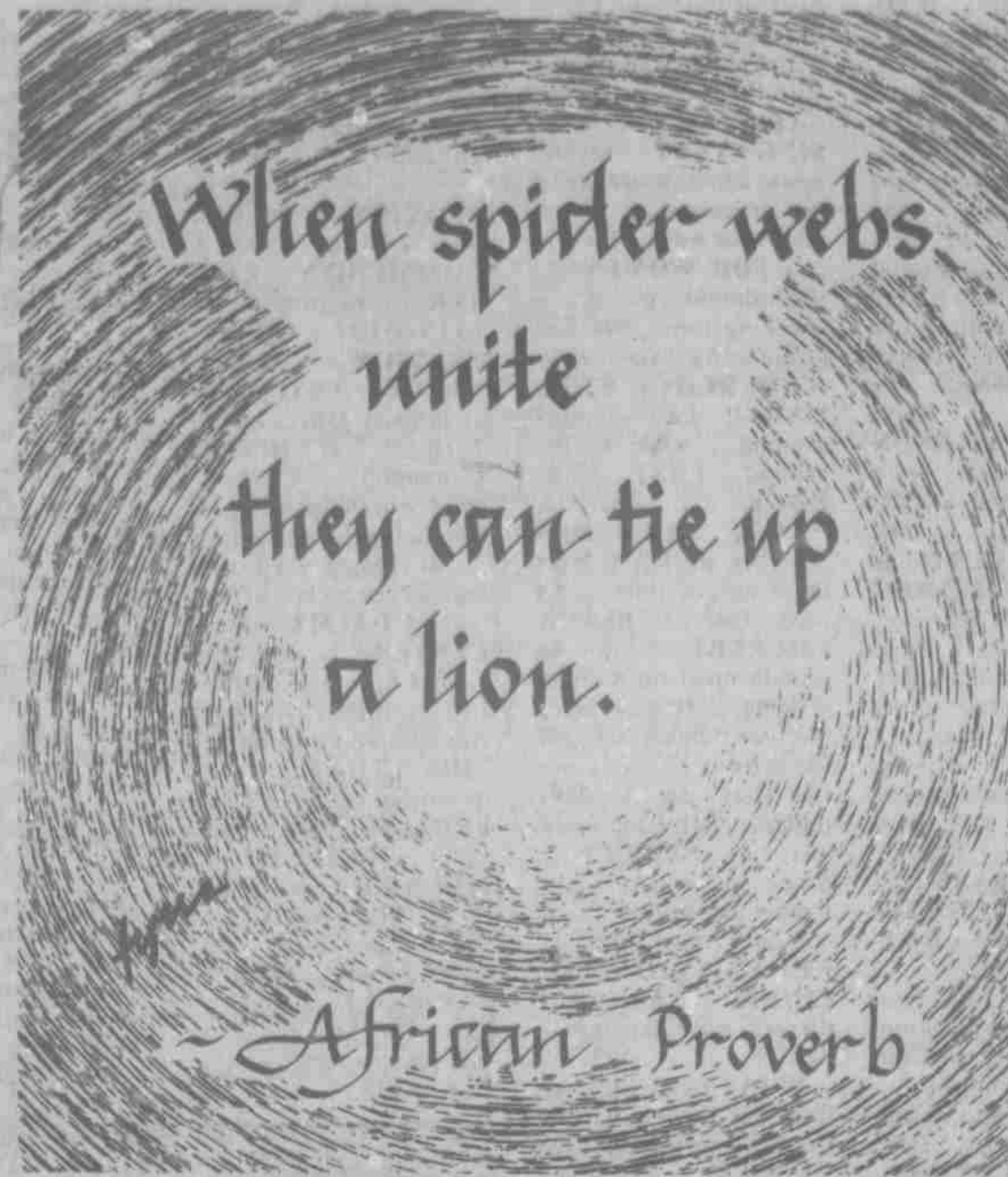

**The Brown Experience - La Vida Americana** - More than any other segment of the U. S. Population, Hispanics are inter-city people. According to census data, about 85 percent of the 14.6 million Hispanics in the U. S. live in urban areas. During 1980, 20.4 percent of Hispanic families were living below the poverty level (8,500 for a non-farm family of four) compared to 8.6 percent for the non-Hispanic population. In the Southwest, this under class replenishes the urban core as whites leave for the suburbs. In the Northwest and Midwest, the under-class replaces whites who migrate to the Sun Belt.

In many urban communities, the federal budget cutbacks have brought a new and grim sense of competition between Hispanics and Blacks - still the preeminent minority in the nation. In most communities where Hispanics and Blacks coexist, the coalition - if any exists at all - is fragile.

In New York, bellringer sources report that Puerto Rican leaders complain that Blacks control many of the social welfare programs. In Chicago, Hispanic leaders say Black social workers and case workers routinely short shift the Hispanic poor on the basis of language or citizenship.

According to these same sources, life for Hispanics is better in the Sun Belt than it is for those in other areas of the nation. Big city mayors in the Sun Belt such as Henry Cisneros (first Mexican ever elected there) of San Antonio and other leaders are worrying somewhat about the problems of the poor in the cities. States Mayor Cisneros: "We haven't dealt with the terrible, terrible sensation I think we will be facing in the next budget year as people who we employ have to be laid off, as people we provided service for no longer get it."

The voices of the Washington lobbyists for Hispanic groups, neighborhood organizers and the people are growing louder as their numbers grow and their political sophistication increases.

Ruben Bonilla, national counsel of the League of United Latin American Citizens, recently issued a statement highly critical of reported plans by the Immigration and Naturalization Service to revoke tens of thousands of temporary residency permits that have allowed Mexican aliens to live legally in the United States since 1977. Bonilla said he found it ironic that while we grant the necessary and appropriate refuge to Polish refugees that we turn our backs on Mexican economic refugees. In a sense, it amounts to international double-cross.

Rawls formerly sung with The Pilgrim Travelers, a gospel singing group that was sponsored in West Texas and New Mexico by this correspondent. He has won several Grammy Awards and sold millions albums and records during his career.

growing nuclear arms capacity of either the United States or the Soviet Union.

Furthermore, I am here because of my longtime philosophical commitment to our mastery of natural forces and improvement of human relations. Peace between the super powers is a prerequisite for this. And immediate disarmament negotiations and actions by the super powers are essential to peace. It is essential not only for further development of human personality, capability, and satisfaction, but also for even maintaining our present levels of development.

To repeat more specifically, I am here because world disarmament is essential to create jobs and to spread justice in a world at peace. For example, Congress recently adopted a budget proposed by President Reagan which provides \$208 billion to increase America's armament but only \$147 billion for non-entertainment domestic needs.

In other words, more for killing than for healing; more for destruction than for consumption. This budgetary distortion has caused an anticipated national deficit of \$100 billion this year. A record high. As a result our government - one of the wealthiest in the world - must borrow at exorbitant interest rates to its own taxpayers. An amount so great as to promote an even higher interest rates and profits for the world's private, multi-national financiers. Moreover, the renewed arms race fosters inflation and super profits for the global conglomerates.

Of course, this not only stifles economic development in the United States and other developed

### Charity Begins at Home Tax Deduction Time is Now

"It is more blessed to give than to receive," at least in this tax year 1981. The vast scope of the changes to the tax law requires some serious rethinking of traditional tax planning ideas. In almost every closet in America is an item or two, or perhaps even a dozen or so, that should be given away for a charitable deduction. The new Tax Act demands a serious look at several of these relics for the Salvation Army coffers.

President Reagan's sponsored Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981 will affect every man, woman and child in America.

Change, however, is often an opportunity for profit. Many of the new provisions require almost that people take positive steps in order to start taking full advantage of the new rules and regulations. Although over 100 changes to the Internal Revenue Code have been made, many of which are very complex, there are ten commandments of the Economic Recovery Tax Act of 1981, which should prove profitable if you live up to them.

These strategies and ideals go like this:

- First, defer income into future years.
- Second, accelerate deductions into earlier years.
- Third, avoid short-term gains in 1981.
- Fourth, buy fully-taxable dividend public utility common stock and reinvest their stock dividends in the company.
- Fifth, 1981 is a perfect year to swap municipal bonds.
- Sixth, discount bonds, those selling below their face value, have become more attractive for investment, from high grade corporate bonds, the strongest with the greatest ability to pay off on the due date, down to the low-grade corporate bonds, those bonds thought to have a lesser ability to pay off a face value when due, but which often pay a much higher cash interest rate for the same amount of your money.
- Seventh, take another look at and reassess tax-exempt vs taxable investment returns.
- Eighth, tax shelters generating large write-offs in 1981 are particularly attractive.
- Ninth, the new lower capital gains rate is extremely favorable for investments in the stock market, especially in growth stocks.
- Tenth, Investment Retirement Accounts (IRA) are for everyone.

After consulting with your accountant or tax attorney, take a look at the first commandment: Deferring income into future years. You may have heard that Economic Recovery Tax Act reductions in the federal income tax rate were "5-10-10," that is five percent in 1981, ten percent in 1982, and ten percent in 1983, but the real rate cuts from last year, 1980 will be only one and one quarter percent (1 1/4%) in 1981, and ten percent for 1982, a good news 19 percent reduction for 1983, and a whopping slash of 23 percent for 1984! The well known chop off of the top bracket of 70 percent down to 50 percent on investment, as well as, earned income is tremendous for those whose income may include large amounts of interest and dividend income in the future.

By the way, do like the second commandment of the Economic Recovery Tax Act dictates, accelerate as many charitable business and medical deductions as possible into the earliest year.

Likewise, the third commandment of the ERTA is clearly obvious, avoid taking any short-term gains this year. This, of course, would only increase your income in the highest paying tax year you might have in your entire lifetime.

**COPENHAGEN, DENMARK** - This report comes to our readers from Copenhagen, Denmark, where I am participating in the 35th annual meeting of the Bureau of the World Peace Council. On January 6, I was the keynote speaker for the International World Disarmament Conference, sponsored by the Council. As was the case with my fact-finding mission during the four-week congressional recess last August, I am using the recess this time in the interest of my constituents and other peace-loving Americans across our great country. Now I am on a working-tour of European nations.

With me is my close friend and colleague, Congressman John Conyers of Detroit, Michigan. He also is a speaker here. This historic meeting is being convened by the World Peace Council because of its growing concerns over the arms buildup on the part of the major world powers, principally the United States and the Soviet Union. This, the Council believes, is a threat to world peace.

Therefore, my being here will enable me to better inform my constituents and to be more knowledgeable when I vote on the floor of the House of Representatives. As you know, participation in the shaping of foreign policy is a major responsibility of every congressman, and in this instance it relates directly to jobs, justice, and peace. Most of the 520,000 people in the district I was elected to represent are concerned about jobs, since most of us are workers. We also need justice since most of us are Black. Most of us are concerned about the world disarmament since all are civilized, and civilization itself could be quickly wiped out by the

## How Do You Present Christ?

"And the times of this ignorance God winked at; but now commandeth all men everywhere to repent. Because he hath appointed a day in which he will judge the world in righteousness by that man whom he hath ordained; whereof he hath given assurance unto all men, in that he hath raised him from the dead." Acts 17:30-31.

The truth is sometimes offensive; yet it must be told. Paul said to the Greeks who thought themselves to be the cream of the educated society of that time, "... whom therefore ye ignorantly worship, him declare I unto you," Verse 23.

That was the case in the first century church, but here we are in the 20th Century church where for 2,000 years the gospel of Jesus Christ has been preached. The question is, How do you as a 20th Century person present the Lord Jesus Christ? Do you present to the man who says I am not saved a Christ in strength? Or does life show forth an image of self defeat in condemnation?

The West Texas area has experienced the preaching of the gospel for many years, and in every city in which this paper is read there are many churches, especially in Lubbock, the city is filled with churches. While in these churches many of their people do not know who Jesus is. You have read that He came to seek and to save that which is lost; you have read that He is the Son of God, that He can heal all, knows all, and

can do all. Yet, your life is bound in sin.

The Greeks did not have the true message of Jesus Christ but we read that when Paul preached, many believed and were saved. Now the message has been preached, and the invitation of the Lord is given. "The moment that you hear my voice, harden not your hearts."

## Getting Involved in A Black Youth Reading Program

One of the major priorities of an almost unprecedented number of leaders of black groups nationally is that of helping our youth to learn to read. If you have not heard of the National Assault-On-Illiteracy Program (A-O-I-P) already, you should know that it is the major cooperative effort of the leadership of

upwards to 100 national black organizations and their local affiliates. Your organization's leadership should be involved.

Check the partial list of groups below, and if your leadership or group is not included, then write to the A-O-I-P office and have your national leadership do the same. National presidents are invited to

serve as A-O-I-P trustees, and it is most important that all of our groups get involved.

The A-O-I-P national office is at 770 Broadway, N.Y., N.Y. 10003. With nearly one-half of our black youth leaving our schools today unable to read at a fourth grade level, we are faced with possibly the most serious

threat of our 120 years of freedom.

People who cannot read any better than that cannot be employed regularly or for any basic industrial or commercial work. Hence they will be consigned to welfare or worse permanently. This places all black Americans in a highly precarious position. Can you imagine white Americans standing for providing support for the majority of black Americans? The possibilities are exceedingly ominous.

**ODESSA** -- State Sen. E. L. Short, 56 year old Tahoka resident, recently announced here that he will seek re-election for a second term in November. A veteran politician, Short currently holds the 28th Dist. seat in the Senate. The Texas Tech Medical School branch to be located here was noted as one of his priorities, along with public education and tax relief. The School district trustees also gave final approval to a new junior high school and approved plan for a new west Odessa elementary school, to be constructed by Dec. 1982.

**HOBBS, N. M.** -- For Ralph Tasker, a legend in New Mexico high school basketball and head coach of the Hobbs Eagles for the past 33 years, was expected to gain his 800 victory in his career when the Eagles meet Oklahoma schools as we go to press. And the Hobbs City Council recently approved more than seven million dollars worth of street improvements on top of the nearly six million dollars worth of storm sewers, according to city manager Joe Harvey. Unbeaten and unflappable Hobbs has been chosen as the No. 1 Class AAAA high school basketball team in New Mexico according to Associated Press. They have won 48 straight games.

**NORMAN, OKLAHOMA** -- An additional 280 minority women in higher education have been identified for future advancement through a program established in 1977 by the Office of Women in Higher Education with the recent consultation help by E. Ann Holmes of the University of Oklahoma.

Despite widely reported national feuds, the heads of the seven largest Black and Jewish organizations in the Newark, New Jersey area, representing more than 200,000 persons contended that they remain united on major issues. Both groups called for 'social justice and a better life for those who are disadvantaged or deprived in American society.'

In a statement to the Digest recently, Nick Franklin, State Chairman of the Democratic Party of New Mexico stated: "In light of the terrible impact of the Reagan budget cuts, especially on low and moderate income Americans, it is hoped that participation in the National Party Conference in Philadelphia to be held June 25 - 27, 1982, will include victims of these budget cuts. On Friday, January 29, "Mike Rannels For Lt. Gov. Fundraiser" will be held at the Hobbs Country Club and The Digest has been invited to cover the affair.

**LOS ANGELES, CA.** -- Bill Cosby will serve as National Honorary Chairman for the National Association of Sickle Cell Disease, Inc. on radio and television announcements across the country, according to Dr. Charles F. Whitten, national president.

**MIAMI, FLA.** -- The plight of Haitians seeking to enter the United States -- highlighted by the recent boating deaths of 33, the 'dehumanizing' conditions at a refugee camp and new attempts to bar immigration -- has ignited the concern of many church leaders over the nation, including United Methodists.

**SANTA FE, N. M.** -- A district judge has upheld planned cuts in state welfare benefits which are expected to save the state and federal governments nearly \$2 million in 1982. It was reported that about 600-700 families will be removed from the welfare rolls as a result of the standard of need decision as well as 19 and 20 year old students now receiving state assistance under AFDC. And former Attorney General Toney Anaya, a candidate for the Democratic Party's gubernatorial nomination, said New Mexico's energy policy should be directed toward developing alternate energy sources and making utilities more affordable.

a candidate for a state or local office. Section 14.01 of the Code defines the term 'candidate' and specifically states, however, that the designation of a campaign treasurer is not "affirmative action which makes one a candidate."

Mattox said he will make a definite announcement of his decision by the filing deadline, currently set for Feb. 1, 1982.

Mattox's working class 5th Congressional District in Dallas was gerrymandered into a Republican silk-stocking district by the Legislature last year after Governor Clements applied pressure on a slight majority of State Legislators.

"The Republicans were finally able to accomplish with a pencil, a map and a smoke filled room, what they were unable to accomplish on election day in the last three elections," Mattox said. Clements' Congressional redistricting plan has been challenged in Federal court and the U. S. Justice Department is now reviewing the plan to determine whether it was drafted legally.

"It now appears that the law suit and Justice Department review of the redistricting plan will not be concluded as early as we had hoped," said Mattox, "so we have designated a state treasurer in order to explore the Attorney General's race."

No matter what my ultimate decision, I will continue to stand up for the people's interests, and should I decide to enter the Attorney General's race, you can be sure that I will be the people's lawyer," Mattox concluded.

Mattox will be in El Paso later this week.

nations, it is absolutely devastating to the legitimate aspirations of Africans, Latin American, Middle Eastern, and Far Eastern nations whose natural development has been oppressed for centuries by the greed of imperialism, colonialism, and racism.

Now the accelerating obsolescence of stockpiling of arms promotes unemployment by subtracting from and violating the natural economic cycle of production and consumption. It does this by diverting capital, diverting intelligence, and diverting labor into the deadend production of arms.

When I return home I plan to continue there this speaking tour for disarmament daily until Congress reconvenes, and on weekends thereafter so far as my other duties permit.
