Voting Rights Passes 85-8

The Senate breathed fresh life into the Voting Rights Act of 1965 last Friday, approving 85-8 the enforcement provisions designed to guarantee free access to the polls by blacks and other minorities. The House approved a similar measure 389-

24 last October. President Reagan, who opposed it initially when it was proposed by civil rights groups, has said he will sign the bill into law. Although 77 U. S. Senators publicly supported the Voting Rights bill, Republican Senator Jesse Helms of North Carolina vowed to block the bill until the Senate accepted changes lessening or eliminating federal authority to challenge state election laws as discrimi-

natory. Helms led a filibuster which blocked any action for a week, but gave up under pressure from fellow Republicans and Senate leaders last Thursday.

Unemployment Rate At 5.3%

The Texas Employment Commission released figures last week that showed 5,750 local workers were out of a job in April, boosting the city's unemployment rate to 5.3 percent -- the highest it has been since June 1981. The jobless rate stood at 4.4 percent in March. Many of the Lubbock's residents who joined the unemploy-

ment ranks in April were in industrial or agricultural related fields. The local TEC Office is expecting the unemployment rate to increase this summer because of the large number of college and public school students who have entered the local job market in search of temporary work this summer.

Lubbockites Enjoy Juneteenth Celebration

It appeared at first that the Juneteenth Celebration would get rained on -- but despite the persistent dark clouds overhead the rain never came, as East Lubbock residents gathered at Mae Simmons Park to celebrate. The festivities began at 10 a. m. Saturday with a parade down Broadway with Grand Marshal Eric G. Laneville leading the way. Once the parade arrived at Mae Simmons Park Mayor Bill McAlister told the crowd that it (June 19th) was a great day of celebration. The mayor also presented Laneville with a citation making him an honorary citizen of Lubbock. The featured speaker of the day was longtime city worker and resident George Woods. Woods told the crowd that the 19th of June should be the most celebrated days in the state of Texas. "This is to be a happy day at a joyous day, because it is the day when grandpa and grandpa were freed from slavery." Woods stated that he

believes that black Americans have made more progress in the last 100 years than any other race. "For a longtime, I could not sing 'My Country 'Tis of Thee, Sweet Land of Liberty,' because I would be lying. But young blacks today have plenty of opportunity if they prepare themselves. Wood admonished young blacks to attend to get ready to meet opportunities that life holds by getting an education." "Just because the complexion of your skin is dark and the texture of your hair is kinky, doesn't mean you can't learn the same thing as other people." At the conclusion of his speech, the crowd hands and sang "We Shall Overcome." Festivities continue throughout the day with music rendered by "The 15th Street Players" and "Reflections." The celebration ended Sunday afternoon with gospel music and a sermon delivered by the Rev. Larry L. Polk, Sr. of Mount Gilead Baptist Church. Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

This is the fourth in a series of five information articles about Social Security.

In the previous article in this series, we described three of the changes in the Social Security program made in 1981 to help ensure its financial soundness. This describes other changes.

Benefits for Parents of Entitled Children

Under prior law, benefits were payable to a mother or father caring for any child receiving Social Security benefits. (A child under 18 is entitled to benefits as the dependent of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker.) Under the new law, the parent's payments will stop when the child reaches age 16 unless the child is disabled. Benefits to the child will continue until he or she reaches age 18.

The new law was effective September, 1981, for people who first became entitled to mother's or father's benefits after August, 1981. Parents who were getting benefits in August, 1981, or earlier, because they were caring for a child under 18 will continue to get benefits until the child reaches 18 or through August, 1983, whichever comes first. **Benefits Start With First Full Month of Eligibility**

The new law allows payment of Social Security retirement benefits to a worker and his or her spouse only for months in which all conditions of eligibility are met for the entire month. Generally this means that benefits for a person who applies at age 62 will first be paid for the month after the person reaches age 62.

Under the old law, a benefit could be paid for the month a person reached 62, even if he or she reached 62 near the end of the month. This provision does not affect survivor benefits. The new law is effective for workers and spouses who reach age 62 after August, 1981. **Changes in Medicare Reimbursement**

Several changes were made in the Medicare program in 1981. Generally coverage was expanded but cost-sharing by Medicare beneficiaries was increased.

The expansions of coverage include the following: the limitation on the number of home health visits that Medicare can cover was removed; reimbursement of changes associated with outpatient surgery was expanded; the annual limit on coverage of the outpatient physical therapy services provided by an independently practicing physical therapist was raised from \$100 to \$500; Medicare can now cover the services of a dentist for providing the same care which would be covered if provided by a

physician; the cost of a hospital stay resulting from a severe dental procedure can be covered even if the procedure itself is not covered; pneumococcal vaccine shots are now covered; the treatment of warts on the feet, including plantar warts is now covered.

Three major cost-sharing revisions were made in 1981. For the first 60 days in each benefit period, Medicare hospital insurance formerly paid for all covered services except the first \$204. This is called the hospital insurance deductible and is intended to represent the average cost of one day of inpatient hospital care. The deductible was raised to \$260 on January 1, 1982.

Also, the annual medical insurance (Part B) deductible amount has been raised from \$60 to \$75. This means that after the first \$75 is approved charges for doctor bills or other covered expenses in 1982.

This means that after the first \$75 is approved charges for doctor bills or other covered expenses in 1982. Medicare will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for the remainder of the year. A third change is that the medical insurance "carryover rule" has been eliminated. Under the old rule, any covered medical expenses in the last three months of a year that could be counted toward the deductible for the following year.

'Resurrection City' In D.C.

Washington - The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) announced plans to set up a new "Resurrection City" here to dramatize its campaign of a strong Voting Rights Bill, more jobs for Blacks and world peace.

The Rev. Joseph E. Lowery, president of SCLC, told a news conference that the "Pilgrimage" from Atlanta will camp Lafayette Park, across from the White House, starting June 23rd.

At the press conference to give support were Congressman Walter Fauntroy, chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus and SCLC and Dr. Charles Cobb, director of the United Church of Christ's Commission on Racial Justice.

The group is concerned about plans of Senators Jesse Helms and John East, North Carolina Republicans, to try to weaken a bill to extend an enforcement provision of the 1965 Voting Rights Act, which is expected to reach the Senate floor shortly.

"Secondly," Lowery said, "on the issue of jobs, we urge the President to take immediate steps to provide at least one million jobs now for youth as they come out of school onto streets with little hope of gainful employment for the summer."

"Blacks," he said, face "hopelessness, helplessness and growing desperation" in today's economic conditions.

"We think the nation must address this with urgency lest that desperation address the nation with social chaos," Lowery concluded.

Business Hints

BLACK BUSINESSES USED FOR SCAPEGOAT

Mid the fallacy, misconceptions, and indoctrinations that Black businessowners have a business problem, economic and political viewpoints and the many aids to teach the Black businessowner business, many people would be shocked to know that Blacks have become a scapegoat or coverup for what is in actuality existing a universal business problem due to lack of understanding of the proprietor business structure by society.

Thorough research and investigation into the ever present business problems of incompetence, lack of business knowledge, and insufficient operating capital revealed several facts of truth which explains why not only Blacks, but whites too, are finding it difficult to own and operate a competitive business and make a profit.

Fact 1. It is impossible for anyone to teach, instruct, or train another in a subject matter that one himself is not knowledgeable and understand.

Fact 2. In the quest to keep abreast of growing businesses or the giant corporations, changing technology, and legal laws a business monster known as "small business" emerged some years ago.

The "small business" structure that appears to create the existing business problems which have baffled many over the years, I discovered, was in essence the proprietor, partnership, and corporation structures all wrapped in one. Technically and legally there are only three recognized business structures: proprietor, partnership, and corporation.

Fact 3. The proprietor business

structure have a basic language, basic laws with accompanying advantages and disadvantages that governs it, basic customs and basic habits which is and gives every business structure the basic sound business foundation or what is known as management techniques.

Fact 4. Concentration in the

corporation business structure and the inability to recognize true proprietor/partnership business offers little, if any, construction academic instructions and informative research material available to aid existing or potential (including students) businessowners in their endeavor and make known the functions, roles, duties, and responsibilities of a businessowner to a business as a whole.

Fact 5. The lack of constructive instructions and informative research material on the proprietor

also leaves unknown the unpublished functions, roles, duties and

responsibilities of professional advisors (accountants, lawyer and

consultants) which every businessowner should be well aware of and the important role they play in a business.

Fact 6. In the 60's the "small business" authorities presented the business world with triplets. The word "minority" which includes Blacks, women (white and Black), Hispanics and other nationalities that I destroyed immediately since true business in green, checks that don't bounce, or sign on the dotted line. However, the Minority Development Agency and the Minority Contractors Agreement, w Minority Contractors Agreement, which are both useful tools when used properly, I have come to regard as a detrimental oppressive weapon in their present endeavor because they do not address true business aspects and needs in aiding the limited businessowners whom they do assist.

It is no secret that a business, embolded with constraints and restrictions, belong to its owner who must perform or have someone else perform definite functions, roles, duties and take responsibility for the business. However, if one does not know what his functions, roles, duties and responsibilities are he cannot perform them. Likewise, if one does not know the functions, roles duties and responsibilities of professional advisors he cannot use them constructively.

In reality, business is a game with opponents, accomplishments, set rules and a definite strategy that is applicable to every businessowner. The secret is to learn the game whether through trial and error, academic or informative research material.

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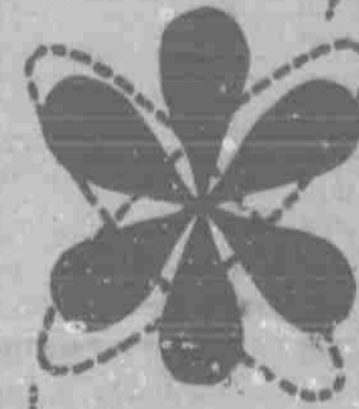

\$300,000 To Black Colleges From Teele

Washington - Arthur Teele, Administrator of Urban Mass Transportation (UMTA), announced the award of ten grants for almost \$800,000 to historically Black institutions for research projects.

"In this year's UMTA research program there is an 80 percent increase in the number of minority universities participating over the previous year," said Teele. "This also represents a 200 percent increase in the number of participants and a 250 percent increase in the dollars going to minority universities since 1980."

The UMTA university research and training program encourages and supports university research, education and training which will address and be responsive to local, state and federal urban transportation concerns, and advance the understanding and resolution of critical transportation problems facing the nation.

The ten minority schools receiving grants are: Texas Southern University, H. Southern University, Houston; Howard University, Washington, D. C.; Edward Waters College, Jacksonville, Fla.; University of Puerto Rico, Mayaguez; Alabama State University, Montgomery; Morgan State University, Baltimore; University of District of Columbia, Washington, D. C.; North Carolina A & T State University, Greenville and Atlanta University, GA.
