### Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You .





This is the fourth in a series of five information articles about Social Security.

In the previous article in this series, we described three of the changes in the Social Security program made in 1381 to help ensure its financial soundness. This describes other changes.

Benefits for Parente of Entitled Children

Under prior law, benefits were payable to a mother or father caring for any child receiving Social Security benefits. (A child under 18 is entitled to benefits as the dependent of a retired, disabled, or deceased worker.) Under the new law, the parent's payments will stop when the child reaches age 16 unless the child is disabled. Benefits to the child will continue until he or she reaches age 18.

The new law was effective September, 1981, for people who first became entitled to mother's or father's benefits after August, 1981. Parents who were getting benefits in August, 1981, or earlier, because they were caring for a child under 18 will continue to get benefits until the child reaches 18 or through August, 1983, whichever comes first. Benefits Start With First Full Month or Eligibility

The new law allows payment of Social Security retirement benefits to a worker and his or her spouse only for months in which all conditions of eligibility are met for the entire month. Generally this means that benefits for a person who applies at age 62 will first be paid for the month after the person reaches age 62.

Under the old lav., a benefit could be paid for the month a person reached 62, ever if he or she reached 62 near the end of the month. This provision does not affect survivor benefits. The new law is effective for workers and spouses who reach age 82 after August, 1981. Changes in Medicare Reimbursement

Several changes were made in the Medicare program in 1981. Generally coverage was expande but cost-sharing by Medicare beneficiaries was increased.

The expansions of coverage include the following: the limitation on the number of home health visits that Medicare can cover was removed; reimburse.nent of changes associated with outpetient surgery was expanded; the annual limit on coverage of the outpatient physical therapy services provided by an independently practicing physical therapist was raised from \$100 to \$500; Medicare can now cover the services of a dentist for providing the same care which would be covered if provided by a

physician; the cost of a hospital stay resulting from a severe dental procedure can be covered even if the procedure itself is not covered: pneumococcal vaccine shots are now covered; the treatment of warts on the feet, including

plentor warts is now covered. Three major cost-sharing revisions were made in 1981. For the first 60 days in each benefit period, Medicare hospital insurance formerly peld for all covered services except the first \$204. This is called the hospital insurance deductible and is intended to represent the average cost of one day of inpatient hospital care. The deductible

was raised to \$260 on January 1, 1982. Also, the annual medical insurance (Part B) deductible amount has been raised from \$60 to \$75. This means that after the first \$75 is approved charges for doctor bills or other covered

expenses in 1982.

This means that after the first \$75 is approved charges for doctor bills or other covered expanses in 1982, Medicare will pay 80 percent of the approved charges for the remainder of the year. A third change is that the medical insurance 'carryover rule" has been eliminated. Under the old rule, any covered medical expenses in the last three months of a year that could be counted loward the deductible for the following year.

'Resurrection City' In D.C.

Washington - The Southern Christian Leadership Conference (SCLC) announced plans to set up a new "Hesurrection City" here to dramatize lis causes of a strong. Voting Rights Bill more jobs for Blacks

and world peace. The Rev. Joseph E. Lowery, president of SCLO, told a news conference that the "Pilgrimage" from Ala'sama will camp aFayette Park, across from the White House, starting Juen 23rd.

At the press conference to give support were Congressman Walter Fauntroy. chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus and SCLC and Dr. Charles Cobb. director of the United Church of Christ's Commission on Racial Justice.

The group is concerned about plans of Senators Jesse Helms and John East, North Carolina Republicans, to try to weaken a bill to extand an enforcement provision of the 1965 Voting Rights Act, which is expected to reach the Sanate floor shortly.

"Secondly," Lowery said, "on the issue of jobs, we urge the President to take immediate steps to provide at least one million jobs now for youth as they come out of school onto streets with little hope of gainful employment

for the summer." "Blacks," he said, face "hopelessness, helplessness and growing desperation" in today's economic conditions.

"We think the nation must address this with urgency lest address the nation with social chaos," Lowery concluded.





### BLACK BUSINESSES USED FOR SCAPEGOAT

Mid the fallacy, misconceptions, and Indoctrinations that Black businessowners have a business problem, economic and political viewpoints and the many aids to teach the Black businessowner business, many people would be shocked to know that Blacks have become a scapegoat or coverup for what is in actuality existing a universal business problem due to lack of understanding the proprietor business structure by society.

Thorough research and investigation into the ever present business problems of incompetence, lack of business knowledge, and insufficient operating capital revealed several facts of truth which explains why not only Blacks, but whites too, are finding it difficult to own and operate a competitive business and make a profit.

Fact 1. It is impossible for anyone to teach, instruct, or train another in a subject matter that one himself not knowledgeable and understand

Fact 2. In the quest to keep abreast of growning businesses or the giant corporations, changing technology, and legal laws a business monster known as "small business" emerged some years ago.

The "small business" structure that appears to create the existing business problems which have baffled many over the years, I discovered, was in essence the proprietor, partnership, and corporation structures all wrapped in one. Technically and legally there are only three recognized business structures: proprietor, partnership, and corporation.

Fact 3. The proprietor business

structure have a basic language, basic laws with accompanying advantages and disadvantages that governs it, basic customs and basic habits which is and gives every business structure the basic sound Business foundation or what is known as management techniques. Fact 4. Concentration in the

corporation business structure and the inability io recognize true proprietor/partnership business offers little, if any, construction academie instructions and informative research material available to aid existing or potential (including students) businessowners in their endeavor and make known the functions, roles, duties and responsibilities of a businesscwnwer to a business as a

Fact 5. The lack of constructive instructions and informative research material on the proprietor

also leaves unknown the unpublized functions, roles, duties and

advisors (accountants, lawyer and 584 M. O., Manchester, CT 0604u. Distributorship

consultants) which every businessowner should be well aware of and the important role thay play in a business.

Fact 6 In the 60's the 'small business" authorities presented the business world with triplets. The word 'minority' which includes Blacks, women (white and Black), Hispanics and other nationalities that I destroyed immediately since true business in green, checks that don't bounce, or sign on the doited line. However, the Minority Development Agency and the Minority Contractors Agreement, w Minority Contractors Agreement, which are both useful tools when used properly, I have come to regard as a detrimental oppressive weapon in their present endeavor because they do not address true business aspects and needs in aiding the limited businessowners whom they do assist.

It is no secret that a business, emboided with constraints and restrictions, belong to its owner who must perform or have someone else perform definite functions, roles, duties and take responsibility for the business. However, if one does not know what his functions, roles, duties and responsibilities are he cannot perform them. Likewise, if one does not know the functions, roles duties and responsibilities of professional advisors he cannot use them constructively.

In reality, business is a game with opponents, accomplishers, set rules and a definite strategy that is applicable to every businessowner. The secret is to learn the game whether through trial and error, academic or informative research material.



Black Colleges: Some of the nation's approximately 100 institutions may face a bleak future if cuts to federal students aid proposed in President Peagan's 1983 budget are passed. Our bellringer sources report that at least 20 predominantly black colleges in the nation could be forced to close in the 1983-84 school year. There are six church related schools in Texas and most of them are supported in part by the United Negro College Fund and officials believe they will be able to weather the storm.

Terry Smith, financial aid director at Huston-Tillotson College in Austin said recently: "This institution had a history of 60 to 70 years without federal funding. I do not think we are ready to bow out of education."

Reductions began this year in Poll grants, Supplementary Educational Opportunity Grants, the College Work Study Program and the National Direct Students Loan Program. Further cuts are proposed for next year. Under the proposed 1983 budget. Supplementary Educational Opportunity Grants and National Direct Student loans would be aliminated.

"I do not see that our church, which founded and fostered Jarvis would let us flounder," said C. A. Berry, president of Jarvis Christian College, an affiliate of the Disciples of Christ. Berry said a \$1.5 million building financed by the church is nearing completion and 'they wouldn't build a building if they thought we were going to close' Texas College in Tyler began cutting back two years ago to keep the college out of the red. The college is pinning its hopes on national lobbying efrorts to minimize the cuts and increasing grants from private organizations and alumni, president Jimmy Ed Clark said. About 65 percent of Texas College's 600 students are receiving some financial assistance and the average income of the students' families is \$7,000 he said.

Huston-Tillotson could lose \$250,000 in aid if present proposals go through Wiley College in Marshall, according to president Robert E. Maves, Jr. estimated that the college could lose \$632,000 if Congress approves the proposed budget. Wiley is supported in part by the United Methodist Church. Paul Quinn College's president, L. N. McCloney said: "Of course the proposed cuts would be harmful. Any cuts would hurt." He added that he did not want to discuss spacific problems the cuts would cause the Waco institution because he would be afraid students

would warry needlessly.

Bishop College in Dallas has not begun to pay \$1.4 million awed to the Department of Education and some \$400,000 to other creditors, it is reported. Bishop also owes \$10.38 million on buildings in loans and bonds. Comer Cotrell, president of Proline Corp. and a Bishop trustee, is involved in fund-raising plans for the school and Baptist trustee, is involved in fund-raising plans for the school and Baptist churches over Texas and the nation are staging fund raising activities to bring Bishop College out of the red. The payroll is being met each month and the college is collecting almost 90 percent of the fees owed by students compared to 60 percent in 1979.



#### President's Dilemma **Nuclear Weapons and Waste**

There are actually people who work and play aroung nuclear facilities everyday without turning evergreen. Even I am not green and glowing after touring the three U.S. Department of Energy nuclear storage facilities. The hapless desert set Hartford Reservation in Washington state where expended nuclear weapons waste wallows beneath the surface is a safe distance from civilization. God's country! Idaho Falls, Idaho is an idealistic spot overlooked by snow covered mountains making man dream a total life not its entire destruction. Dealers in Las Vegas, nevertheless, cringe when an underground nucleare test bomb is set off some 65 miles away at the U. S. Nevada Nuclear Test Site. See "Chucky run" when informed of the pending explosion planned for the next day. Detonations of nuclear weapons is wise only under individual and environmental safe conditions and even that may be questionable in this country.

Nuclear weapons testing is the terminal reason for regularly pushing the radio-active button. BEFORE discussing commercial use of nucelar energy, everyone should be aware of the role the Reagan administration considers for nuclear weapons for this country. Onward. July 17, 1981. the U.S. Senate passed a resolution 88-0 calling on President Reagan to make nuclear proliferation a topic at the then up-coming economic summit in Ottawa. Other men might have heeded the hint of the Senate to at least hear the concerns of other countries to cut down on the spread of nuclear weaponry around the world. But not this nuclear mandated administration.

By law, the U.S. does not supply nuclear equipment and fuel directly to countries that refuse to go along with international safeguards; however, under Reagan's rule the U.S. has taken the position that the U.S. should be a reliable supplier to countries it deems not to present a proliferation problem. As one might suspect some of these "O. K." countries do supply nuclear material to "problem" countries, as the U. S. stands idely by. Idealy, the U.S. with its vast expertise on the effects of an exploded atomic bomb would want to nall nuclear proliferation not help its expansion. Everyone who works at a Nuclear handling Department of Energy (DOE) facility has found a way to cope with any real or preceded fear of nuclear contamination. Considering the calmness which workers continue to exhibit at work at nuclear waste facilities it might be difficult to find fault with the President's position. #### "Ku Klux Klan Loses"

Dear Mr. Patterson:

I am pleased to inform you, in case you have not learned already, that on June 3, 1982 U.S. District Judge Gabrielle McDonald in Houston issued a memorandum opinion in favor of the plaintiffs in the case Vietnamese Fisherman's Association et al. v. the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan.

In her order, Judge McDonald stated the court's intention to permanently enjoin Louis Beam and the Knights of the Ku Klux Klan from maintaining or associating as a military organization; from engaging in any military or paramilitary training; from parading with firearms in public on either land or water, and from engaging in other activities calculated to violate the civil rights of the plaintiff class.

I am extremely pleased and gratified by the court's decision to prohibit activities by an organization such as the Ku Klux Klan, which has its foundation in hatred and prejudice and encourages divisiveness in people instead of

their common goals.

As I promised to do when I intervened in this suit, I have successfully joined with the plaintiffs to prevent illegal activities which would violate the individual rights and threaten the safety of our law-abiding citizens. Violence and intimidation must not be permitted to exist in violation of state law, which in this case was designed to prohibit terrorism and vigilante activities in Texas. This issue reaches directly to the heart of what this country is all about and to the foundation of the State of Texas.

I know you also will be happy to hear that the court has sustained our position in this case.

### You are what you spend

If a family spends half of its modest income on liquor, you can bet that at least one of its .nembers is attracted to alco-

But if that family spends less than 1 percent of its hour-hold budget on spirits, it probably only wants to have a bot-tle handy when Uncle Joe, the lush drops by. Either way, the family's attitudes toward what's neces-

sary and what isn't can be determined by watching its pocketbook. Where the money goes gives the observer a sense of where the family's priorities lie.

It's the same way with governments. They show what they think is important by spending more money on libraries than on highways, for example, or more on desks for bureaucrats than on welfare for the poor

So, when Ronald Reagan proposes spending 0.07 ercent of the 1983 federal budget for civil-rights enforcement, it's clear that he has other priorities. The civil-rights enforcement share of the federal budget

is very small and decilining steadily," says the chairman of the Civil Rights Commission He is Clarence M. Pendleton, a Reagan appointee whose nomination to head the civil-rights watchdog agency stirred

a storm of protest.

But Pendleton may have prompted some protests from his patron in the White House when he used his first public appearance as commission chairman to warn that less money for civil-rights enforcement means — obviously — a reduced federal presence in insuring equal opportunity.

Pendleton assured his audience that he personally did not believe that the cuts in the civil-rights budget demonstrated diminished commitment to civil rights by the Reagan adminitration. He ais: said that the civil-rights budget would be 25 per-cent smaller in 1983 than it had been in 1980.

That "perception" seems like reality from here.

Who is the NAACP?

To most, it is the venerable National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, the civil-rights organizaiches and nundreds of thousands of members throughout the country.

To others, it is the NAACP Legal Defense and Education Fund, a legal agency responsible for many precedent-setting court victories in the civil-rights field.

But to too many people, it is both.
That's why the MAACP's lawsuit against the Lagal
Defease Fund over use of the NAACP initials is necessary, if regrettable.

While many contributors are sophisticated enough to recognize the difference between the two groups, many others aren't. Some contributors give money to one in the belief that they are beloing the other.
Furthermore, the NAACP and the Legal Defense Fund

don't always agree on what action is best for America's blacks. Many Americans can't tell which group is responsible for which civil-rights activity.

Each organization realizes the unique nature of the other, but the public doesn't. And each regrets that a lawsuit was

"We should be out there fighting white folks," said Legal Defense Fund Director Jack Greenberg, who is white. "We have asked Legal Defense Fund to rejoin us," said NAACP Executive Director Benjamin Hooks. The Legal D. fense Fund was created by the NAACP in 1939 and became a separate entity in 1957.

No one wins when friends have a falling out, but the Legal Defense Fund is not the NAACP and ought to stop saying

#### The Black Divorce Rate

The divorce rate for Blacks, which is twice the rate of whites, represents a tragic, shattering reality that threatens to prevent us from forging stable neighborhoods and communities. According to the Census Bureau, in 1970 83 Black men and women were divorced for every 1,000 who were married. The breakdown for Black men showed 62 divorces for every 1,000 males. For Black women, the divorce rate came to 104 divorces for every 1,000 females.

This distrubing count was much higher than the rate for whites in 1970. There were only 44 wh the rate for whites in 1970. There were only 44 white men and women who were divorced for every 1,000 who were still married. The rate of divorce for white men came to 32 men for every 1,000 males, while for white women the divorce rate meaured 56 for every 1,000 females.

By 1980 the figures and the ratios were just as nogative. Some 203 Black men and women wer divorced for every 1,000 Blacks. For Black men there were 151 divorces for every 1,000 men; and for Black women there were 257 divorcees for every 1,000 warren.

By comparison. In 1980, there were 92 divorced white men and womer, for every 1,000 persons: For white men the reto was 74 divorcees for every 1,000 meg; and for white women there were 110 divorces for every 1,000 wamer. So must for statistics.

C.; Edward Waters College, Jacksonville, Fla.; University of Puerto Rico, Mayaguez; Alabama State University, Montgomery; Morgan State University. Daltimore; University of District of Columbia. Washington, D. C.; North Carolina A & T State University. Greenville and Atlanta University, GA.
