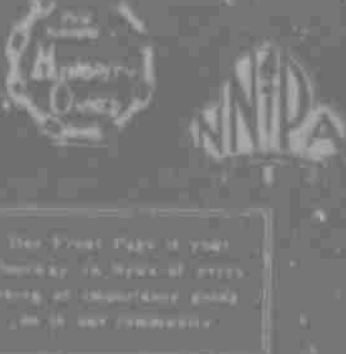

## Minister Speaks About Church

### "Black Church Lacks Programs"

When he first came to Lubbock more than five years ago, he was a student at Texas Tech University, majoring in Architecture. But a lot can happen in five years.

"The Lord had been dealing with me and calling me unto the ministry for a long time. Once I had my feel of running from him I found joy and security in serving the Lord." These are the words of Rev. Joseph Williams, Jr.

Although he plans to return to school this fall, his primary concern at present is helping in the black community.

"I have been hearing a lot of talk from our pastors saying they are opposed to black children being bussed to white churches. I do not oppose the ministry of white churches. I do not think we should be concerned as long as they are educating our children in the ministry. Our concern should be the lack of programs in our churches. The programs are as old as the black church. They are outdated and no longer fit the times. Until we formulate new programs that meet the needs of young people, we will continue to see an exodus of not only young people from the church, but adults as well."

Rev. Williams stated that one of the problems facing East Lubbock is a lack of trained leadership and the fact that too many ministers are trying to capture leadership.

"For a minister to pursue a leadership role in the community contradicts the teaching of the Bible. Jesus said let him that be greatest among you be servant of all. Until a minister becomes a servant he cannot be a leader."

As far as his goals for the future, Williams says he would like to become more involved in community affairs and maybe even politics.

"I would like to push for programs that would help poor people. I would also like to be involved in the redevelopment of East Lubbock. I don't feel that any minister should limit themselves to just their congregation, but should get involved in the community. Because unless you get involved in the community there is no church community."

# Tech Not In Compliance

Texas Tech University is not in compliance with federal guidelines in several areas with regard to the schools affirmative action program according to a Department of Labor investigator.

Dennis Good, acting field supervisor for the Office of Federal Contract Compliance Programs in Albuquerque, completed his year long investigation last week into alleged

discrimination in Tech's hiring practices, salaries and promotions.

Good listed the following items—as being in need of attention at the University:

- Some department heads are not pursuing affirmative action goals strongly enough;
- One supervisor, at the University, was found to be unfamiliar with affirmative action;
- Some department heads are not fully following affirmative action goals in their hiring practices;
- Some supervisors may have been heard to make racial slurs; and
- Merit pay increases have not been applied consistently across the campus.

Good also found that the University in general has not been vigorously recruiting women or minority employees.

Good will submit his report to the OFCCP Regional Office in Dallas this week. That office will send a letter outlining the OFCCP's conclusions and will await the school's response.

Good told the Lubbock Digest that because his office had to become involved in the discrimination suit, it has cast a bad light on the University.

"We always recommend that complaints be solved internally. If it can't be solved internally, obviously something is wrong. Somewhere, someone is not communicating."

## Perez Challenges Biggs' Seat

A 48 year-old Lubbock man, Mario Perez, announced last week in a news conference at Jose's Restaurant that he will seek the position of County Commissioner, Place 2, which is held by Coy Biggs of Slaton.

"I want to represent all the citizens of the community," said Perez.

A longtime resident of Lubbock and owner of Superior Color, he was named as the 1982 "Businessman of the Year" by COMA. He has served as president of the Texas Association of Mexican American Chambers of Commerce. He is currently a member of the National Consumer Panel of the Better Business Bureau, secretary-treasurer of the Housing Finance Corporation, and a board member of the United Way.

Joined by his family at the news conference, he said he will work hard to make Lubbock a better place to live for everyone.

His memberships include the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce, Better Business Bureau and the Lubbock Lions Club. In the past, Perez has served on the Parks and Recreation Board

for the City of Lubbock, St. Elizabeth's Parish Council, the Dixie Little League Board, and was the first president of Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic Church parish. In 1960 and 1961, Perez received an "Addy" award from the American Advertising Federation of Lubbock. He is a selector and administrator of communion at Our Lady of Guadalupe, where he is an instructor in the CCD program.

"I want to be a commissioner for all the people. In the past, some commissioners have chosen to represent one city or area or one special interest group instead of the people in general. I will serve the citizens of Lubbock, Slaton and the rural areas of Precinct 2 fairly and equally," concluded Perez.

## Sedeno Will Enter Politics

Lorenzo M. Sedeno, 51 year old former administrative aide to Congressman Kent Hance, announced last Friday he is vying for the position of Justice of the Peace, Precinct Six.

Sedeno, who for the past three years has been an aide in Hance's Lubbock office, is seeking the position being vacated by Wayne LeCroy, who is now a candidate for District Clerk.

For 14 years, Sedeno was a self-employed life underwriter in Lubbock and resigned his position with Congressman Hance last week to seek the Justice of the Peace position. He has been a member of the Los Amigos Toastmaster's International, the Human Relations Commission, the Community Service Commission, the Legal Aid Society, Bilingual and Bicultural Committee on Mass Communications.

Sedeno has been president of St. Patrick Catholic Church Parish Council, the

Pastoral Council (Diocese of Amarillo) and president of Bozeman Elementary School P. T. A., Alderson Junior High School P. T. A., Guadalupe Neighborhood Center, Fiestas Patrias. Sedeno was vice president of the Community Action Agency, Project Upward Bound and the Diocese of Amarillo.

He holds three outstanding company awards in the life insurance industry: a lifetime membership in the President's Club, the Bronze Plaque and the Gold Plaque.

Sedeno and his wife, Lydia, reside at 408 Vanda Avenue. Their five children are married.

## Dr. Graves Honored

Black Awareness Month celebrating Black cultural activities will be held during the month of February on the Texas Tech University campus.

Dr. Lucille S. Graves, the first Black student to attend Texas Tech, was keynote speaker Monday evening, February 1st, in opening ceremonies at the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church.

Dr. Graves told the group present how important it is to have unity if "we are going to get ahead."

"They made it hard for me to become a student to me to become the first Black student at Texas Tech University, but I didn't give up. You can't give up, young people, you must hang in there," she said.

The owner of the only Black owned, private school in West Texas, Mary & Mac Private School, 902 East 28th Street, since 1955, went on to say: "We've got to quite holding each other back, and start helping

each other."

The theme for the 12th "Black Awareness Month" is "Texas Tech, The First Black Student - 20 Years Later, Where Do We Stand?"

Other activities during the month will include a courtyard concert "History Through Black Music," featuring local bands and choirs, February 20th, in the UC Courtyard. A Black Awareness dance is scheduled for Friday, February 5th, at the Lakeside Club.

The annual "Miss Black Texas Tech" pageant and ball will conclude the month long celebration.

## Court Gets Civil Suit

A Lubbock federal court will consider a racial discrimination suit this week in which several Petersburg residents claim they are barred from using a Petersburg swimming pool.

The suit, filed in December 1980, claims that blacks and Mexican-Americans have

been excluded from swimming pool usage by discriminatory membership requirements.

According to the suit, the swimming pool is operated by a private association and that no black or Mexican-American has ever been a member of the private association.

The plaintiffs are asking that the pool operators refrain from discriminatory practices and open the pool to member of all races.

**HOBBS, NEW MEXICO** -- At the close of regular registration recently, College of the Southwest had enrolled 204 students for spring-semester classes. The college is independently supported and is fully accredited, it was reported. The Hobbs Junior College, a state supported institution here reported a record enrollment of more than 1200.

**DALLAS** -- Enrollment at Bishop College was 1150, a more than 20% increase over the previous year. The Black Baptist supported college announced that Dr. Harry S. Wright, has relinquished the presidency of the 100 year old college in order to accept the pastorate of the 4,500 member Cornerstone Baptist Church of Brooklyn, New York.

**SANTA FE** -- Lawrence Ingram said recently New Mexico is in little danger of losing federal funds because of a high error rate in its food operations. As long as the state comes up with a corrective action plan by April 1, we save Ingram said. He is secretary of the state's Human Services.

**WASHINGTON, D. C.** -- The federal budget cutback is causing states to close job placement centers and trim employment office payrolls at the same time that unemployment is rising, according to reports.

**JULIAN BOND**, who does a regular column: "Viewpoint" for the Hobbs Daily News Sun said recently -- Ronald Reagan is playing it off by hurting the poorest by claiming that they will be helped the soonest by his economic program even "as they are harmed the most."

**LADONNA HARRIS**, an active Comanche Indian from County Coiton, Oklahoma is getting a divorce from her husband of 33 years: Fred Harris, an Indian who ran for president in '72. He is teaching at the University of New Mexico. Harris was elected U. S. Senator from Oklahoma in 1964. We knew both of them personally. "I shall miss him" states LaDonna. They were a great team. She will go to D. C. to continue to lobby for Indian rights. More later.

**ST. LOUIS, MO.** -- Members of the tiny Coleman Temple Christian Episcopal Church (C. M. E.) recently accused their pastor of taking \$31,960 from the church building fund and buying a Mercedes-Benz. The pastor, Lynman A. Stamps, resigned in 1976 as warden of the city workhouse after a shortage was found in the commissary funds. Stamps, who has been pastor of the mission church since 1974, paid the city five thousand dollars, and no further action was taken on the workhouse funds.

**CLOVIS, N. M.** -- Voters here recently rejected a proposal that would have allowed issuance of beer and wine licenses for restaurants under provisions of New Mexico's 1981 Liquor Control Act. Nonetheless, Roswell voters approved a similar referendum allowing the licenses to be issued to restaurants in Roswell. As we go to press, Carlsbad faces a similar election.

**NEW YORK** -- The regular stamp in the Great Americans Series honoring Nobel Prize winner, Dr. Ralph J. Bunche, was issued January 6, 1982, in New York City. Buy Bunche Stamps today.

**HOBBS, N. M.** -- A 3 million dollar ultra-high frequency television channel is planned here by a group who have formed Family Television Lts. The company has applied to the Federal Communications Commission for license. The station's proposed area of coverage includes: Hobbs, Lovington, Eunice, Jal, Denver City, Seminole, Seagraves and other cities or towns within a 35 mile radius of Hobbs.

# Water Problems Still Exist

Residents of Yellowhouse Canyon are still having problems with their water supply. Last week, the Yellowhouse Canyon Community Association (YCCA) asked the Lubbock City Council to set aside almost \$97,000 in Community Development fund to extend

water services to the Canyon.

The council voted to accept the report submitted by the YCCA attorney, asking the city staff to study it and make presentation at a subsequent meeting.

Last month, the State of Texas filed suit

against the owner of the water system, Travis Martin, alleging that his system did not comply with health and sanitation status. The suit listed 12 alleged violations of the Texas Sanitation and Health Protection Act.

Ned Brooks of the State Health Department

told the Lubbock Digest that Martin has met most of the requirements aimed at improving the water system, however, some work still needs to be done.

He has hooked in the chlorinator and he has removed the fire hose that was pumping

water directly from the tank. But the tank is leaking badly and he still hasn't fixed all the leaks in the line," Brooks said.

Brooks advised that the current situation at Yellowhouse Canyon has been reported to the attorney general's office.

## February A Review of the Neglected!

During the month of February, this space will give some information of the life and works and accomplishments of Carter Goodwin Woodson. Woodson organized the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History in Chicago in 1915. The Journal of Negro History, the Negro History Bulletin.

Dr. Woodson organized the observance of National Negro History Week and was later extended to its present state -- the month of February. This series will cover a four week period.

### — The First in A Series —

Carter Goodwin Woodson (1875 - 1950), founder of the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History, was born in New Canton, Virginia, and was educated at Berea College in Kentucky, and at the University of Chicago, where he earned his B. A. degree in 1907, and his M. A. degree in 1908. He earned his Ph.D. degree at Harvard University in 1912. Later he studied at the Sorbonne in Paris.

Struggs Junior High School a few years ago; the Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta's Mr. Esquire seminar, held at LOIC; and a career day activity at Parkway Elementary, directed by Ms. Joan Crawford; as well as the one conducted by Ms. Margaret Randle at Wheatley Elementary School.

Those mentioned above are the only ones who have shown any kind of interest in seeing that young black boys and girls know something about this business. We would have thought there would have been more concern for such an effort. Who knows, maybe one of them young black boys or girls, could be the editor of the newspaper one day. That is, if they are aware of such opportunities.

The person who has worked the closest and hardest with this publication to help young elementary school students - who are interested in journalism - has been Lee McCloud who teaches at Bozeman Elementary School. The students, under his supervision, publish their own newspaper -- *The Paper Pirate*. These youngsters are tri-ethnic with a high interest in the field of publication writing, advertising, photography and composition.

The most recent oversight was the Student Organization for Black Unity (SOBU) at Texas Tech University in their career activities was that the Lubbock Digest was overlooked for participation. One thing which is hard to figure out is they never overlook us for FREE ink and space, but for exposure to young people looking for a way out.

#### Do lawmakers need tutoring?

How would you feel if you learned that the White House had hired Gerald Ford to teach Ronald Reagan how to be president?

If you voted for Reagan, you might feel a little cheated to discover that the man you had chosen to run the country had to be told what to do by one of his predecessors.

And if you didn't, you might be dismayed to find out that you had been right in suspecting that Reagan could not do the job -- and that the taxpayers' money was being used to hire experts to tell the president where to find the Oval Office.

As far as we know, Gerald Ford hasn't joined the White House staff, although he may offer occasional free advice.

But Green members of Congress have hired a former colleague to teach them how to do the job to which the voters back home elected them -- that is, to introduce and pass legislation in the House of Representatives.

The three are Jim Jeffries of Kansas, Larry McDonald of Georgia, and John Ashbrook of Ohio.

These lawmakers are ideological triplets even though Jeffries and Ashbrook are Republicans while McDonald got elected as a Democrat. All have perfect records from the American Conservative Union, which rates members of Congress according to their votes on issues of interest to conservatives.

All three hired former Rep. Robert Bauman to teach them how to make laws -- something the voters of their districts probably thought they already knew how to do. After all, Ashbrook has spent more than two decades on Capitol Hill; McDonald was first elected to Congress in 1974, while Jeffries was first elected in 1978.

Jeffries hired Bauman as "a consultant on parliamentary

#### Guns Not Better Than Butter Reagunomix Marks Down

Just to keep the record straight first thing this economic and financial writer witnessed this year was a two-handed economist. Unfortunately this is the only type known to mankind. Make that one slight of hand has been the star of the economic jet set. Dr. Walter E. Hoadly, Senior Research Fellow at Hoover Institute, a die hard conservative think tank, has been considered the "dean" of the country's economist for almost a decade.

Did he do anything to deserve this distinction? Sure, set as Executive Vice President and Chief Economist for Bank of America, biggest bank in the western world until recently. The bank went downhill before Mr. Hoadly hopped off board. Or was it while he was giving its executive policy committee his expert advice? No matter he is not there and the bank is no longer number one.

Nevertheless, Mr. Hoadly is still number one with the Commonwealth Club of California, an accomplished if conservative huge (14,000 plus membership) organization. Mr. Hoadly has been

procedure" said Maurice Wenzinger, the congressman's press secretary. "Jim talked to him several times about trying to get through his presentation on the floor," explained Wenzinger.

Bauman said he consulted with his students "mainly on parliamentary activities that come up." He said that most of their sessions took place right on the House floor; as a former member, Bauman has access to the chamber.

Does Bauman sit in their seats? Does he pass them notes? Does he grade their performance or will that be left up to the voters next fall?

Through June 30, Bauman had received \$1,000 from Jeffries, \$499.39 from Ashbrook and \$1,250.01 from McDonald. McDonald paid an additional \$1,665.65 between July and October to learn how to get his right-wing ideas written into law.

Bauman should be a good teacher. He was a master of parliamentary procedure and legislative strategy during his House tenure, which ended in 1969 when he was defeated for re-election after having been charged with soliciting sex from a 16-year-old male dancer.

Bauman announced in late November that he would run again. If he wins, he'll surely have to give up tutoring his "pupils," no matter how closely they agree.

But perhaps by then Ashbrook, McDonald and Jeffries will have learned how to be congressmen and will not need expensive on-the-job instruction at the taxpayers' expense.

Or they may want to pool their resources and ask former Vice President Spiro Agnew to lecture them on proper procedures for taking payoffs while in office. Or hire former President Richard Nixon -- himself a former House member -- to instruct them on the techniques of secret taping and second-hand burglary.

The possibilities are endless for the education of our lawmakers, but who's going to make sure the voters wise up?

### Why Afro-American (Black) History Month?

There can be little doubt that the true facts of the contributions of Afro-Americans to the discovery, pioneering, development and continuance of America have not properly and adequately been presented in the textbooks, media and other communication devices in this country. Indeed, for the most part, Blacks have been left out of the written record about America. Improvement in the recognition of Blacks and their contribution to American history has been made and the designation of the month of February each year is an attempt by the Association for the Study of Afro-American Life and History and other interested educators and scholars to remedy this neglect and to provide for all Americans the information needed for creative and empathetic understanding about Afro-Americans and their place in our nation's history.

Dr. Carter G. Woodson, a Harvard Ph. D. in 1926 started the observance of Negro History and chose February which contains the birthdays of Frederick Douglass and Abraham Lincoln as well as George Washington. During America's Bicentennial celebration in 1976, the Association expanded the week's celebration to include the entire month in order to provide more time for programs, observances and celebrations. And Black Americans look forward to that day when our history will no longer "be lost, strayed or stolen" but our history will be a vital and recorded part of our great American History - period-stated one bellringer. Until that day, we have to keep on telling it "as it is."

Recent great quotes: "The Black Church has historically been the most powerful social institution in the black community, and it still is. Still I believe the black church needs to be revolutionized. It needs to be cleaned out in the sense that the false prophets among us must be driven out, the racketeers must be driven out and those who do not have divine calling for their authority as preachers and those who have not been born again in Jesus Christ must be weeded out. "As members of the church we are called out of the system; whose priorities are materialism, war, jealousy, envy, pride, racism, injustice and the like.... As members of the new community we must practice making love to God. We call that worship. Worship is looking at Jesus Christ, looking at God and saying: Wow! Out of sight! It's grooving off of God. It's praising God. This is what the born again community does." end of quote from Tom Skinner.

Dear Bob -- Since 1960 Black people have had rallying cries such as "We Shall Overcome" Power to the People" and "Nation Time. Nonetheless for our black brothers and sisters in the 1980's there can be but one rallying motto and that is "Survival Time." The present administration is forcefully telling us that the government is not going to take care of us. But rather than curse this unforeseen negative action, we should take the encouragement of a black man who suggests: "Take the first step, stand on your feet, there is always help for the problems you meet".... God has given to each of us a mind for thinking and a body for working and he helps those who help themselves. Black survival will come through political participation and economic growth. Black America with its projected \$100 billion dollars, is not a poverty state. We need to reshape our priorities. Let's get with it, yours truly, Joe Black, v. pres. the invited luncheon speaker on economic issues for ten out of twelve of the previous years, surpassing even Presidents of the United States in demand for his economic directives.

Doing dual speeches has its problems. Problem number one is that people may remember your last speech. Suppose, for example, you excused a projected six percent unemployment rate by stating four percent is simply routine job changes in the economy. Then the next time you speak it is six percent that is "the routine job changing in the country." This 50 percent jump in unemployment becomes an acceptable explanation for the failure of the present executive in the White House. Hoadly gives the President a passing grade for curbing inflation.

Aside from being aware of "two-handed" economist; anyone must remember that "figures don't lie, but liars do figure!" For someone to give the impression that the American public is or should be happy with high unemployment, just to justify a "passing grade for the President" on his economic plan is either naive or pabulum for a prejudice audience. A cursory review of the ravages of unemployment on different ethnic groups of the country reduces even this discussion to absurdity.

Unemployment is knocking on the door of nine percent and getting persistently higher. It is likely to be the highest annual unemployment figure since 1941. President Reagan is responsible for the rampage of heightened hunger and any subsequent riots by restless subjects.

Considering its results to the Black American Community it is comparable to inciting race riots. Reagan is responsible. Employment Research Associates, a group opposed to more military spending, Reagan's pet project, claims everytime the Pentagon's budget goes up a billion it costs the Black American community over 1300 jobs. Black Americans are involved in the production of durable goods, service, state

## God Will Send Judgement

As I watch the Reagan Administration do away with several social programs which help the poor and needy, I take comfort in knowing that God will intervene for the poor and deprived. It seems as if some of the State houses are singing "Happy Days are Here Again." They sing of the times when the poor are becoming poorer and the rich are richer.

There was a time in Israel when its government became Godless and the rulers of Israel sought to please the u sought to please the upper "crust." That is, the rich were in control of Israel. But God spoke through the prophet Isaiah and said, "Woe unto them that decree unrighteous decrees, and that write grievousness which they have prescribed; to turn aside the needy from judgement, and to take away the right from the poor of my people, that widows may be their prey, and that they may rob the Fatherless! To those of you who have become unemployed because of the changes in govern-

ment and don't seem to know where to turn, let us recommend Jesus. Many will lose welfare and food stamps who did not need them in the first place, but a great number of people will lose welfare and food stamps who really need them to live by. Let me say to you, don't turn to any crime, but let me also recommend Jesus. To the young Americans who will lose your grants for schooling unless Congress does something to change the American problem, let me recommend Jesus to you, for He is a supplier of all our needs. During the height of the civil rights movement in the State of Alabama, blacks were dragged into courts and many states were passing laws against blacks, but God intervened. I remember while we were there, Police Commissioner Bull Connor had brought a black lady to trial who was innocent of all charges. All of a sudden the Judge collapsed and died from a heart attack. Bull Connor yelled, Get these niggers out of here, they have been praying. Fear came over the courthouse and a victory was won. 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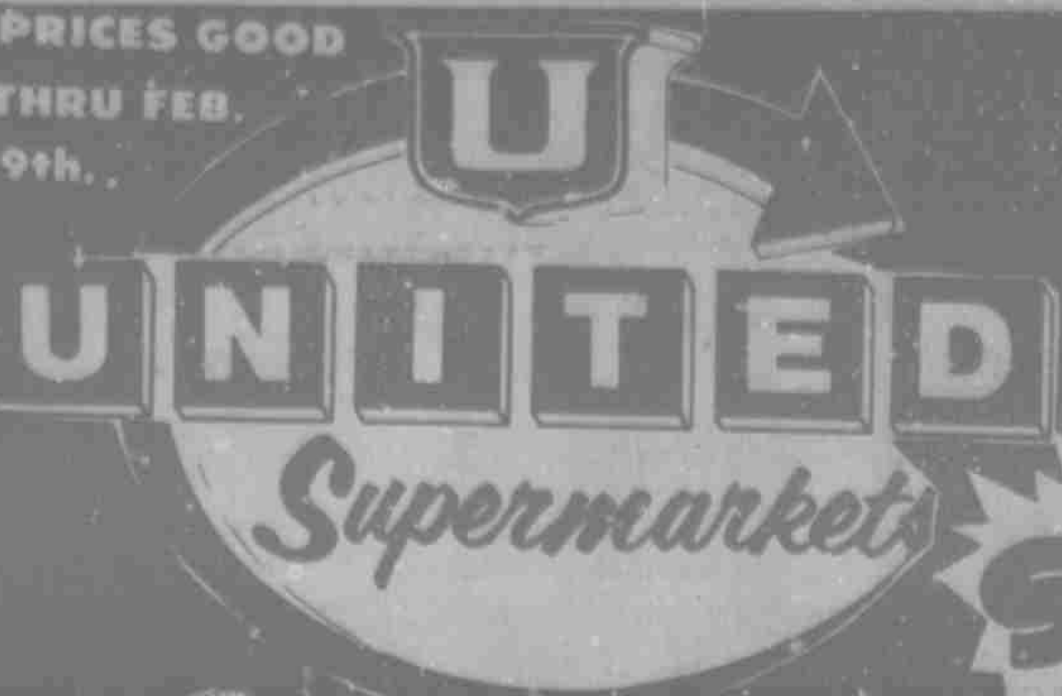

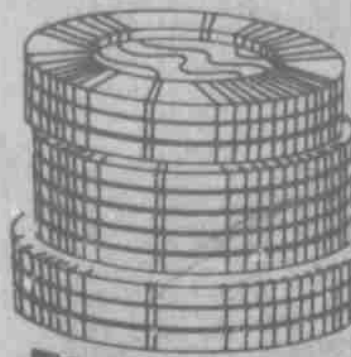
