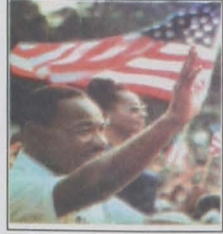

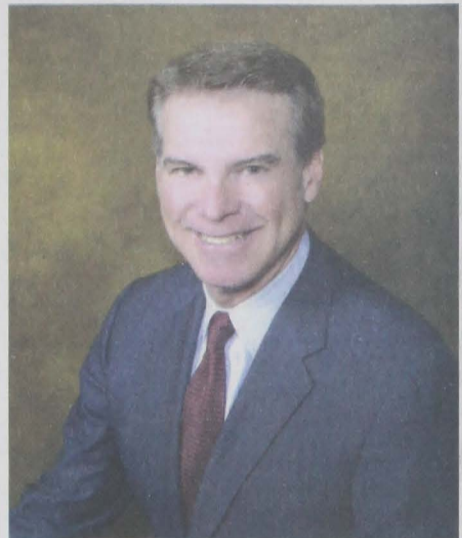

Texas Tech Law Presents Scholarship to Timothy Cole Family



Timothy Cole Family Receiving the \$100,000 Check For Scholarship

A scholarship presentation and a reception for the donors and the family of the late Timothy Cole was held Wednesday afternoon, December 2, 2009, at the Texas Tech School of Law in the Law School Forum.

Cole, wrongfully convicted in 1986 of a Lubbock rape, was the first Texas man exonerated after death for a crime he did not commit. Cole died in prison while serving a 25-year sentence.

In memory of Cole, four attorneys created a \$100,000 scholarship to be awarded to law students interested in public service. Kevin Glasheen, Noe Valles and Chad Inderman, Texas Tech law alumni, classed of 1988, 1993 and 2004 respectively, and Jeff Blackburn contributed to the scholarship fund. Cole died on December 2, 1999, in the state penitentiary for

a crime he did not commit. Through the work of the Texas Innocence Project and Texas Tech law students, Tim Cole's innocence was proven.

During the special presentation, Walter B. Huffman, Dean, and W. Frank Newton, Professor of Law, gave the welcome.

After the presentation of the scholarship by Glasheen, Valles, Inderman and DeHoyos of Lubbock, remarks were given by family members: Mrs. Ruby Session and Mr. Cory Session.

"This is one of the most extraordinary families I have ever encountered -- to turn something so devastating into something this positive is a tribute to the quality, the resilience, and the values of this unique family. They are special, and it's a very small but fitting thing we do here at the law school today to honor the memory of Tim Cole

and his family," said Calv L. Lewis, Associate Dean for Student Affairs & Diversity, Associate Professor of Law, Texas Tech University of Law.



Choice Is Yours," with the scripture text coming from Joshua 24:15 & 16. The choir sang a selection after the sermon.


There was the invitation to discipleship and several came for prayer. All visitors in attendance were acknowledged by the Ushers.

By now, I am certain that you, who read this column, are aware that I have been protesting the Government Pension Offset (GPO) and the Windfall Elimination Provision WEP, since the first time that I retired from employment and applied for my Social Security benefits. Consequently, I wrote to every Congressman from the three states in which I have been employed as a teacher or social worker, where I paid into a pension plan, but not into Social Security.

I received answers from many of the Congressmen during my initial protest, and the only negative one which I received came from Senator Trent Lott of Mississippi. Most of the Congressmen gave me some encouragement about certain bills which had been introduced in the House of Representative and in the Senate; some still in Committee. My second protest came about when I applied for Social Security Survivor benefits and the initiative to pass the Health Care Bill requiring everyone to have medical insurance which will carry a penalty if you do not purchase insurance.

the WEP. If they were eliminated, individuals who are victims of these two provisions would have the finances to purchase medical insurance. Individuals whom have worked at any job where the pay is derived from tax dollars and where you do not pay into Social Security, but have a pension plan, your Social Security benefits are penalized. You have adequate cov-

erage to apply and collect Social Security benefits, but because you did not pay into Social Security on the job where you receive a pension, two thirds of the amount of your pension is deducted from what your Social Security award should be! You will receive one third of your vested interest. The other part of this penalty is the WEP. It robs you of two thirds of your bene-

fits as well. To add insult to injury, if you are eligible for a widow or survivor's benefits, two thirds of that amount is also penalized. There is the possibility that you will receive nothing.

Senator John Cornyn of Texas is a member of the Senate Finance Committee and he advised me that if the GPO is repealed, it will cost at least \$21 billion—potentially more—over a ten year period and would make it more difficult for the country to address the looming fiscal burden posed by the aging Baby Boom generation. Likewise, the Government Accountability Office (GAO) has testified that eliminating the WEP would cost approximately \$19 billion over a ten year period and increase Social Security's long-range deficit."

This is money that we, the workers have put into a fund which is used for everything that the government needs money for, and sacrifices those of us who earned it. An attempt to make your condition in life better, gains you a penalty. We need to get 'in cinque' and elect Congressmen who will make better use of Social Security benefits for workers instead of just for themselves! Congressmen and their spouses get a lifetime pension, not Social Security, which is almost as much as their salaries when they retire! What would happen if they too, had to receive Social Security instead of the lifetime pension?

Everyone knows or should know about the GPO and



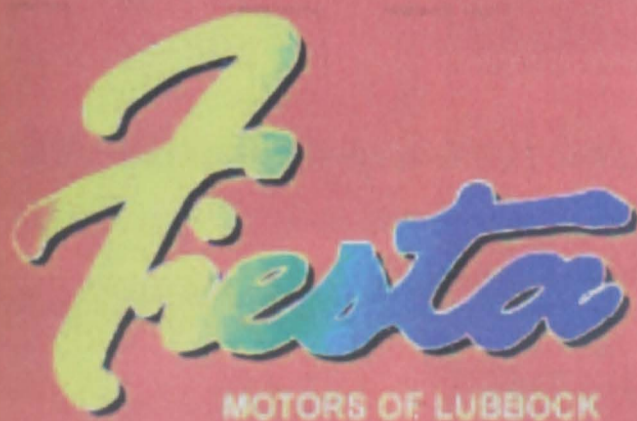
