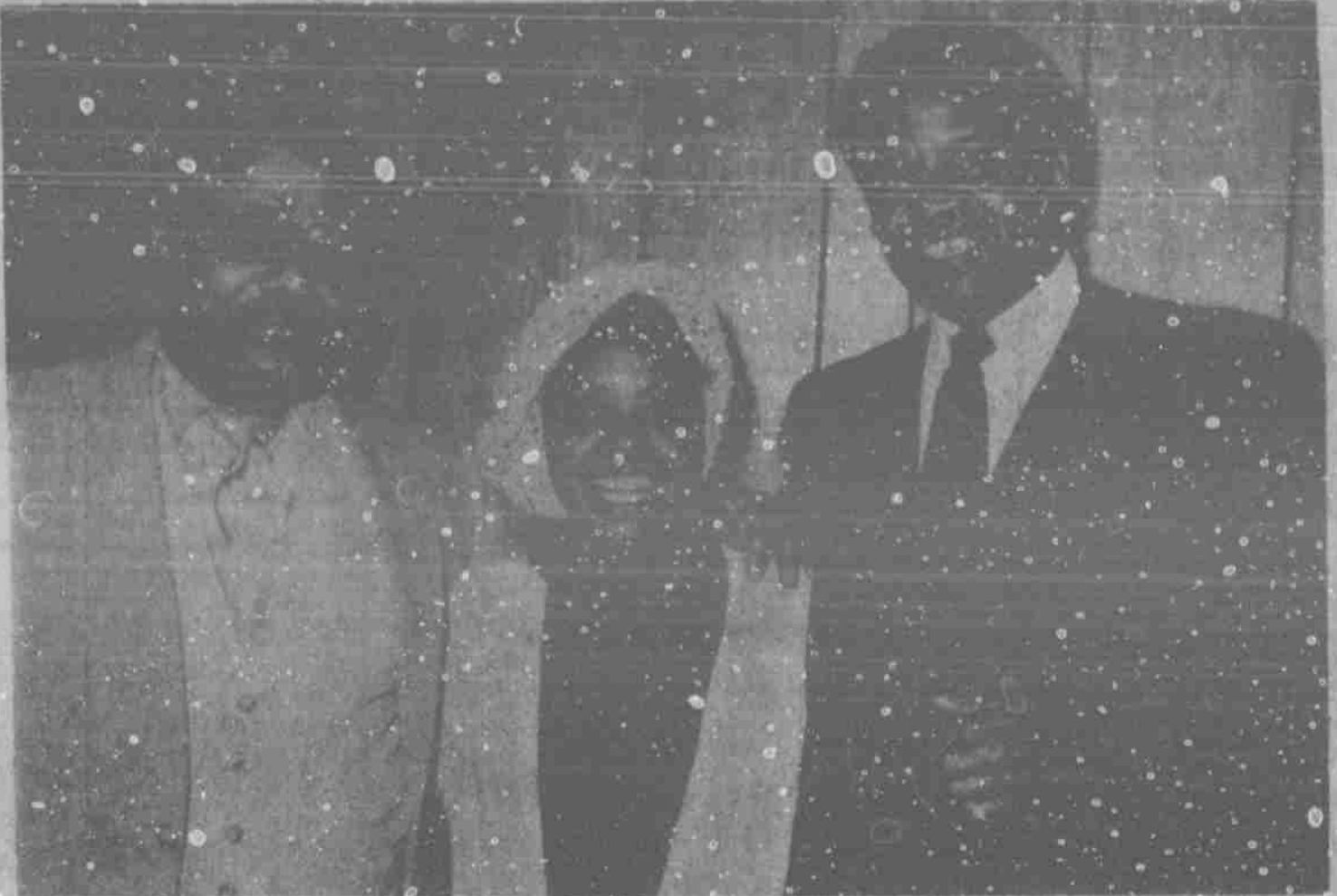

Stubb's Resignation Turned Back!

Clovis, N. M. -- While most Clovisites were watching T. V., doing last minute Easter preparations and/or indulging in various other activities last Saturday, Ethel Stubbs, president of the NAACP, was tendering her resignation.

Only the quick thinking of an attentive secretary, a preacher-skilled in turning wayward travelers and a half-handful of supportive members frustrated her attempt. The future of the civil rights organization is still uncertain. The work load remains undone. Two city Black citizens in particular, remain unemployed. Unfairly dismissed from their jobs. The recipients of the latest round of discrimination in Clovis.

Who will take up their case? Nobody it seems, at least, not the NAACP. The organization is hampered by elected officers that will not fulfill their obligation of supporting the civil rights group. It's president has had to bear the leadership role alone and without help and support from officials and members

alike. Marin Garrett, who is branch secretary, openly admitted that she had "not done her part" in aiding the local president. Incidentally, she was the only other officer present at the meeting. Ms. Stubbs cited "personal health reasons" as her reason for wanting to resign. "I'm tired," she told the

Digest. This is a high pressure job and I can not run the NAACP by myself." She seemed right. All the members present stated that she had done over and beyond what was (is) required. Several achievements mentioned were riding a base commarary manager of his position, successful organization an of

ENMU group and Cannon AFB Civilian Personnel program success. One example of Stubbs' overboard attempt to salvage the civil rights group was to spend her own monies in mailing to 92 members personal post cards to attend an urgent meeting. Seven members showed up for the meeting.

No finances, no planning, and non-participation of members within the organization is beginning to sound its doom.

Two Lubbock men were arrested last week in connection with the shooting death of 54-year-old Lorenzo Wadley.

Steve Wayne Bussell, 28, of 5811 Avenue H, was arrested Tuesday. He remains in jail on a recommended \$100,000 bond. Keven Scott Farmer, 21, of 1201 46th Street was brought back to the city after he fled to Vernon, Texas. Bond for Farmer was also set

at \$100,000. Wadley of 2112 Avenue O was still breathing when police found him lying behind an office counter at Seven Acres Lodge at 2415 East Broadway Avenue. Wadley died at Lubbock General Hospital. Justice of the Peace Charles Smith ruled the death a homicide. Police received a telephone call last week from a man who

said two white men reportedly had offered to sell the victim a large box containing a substance believed to be marijuana. According to the witness, the men were to borrow some money from Wadley, leaving a .45 caliber semi-automatic pistol as security. They reportedly told the witness that if they were crossed, they would kill somebody.

The Lubbock Branch of the NAACP held its monthly meeting Saturday at Mae Simmons Community Center. Candidates in the May 1st Primary were invited to the meeting to address members of the NAACP and public. However, more candidates were present in the audience than were East Lubbock residents. Among the candidates present to

address the small gathering were incumbents E. L. Short, State Senator, and Froy Salinas, State Representative. Short, who's opponent is John T. Monford, says he believes he has served the people well for the last 12 years, and is proud to run on his record on the Texas Legislature. Monford, who was unable to attend because of a prior

engagement, was represented by T. J. Patterson, Sr. Salinas' opponent is Delwin Jones. Salinas says, for the past 6 years he has been willing to listen to the people when they've had problems concerning state government. Salinas says he will continue to have an open door policy for the residents of his district. For the position of Criminal District

Attorney, Wanda Wray and Travis Ware stated that their primary concern is the rising crime rate in the city. Ware, who has served as Chief Felony Prosecutor in Lubbock County for the past 3 1/2 years, says the new way to solve the crime problem is through tougher prosecution. Wray says more neighborhood crime watch programs are necessary along with cooperation between

Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

Legislation enacted in 1981 made a basic change in when a person can first become eligible to receive Social Security monthly benefits.

People now becoming eligible for benefits can receive a benefit only for months they are eligible throughout the entire month. This means that unless a person was born on the 1st or 2nd day of a month, he or she cannot get a benefit for the month they become 62. The first month they

can receive a benefit is for the month after the month they reach 62.

This provision also applies to a wife or husband and children receiving benefits on a living person's Social Security record. The spouse or child must be eligible throughout the entire month to get a benefit. This mainly applies to step-children, since the marriage of the child's natural parent must have taken place one full year before the child can get benefits.

This rule does not apply to survivor benefits.

Widows and surviving children continue to be eligible for benefits starting with the month the wage earner dies, regardless on what day of the month the person dies.

A person who chooses to receive benefits before reaching 65 should remember that, in general, benefits cannot be paid for months before the month he or she applies. Applications can be made up to 3 months before the month benefits can start.

In last week's edition of the Lubbock Digest, a very nice letter from Rev. Harvey Robinson was written in support of our efforts and encouraging support of the Digest. Thanks, Rev. Robinson for your untiring continuous support.

But long before you came nearly a year ago, we were on the job of encouraging Black support of Black businesses, and the Black community and its effort. We have been doing this since 1977 on a non-stop basis urging Black to take charge of their destinies and to run their own communities with the initiative and leadership coming from within your tenure here.

We have nine Blacks on our payroll. We have had as many as twenty at one time, mostly on a contract or part-time basis. Plus we have used other Blacks whenever possible, i. e. electrician, air conditioning repairman, heating repairman, carpenters, wood workers, joiners (Nathan's Maid Service), paper boys and girls, distributors and others we could use.

At times, we went out of our way to hire and give Blacks a chance. In some cases -- which proved to be quite expensive and disadvantageous because of non-productivity and you owe me because I'm Black -- we found that some Blacks only want their paychecks after working for two days. We have found some who want nothing but a lot of money, and tell you how to run your own business. Some have even had bad attitudes and understandings. It's tuff, but we must continue to have faith in our own.

We appreciate you help and support, Rev. Robinson. We have been and will stay on the case even if we ruffle a lot more feathers. Sometimes for the truth and hard hitting stories, it hurts. We will, however, hang in there!

Thanks, a bunch, Rev. Robinson. We appreciated what you said, and your support!

Failure of Orthodox Religion -- Opportunity for Cults. In the gospel of St. Luke we find these words from Christ: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me, because he hath anointed me to preach the gospel to the poor; he hath sent me to heal the brokenhearted, to preach deliverance to the captives, to recover sight of the blind, to liberate those that are bruised, to preach the acceptable year of the Lord."

The Black Church has forgotten its responsibility to the people that it was originally designed to serve believes Dr. L. V. Stennis, Ph.D. and author of "The Black Church - Why Sit We Here Until We Die?"

Dr. Stennis is a candidate for the bishopric at the General Conference that will be held in May in Memphis, Tennessee and formerly pastored Patterson Chapel C. M. E. Church in Clovis, New Mexico.

He cites instances during his C. M. E. ministry in Alaska and elsewhere where poor, raggedy people were practically thrown out of the services on Sunday morning. And other cases of persons attending church on Easter, Christmas, Mother's Day etc. but who would not think of missing the Lodge or Eastern Star meeting and often leave a sick bed to do so. He adds that as long as the Black Church continues to separate themselves one from another with such flimsy excuses as education, economics, politics and social activities, Jim Jones types of cults will continue to exist and grow.

Dr. Stennis continues: "The church will never know how many souls it saved from hell and eternal damnation, but it can know how many lives on this earth that it was able to turn around... We need soup kitchens, clothing centers, crisis centers, counseling services, legal assistance, halfway houses, day care centers, employment centers etc. We have the resources but do we have the commitment?" He concludes: We must broaden our concept of ministry in the Black Church. Do you agree?

A bellringer writes: Dear Bob -- I have striven diligently to unselfishly lead our church for the past twelve years. Every project I have undertaken has been in the interest of the General Church. We have, through the support of a few of us, been able to purchase about 70% of the land needed for the development of Saints Center, here in Memphis, Tennessee. As I am writing this letter I hear the air-hammers cutting out the concrete floor for updated fire escapes in our downtown headquarters that we are in the process of renovating for the use of our "All Saints University" we hope to open in the not too distant future.

"The latest effort for fund raising put forth in our Church is a request for at least five-thousand individuals or congregations, to donate one hundred dollars per month for twelve months.... Please be one of these regular contributors. I do, however, hope you understand that contributions have to be consistent and Now. Make all checks payable to Church of God in Christ - Saints Center, P. O. Box 320, Memphis, Tennessee 38101. Gratefully yours, J. O. Patterson, presiding bishop, Church of God in Christ."

Melvin Harrison came to the mission fields of Eastern New Mexico and West Texas some few years ago. His family soon developed into almost a baseball team and as a young struggling Methodist minister, he was the sole support. Sometimes he would come to this correspondent with tears in his eyes and ask prayerfully: "What am I going to do?" We told him to hold on and that God in His own time would make a way. He had talent and was a brilliant musician and artist (God given). He held on and soon he was on his way to one of the largest Methodist churches in Kansas City, Missouri, being assigned there by the late Bishop W. H. Amos. And in spite of his lack of formal education, he remained at Jamison Temple for ten years. The people liked him and he loved people. Then bitter disappointment came. In the Methodist fashion, he was moved. It was a serious blow and he left the denomination and moved to Rialto, California and organized the Fellowship Christian Independent Church.

Coal Pipeline Must Funnel Jobs To Blacks

Our nation is gripped by a coal dilemma. We have coal like Saudi Arabia has oil. About 50 percent of the world's coal is in the U. S., but moving it across our country by rail has become costly and cumbersome.

There is a measure being advanced through Congress which supporters insist will solve this dilemma. They want to crush coal and move it through a pipeline system, and the material would be propelled by pressurized water. The product is coal slurry.

My concern is to make sure that this coal slurry

Every member of the Human race can rest assured now that he/she can die by detonation of an atomic weapon.

Well, needless to say Dr. Commoner does not believe you and I should be blown up. Understanding the detriment of doing a lot of federal government spending on spit-fire weapons is what is needed by the general public according to Barry. Believing that if the people were presented with the fact that it is better to build 747 planes for private air travel than for bombers, big and righteous changes would be created in the political arena. A private airplane provides an avenue for productivity when in service says Dr. Commoner. Cannon firing fighters and bombers do not deliver services to the economy except, heavens forbid, during a war.

When the nation awakens to the fact that government was founded to finalize recommendations of the people rather than relying on "the marketplace to decide" then and only then will the nation be on the right course confides Dr. Commoner. "Every dollar in deficit does nothing for the economy," explained the past (1980) Presidential candidate of the Citizens Party. A third party movement, which Dr. Commoner likens to the Republican Party of Abraham Lincoln, which faced "the real issue of the day in those days - slavery." Seeking a solution to the "particular problem of Negro slavery" led to the establishment of the Grand Old Party (GOP) of the Republic, with the wake of the Whig and Democratic party of the past. Perhaps Barry is begging the question a bit, but dealing with the economy does mean dealing with the federal budget and its abnormally peace time high Pentagon spending plans before the end.

pipeline project also energizes the black community by providing contracts and jobs. An amendment which I introduced recently during debates before the House Surface Transportation Subcommittee is designed to do just that.

The affirmative action amendment to the Coal Slurry Act of 1982 clearly requires the Interstate Commerce Commission to grant construction permits to firms that practice affirmative action. Firms which want to build sections of the pipeline must make maximum use of black employees. They also must facilitate black-owned enterprises in the construction, operation, maintenance, extension or increase in the capacity of the pipeline.

I was the only black of the 31-member subcommittee which weighed the coal slurry plan that is now proceeding to other legislative channels. The debate was a tug-o-war between liberals and conservatives. However, this is all too often a contest that disregards the interests of blacks and the urban poor.

Blacks are not power brokers, but we are not broke when it comes to power. The affirmative action rider on the coal slurry measure illustrates this. Saving social programs and stopping reductions in food stamps are worthy pursuits. However, our time must also be directed at methods to sustain and promote economic development for blacks.

We must look for any opportunity that allows our people to get a hand up instead of a hand out. By seeking racial fairness in the coal slurry plan our communities were cut in and not cut out of a network that will generate billions of dollars.

Mine was the swing vote on the coal slurry issue when it came before the subcommittee. If this affirmative action clause had not been adopted the pipeline would have exposed the federal government to indirect complicity in a risk of racial discrimination.

Without an amendment aimed at skyrocketing black unemployment the use of federal power to grant building permits using eminent domain regulations would have been unconstitutional. The coal slurry pipeline would have run counter to stated public policy and Supreme Court rulings relating to contract set-asides for blacks.

There had been talk that the coal pipeline would help lower energy costs and so its construction might help the poor in urban centers. However, this was the same line we received in Illinois when the electric power industry argued for permission to construct nuclear power plants. Those facilities have been built, but our electric bills are higher the eve. Profits were put ahead of people.

In the coal slurry matter the primary need is jobs and justice. And we can best decide how this is to be achieved. Our communities suffer from disproportionate levels of unemployment and more coal or cheaper coal will only benefit us if jobs and contracts are also in the pipeline.

The forces committed for and against the coal slurry pipeline are engaged in this battle because of tremendous economic implications.

Our communities also have an agenda which must be considered and the affirmative action amendment speaks to that. This victory comes at a time when affirmative action and quotas are being undermined by conservative and reactionary forces.

We met this challenge on this very vital energy proposal.

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TOWARD EMPOWERMENT

Multiplying Our Resources

Whether a person happens to be religious or not, the use of the Scriptures simply for their unmatched treasury or storehouse of practical wisdom ought to be a routine, perhaps even a daily, experience.

One of the finest examples of "growth advice" in the Bible is found in the Parable of the Talents (Matthew 25:14-30). It is a superlative lesson about making the most of our resources. The overarching importance of the Parable of the Talents to black people rests in the fact that we come from a "wage-earning" culture where a sense of investment is not encouraged. Hence, the racial or ethnic goals of many of us tend to be "survival-oriented," and so we miss out on the Bible-taught divine goal for human life, which is for prosperity for us all. "I wish above all things," said St. John (1 John 3), "that you may prosper and be in health, even as your soul prospers."

The Parable of the Talents deserves to be read in detail to sense its fullest impact. But in essence it tells of several persons who were given in trust various sums of money, from ten talents (or weighted amounts of money) down to one.

The persons who were given the greatest amounts

of money to hold in trust invested what was given to them. In this way, when the donor or the king called for a return of the money which he had farmed out, the money was returned to the king with interest. Those who had been entrusted with much had a "sense of investment." They knew that when money or any kind of resource is dormant or unused, it produces waste.

The parable goes on to indicate that the king was greatly pleased with his getting a return on his money (which had been used to the very best advantage). Hence, he gave to these wise and faithful friends greater responsibility with greater rewards for themselves.

It must be noted here importantly that those who invested the king's money did not expect any immediate reward. They made, in effect, an investment of trust in and commitment to the king, knowing that long-term rewards and the overall favor of the king would serve their own best interests. In this sense, they were willing to wait for "postponed gratification." There was no expectation of "immediate gratification" (as with infants and children) or of present rewards.

By contrast with the behavior of those who had

received large gifts, the one person who had received only one talent (or a relatively small sum of money) did not invest his allotment. He simply kept the king's money in a safe place where there was no risk of loss, and then returned to the king exactly the amount that the king had entrusted to him.

According to the parable, the king was filled with consternation, and he consigned the "unfaithful servant" to a place of destitution.

The import, drift or message of the story is that, regardless of how little we may seem to have, there is always the potential for much more within it. When we use whatever little that we may seem to have wisely and well—and with a sense of investment—our resources always can and will be multiplied.

This is but another way of saying that we must "pull ourselves up by our own bootstraps." The paternalists (who are always ready to enfeeble and then control and maintain the lives of others) then whisper in our ears the words, "But what if you don't have any bootstraps by which to pull yourself up?" The question is an insidious one, since the only basic—but tremendously important—bootstrap

How we think about life and about ourselves is crucial. If we think of, and see only, today, we are like children "for whom the present and signs of the moment encompass the whole of eternity." For those who can step up for and await the future, the disciplines of faith, patience, self-control and trust in the best which the future holds will pay the richest kind of dividends. We shall want to give ourselves, forgetting immediate rewards, and we shall see a far larger world in which we shall find for ourselves a vastly larger and an infinitely more rewarding place.

Another long, hot summer?

A segment of the population is angry. These people believe that they are the victims of insidious racial discrimination. The best jobs, homes and schools are reserved for others whose only qualification is skin color.

The resentment builds and one day explodes. Watts revisited? Newark in flames again? Detroit destroyed? Not this time.

These angry people are inner-city blacks suffering an unemployment rate twice the national average. This volatile mob-in-waiting isn't found in tenement or bursting bar-tos seething with racial tension.

This time it's Anglo-Saxons who are ready to riot if relief isn't granted before the long, hot summer begins.

This unfamiliar and unsettling scenario has become the Reagan administration's rationale for abandoning affirmative action.

Never mind the 44 years of legal authority for federally mandated elimination of white preference in employment. Never mind the decades of court decisions authorizing race-conscious remedies for race-conscious wrongs.

Reaganites say that affirmative action must go because it creates tension and resentment among "the previously advantaged population" — that is, the overwhelming majority of Americans whose skins are white.

Assistant Attorney General William Bradford Reynolds warns that affirmative action programs "have driven a wedge of resentment between fellow workers. The issue has divided the country, engendering new tensions and threatening the hard-fought civil-rights gains of the past three decades."

This is a serious indictment of nearly half a century's efforts to achieve racial peace — especially coming from the man whose job it is to enforce civil-rights law.

It has long been known that the victims of racial discrimination — largely the descendants of African slaves — were resentful of the treatment they received from their white fellow citizens. That resentment became righteous anger at several points in our national history and found expression in slave rebellions, riots and non-violent protests.

Public-opinion polls demonstrate that resentment and tension still exist among the victims of continuing discrimination, but now Reynolds tells us that the practitioners of that discrimination are resentful, too.

Reynolds did not go so far as to predict white riots for the summer of 1982. But his message seemed unequivocal: Unless something is done to reduce white tension, past civil-rights gains will be threatened and the country will be torn asunder.

The Reagan administration is on top of this problem, however. If civil-rights enforcement causes tension in whites, then eliminate the enforcement.

The Justice Department will no longer use goals and timetables as a remedy in employment-discrimination suits, thus ending a 12-year-old policy begun under President Nixon. Reynolds also tried to repeal a requirement that government contractors demonstrate their compliance with federal anti-discrimination law. Finally, he has declared that the U.S. Supreme Court "wrongfully decided" the case of Steelworkers vs. Weber that upheld a voluntary affirmative-action plan.

It is good news, I guess, to learn that the Justice Department will spare no pains to see that unhealthy Caucasian racial tension is eliminated. And not a day too soon. The prospect of wild-eyed white looters marching through the suburbs, destroying shopping malls and assaulting garden-club members, is too horrifying to contemplate.

Of course, some nay-sayers will warn against capitalization

WHITE HOUSE GIVES RICH MEDIA PREFERENTIAL TREATMENT

There has been widespread opinion that the Reagan administration controls the press. The big television, radio and white newspapers and magazines make up part of the huge corporations. So they all fall under the same bureaucratic umbrella. The little white press and, of course, the black media operate outside the preferred group.

During the transition period, a reporter for a small white magazine asked President Reagan if he would continue the practice of having the big media reporters on the front rows in press conferences, and his reply was that he would not. However, it seems far more entrenched now than it was during the previous administration. Reporters were moved around to different seats during the Carter press conferences. Occasionally, blacks did get in at least the second and third rows.

The press has been moved back into the west wing press room for daily briefings, where metal nameplates are on the seats. Before this, during daily briefings, reporters had no permanent seats, so all had the same chance to get preferred seats. Only black media—Sieridan, whose reporter is there daily, has a seat—and he is in the row next to the last. I don't go everyday, so I do not have a daily briefing seat. When I spoke to

David Prospero, who makes seating assignments for the White House press corp, he said they could not give seats to all White House press members, and since I do not come daily to the briefings, I could only occupy a seat if someone is absent. I told David that our papers can't get the advertisements like the big white papers—that we can't afford to have a person just assigned to the White House, but that the black press is the voice and source of information for black citizens; that my articles appear in 124 papers, and that I dare say I influence more people than just about anybody in the White House corp.

Some of the little White House press people also complain about the preferential treatment being shown to those who work for more affluent media. Since the people back home feel a close intimacy with their little hometown paper, they are more influenced by it than the big media. So the White House seating arrangement may prove to be self-defeating.

Since Press Secretary Jim Brady's accident, Larry Speakes, Deputy Press Secretary, has been conducting most of the daily press briefings. He appears to become greatly annoyed by my questions. Generally, he is insulting, sarcastic and sometimes nasty. At a recent briefing, I kept raising my hand and trying to get in a question

as the other reporters were doing. Finally, Larry looked at me and said "do you want to ask me a question?" I said, "yes". He then said "ask it then". But as soon as I began he cut across me and I said, "wait, let me finish." He replied, "well go on and finish." My question was "considering the recent unemployment figures which show black unemployment to be more than twice as high as that of whites, how can the President take a stand against affirmative action? Doesn't the great difference seem to prove that discrimination practices are going on in employment?" Larry's answer was "when the President's programs causes the economy to rise, everybody will benefit." I've been told by Larry before that I come to the briefings with my mind made up. I replied that after research, I do come there with questions in mind that I want answered. After the recent press briefing, those of us who are members of the black press decided that if any one of us is insulted, all of us will have to take a stand against those actions. So to avoid what could become a somewhat explosive situation, I registered my complaint in a letter to White House Chief of Staff James Baker.

Surely the questions about issues relative to blacks are hard to answer. However, all public officials must be responsive to them. Racial discriminations and injustices can't be glossed over—neither can they be called right. As much as I abhor insults, sarcasm and nastiness, I'll let nothing deter me from my duty to my publishers and readers.

Jesse Johnson to support Dan Kubiak in land race

AUSTIN — Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Johnson, who gained fame across Texas in 1981, when a constitutional amendment was passed to keep their family farm from being turned over to the state, have announced they will support Dan Kubiak for Land Commissioner.

"I am proud to have the support of the Johnsons who proved to everyone last year that government can be responsible to the needs of the people. Jesse Johnson had the determination and the will to keep his family farm which he had rightfully owned and paid taxes on since 1928," Kubiak said.

While visiting the Johnson farm in Leon County recently, Kubiak compared Johnson with another black man who resided in nearby Nacogdoches, William Goyens. Kubiak authored a book entitled "Monument to a Black Man" which tells the story of how Goyens, a free black, came to Texas before the Revolution and helped Sam Houston negotiate treaties with the Indians.

"Jesse Johnson and William Goyens are very much alike," Kubiak said. "William Goyens had to go to the legislature in 1852 to secure title to land which he received for siding with Texas during the Revolution. Last year, Jesse Johnson also went to the Legislature and the people of Texas to protect the land he owned and has raised his family on for the past 54 years," Kubiak noted.

Because of an error in a seller's title 140 years ago,

no "patent" of legal description was on file on the Johnson farm and several other nearby pieces of property. Until the constitutional amendment was passed in 1981 by the voters, the land actually owned by Johnson was legally owned by the state as public school land. After 75 percent of the voters approved the amendment clearing up the patents, Johnson and his neighbors received the patents on their land in December, 1981.

"Jesse Johnson could have let his land go anytime and given up his fight. But like William Goyens, he had the ability and perseverance to fight for what was his. Not just the Johnsons, but all of Texas will benefit as a result of this case," Kubiak predicted.

If elected Land Commissioner, Kubiak pledged to have all of the records of land titles of the state surveyed to make sure no other patent errors exist. Under the constitutional

amendment passed in 1981, owners have five years to clear any titles which may be defective.

"I was the only black man in this part of the country who bought his own land in the 1920's," Johnson told Kubiak in their visit. "I was only getting paid 26 cents per hour when I bought it in 1928, so I had to work real hard at other jobs."

During those years, Johnson and his wife Mollie raised nine children and two grandchildren in their white frame house. In addition to working for the railroad, Johnson said they chopped wood, took care of other people's children and "picked cotton until after Christmas and lots of times in the moonlight" to make ends meet.

"I knew Mr. Kubiak and had heard of him before he was in the race," Johnson said of Kubiak, who is the State Representative from nearby Rockdale. "I am proud to support Dan Kubiak in this race," he confirmed.

The cause of justice and equality is much too important for that.

Larry Speakes, who hails from Mississippi and worked on Capitol Hill in Senator James Eastland's office—and everyone knows that Eastland was no friend to blacks—might find it

hard to be confronted with legitimate issues that are peculiar to blacks and then leave a black person question him about them. "I'm sure he'll change, with some help."

Jim Brady is one of the nice persons one could ever wish to have for a Press

Secretary. White House Deputy Press secretary David Gergen is also very cordial and he treats all reporters with the same respect.

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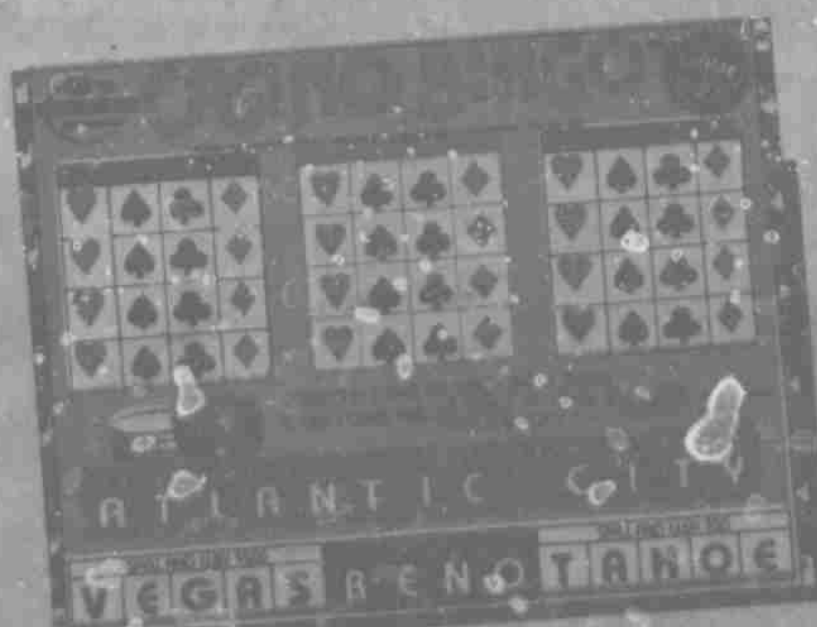
