NAACP Hooks Urges Support

New York -- Despite the Senate Judiciary Committee's recent approval of a compromise version of the Voting Rights Act extension, there is still a great deal of work to be done to insure that the extension of the Act becomes a reality. Benjamin L. Hooks, executive director of the NAACP, noted last week.

Mr. Hooks and Althea T. L. Simmons, director of the NAACP Washington Bureau, were two of the main "movers and shakers" in carrying the bill through the House of Representatives and the Senate Judiciary Committee with its effectiveness intact. They are urging the

Association's 1,800 branches, college chapters and state conferences and each of its 400,000 members to write, call or send telegrams to Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker asking him to bring the Voting Rights Extension bill to the floor as soon as possible for final action.

Mr. Hooks called on the NAACP members and friends interested in preserving the precious and fundamental right to vote to let their senators know of their interest in having a strong Voting Rights Extension passed by the Senate.

Mr. Hooks has also suggested to NAACP field leaders and units that they send letters of thanks to Senators Edward Kennedy of Massachusetts and Charles McC. Mathias of Maryland for introducing and supporting the bill initially and for their role in getting it through the Subcommittee on the Constitution and the Judiciary Committee. Branch leaders are also urged to express their appreciation to Senator Robert Dole of Kansas for his leadership in helping to forge a stronger bipartisan coalition.

complete," Mr. Hooks declared. "The battle is not yet won." He noted that supporters of a strong Voting Rights measure still "have to fight off weakening amendments."

The urgency in this phase of the struggle, he said, is demonstrated by the fact that Senator Jesse Helms of North Carolina has filed at least 40 amendments to the bill. Senator John P. East, also of North Carolina, has also introduced the set of weakening amendments he lost in committee.

Mr. Hooks further urged branch leaders to keep a close watch on votes by senators and congressmen on other civil rights and economic issues that have a direct impact on minorities and the poor.

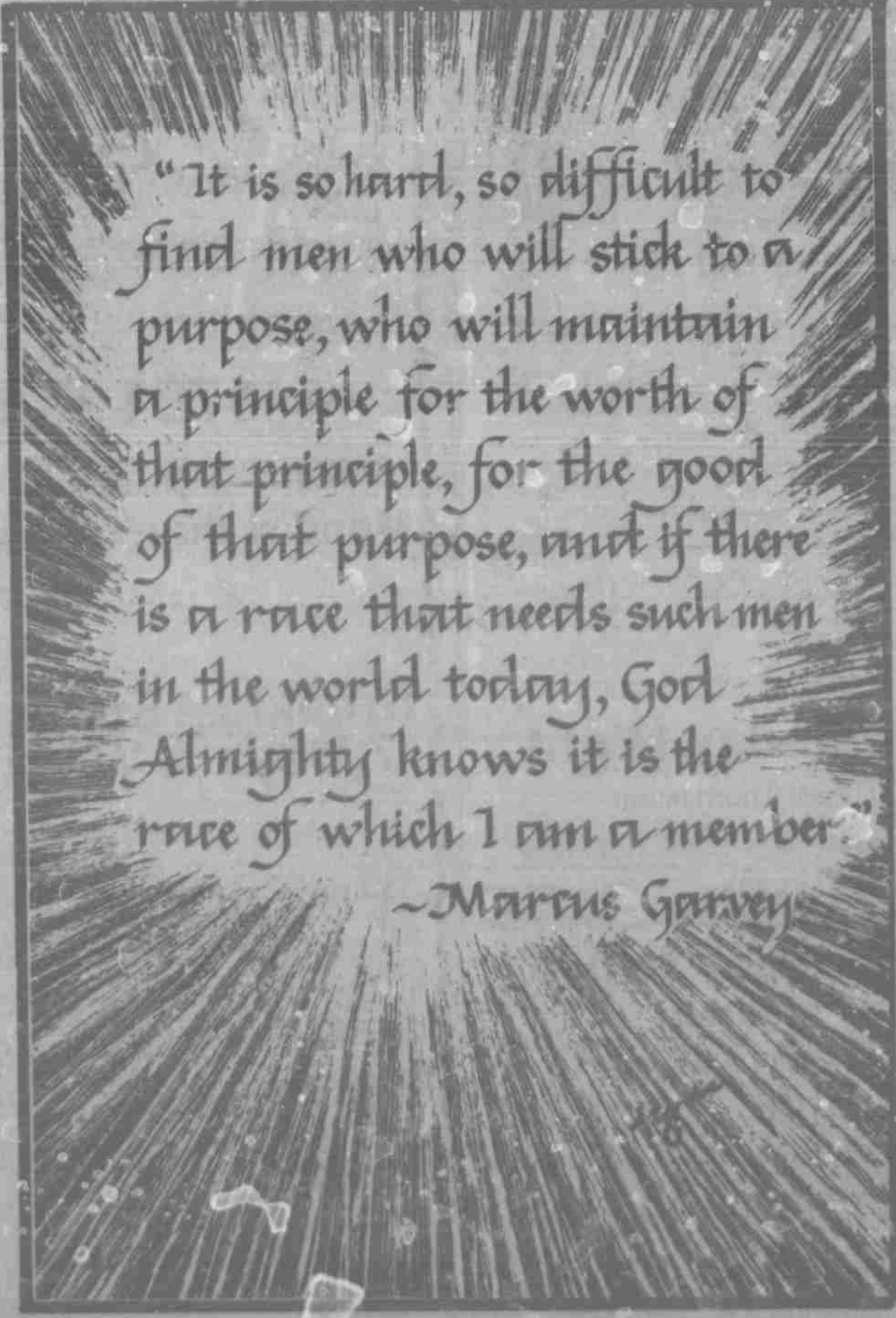

FAMU Journalism Accreditation

The Florida A & M University Department of Journalism has become the first journalism degree program at an historically black college in America to be accredited.

The announcement was made by Dr. Walter L. Smith, FAMU president, at a journalism department year-end banquet April 30.

The accreditation, by the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications (ACEJMC), is for a six-year period. The ACEJMC is comprised of 22 professional media-related and academic organizations.

The accreditation means that the department's administration and all three instructional sequences have met rigorous ACEJMC standards on budget, curricula, faculty, facilities, equipment,

library holdings and student services, according to Robert M. Ruggles, department chairman. The sequences are print journalism, broadcast journalism, and public relations.

Tony Brown's Journal Features Black Family



"Congressional Black Caucus Plan: Yes or No?" -- A television poll on TONY BROWN'S JOURNAL decided the debate between Congressman Walter E. Fauntroy (Center), Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC), and Dr. Carlton Goodlett (Right), Publisher of Reporter Publications, on the crucial question, "Can a Black self-help plan work in this

capitalistic system?" Congressman Fauntroy defended the new CBC "Black Family" self-help plan while Dr. Goodlett called it an "evil document" developed by "would-be leaders." The series has been funded by Pepsi-Cola Company for seven consecutive years and can be seen on KTX-TV, Channel 5.

By an overwhelming 71 percent majority, a television opinion poll approved a "Black Family" self-help plan proposed by the Congressional Black Caucus (CBC). The poll was taken in Cincinnati, Ohio

during a live-telecast of TONY BROWN'S JOURNAL, which utilized the OUBE two-way talk-back system. "Congressional Black Caucus Plan: Yes or No?" analyzed the merits of a proposal by the CBC for a national black self-help movement. This special TONY BROWN'S JOURNAL airs Saturday, May 29, at 7 p. m. on KTX-TV, Channel 5.

leaders." Dr. Goodlett felt that because plans have not worked in past decades, that blacks should adopt a basic ideology, and not agendas.

Congressman Fauntroy refuted Dr. Goodlett's assessment and said that Dr. Goodlett's apparent lack of familiarity with the plan prevented him from being a fair judge of the proposal. He added that these are unsettling times for black America and that many of the gains of the 60's have been eroded by a well-organized white community and misinformed elements of the black community.

vice president/news of Knight-Ridder's city group newspapers and president of ACEJMC, wrote:

"I can tell you that I have talked with members of the evaluation team that visited your campus, and all have emphasized their pleasure at the high quality of your students, your faculty -- and the administrative support the Department has received from your administration."

Noting that the ACEJMC hopes other journalism programs at historically black colleges will soon be accredited, Carter wrote, "Certainly those which come along later will find an admirable example in the Department of Journalism at Florida A & M."

The FAMU program was begun in 1974 and has 115 majors.

In an interview with host Tony Brown, CBC Chairman Walter Fauntroy argued the merits of the plan which he describes as a proposal for the unity, survival and progress of black people. Fauntroy, a Congressional delegate for the District of Columbia, said that the plan was designed to meet the current across-the-board challenge to the quality of life for all black Americans and he outlined its twelve major points.

However, Dr. Carlton Goodlett, publisher of Reporter Publications in California, said the plan was one of the most pitiful remedies ever prepared and describes it as a plan for genocide, not for survival. He called it an "evil document" tragically compounded by "would-be

Business Hints

FINANCIAL BUSINESS PROBLEMS

Financial business problems are nonexistent business problems. They are nonexistent problems because the business finance is dependent on the sale of the product or service being sold. It is the function, role, responsibility and duty of the businessowner(s) or his manager to effectively promote the business' product or service in order to assure that sufficient income for the business' needs and desires is generated.

The need or desire for additional finance has become a generalization by the assumption that there is a financial problem. In reality what is existing is a question: How does one get the necessary finance that is needed or desired when he himself does not have it?

How is defined: in what way or manner, by what means.

The question, "How does one get the necessary finance that is needed or desired?" usually means that there are difficulties present. Past

experiences have proven that business financial difficulties involves one or a combination of nine factors: (1) You are not the boss; (2) Means of entry into the business venture; (3) Businessowner(s) business practices; (4) Under the table payments; (5) Debt status; (6) Lack of track record; (7) Lack of promotion of the business' product or service; (8) Financial management practices; and (9) Lack of financial statements prepared by a competent accountant.

Although poor management of finances is often cited as the major reason for financial difficulties the first six noted factors carry the greater weight for financial problems.

Next week's "hint" will be a continuation of this series explaining "You Are Not The Boss". And likewise, as I continue to write this column I would like to hear from the readers.

Business Is Great

Although 20th Century Pizza & Subs has been open for only three months, the restaurant's owner says business is very good and can only get better.

20th Century, located at 801 4th Street, is one of the Black owned restaurants in Lubbock. The owner is Curtis Slay, a graduate of Estacado High School and Draughon's Business College.

Slay has not always lived in Lubbock. He left several years ago traveling to other parts of the country, because he says he believed it was almost impossible for a Black to make it in Lubbock. "I left Lubbock several times. I believed that a Black in Lubbock had no way of

making it because this is a prejudice town. But the more I traveled, I found that everywhere is just about the same. I came back and decided that regardless of what happened I was going to make it."

And so he has. Since opening 20th Century, business has increased 160 percent. An increase, Slay says, is due largely in part to hard work and determination.

"The restaurant business is a great

business to get into if you enjoy food and working with people. But it also takes hard work, a strong desire to make it and a determination

will to keep it." According to Slay, Blacks can make it in business in Lubbock if we help each other. "The only hold back

on Blacks in this town is that we don't patronize our own. We don't do for our people what the white man

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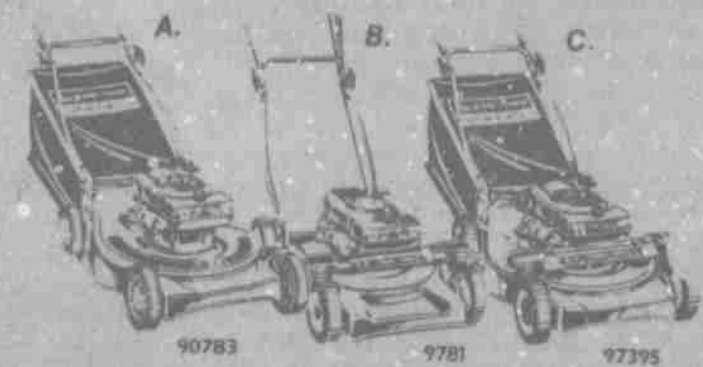

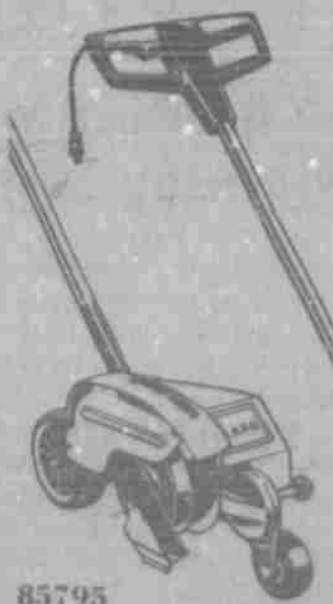

"We Must Get Back On Track"

For sometime, this column has gotten a little slack and, in a sense, neglected its duty to inform and tell you, our dear readers, like it really is! So as of last week, we decided to get back on track.

The Coronado Apartments blight is over. So we have to get us another soap box. The new soap box is economic development which is in line with the national thrust. The nation is going economic development while Lubbock Blacks are going full force on dogoodism and social action. With every breath I have and this publication can muster, we are going to push free enterprise, business and self-help through economic development and entrepreneurship. Helping ourselves, spending our monies with each other, supporting ourselves, and hiring our own when we can get production from our own are the things we should be about in Lubbock. We need to be in tune with America.

This writer became very disgusted when I attended last week's Juneteenth meeting in which this writer, last year, brought to town. It was very upsetting to hear people at the meeting down play the efforts of Al Edwards by someone who refused to participate in the program last year. The reason, perhaps, for such a down play is to connect the Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd with the Juneteenth Celebration. This should not be allowed to happen.

Now let's understand, I don't have any quarrel with re-naming Quirt Avenue, and calling it Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. My quarrels are with people and the method. King was a great man and he lived until he discovered the key to economic development. As long as Dr. King was dealing in social action, he lived. But when he turned to economic development, he died. Dr. King was my idol and hero, behind my man Rev. Adam Clayton Powell who in the 1930's integrated the Congress. He made all of his staff use all of the facilities of the Congress and was the Black peoples congressman, not just from Harlem, but across all America. He coined the phrase "Keep the faith!"

Back to the Juneteenth: Before freshman state representative Al Edwards from Houston authored and got through a conservative Texas House, H. B. 1016, the 19th of June was almost out. He made it a state holiday and had to come back later to retrieve it when it was left out of the budget package. What hurts is we have a person who refused to participate last year, and a newcomer who we brought in to help and give some exposure to him. Then, there is a person who was against him last year at this time. If anyone read my column last week... you can see what has happened... which stated... "needing to do something or wanting to do something or desiring to do something... that is beyond the ability of the person seeking same is nothing more than a lesson in futility."

The sad thing about this year's committee is that they are trying to tie Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Blvd. to the Juneteenth and leave out Al Edwards. As mentioned, Dr. King was one of my heroes, but he was not from Texas and should not be used in that manner to promote Juneteenth. Regardless of how those involved may feel, these are the facts, and this is the way it is!

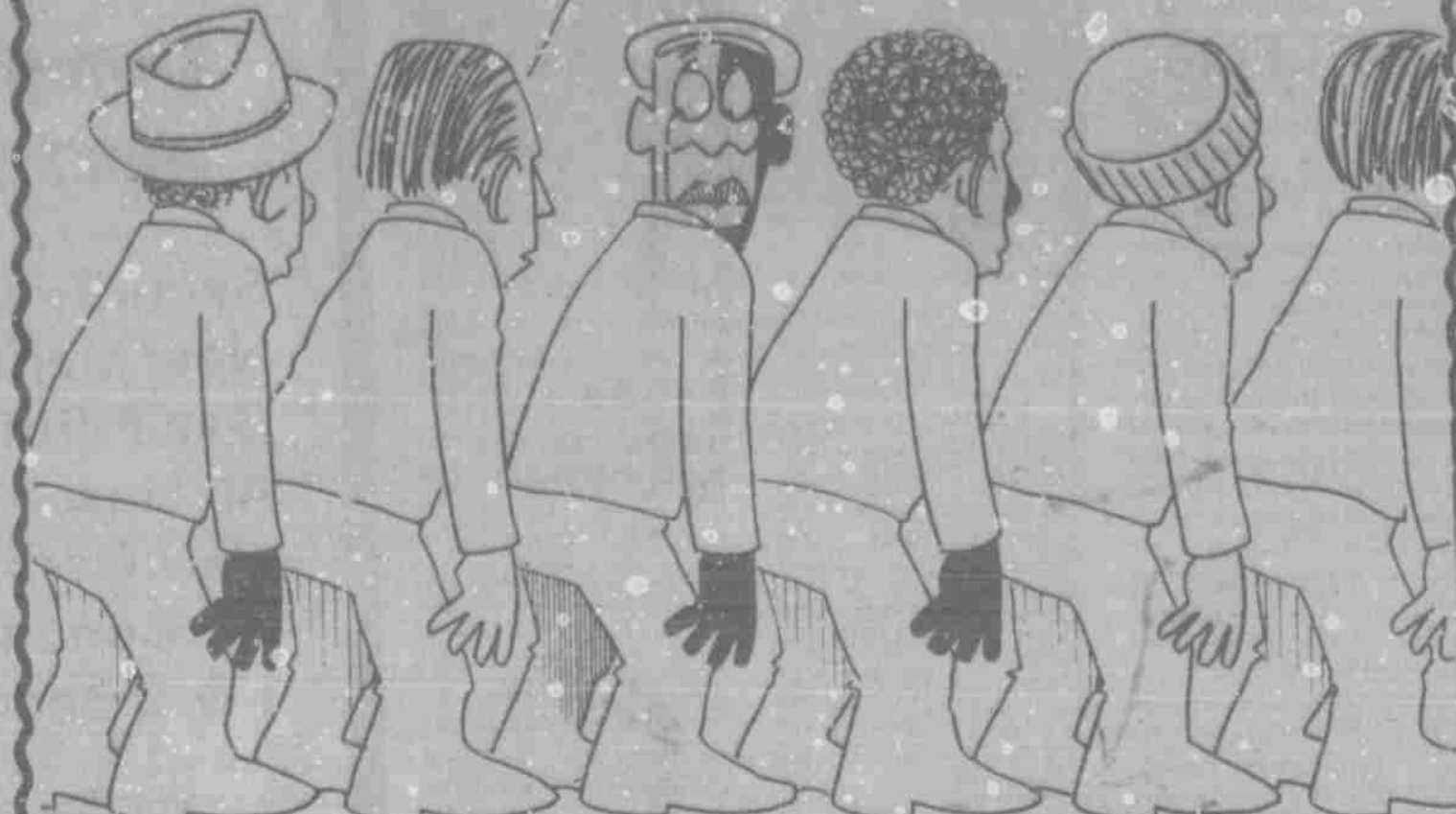

Business in the Black

Class, Changes, Course The Cruellest Tax Cut

"Don't cherish exaggerated ideas of yourself or your importance, but try to have a sane estimate of your capabilities by the light of the faith that God has given to your all." Romans 12:3 (Phillips). For if anyone thinks he is something when he is nothing, he deceives himself. The 1982 tax cut scheduled as a ten percent reduction in personal withholding rates on July 1 was recently hailed as a gift to the middle-class from heaven. Only they don't have the jobs to earn the taxes. As heaven would have it, helping the poor is more polite.

The President's plan for economic recovery is wrecking more middle income homes than helping them. Burgeoning middle-class businesses are going bust. Business slumps are frightening experiences for everyone. Current unemployment rates in several areas of the country have no match unless compared with the 24.9% unemployment rate of the great depression 1929-1933. Who's getting hurt the most trying out Reaganomics? Those wrestling without \$30,000-a-year incomes or the perennially unemployed Aid to Dependent Family recipient. Recognizing the latter is not being pulled off the relief rolls while the white collar crowd is joining the bread line. A new position for "those" people.

A study by the University of Chicago indicates it may be more profitable for some poor families to rely entirely on government welfare programs than to work at low-paying jobs. An example is that a single ADFC mother of two children in the state of California or New York is better off by 17% and 8.5% respectively, as well as, slightly ahead in the high unemployed state of Michigan. No wonder these women will not make the mistake of going to work for minimum wages. While others more accustomed to higher wages will find the loss of a job means more than loss of money. Lots of the middle-class mind is also blown. First time in the bread line is the worst time.

Middle America is also taking it on the chin. For "the first time since 1933 and 1934 you had back-to-back years in which the cost of producing on the farm was more than what the farmer got for growing it," according to an official of the Farmers Home Administration. Farm sales are being held in record numbers and farm bankruptcies and foreclosures have leaped up. Likewise the rate of delinquency on payments of loans from the FHA has jumped up 58%, the highest level in memory. No salvation on the farm. Forget the hired help, he's your son or son-in-law.

The middle of America is not alone in this confused economic collapse around the country. Call upon businessmen and you find they think positively (60%) about the trust of the current White House economic program, according to a Louis Harris & Associates, Inc. poll for Business Week Magazine. Maybe the businessmen know something they are not telling, since an overwhelming (70%) have no plans for a bigger increase in capital expansion than normal. An even greater number (81%) are not even going to rebuild inventories more than normal. These are essential movements to make the economy turn around on the upside, barring a war. Well, the good news is, we all know who we are and that power to place the President on the right program will be apparent for all to practice at the polls.

If we do no more than we are doing now, the odds are one out of three that he or she will be unemployed, one out of four that he will be in jail, and in Atlanta, if he manages to live that long, the odds are one out of ten that he will be in the cemetery. And it has nothing to do with Ronald Reagan, the Moral Majority or the New or Old Rights.

"Afr-Americans have always lived in a hostile environment. James Weldon Johnson put it well when he wrote: 'We have come over a way that with tears has been watered. We have come treading our path through the blood of the slaughtered...' ... e.g. the blood of Douglass, the blood of Tubman, the blood of Malcolm, and the blood of Martin Luther King, Jr.

Our ancestors had incubated Ethiopians, populated Nubia, and brought forth Pharaohs unto Egypt. They were an ancient, peace-loving people who had built universities and advanced systems of law when Europe still crawled on its hands and knees.

Perhaps God is tired of our crying about white racism. Let us go forward. Tell them that my Servant, Frederick Douglass was right: "If there is no struggle, there is no progress." Tell the people that King was right: "Freedom is never voluntarily given by the oppressor, it must be demanded by the oppressed." Tell the people that 'love never fails'. It was tested at the Red Sea and won. It was tested on Calvary and won. It was tested in Memphis on April 4, 1968, when they led King like a lamb to the slaughter. But Glory! Glory! Glory! Expand our list of leaders

"I see you didn't make it again this year," my friend Robinson said snidely.

"Didn't make what?" I asked in all innocence.

"Once again," Robinson said triumphantly, "you didn't make the annual Ebony Magazine list of the 100 most influential blacks in America."

"Really," I yawned, "I hadn't even noticed."

"Sure," he said with a hint of sarcasm. "You took up permanent residence at the West End News Stand until the May issue of Ebony was delivered. Then you bought two dozen copies because you were so sure that your name would be on the list. I happen to know for a fact that those Ebony's are now ivory ashes."

"Perish the thought," I said. "I happen to believe that all such lists are divisive and self-defeating for a people who need to widen, not narrow, their leadership class.

"You didn't think that a few years ago when your name was narrowed onto Ebony's list," Robinson scoffed. "Then you thought the top 100 was a true reflection of the power structure of black America. Then it represented our strength. Why is it a weakness now?"

"I don't believe I ever said any such thing," I protested. "Besides, any list of this kind is created by making choices and omissions. By its very nature, it is arbitrarily exclusive, and we've been fighting exclusion and elitism for more than 200 years."

"But Ebony doesn't say that these are America's only influential blacks -- just the top 100," said Robinson. "Can't you be satisfied with place No. 101?"

"My absence from the list has nothing to do with my objections to lists per se. I'm opposed to the whole idea, period."

"Why?" Robinson asked. "Ebony's readers, who are almost exclusively black, need to know who their leadership figures are. Ebony's editors, who are also black, are just as capable as anyone else of making those choices -- unless you'd prefer a more elite selection panel."

"Not at all," I said. "Ebony's editors are fine. And if I had been on the list, I would have been No. 6, between Ebony Editor Lerone Bennett and White House adviser Mel Bradley. The listings are alphabetical, not numerical."

"Ah, ha," said Robinson. "Does that mean that Detroit Mayor Coleman Young, whose last name placed him last on the list, should be removed to make room for you?"

"Of course not," I replied. "Coleman Young certainly deserves being on any leadership list."

"Who do you want to drop, then?" Robinson asked. "Which one of the seven mayors, 16 leaders of civil-rights and racial-advancement groups, five heads of professional organizations, six officials elected statewide, 18 members of Congress, 15 heads of fraternal and sororal groups, three administration officials, one journalist, one foundation president, four labor leaders, eight leaders of religious groups, two entertainers, six federal judges or 13 business people do you think should be crossed off the list?"

"No one should be dropped," I shouted, "but more should be included. Why list all 18 blacks in Congress but not all black federal judges? Why list six mayors instead of seven or eight? Why only one journalist and only two entertainers? Why no athletes? Why only four labor leaders? Why list dentists and doctors but not certified public accountants and pharmacists? Why the head of one black hair-product company but not the head of another? Why this collection of responsible, moderate men and women and no old-fashioned militants?"

"Perhaps Ebony is saying that militancy is outdated," Robinson said. "Besides, it's unfair to characterize these men and women as members of the establishment. They run the gamut from business to labor, from church to state, from Democrats to Republicans to the non-partisan types who try to keep the partisans honest. Ebony's editors wanted 100 names, and they chose 100 names."

"I still think there's room for improvement," I insisted. "Better luck next year," said Robinson as he walked away. "Maybe they'll make it the top 23 million, and you'll be guaranteed a place on the list."

GREAT MOMENTS IN AMERICAN HISTORY

Many of our National Guard units have participated in great moments in American history.

One unit that is particularly remembered is the 178th Infantry of the Illinois Army National Guard. Organized as the 8th Illinois Infantry in 1895 in Chicago, this regiment, composed of Black National Guardsmen, was redesignated as the 370th Infantry in 1917. It arrived in France in April 1918, when it, along with two other Black National Guard regiments, became the only American units attacked to the French Army in World War I.

On 21 June 1918, the 370th Infantry was placed on the front line in the St. Mihiel sector. The 370th then took part in the Oise-Aisne offensive in September while assigned to the French 59th Division. After a brief respite, the 370th participated in the Loorraine campaign.

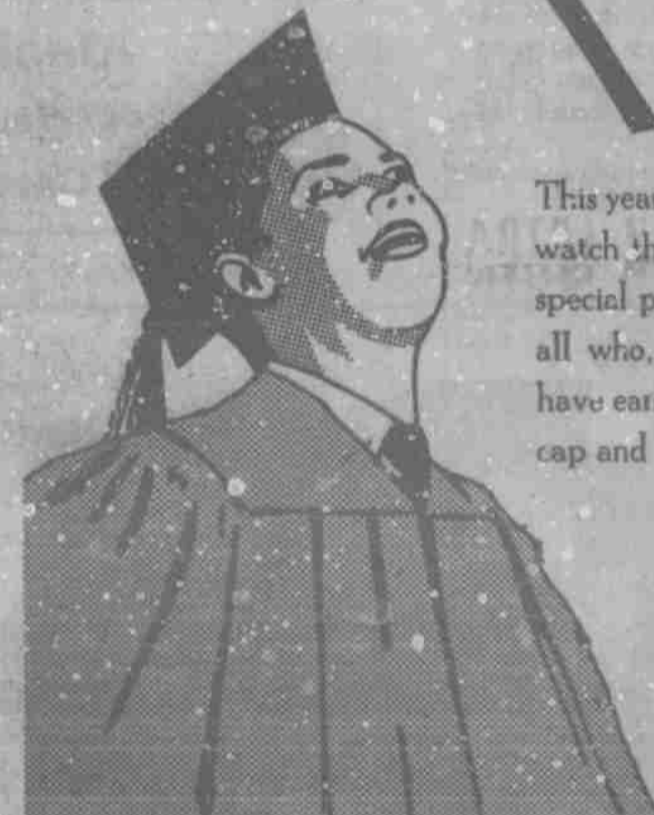
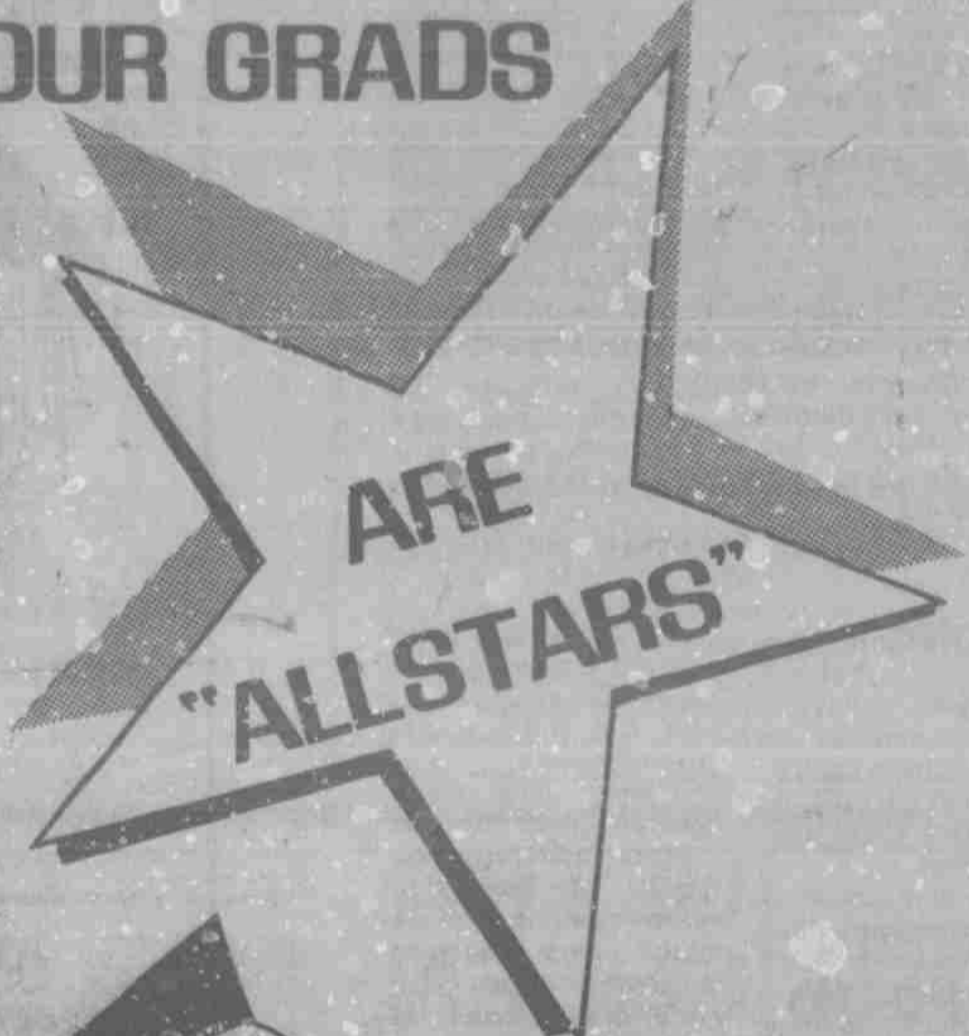

Why We Must Rescue Legal Aid

The deepening recession has left a growing number of Americans in a very serious bind: since they are having a hard time making ends meet, many of them have to surrender their legal rights because of high fees for lawyers.

Despite this reality, the Legal Services Corporation, commissioned by statute to help the poor secure their legal rights, is once again on the president's budget chopping block.

President Reagan initially sought to eliminate federally supported legal services in his 1982 budget. The lobbying on the part of the administration was intensive.

Congress refused to junk the program, but funding was sliced by 25 percent to \$241 million. Further, the program was also hit with new restrictions on its activities. For example, legal aid attorneys can no longer file class action suits.

Last year, the program hit its target of providing two attorneys for every 10,000 cases, and only two percent of the program's budget was allocated for overhead and administration costs. Most of the funding went to the problem -- client services.

Scores of racial minorities and the urban poor have called on and benefitted from the legal aid system since it was founded in 1974. Federally funded legal services have been provided since 1965 when the Office of Economic Opportunity set up its first legal aid project.

The question that concerns me is, what will happen to the 1.5 million poor people now being served by 6,000 legal aid lawyers? As for as the Reagan administration is concerned these Americans will just have to find another way to buy justice.

The administration contends legal aid lawyers or "poverty lawyers" are being subsidized at public expense to propagate their private views of what is good for Blacks, the poor and the nation.

However, the administration does not want to face up to the reality that there is a growing need for legal aid and the American public likes the present approach.

An April, 1981 CBS/New York Times survey indicated that 83 percent of those polled supported either the same level of funding or an increase for legal aid services for the poor, while only 13 percent favored a decrease in funding. Even among those who approved of Reagan's economic program, 80 percent favored the same level of funding or an increase for legal aid. It's unfortunate that despite this support the legal aid program is still slated to be axed by the president.

We must fight to prevent the suggested cuts in legal services and we also must work to restore the options that legal services used to have, such as the right to file class action suits.

If there is a legal problem affecting a large amount of people, problems which can range from racial discrimination to rent control, it is simply more efficient to have one lawyer file on behalf of all affected clients than to tie up 200 attorneys with 200 cases.

The legal system is already under attack for being one that renders a special kind of "justice" for "just us." If legal aid is derailed, we will have another reason to have little confidence in true justice.

Let's come together and rescue legal aid.

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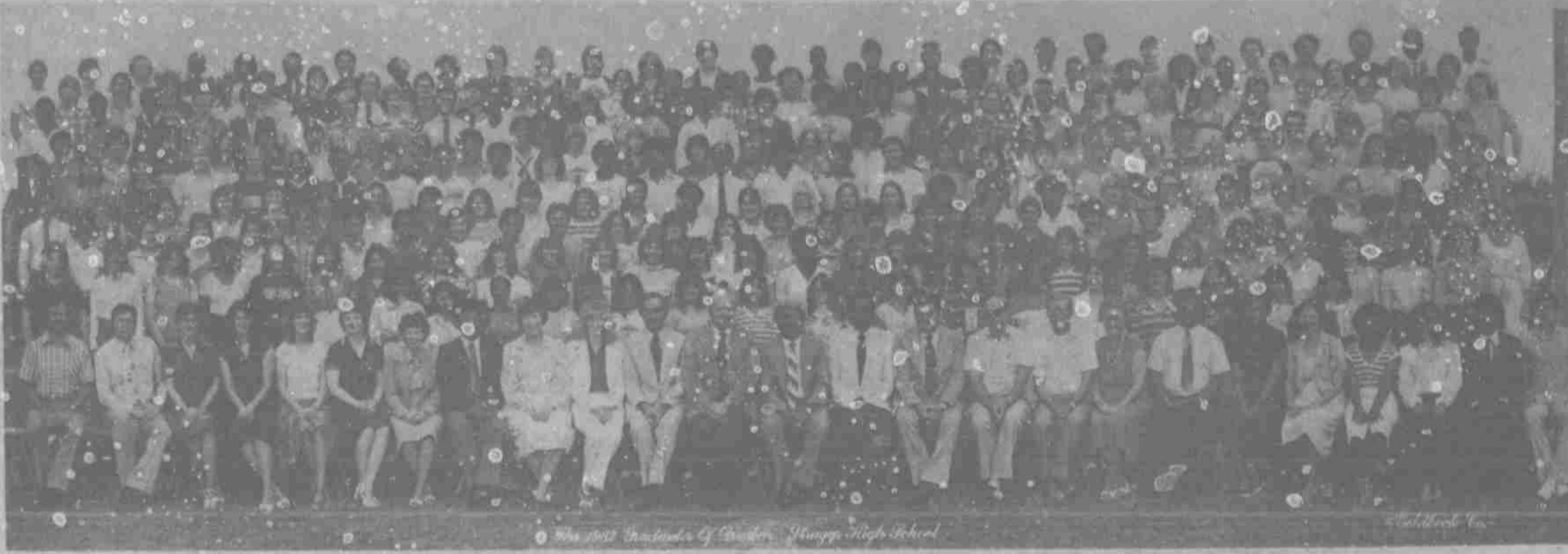
