### Social Security Tips

Your Social Security And You

This is the fifth and final article in a series about Social Security published as a public service by this

There are five times when you should contact the Social Security office. Knowing the five times for action is extremely important. It can mean greater security for you and your family.

Before you get your first job. You need a Social Security card to get proper credit for your earnings. After a death in your family. This is necessary to find out if survivor's benefits are payable. When someone in your family is disabled. Disability benefits under Social Security or SSI may be payable.

4. When you reach retirement age. Retired workers covered under Social Security are eligible for full cash benefits at age 65 or for reduced payments at age 62. Persons should sign up for Medicare two or three months before age 65, even if they plan to keep working.

5. Whenever you have a question about Social Security or need to report a change that affects monthly benefits.

The first step in contacting Social security should always be to call the number listed in the white pages of the telephone directory. Almost all Social Security business can be handled entirely by telephone. This is a special service called Teleservice which helps you save the time and travel expense required to visit the office.

In a few cases, it may be necessary to visit the Social Security office in person. By calling first, however, we can tell you what you might need to bring with you and possibly save a second trip. The people at Social Security can tell you how much work you need to be insured, who can qualify for benefits, how to replace a lost Social Security card or Medicare care, how to get a free statement of your carnings record, and what documents you need when you apply for benefits.

Social Security is here to stay. It is a fundamental part of the social and economic structure of the nation. It is a dynamic program, however, and will continue to change as it has changed in the past 47 years to reflect a changing society, almost certainly, changes will be needed in the future to ensure the financial soundness of the system. While there is no doubt that the system will be funded, there are many different ways in which this can be done. Public awareness and involvement is needed to ensure that these changes reflect the needs of the public.

The Lubbock Social Security office provides important public information services to facilitate the effective involvement of the public.

The Lubbock Social Security office has a number of pamphlets available free to the public which explain the program. We encourage questions and will provide speakers to any group that would like to learn more about the program in general or discuss a specific area





Unemployment Rate Also Hurts Those With Jobs

We cannot afford to continue to fellow the line that says: recession is when the other guy is out of work. and a depression is when unemployment reaches

Clearly, the soaring unempleyment rate hurts those without joby. It also undermines the entire community.

Whenever unemployment climbs another precentage point, the federal government loses about \$25 billion tax receipts. Yet, when this happens, more revenues must be spent for unemployment payments and for other so-called "safety net" programs, greatly aggravating the fiscal problem caused by the loss of revenue.

The resulting increased government deficit forces interest rates higher. This in turn, keeps the overall economy sluggish. Under such conditions, inesses are less willing to invest or hire more. In fact, they look for ways to trim costs, which in most instances means a further reduction in work force.

In past years, when such a negative economic cycle developed, Congress authorized more revenues for public employment, job training and unemployment assistance. However, under Reagan reign, Congress voted the opposite in the current federal budget as well as in th cones voted this month by the House and the Senate to begin

### Depression Doing its Duty Ignore Inflation

Out of the frying pan and into the fire. Finally inflation is flickering out. It is suggested by most eading economist that the end of the era of high inflation and inflationary expectation is at hand. Predictions now by some economists take the annual inflation rate down, as low as, three percent back to the pre-LBJ, President Kennedy days. Do not know if this depression is going that deep to drag the inflation rate. below six percent but it's a decent bet. Budget deficits not withstanding inflation is withering as the economic depression worms its way across the nation.

U. S. Department of Commerce composite index of leading indicators continues to decline. Doing a drop for ten straight months in a row, revealing how elusive acy hope of recovery for the economy is in the immediate future.

President Regan's \$100 billion budget deficit is expected to damage any a nomic turn around attempt by the economy. Even Republican representatives and senators sense the stupitity of standing pat by the President on the budget deficit. Doing something about the budget deficit now almost invariably means cutting the defense budget. Big deat. Democrats and others have been demanding a cut consistently with no response from President Reagan. Republicans may have better luck, especially since some senior Republican senators are up for re-election in November when they are out of a job!

It is presumed by even Presidential advisors that a

government's debt would mean "crowding out" or "drowning" the investment area and not leaving any money available for private industry, except at exceptionally higher interest rates. Thus no turn around. Ronald Reagan as President is merely doing with the defense spending what Democrats have done with social service programs in the past. Both must pay

President Reagan simply believes it's better to spend to fight the "communist" rather than to spend to alleviate poverty. Too much of a good thing can harm you, too much of a bad thing can harm you, too much of a bad thing can kill you. It's pretty hot in the fire now when the hear of the current depression starts to cool come next year we can start a rebuilding program for the country if President Reagan does not run us in too greater debt on behalf of the Defense Department.

In the meantime a mental shift should be taking place among the people in this country. Considering the sloppy economy, everyone should recognize this trend of no growth, high interest rates, and the beginning of a deflationary cycle. Cut your spending plans and hold on to cash while looking for bargains. There is a fire sale going on.

### The soul of the NAACP

By Julian Bond

If all you caught of the recent NA ACP convention in Boston was a quick cut on the evening news, you missed some-

Even if you heard the stirring speeches by NAACP President Benjamin Hooks, Sen. Edward Kenredy and former Vice President Walter Mondale, as well as the sober call to action by NAACP Board Chairperson Margaret Bush Wilson, you may have missed the heart and soul of the nation's oldest and largest civil-rights organization.

The real NAACP wasn't in Boston. The leaders were there. and the board, and most of the New York-based staff. Nearly 9,000 NAACP members were there, too — from Amarillo. Texas, and Anchorage, Alaska, and 1,800 other towns and

The delegates are back home now, revived by a week's wor shops and speeches, and by some marvelous victories that happened to occur during convention week.

On June 29, President Reagan signed into law the extension of the 1965 Voting Rights Act. The NAACP had labored for two years to get that signature.

And on July 1 and 2, the U.S. Supreme Court upheld the NAACP position in two stunning legal victories. The first outlawed an at-large voting system that discriminated against blacks in Burke County, Ga. The second overturned a state court ruling that held the NAACP liable for damages suffered by white merchants during a boycott in Port Gibson, Miss

Supreme Court victories and successful political action over the wishes of a recalcitrant president are nothing new for the NAACP. The organization has achieved these many times before.

But the true grit of what Hooks calls "the NAACP movement" wasn't evident until the convention's final session. That's when the NAACP family honored its own with the presentation of its Thalheimer Awards.

The awards — given annually since 1944 — recognize the achievements of NAACP branches from the smallest to the largest, from memberships below 250 to memberships greater than 1,000, from all-volunteer units to the few branches able to hire a staff.

More important, they answer the questions about what and where the civil-rights movement is today.

It is in Duplin County, N.C., where nearly 2,000 blacks have supported a range of NAACP programs that might put

more affluent chapters to shame. The branch belped elect seven blacks to public office, ran a tutorial program that reduced failure rates for black schoolchildren and helped local blacks retain 4,000 acres of land valued at \$1.2 million.

easing tensions between the black community and the local police: The Thomasville, Ga., branch lodged discrimination complaints against the local state hospital and filed suit against the county's at-large election system.

The Atlantic City, N.J., branch monitors the equalemployment performance of the city's casinos. The Kokomo,

Ind., branch runs a job counseling and referral agency.

The Nyack, N.Y., branch investigated complaints of police-brutality. The Monterey Peninsula, Calif., branch examined the affirmative-action plan, of local businesses

The Fairfax County, Va., branch is assisting in a suit against the local government. The Battle Creek, Mich., branch found jobs for 161 black youths.

The Co-op City, N.Y., branch runs a pre-kindergarten program without government funds. The Madison County, Ind., branch studied local lending institutions and, after discovering that they were red-lining black communities, is helping to start a credit union.

The Syracuse, N.Y., branch helped to pass local legislation that provides a 15 percent set-aside for minority businesses. And the list goes on and on. "If we got a membership from everyone we helped," a

branch president said in Boston, "every black person in America would belong. People curse us until they need us. "And by the way," he asked, "are you a member — a root? Or are you just a part of the problem?"

### opportunity and resour. Tuition Rebate Program Offered at Miles College

Birmingham, Ala. ---Miles College President W. Clyde Williams sanounced in a press conference a new tuition rebate program for new students errolling in Miles College.

In making the nouncment President Williams sai "Recent federal budget cuts are hurting black colleges and are already having psychological offects on students. The rebate program is simply 'good business." He added that the program is a revolutionary new way of offering financial assistance to help ease the financial troubles of seedy students.

The rebate program which wil po into effect for the fall semester beginning in August 1982, is based on: (1) fulltime student; (2) the

amount of financial aid awarded to the student through government grants and loans, and (3) student ability and potential for educational SULCESS.

"Miles College was founded by Black Americans as an institution of higher education with an open door policy to serve all ethnic groups," said Williams. He added, "We feel that no 'serious' student is so 'dumb' that he can't learn, with proper direction and tutoring. We'll accept all high school graduates or equivalent, egardless of their grade point average, it they have commitment to learn and develop their highest potential."

Dr. Williams said that the laition vebate is similar to automobile rebates. "If the auto

industry can five rebates as an inducement to protective customers, then I ame sure we can do it to further a person's mind," said the president of the 77-year-old black institution. The need for providing a special edication at the postsecondary level is greater today than ever before.

In his final statement announcing the tuition rebate program, the Miles President said, "I feel that it's not only the obligation but the duty of Miles to produce all of the educated 'black' brain power we possibly can. In today's system of undersupported, underfinanced and overpopulated public schools, the children of the poor and disadvantaged continue to receive an inadequate secondary education. 

Happiness is a Two-Way Street

"I became borea with her/him.

"I got tired of giving everything and receiving nothing in return.

"She/he became too predictable." "The relationship was no longer challenging ... I had conquered her/him and needed another more challenging affair."

"It was love on a one-way street; I gave and she/he never returned my affection."

"I just needed to live by myself for awhile."

These are but a few expressions uttered by one or both of the mates in a relationship that it coming to an end. These statements seem to have a common ring to them. They suggest that one or both of the mates is in the relationship for what she/he can cal out of it and is not prepared to give anything to the relationship in

order to make it work. An enduring, compassionate, loving relationship that lasts for a long period of time is far more difficult to achieve than a relatiouship that lasts for weeks or months and then fades into nothingness. Practically anyone can entice a member of the opposite sex to like him/her for a few weeks or months but making a relationship grow and last for years requires care, planning, understanding, receiving and giving. Such relationship requires "giving" to such an extent that one cares very deeply about the feelings of the mate

and expresses this caring often. A friend once said that she knew that she was in love when she cared more about her spouse than she cared about herself. But, this feeling must be a two-way street in order for the relationship to endure. The insecure perron who enters a relationship in order for the relationship to endure. The insecure person who enters a relationship for the over-riding purpose of obtaining emotional or sexual fulfillment will soom become bored and frustrated due to the absence (or loss) of the challenge; complacent and even obnoxious. One or both persons will soon tire of each other and obtain fulfillment only when a new challenging not-so-easy-to-obtain mate is found. It is not uncommon for one to search for years to find that one person will soon give love and understanding, but

tire of it and resume the tormenting search. This person may actually chase the loving mate away accepting love but rejecting the mate's efforts to obtain love in return. This is an ideal case of a person. anding a goal, tiring of the joy that it can bring and tossing it aside, then, searching high and low, often without success, for another pot of gold. We often

destroy the very thing we need.

Deeply imbedded within the hard exterior of each of us is a soft, hidden, individual in need of love but often afraid to reveal itself for fear that it will be rejected. If it

it is ever rejected it will be very, very difficult for a person to again find the strength and nerve to express the soft, inner seif that dwells in the depth of our personalities wanting, but fearing, to unveil itself. Only we really know that it is there but we will seldom reveal it. After all, isn't it a sign of weakness to let semeone else know how much we need to be loved?

Yet, the very person who so badly needs to be loved by someone else is in no hurry to provide the kind, unselfish love that someone else needs. This is unpuestionably the primary cause of unhappiness and failur es in many relationships.

A young larly once said that when her spouse, in a very tender moment, shed a tear, she interpreted that behavior as weakness and sought to end the relationship. Wouldn't it have been gratifying if site had held her mate tightly and said, "I understand." We reject the deep emotional needs of others but spend our lives searching for the same thing for ourselves.

'Sexual deviants' label for homosexuals

Woman ditter about black-white marriages

Dear Doctors: In a recent column on reasons for homosexuality you said the term "birth defect" is stigmatizing and is similar to suggesting gays are sexual deviants.

Are you saying gays are not sexual deviants? Please

clairify - D. R. Dallas, Texas Dear D. R.: We do not think there is enough supporting evidence to label homosexuality as sexually deviant behavior, although there is controversy about this issue among psychiatrists, the officeal position of the American Psychiatric Association is that homosexuality per se is not a mental disorder. A gay lifestyle is believed to be just one example of sexual behavior in a wide continuum

of normal sexual activity. It would not be scientific nor fair to view homosexuality as sexually deviant merely because exclusive homosexuals are a small percentage of the population. Gay behavior is not the norm in most cultures, but it has probably existed in most societies

It is possible that a homosexual himself or herself may view his or her sexual orientation as deviant. Such individuals feel abnormal and disturbed. Part of this feeling is due to societal attitudes and treatment of homosexuals. when homosexuals are rejected, discriminated against and stigmatized it is quite likely that many will come to see themselves as "sick." These internalized feelings often create anxiety, insecurity and depression. As a result, a high percentage of gays are lonely and have difficulties with alcohol abuse. The gay community is trying to cope with many of these

There are some gays who do seek psychiatric help and wish to become heterosexual, at least to some degree. They want to avoid what they view as an "abnormal" adaptation. Many, for instance, might wish to marry a member of the opposite sex, raise children and have a family. From the psychiatric point of view, these gays are not comfortable with their sexual orientation. In psychiatric nomenclature this disposition is called "ego-dystonic homosexuality." Homosexuals, in general, fair into the same range of personality types as heterosexuals.

Dear Loctors: I retired, I became acquainted with a black woman long enough so that I could speak freely with her. She was intelligent, good looking and welleducated. One day I chanced to remark on the fact that the never married. Seemingly, with some bitterness and sadness, this woman claimed that she had been engaged at different times in her life to high-caliber, well-educated black men who were interested in her but had enede up marrying white women. She said she lelt her chances of getting married were slim for that

\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

I felt, from talking with her, that she felt white women were grabbing the cream among the educated and successful blacks and leaving the skim milk for the black women. Since she seemed quite bitter about the matter I thought I might ask new prevalent this problem is for biack women, or is hers an isolated view? -- D. G. Everett, Woshington.

Dear D. G.: The experience of this black woman is not an uncommon one, but one that is often exaggerated. Black men do marry white women but in much smaller percentages than most people realize. Although the number of black men marrying white women has doubled in the past few decades, only 2 to 3 percent of married black men are married to white women. It follows the vast majority of black men are married to black women.

Perhaps the most important lasue is the general skortage of available black men. Life expectancy for bleck males is about 63 years and many die relatively

young. Life expectancy for black women is about 70 years. In addition, there are many black men in jail and the armed services. Many more are unemployed because of the economy and not likely to 'e thinking of taking on the responsibilities of marriage.

Because of thes shortage of black men, many black women feel a great threat from white women as competitors for black men who are already in short supply. They also worry that men married to white women are prejudiced and anti-black. From our observations, only a small percentage of such men are definitely anti-black.
