

Home Health Care Under Medicare

Home health care, a service that Medicare may help pay for under both its hospital insurance and medical insurance provisions, is a program that is medically sound, economically feasible, and humane. It enables patients who do not need fulltime skilled care in a medical facility to receive the services they need while they remain in their homes.

Home health care services include part-time skilled nursing care, phycial therapy, and speech therapy. Moreover, if any of these services is needed, Medicare also may pay for the part-time services of an occupational therapist, home health aide, or medical social worker, as well as for medical supplies and appliances, furnished by a home health agency. A home health agency is a public or private organization that specializes in providing skilled nursing and other health core services to patients in their own homes.

Four criteria must be met if either Medicare hospital or medical insurance is to pay for home health care: (1) the patient must need part-time skilled nursing care or physical or speech therapy; (2) the patient must be confined to the home; (3) a doctor must prescribe home health care and establish a home health care plan; and (4) the home health agency must participate in Medicare.

If these criteria are met, either Medicare hospital or medical insurance will pay the reasonable cost for unlimited covered home health visits. In most cases, hospital insurance will pay for the care.

More detailed information about Medicare is contained in Your Medicare Handbook. Question: My mother is receiving home health

care, but she is badly in need of homemaker services. Is this covered under her Medicare health insurance?

Answer: Homemaker services, such as preparing meals and helping to meet personal care needs, are not covered under Medicare. Under the law, Modicare is limited to services that cre necessary only for the diagnosis and treatment of an illness or injury. Question: My father received service by a home health agency in the morning and afternoon of the s-me day. Is this counted as one visit or two for purposes of Medicare?



Commenting on a film like "On Coiden Pond." still her dily at the Fox Complex on West 19th Streat after a couple of months or so, five months after its initial national bow, is like reviewing the famed German Passion Play. It's achieved an immortality and a familiarity nationwide to the tune of more that \$100 million at the box office and a number of hefty honors such a Best Action and a number of hefty honors such as Best Actor and Actress Academy Awards honors and others.

"On Golden Pond" is not a "blockbuster movie" as movies go; it is restrained and gentle and avoids much of the potential bravura drama-wise that it could have milked out of the gold-plated casting of Henry Fonda and Katharine Hepburn (teamed together for the first and only time in their heritage vintage careers) with daughter Jane Fonda (on screen and real life to Henry).

It tells of the trials and communication problems of a family whose head, Henry Fonda, is nearing his 80th birthday and his invevitable death in future, ably supported by his wife, Katharine Hepburn. The grown daughter, Jane Fonda, arrives with her intended husband, Dabney Coleman, and Jane's young son, Dough McKeon. The latter, a teenager vulgar mouth, is taken in tow by Grandpa during this summertime retreat on a New England lake, while mother wrestles with her guilts and her communications problems with her father. Hepburn is the constant, the peacemaker, the comfort and the strength, the family protector.

The film's most moving moments are a neardeath scene that brings the volcanic, sympathetic and probing acting talents of the two stars to a peak. Both stars are in their 70s (Fonda is 77 this week and ill) and this underscores the entire moton of the pairing.

Young McKeon holds up sueprbly, pitted with the two Fondas and Hepburn, and Coleman is not cowed not fazed by his towering co-players.

It's a fine film, deserving everything it has gained and it will continue to delight and move audiences from time on, as it has been doing from coast to coast.

Publishers, We were treated with royalty by Eastern Airlines, the City of Miami Beach Visitors and Convention Authority, American Sightseeing Tours, Don Griffin, Assistant Secretary of Commerce State of Florida, the Florida Department of Commerce --- a Division of Tourism, and our friend, George Jackson, executive director of the Association of National'Regional Convention Planners. Others included: Kanover Hotel, Carillon Hotel, Deauville Hotel, Doral Hotel, Eden Rock Hote! Fontainebleau Hotel, San Souci Hotel, and cf course, Charles E. Wright of Eastern Airlines, and the officials and staff of our own BMI. There were also General Foods, Heublein Corp. Schenley Affiliated Brands. Travels and Leasure Publications, Eastman Kodak, Philip Morris, Inc., UniWorld Advertising, Hill and Knowiton, Meeting News, ITT, On Line Executive Data and Budget Rental Company All vere great!

The participants of this historical Black gathering included top Black publishers of Black newspapers from across America, presidents of major Black national powerful organizations, Le, social, Greek letter, professional, religious and others. In short, the doers, movers and Black community builders across America -- which was beautiful -- were present. What we learned and shared we will all go back to our respective communities under a national umbreila dedicated to moving and building our communities. All of this will be done with a major united thrust on saving and salaging our Black youth with over 44 percant of them, 18 years old and over, being functional illiterate. In the near future, there will be a mass attack on illiteracy among our young Black people from a national, regional and local level by participating newspapers as well as regional and local branches and chapters, etc. of national organizations, collectively. With all the luxury of all these great minds, all of these rich upper middle class, middle class, lower middle class and moderate income, there were no low income Blacks in attendance. But get this, just 30 miles down the road, from the convention, the sight really upsel, disgusted, and hurt all in attendance. You see, this was the site of the Krone Dention Center. In other words, a JAILI This jail was used to house Black people. These were Black people who look just like anyother Black. It is just funny how skin color makes the differnce. We (publishers) will call this to the attention of all major Black national organizations and publish this in all Black printed media. The interesting part is that Blacks now In America never melted into the melting pot, because of skin color and legislation. Now, today, we have Blacks coming to this "promised land" along with people from other countries. The only difference is that the other people (non-black) from other countries are put into refugee camps -- not jails - or even sponsored by organizations. families, and, in most part, furnished food, shelter and employment. Even people whom America has been at war with, i. e. Nazis and others, get better breaks. This dosen't matter if you are not black. Even Russians, who do not have the dark skin, are treated different than Blacks. It's just that skin color plays an important role in how you are treated. At Krone Detention Center, the condition is deplorable. Can you imagine four women sleeping on a board the size of a cot. At the same time, "Old Glory" flies so beautiful over the land and over sea, long may she live with 50 stars representing you and me. Land of the frec, home of the brave. My country tis of thee of the sweet land of liberty. God shed his grace on thee. Land of opportunity, sweet land of liberty. The melting pot for people of all lands not so. With our Black Brothers and Sisters from Haiti.

Will the act be emasculated?

WASHING'ION (NEA) — The lines have been drawn. On one side are President Reagan, Attorney General William French Smith, Senate Judiciary Chairman Strom Thurmond and Chairman Orrin Hatch of the Judiciary Subcommittee on the Constitution.

On the other side is the entire civil-rights community from the American Civil Liberties Union to the Urban League; from the NAACP, the Southern Christian Leadership Conference and Operation PUSH to the League of Women Voters, the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith, the AFL-CIO and every other organization devoted to equal justice before the law.

The issue? Whicher black and brown Americans and language minorities will have effective protection against discrimination at the ballot bex and throughout the political process. In other words, whether the Senate will press an effective renewal of the Voting Rights Act of 1965, major portions of which are scheduled to expire this August.

Few doubt that the act will be renewed. But important questions remain: Will the act contain legal protection for the victims of racial gerrymanders and other discriminatory election schemes? Or will it prohibit the wrong without guaranteeing the right?

The jury in this case is the 98 men and two women in the U.S. Senate, which soon will be engaged in full-blown debate on the future of the Voting Rights Act. If the Senate version of the act differs from the strong version passed 389-24 by the House last October, a conference committee will determine which legislation will face the president's pen.

Some 64 senators - 40 Democrats and 24 Republicans - are co-sponsoring legislation identical to the House renewal bill. But some of these senators may accede to the changes sought by the Reagan administration.

Under Hatch's relendess attacks, an emasculated version of the renewal legislation emerged from the Constitution Subcommittee in late March. This substitute, consored by Iowa Republican Charles Grassley, is a simple 10-year extension of the existing act.

The Grassley bill would allow protection for language minorities to expire in 1985 and would luck voting-rights litigants into the "intent" standard that most legal authorities say is impossible to prove, The House version would extend the provisions covering language minorities until 1992 and shift the standard used to prove discrimination from "intent" to "results." From 1965 until 1980, plaintiffs in voting-rights suits had only to prove that a particular electoral procedure produced discriminatory results. In 1980, the Supreme Court ruled in the Mobile case that aggrieved parties must prove a specific intention to discriminate. That requires discovery of the "smoking gun" that elected officials never seem to leave behind In month-long hearings that began in late January, Hatch led the attack on the House-passed version of the renewal legislation. Hatch and Altorney General Smith argued that the "results" standard would lead to proportional representation or quota politics. That's a view that few others share. The Anti-Defamation League, a fierce opponent of quotas, dismisses the Hatch-Smith thesis, as do a host of legal scholars. But the thesis may win over enough senators to pass Grassley's weakened version of the renewal legislation. President Reagan has offered little more than bromides on the topic of voting rights. Reportedly, he once agreed to accept any version of the renewal logislation that emerged from Congress but was argued out of that position by Smith in a White House confrontation. Reagan has since let Smith and Assistant Attorney General William Bradford Reynolds carry the message that the administration wants to weaken the right to vote That message widens the vast rift between Reagan and the large community of Americans who believe in fair play. And it reinforces the growing feeling that this president is aggressively indifferent to the racial realities of the 1980s just as he is to the misery that his economic policies have produced.

It is good news to hear that there are plans to enlarge the coverage of the Digest which would include the Southwest at large with special coverage of the Midland-Odessa area. Southeastern New Mexico and many other areas with a portion of black people. All of our problems are smillar, with the main one of becoming a part and parcel of America's mainstream.

To publish a great newspaper, whether it be black or white, it takes money. This correspondent would like to see the Digest open up an sell common stock to those blacks whow up an sell common stock to those blacks who want a strong voice in the affairs of their respective communities. 
