All my life I have been involved in books. I love books. I have written and published nine novels here and in England over the years and heaven knows how many books I have read during the lengthy span of my life to date. To this day I read about four books a week, depending on length and subject matter, of course.

Now my principal source of supply is the Lubbock Library System and I go to Mahon Public Library for both the old and the new best selling items when possible

I tell you these things because I am burned to the core over the thoughtlesness and the wanton vandalism that has pervaded the library shelves now for a long time. It is every citizen's perogative to take out a free library card and to draw on those books provided by the people's tax funds. God knows it is a privilege and a public gift to all of us.

Then why -- tell me why -- will some library borrowers take out books and in order to insure the pages laying flat while they read, crack the binding back until it is torn form the cover and wrecks the book. I have hed no less than five or such books, recent releases, too, that have been maltreated in the past couple of months. It is pure careless vandalism at its best.

Why, too, will some readers underline sentences, words or record their worthless thoughts along the margins of the printed pages? Innumerable instances of this can be cited along the way.

One other thing. There is a service rendered to borrowers that should have been discontinued in practice a long time ago and still persists. Patrons can request a best-seller be held for them as they come in or are in high demand. This is discrimination against those who visit the library on a regular basis. As a result some best seller (so-called) books are almost never on the shelves and the seven-day book shelves are sometimes nearly as bare as Mrs. Hubbard's cubboard - for days on end.

I say, scan the books on return and nab the vandals. Abolish the reserved list and let those privileged now take their chances on catching the books on return from the shelves. These books are for everyone -- not the friends of the staff first or those too lazy to come by to check until they are notified their requested item is ready for them. I, for one, resent it; my fellow library attendees smart under this peculiar arrangement as

Dear Editor:

I respect the rights of all Americans inherent in the First Amendmant to the U.S. Constitution, but fail to understand your encouragement of negativism toward a minority community by a minority member as reflected in last week's Digest and your Channel 11 TV show. Your discussion of a 'Black Agenda' smacks more of intrigue and subterfug-, 'divide and conquer' than it does of constructive alternatives to a leaderless entity. WHOSE 'Black Agenda' do you veter to?

"Hi honor" Mr. McKinley Shephard was a dark horse candidate in last election, and it would serve him well to remain that way, quiet and out of sight, if negativism is all he has to contribute to the minority community, especially the Black one.

Is it possible for "Hishonor" to use his position to enhance the Black community and show it his merits? Would it be asking too much if he were to become a member of the local NAACP and lend his 'expertise' to the Political Action Committee? We need help in securing active members and canvassing for voter registration.

If all of our verbal critics became actived as opposed to bench members, or 'just members' as opposed to non-member critics, local leadership in the Black community in Lubbock would be identifiable and influential in the formulation and execution of a "Black Agenda" emanating from the Black Community.

As weak as "Hishonor" feels that the leadership of the NAACP is, he has to admit that it is the best leadership of the collecive Black Community of Lubbock in existence today. It is further hoped that "Hishonor's" own example of secular leadership is not the alternative which he offers as more positive. It is also hoped that the Black media would encourage more positive constructs in reading and viewing. A people with a history of oppression do not need any recapitulation of the mistakes which resulted in our previous lost of power and influence. Let us use our ability to read and write to help us to be more selective at the polls with the challenge ahead of us: EAST LUBBOCK CAN GET IT TOGETHER!



It dropped from 59.3 percent of the per capita income of whites in 1978 to 58.4 percent in 1980 -despite an actual and comparative increase in the educational attainment of Blacks from 1975 to 1980 of a median 10.9 years to 12 years (The increase for whites in the same period was from 12.4 to 12.5 only).

During this period, Black unemployment doubled that of whites. Also, while the total number of government loans made to small businesses in 1982 (15,435) was 30 percent fewer than in 1975 (22,155), the number made to small minority-owned businesses dropped 53 percent (from 5,359 to 2,521). In dollar amount, this same increasingly unfair ratio prevailed: total loans up 22 percent (\$1.4 to \$1.8 billion), but minority business loans up only 41/2 percent (\$210 to \$220 million).

The President, as well as Congress, should treat our system, not merely the symptoms. We can no longer rely on individual greed to most our collective need. More co-operation rather than competition must be engendered in our psyche; and more national economic planning and humane government responsibility are necessary, now! The President should prescribe a different medicine -- not merely an in-

create or decrease in our dosage of the same.

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This week, the Texas House debated its first major propriate general revenue for construction at any of issue -- a proposal for funding state colleges like Texas

the property tax colleges. As a result, the 17 non-PUF colleges have been waiting for more than two years for the Legislature to propose a new source funding. I believe HJR19 is the potential solution, and it was approved by the House with less than 10 negative votes.

However, there were several important amendments made during the debate. First, the original \$125 million allocation was trimmed to \$75 million, which is reportedly more proportional to estimates for construction, repair and rehabilitation at the non-PUF schools. The Legislature also recommended that the distribution of f inds begin in 1984 instead of 1985. Another change was the rejection the Consumer Price Index as a means of figuring annual increases in the amount going into the fund. Instead, the Legislature will set the amount for each year based on economic conditions and other state priorities.

Although I personally opposed the reduction from \$125 million to \$75 million because I believe that Texas Tech and the othe non-PUF schools would put any additional money to good use, I am pleased by the fact the resolution was passed by the Pouse. These colloges and universities have been patient in their suffering. It was difinitely time for the Legislature to ridress the tasue, and voters may have a chance to approve the amendment as early as April II all goes well in the Texas Senate.


