EDITORIALS

We Must Think in Terms of Three Things

Next year is a political year and we must start now getting ready for this important situation. In order to start getting ready now, there are three things we must take under consideration at the present time. They are Voter Registration, Voter Education and Voter Participation.

In looking at the voter registration phase, we should start passing the word out now in order to impress on our people how important it is for them to register next January in order to be qualified to vote. If we begin now, individually, to tell our fellow citizens how important it is for everyone to be registered, the bandwagon will already be rolling when the time comes around.

Of great importance for all of us is voter education. This includes knowing how to mark a ballot and even understanding every issue or amendment on any ballot. Also knowing something about each candidate who is seeking

your vote is most important.

Voter participation is the last of the three, but surely not the least important. After all, this is the one which really counts. If we don't go to the polls and exercise our right to vote, then we have had no need for voter registeration or voter education.

Some may say it is too early to start making preparations now for the elections in 1970. This is incorrect. We can start now building something which could surely affect our city and school board elections in the spring of next year.

By the same token, if an organization is built now, and is strong enough to assure a vote, then our democratic process would work much more smoothly—since our voice would be heard.

For all anyone knows at the present time there may be candidates running for any office which every reader of this newspaper would like see elected to office. If these readers and many more are prepared to support that candidate at the proper time, they can rest assured their voice will be heard and effective. For that reason, now is the time to start work on a strong, efficient voting organization within our community.

In the past mistakes have been made. With the experiences gained by all concerned, a great deal could be accomplished if we want it to happen for us. In a community of 17,000 blacks (perhaps more), we can command attention during the elections next year if we only start now making preparations.

The West Texas Times is willing and able to be a part of this type of movement, voter registration-voter education-voter participation. What is your pleasure? Are you willing to move forward boldly and start making preparations for the ordeal with the politicians come next spring?

In the past many promises have been made, with only a few bearing fruit. Is this what you actually want from future politicians? If so, remain as you are—the symbolic system. But if you are willing to call a spade a spade and desire materialistic rewards for our community in the future, then start thinking now about the future.

Start thinking now in terms of voter registration, voter education and voter participation. We need all three—and most of all—we need each other.

Austin-Senate State Affairs Committee voted out bills to set up upper level (junior-senior-graduate studies) colleges at Midland-Odessa, Corpus Christi and Texarkana and an additional University of Texas dental branch.

State Affairs Chairman Sen. William T. Moore of Bryan emphasized he is opposed to all of the bills and intends to make his views known on the floor. Moore postponed action on any of the group over the weekend by leaving town with the bills locked in a vault—and unreported to the floor of the senate.

Meanwhile, a House-Senate conference committee coached by Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and House Speaker Gus Mutscher plowed slowly through the job of writing a one-year budget bill that will necessitate no new taxes.

Gov. Preston Smith spelled out his opposition to such a short-term approach to state governmental budgeting as more costly in the long run as evidenced by recent experiences with the one-year plan and emphasized he interprets the Texas constitution to require a biennial appropirations pattern.

By trimming proposed spending and switching some unused surplus in several state funds, a conference committee headed by Sen. A. M. Aikin, Jr., of Paris and Rep. W. S. Heatly of Paducah believes it can provide the teacher pay raise requested by the Texas State Teachers Association without new taxes.

Smith feels that the state's dollars simply cannot be stretched that far. Barnes thinks they can cover the basic needs of higher education, state hospitals and special schools and state agencies, and still leave \$61.9 million for the first year of the teacher pay raise.

Smith said there was a movement afoot to kill the \$15,000,000-a-year general fund allocation to farm-to-market roads. Barnes said the Senate conferees would not propose taking that program away.

Governor declined to say he will veto the one-year bill. "Several alternatives will be open to the governor," said Smith. "It would not be proper or possible for me to choose one at this time, because I do not know what the circumstances will be."

Legislature Nears Windup-With adjournment deadline closing in, legislators are getting day and night workouts on literally hundreds of bills.

House finally completed action on a watered-down \$1.25-an-hour minimum wage bill. Amendments sent it back to the Senate. House earlier approved creation of a dental school for San Antonio, new regulation of coin-operated amusement machines, law banning possession of LSD and other hallucinogenic drugs, higher service charges on large real estate loans, a new upper-level college at Laredo, strengthened rules for transporting migrant workers, elimination of the requirement that jurors be free-holders or house-holders and county civil service systems for major counties.

Senate, not so productive due to filibusters, passed three bills to remove legal obstacles to heart and other organ transplants, agreed to creation of a new medical school in Houston and another in an unnamed city, approved a broadened tuition-aid plan for needy students, and proposed submission of a constitutional amendment to abolish the welfare spending ceiling in 1970 (in event the August 5 vote fails).

Both houses completed action on bills to expand the program of special education for exceptional children between the ages of 3 and 21, make universities out of Stephen F. Austin (Nacogdoches), Southwest Texas (San Marcos), Angelo State (San Angelo), and Sul Ross (Alpine) State Colleges, permit use of Spanish in teaching in the first six grades of public classrooms, create a board to license private detectives, set legislative salaries at \$6,800 a year (if the voters approve a constitutional amendment at the special election August 5 to permit the increase from the present \$4,800 a year), allow courts to issue driver licenses to persons who drive for a living but have lost their licenses for traffic law infractions (to be used on-the-job only and not for private driving), create the University of Texas Clinical Nursing School at San Antonio, make public agencies liable to persons injured by mistakes of public employees while driving motor vehicles or operating motordriven equipment, and regulate practice of optometry.

Horses Run Slowly-Rep. Glenn Kothmann of San Antonio did not even come close in his effort to submit to the voters a proposal for local-option horse race betting.

And the funeral oration of the Kothmann resolution was preached by Rep. David Allred of Wichita Falls. Thirty-three years ago his father, Gov. James V. Allred, kept calling the Legislature into special sessions until horse race betting was repealed. So this week's fight by Representative Allred was a rerun of history.





PUBLIC NOTICE Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (SJR6)

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 2, Article VIII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 2. All occupation taxes shall be equal and uniform upon the same class of subjects within the limits of the authority levying the tax; but the legislature may, by general laws, exempt from taxation public property used for public purposes; all real and personal property owned by a nonprofit water supply corporation which is reasonably necessary for, and is used in, operation of the corporation in the acquisition, storage, transportation and sale of water as authorized as its sole legal purpose; actual places or (of) religious worship, also any property owned by a church or by a strictly religious society for the exclusive use as a dwelling place for the ministry of such church or religious society, and which yields no revenue whatever to

ciety; provided that such exemption shall not extend to more property than is reasonably necessary for a dwelling place and in no event more than one acre of land; places of burial not held for private or corporate profit; all buildings used exclusively and owned by persons or associations of persons for school purposes and the necessary furniture of all schools and property used exclusively and reasonably necessary in conducting any association engaged in promoting the religious, educational and physical development of boys, girls, young men or young women operating under a state or national organization of like character; also the endowment funds of such institutions of learning and religion not used with a view to profit; and when the same are invested in bonds or mortgages, or in land or other property which has been and shall hereafter be bought in by such institutions under foreclosure sales made to satisfy or protect such

such church or religious so-

bonds or mortgages, that such exemption of such land and property shall continue only for two years after the purchase of the same at such sale by such institutions and no longer, and institutions of purely public charity; and all laws exempting property from taxation other than the prop-erty above mentioned shall be null and void."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in August, 1969, at which election all ballots shall have printed on them the fol-

"FOR the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation."; and

"AGAINST the Constitutional amendment to exempt nonprofit water supply corporations from taxation.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election, and this amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
