**NAACP Supports Petition By Stearnes' Lawyers**

In an article in the Lubbock *Avantage Journal* dated Saturday, April 22, 1989, and written by Joe Gulick, the NAACP Legal Defense and Educational Fund has filed a brief in support of capital murder defendant Michael Dewayne Stearnes' attempt to retain his defense attorneys, who were removed from the case March 6, by 99th District Court Judge Thomas Clinton.

The matter, at this report, is currently pending before the nine member court of Criminal Appeals in Austin. The Texas Criminal Defense Lawyers Association and the Lubbock Criminal Defense Lawyers Association jointly undertook representation of Stearnes in his efforts to retain Carlton McLarty and Chuck Lanehart as legal counsel.

Lawyers for the NAACP in New York filed a 37 page "friend of the court" brief regarding the situation. The brief will be read and reviewed by all nine members of the Court of Criminal Appeals, McLarty told the *Southwest Digest* on Monday morning.

Clinton removed both lawyers from the case after

saying that McLarty had compromised his ability to represent Stearnes. This appearance of impropriety on McLarty's part made it necessary to take the action, the judge said.

He referred to McLarty's

and attorney Quinn Brackett's visit on the night of February 28 to the residence of Anita Hanson, a witness whose life reportedly had been threatened on several occasions.

Stearnes is one of four defendants charged with capital murder in the September 10, 1987, shooting deaths of Vivian Webb, 42, Napoleon Ellison, 27, and Quinnie Smith, 27.

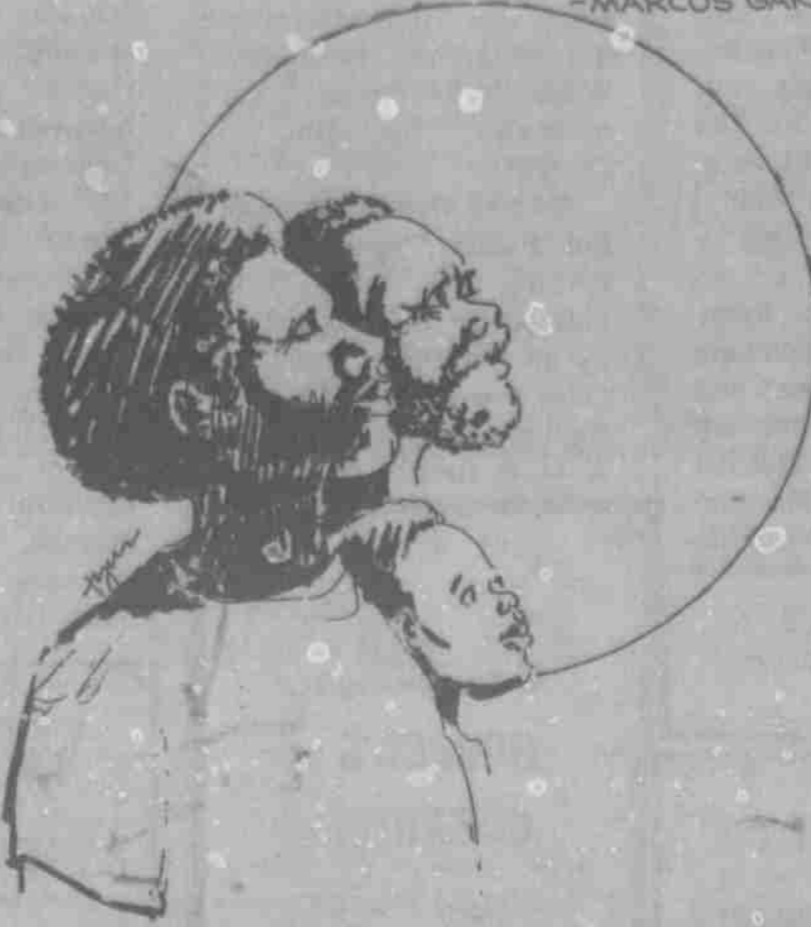

We need young, middle age and senior citizens all working together promoting East Lubbock in a positive light. Black faces in numbers must be seen at city meetings, school board meetings black sponsored events. We need to show togetherness in our efforts to rid our community of drugs and crime. ## Press Conference Of ELDA

(Editor's Note: Here is a copy of the release issued by the members of the newly formed East Lubbock Development Association (ELDA) on Tuesday, April 18, 1989 at 2 p. m. in the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce office. Making the presentation was Don Rolfe, board member; with Rev. Kado Lang and Eddie P. Richardson, both Lubbock Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Inc. members and T. J. Patterson, City Councilman, District II, were present).

### "Why ELDA?"

We must examine Lubbock historically to paint the scenario to validate the need for ELDA.

Americans of African decent have been in Lubbock since 1910, for approximately 80 years. Logically, this 80 year period can be divided into 2, forty (40) year periods. The significant of this division is readily obvious. Furthermore, this division allows for an easily discernable approach to presenting pertinent and specific points peculiar to each forty year period.

A. The first 40 year period was characterized by the following:

(1.) On January 25, 1923, the city was asked to restrict Americans of African Decent to a certain portion of the Southeast part of the Old Town Addition. The ordinance for such was established and successful; the location of the Black population was controlled.

(2.) In 1926 an ordinance was introduced which restricted Americans of African decent from riding the bus. That ordinance was in effect until 3 years later when the city commission amended the ordinance, but stated that passengers were required to ride in the rear in a separate space or compartment provided for them.

(3.) Furthermore, a city ordinance was developed which required all wild west shows, carnivals and the like to be performed "east of the tracks."

(4.) In spite of these degrading attitudes and practices, certain men stood in the community and homes were established, businesses were developed, and churches grew.

B. The second 40 year period was characterized by the following:

(1.) Urban renewal destroyed the sense of community developed in the first 40 year period.

(2.) Large areas of vacant land exists now where homes and prosperous businesses once were.

(3.) Drugs are now rampantly being distributed and used. Consequently, our youth, are being destroyed daily. Officials are helpless to stop it.

(4.) Very few students are prepared well enough or motivated enough to go on to higher education. Reading levels are the worst in the city.

(5.) East Lubbock makes up over one third (1/3) of the unemployment rate of the entire City of Lubbock.

(6.) Economic development in East Lubbock is at a stand still.

(7.) Commercial dollars are almost totally spent in Southwest Lubbock.

(8.) Public works are being developed which deny the existence of EAST LUBBOCK.

a. For example, the city's study for the downtown revitalization program excluded East Lubbock as it related to Broadway Avenue. In other words, develop Broadway to I 27 and forget East Lubbock.

b. Another example, initial plans for Highway 114 called for skipping over the Parkway area and developing Highway 114 up to I 27.

In essence, I 27 has now become the new canyon, the new railroad tracks, the old Berlin Wall.

Cardiovascular Fitness

Almost everyone believes that exercise is beneficial to good health. Studies have shown that the risk of heart diseases such as myocardial infarction and coronary artery disease can be reduced. # Construction Begins On East 26th Overpass

"16 Month Project"

Barriades were erected at the East 26th Street overpass last weekend, signaling the start of a \$1.4 million project to replace the 30 year old structure.

Construction of a new bridge across the railroad is expected to take approximately 16 months.

According to the contractor, the overpass is expected to be completed by July, 1990.

The Texas Department of Highways and Public Transportation designed the new structure and its construction is by Concho Construction Company.

A change in routes during

the Dunbar West Citibus route will be required during the construction period.

John Wilson, General Manager of Citibus, said that

Dunbar High School students living in the area

between Avenue A and the railroad will ride directly to the school in the mornings, but they will have to ride to the downtown area and transfer back during the return trip in the afternoon.

Reconstruction of the bridge is necessary because of deterioration of the bridge supports and decking. Recent studies indicated that unless corrective action was taken, a limit on the load

Contractors will demolish the existing bridge and begin construction soon after demolition.

## New Outreach Office Opens

A new Community Services outreach office opened Monday at the City Health Department, 19th Street and Texas Avenue.

Outreach workers will take applications at this location for all emergency services to low income families.

The new centralized outreach office replaces previous locations at 102 N. Avenue P and 1301 East 24th Street.

The move will provide easier access for patrons from throughout the community according to Community Services Supervisor Sylvia Martinez.

The 19th and Texas location is served by bus routes 7 and 9 and routes 6 and 8 with front door service. Buses on routes 14 and 15 come within two blocks of the Health Department.

Another advantage is that many of the patrons of the Health Department can utilize services of the Community Services Department. And patrons of the outreach office found to have health needs can be referred to nurses in the adjacent clinics.

Centralized record keeping also will be possible with the single outreach office.

Services to eligible families from the outreach office include home weatherization, utility bill assistance, bus passes for medical and employment

trips, assistance to the homeless in need for food and shelter and home security assistance for the elderly.

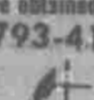

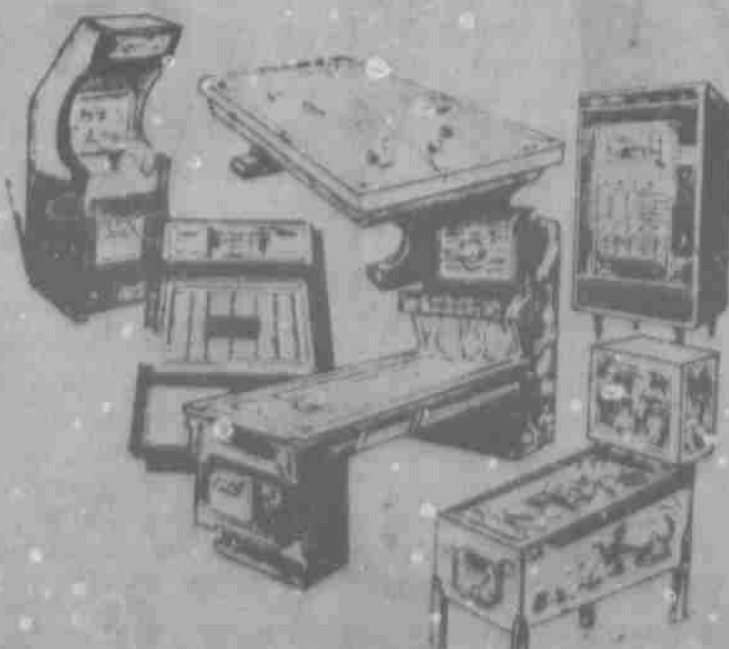

Miss Hanson testified in October as an eyewitness in the capital murder trial of Damon Richardson, who allegedly ordered the shooting deaths.

The NAACP brief states that Clinton used his discretion to appoint counsel for Stearns to prevent McLarty from performing his duty to investigate the state's case. Criminal District Attorney Travis Ware and Clinton both interfered with McLarty's performance of duty, according to the brief.

The brief concluded: "Wherefore, since Judge Clinton exceeded his jurisdiction and this case raises a unique issue of extraordinary significance, this Court should grant leave to file an application

for a writ of mandamus, grant the writ and vacate the order removing McLarty and Lanehart from the case."

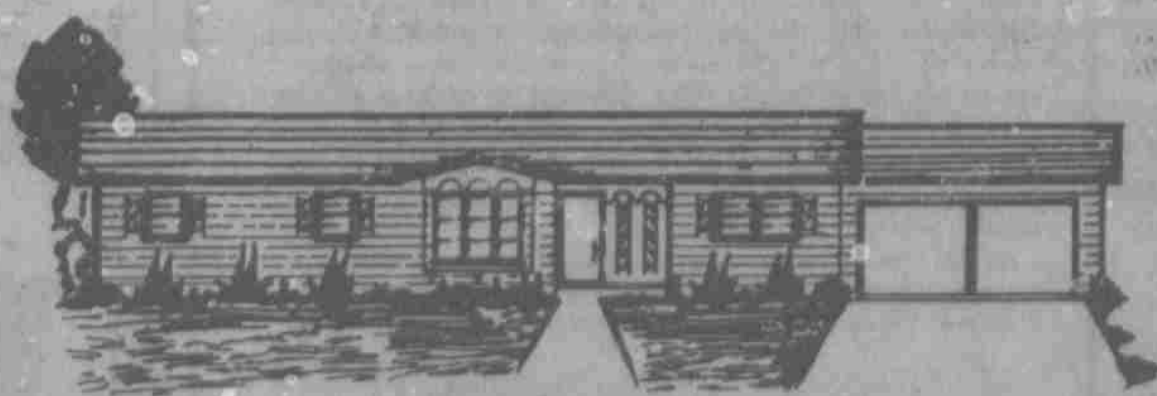
