Southwest Digest Salutes Seniors

(Editor's Note: The Southwest Digest will salute our Senior Citizens from time to time, and let them know they are not forgotten. This week, we feature Mrs. Annie Mae Jones, a hard worker for many years.)

Annie Mae Jones began a second career at age 50, becoming a full time volunteer. After being a mother of five and a professional housekeeper for more than 30 years, she began a life anew, putting back into the community some of the benefits she reaped throughout her life.

At 75 years young, with 17 grandchildren, 42 great grandchildren, and 15 great great grandchildren, Mrs. Jones looks back on her career in volunteerism and says she's been blessed to have met all the people in Lubbock with whom she served. And she takes particular delight in discussing the Well Baby Clinic, a United Way Agency since 1953. Mrs. Jones became a volunteer at the clinic simply because someone asked her to help out.

Mrs. Jones said much of her own volunteer duties included getting families to the clinic. Often a relative would drive her to pick up

families who did not have transportation.

Her career in volunteerism actually began as she became interested in the workings of Lubbock. She said: "I read about the volunteer meetings and attended as many as I could." When she couldn't attend, she would make phone calls.

Soon, she was on her way to posts on more than 10 boards and committees, including the board of the Neighborhood House, also a limited United Way agency, and a 3 year position as Zone 4 chairman of the United Way campaign.

Mrs. Jones has a long list of accomplishments and involvements, such as membership on the advisory board for the East Lubbock Senior Citizens, the Community Development Commission, and the Emergency Medical Service Systems advisory committee of the South Plains Association of Governments.

Perhaps the high point of Mrs. Jones' volunteer career was in January, 1975 when the Lubbock Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. named her "Woman of the Year."

Memorial Day will be observed as a school holiday by students and teachers in the Lubbock Public Schools on Monday, May 29. Classes will resume at the regular time on Tuesday for the windup phase of the school year.

The last day of classes will be Friday, June 2, and the final duty day for teachers will be Saturday, June 3. An abbreviated schedule of classes is planned for Thursday and Friday, June 1 and 2. Elementary schools

will dismiss at 2:00 p. m. Secondary students will be dismissed at about midday following their examination schedule.

Graduation exercises are scheduled for June 2 and 3. June 2, Estacado, Municipal Auditorium, 7:00 p. m.; June 2, Monterey, Municipal Coliseum, 8:00 p. m.; June 3, Dunbar/Struggs, Municipal Auditorium, 2:00 p. m.; June 3, Lubbock, Municipal Coliseum, 3:00 p. m.; and June 3, Municipal Coliseum, 8:00 p. m.

There are more than 1,700 graduates in 1989 from Coronado, Dunbar/Struggs, Estacado, Lubbock and Monterey. There are 1,593 students completing requirements this spring, 136 are expected to finish work in August, and 34 were graduated in January for a total of 1763.

It Needs To Be Said

"SAY IT LOUD, I AM BLACK AND PROUD," a very popular song of days gone by and an equally popular expression of Blacks of a few years back. Today, some 20 years later, how many within East Lubbock have true Black pride. True, Black pride is a positive reinforcement within life, that is continuously motivating you to always present yourself in the best possible light. Of all the qualities and traits required to be well rounded, self pride must be at the top or very close to it. You do not turn it on and off like a spigot, it should be as automatic as covering your bare body before going out in public. People with self pride try very hard not to allow themselves to be placed in a situation that will bring embarrassment upon themselves or people or places they hold dear.

Are we of East Lubbock "black and proud", for the majority, YES. However, it is misdirected or we place unimportant qualities ahead of true Black pride. Causing bodily harm to another person simple because of words, does not reflect pride. Allowing or tolerating your children, regardless of age, to do this, that and the other does not reflect pride of family. Allowing or tolerating drugs and crime to be high on the list of things identified with our community or when low income is a high on the list, this also shows pride is not a high priority within the community. Just like people with pride would be highly offended if told "you need to take a bath", the same applies to allowing or tolerating yourself, your family or community to be anything but the best it can be.

And we all will agree, East Lubbock is no way near "all it can be" and the reason is, we do not put forth enough effort to make it "all it can be." Far too many of us feel it is none of our business what the other person does, therefore, we don't get involved. If we had true Black pride, there is no way we would tolerate crack houses and bootleg joints next door. If we had true Black pride, we would be more concerned about what, where and how our children are doing in school, in the community and what they want out of life. Again, East Lubbock has pride, but for reasons unknown, we simply ignore or place little significant on Black pride, therefore, we tolerate more abuse and harsh treatment than we should. True pride will enable each of us to look upon all situations as to the affects it has on us personally. Your neighbor selling drugs has a personal affect on you because you are apart of a neighborhood, you know, "one bad apple spoils the whole basket." Tolerating one child's misbehavior has the tendency to create misbehavior in other family members.

East Lubbock is moving forward, and with more intense cooperation and awareness by the community majority, East Lubbock will arrive as a total modern community much quicker. Pride is a key factor in our quest, because pride will make you perform and react with more intensity than any other motivating factor. Pride will not allow our community businesses to go under without a fight. Pride will not allow our neighborhood to have unsightly areas, or be labeled in a negative manner. We all know East Lubbock is not what outsiders claim it to be, but we don't take enough initiative to change our image.

East Lubbock, let's be BLACK and PROUD, let's show our pride in such a manner that there will be little doubt, even in the minds of our most outspoken enemy, that the people of East Lubbock are proud people, people willing to go the limit for true Black pride.

AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

A Clear Choice

A few months ago, the chairman and chief executive officer of the Allstate Insurance Company, Richard J. Haayen, made a telling remark. In a speech calling for closer collaboration between business and education, Haayen reminded his audience of corporate and education leaders of Calvin Coolidge's famous assertion that "the business of America is business."

Maybe, Haayen observed, "it's time to turn that idea around a bit, and say instead: the business of American business is education."

I believe that remark reflects the fundamental economic shift of the 1980s. We have entered a new, and newly competitive, international economic era. An emerging consensus among the business, political, and education communities recognizes that the key to economic competitiveness in this new era lies in a nation's development of its human capital—its people.

Japan, of course, is the primary example. A small island nation, Japan is bereft of natural resources, except one—its people. Japan's strong economy is based on its investment in developing its human capital, in building a highly educated work force.

In tomorrow's world, economic strength will most assuredly be predicated on an educated work force. That's why American business is spending more than \$40 billion a year to educate and train employees. That's why corporate

leaders are among the most articulate advocates for excellence in America's schools.

As William H. Kolberg, president of the National Alliance of Business, recently told a congressional committee: "America's competitive advantage increasingly depends on the skills, knowledge and flexibility of its work force."

We do have choices. Harvard University economist Robert Reich poses them well: "The United States can compete in the world marketplace by working cheaper,

by trying to match the wages for which workers elsewhere are willing to labor. Or we can compete by becoming more productive, by quickly transforming ideas into better goods and services."

In other words, we can become an economy based on low-wage, low-skill jobs—with a small, highly skilled elite—struggling to compete with other low-wage, tax-haven countries. Or we can build a competitive U.S. economy—based on highly productive, skilled workers able to utilize and improve constantly changing technologies.

The way our nation responds to the economic challenge before us today will determine the kind of economy, and the kind of society, our nation will have tomorrow.

For me and the other members of NEA, the choice is clear. We must fundamentally improve our schools so that we can develop America's greatest resource—our human capital.

Dental Needs:

There are a few procedures you can follow in order to maintain a healthy mouth. Use a toothbrush whose size and shape allows you to reach all surfaces of your teeth. There is NO need for stiff bristles; soft bristles remove plaque without irritating the gums. Replace the brush every three to four months, and even sooner if bristles become frayed and bent.

Plaque is the sticky, colorless film of bacteria that constantly forms on your teeth. If this plaque is not removed daily with proper brushing and flossing, this bacteria leads to decay and gum disease. In time, plaque can cause severe decay of the tooth until the "nerve" or pulp of the tooth is destroyed. The only way this advanced decay can be eliminated and the tooth kept is by root canal therapy. Plaque can also move beneath the gumline and the toxins in it can destroy gum tissues and supporting bone. The more advanced stage of gum disease is called Periodontitis or "Pyorrhea." If left untreated, Periodontitis can lead to loss of teeth.

These are two of many reasons for regular check ups. In order to remove plaque, fluoride toothpaste, proper toothbrush, dental floss are the most effective, but some mouthwashes can add an extra measure of cleaning.

Listerine mouthwash and Peridex, a prescription rinse, are both recognized by the American Dental Association (ADA), though some studies show Peridex fights plaque more efficiently. Most other mouthwashes do little more than fight bad breath. Remember that bad breath may signal a more serious problem such as gum disease or diabetes.

For dental first aid at night and on weekends, you might stock these home remedies: a piece of soft wax (such as birthday candle wax or some pharmacies have this wax on hand), to plug the hole left by a lost filling. Denture adhesive can temporarily repair a crown which has come off. Oil of cloves, a traditional topical anesthetic available at many pharmacies, to soothe a painful exposed nerve.

NOTE: These remedies are only temporary to get you through the night. You should see your dentist the next day for PROPER treatment.

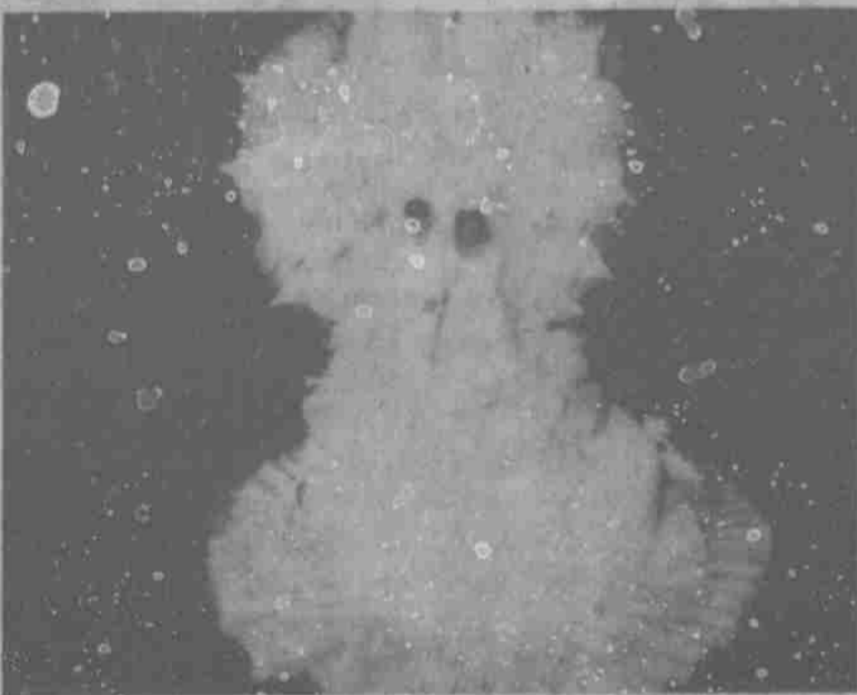

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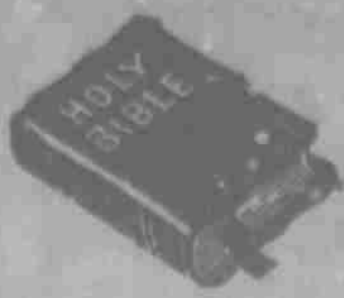
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FROM THE  OF

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
