Vivian Cooke, a well-known art teacher in Lubbock, has retired from the local school system after more than 30 years of teaching.

But for Cooke, retirement has not sunk in yet; and she says it probably will not until she hears school bells signaling the beginning of another school year.

Her unorthodox teaching style has been self-described as "individualized" and "tuned-in" to the students.

And it is that style which is applauded by two generations of local students who said she has the uncanny ability to make them feel as if they were the only student in the classroom.

"I'd like to think I was an individual. Many things you do in teaching depend on your students. I never knew what I was going to teach."

"I would always tune in and work from the students' attitudes and interests," she said.

Cooke was born in Marshall, Texas, but was reared in Chicago, Illinois. She attended Chicago Teachers College and graduated from Wilby College. She received a master's degree in art education from Texas Tech University.

But for Cooke, the most important part of teaching

was not the subject matter learned in those institutions.

"It's not so much teaching the subject matter, it's the little talks you have with your students that carries them through," she said.

True to that instinctive philosophy, Cooke is at her Manhattan Drive residence contemplating which direction she will take in her long-awaited retirement.

One thing she says she will definitely do -- she will continue to pursue her cultural interests and become more involved in community cultural affairs.

## Farmworkers File Class Action Suit

On June 15, 1989, two farmworkers filed a class action complaint against R & J Draper of Tahoka, Texas, a cotton farming operation. The workers are asking the United States Department of Labor to investigate R & J Draper, to assess civil penalties for Draper's violations of the federal labor laws, and to collect their unpaid minimum wages from Draper.

The farmworkers petitioners were paid only \$2.00 per hour for their work picking cotton in 1986. They were driven to the fields by an unregistered farm labor contractor, Pedro Garcia of Lamesa, who was not authorized to transport workers in his bus. The workers did not receive itemized wage receipts documenting their hours

and wages.

The workers are represented by Texas Rural Legal Aid of Plainview and Hereford, Texas. Their attorney Kay E. Mares explains that this class action complaint is yet

another example of how West Texas farmers refuse to respect the federal labor

laws. "Congress decided in 1966 that farmworkers deserve a subsistence minimum wage to support

their families. Twenty years later, Texas farmers still have not gotten that message. Each and every worker must receive at least \$3.35 for each hour of work."

### Some Sales May Be Bogus Bargains

A "going out of business" sale, at which a company must quickly liquidate its inventory at a greatly reduced price, may offer consumers some good bargains. However, these sales are also susceptible to deceptive advertising.

In one recent case investigated by the Attorney General's Office, ads claimed savings of "up to 80 percent" from the liquidation of high quality jewelry "traditionally sold at a well known outlet. Our Consumer Protection Division alleged that the claims were deceptive because:

- all of the high quality goods had been removed from the store and replaced by a lower quality inventory;
- many of the goods had been acquired for the sole purpose of being sold for profit;
- and most prices were not significantly less than normal market prices.

Another case involved an auctioneer who claimed to be liquidating "artifacts" from the estate of a "Prince." Our office alleged that there was no such "Prince" and that the auctioneer was simply selling his own inventory.

The Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division has taken action against these and other deceptive practices. But consumers can also protect themselves by being smart shoppers.

**Don't Buy Phony Price Comparisons**  
A "sale" should be a significant price reduction from the advertiser's usual and customary price. Consumers should be familiar with the prevailing price of a product.

A business advertisement should compare sale prices to:

- their own former selling price;
- the current price of identical merchandise at other stores;
- the current selling price of comparable merchandise at their own or other stores.

Watch out for comparisons which include:

- list price;
- manufacturer's list price;
- suggested retail price.

These terms can be used deceptively to imply savings when there is none.

"Dealer Cost" may sound good, but it might include the cost of the product to the dealer plus overhead, advertising costs, sales commissions, and other expenses.

It is misleading and illegal for a seller to raise prices for a short period, then cut them to the normal price and advertise a sale.

If you have complaints about liquidation sales or any other consumer problem, call your nearest Consumer Protection Office in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen, or San Antonio. The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.



## WORDS OF LIFE

"Your Dental Health And Medical Health: One Effects The Other"

Your medical health can have a direct effect upon your dental treatment. It is important that your dentist know your complete medical history. When you visit a dentist for the first time you will be asked to fill out a medical health form. This form covers such important areas as your past or present illness, allergies, medications you are taking, and your physician's name. You may wonder why your dentist needs such information? Let me give you an example .... You have high blood pressure and your physician has you on medication for this condition. You see your dentist because of a toothache and you fail to state that you have high blood pressure and are taking medication. The anesthetic which the dentist may use could have a direct effect upon your medication and your condition. By letting your dentist know, he can use an anesthetic which will not effect your condition or your medication.

Most dentists will go over your health form with you and ask you questions about your health. Many times upon reviewing a patient's health history, it is discovered that the patient had been in a hurry and forgot to mention an important health condition on their health questionnaire. There are some patients who are unaware that they have a medical problem, for example, blood pressure problems or diabetes. There have been patients who have come in to our office for an extraction, and because we check blood pressures before such procedures discovered that they had a blood pressure problem. If such high blood pressure problems go unchecked or if we had done the extraction, the patient could have had a stroke or worse. For this reason, many dentists take their patients blood pressures, pulse, respiratory rate and even temperatures prior to any potentially stressful procedure.

Many people feel that their teeth, mouth, and diseases which can occur there does not have an effect on their overall health. This line of thinking is completely false. Many diseases and health conditions can appear in the

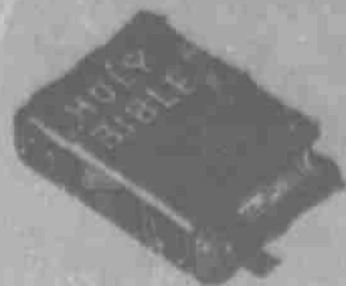
