In Needs To Be Said

"Looking between the lines" is a valuable skill Blacks should master, especially within East Lubbock. "Looking between the lines" applies not only to what you read, but to what you hear and see. Today's modern techniques, skills and abilities have placed more fakes, and imitations at our finger tips than ever imagined. From the food we eat to the house we live in, imitations, fakes or simulated this, that or the other can be found.

Therefore, written, oral or visual communication is just as full of fakes as everything else. Most of us are alert for our right lies, but half-trues and sophisticated languages and skills can present a problem we may not be wise to. It once was the fine print that carried the gloom and doom, but today, it can be anywhere and in any shape or form. For instant, \$1.00 houses, car rebates, surveys are just a few things that clearly states a true fact, however, under close examination, the cost is a great deal more or there is more to it than meets the eye.

The point is, we must learn to look between the lines at everything. East Lubbock has been tagged as a low income, crime infested, drug riddled community. A closer look at the situation reveals that our community is not deserving of that label. Yes, there are many users of food stamps and AFDC, however, the amount of cash that flows from the communities of predominately blue collar workers. Crime in our community is above our desires, but from what I read and hear, there are more crimes committed in West Lubbock in 6 months than East Lubbock has in a year. With drugs, we have much more than desired, but so does the rest of Lubbock and the world. Our major problem with drugs is we are so bold with our activities that more of us get caught than across town.

If we can learn to look between the lines, we of East Lubbock could learn to use the system to our advantage. Look at the Hispanics, they are gaining more of the American pie everyday because they have learned, "for every rule, be it family or community, more can be accomplished than standing alone or being an individual. They have become masters in helping one another to gain a piece of the pie.

We as Blacks must stop taking everything at face value. Because a Black graduates from college does not mean they have it made when it comes to employment. Just because you drive a new car does not mean you don't have the same financial problems as a person that drives an old one. Just because you got yours the hard way does not mean others must go the same route. If more Blacks would look between the lines we could see ways and means to help others. You just might see that a kind word or advice can prevent a new drug user, that telling your neighbor about a job could prevent a new Black criminal or maybe upgrade your neighborhood. That becoming involved in a community event or project could show great benefits to many, including yourself. That looking at each situation on an individual basis, letting the facts of that one situation be the basis for your decision, that more than ever before, at one time or the other, we all need someone to help in opening the door of opportunity. The bottom line to "lookings between the lines" boils down to looking at things for what they really are and finding something beneficial from it.

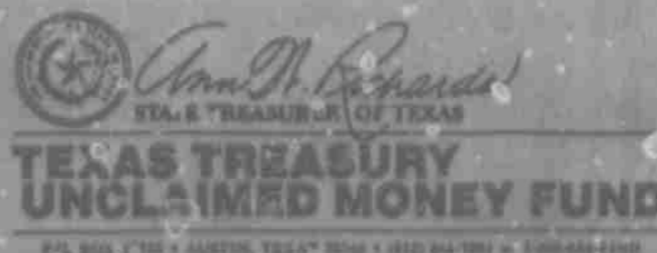

People usually grow herbs for their flavors, aromas or medicinal qualities. Some herb growers also benefit from a less well-known quality of many herbs—the fact that bugs don't always like them.

That's good news for herb gardeners and also for vegetable and ornamental growers who are ready to experiment with natural pest-control methods.

The Value of Scents. What people like about herbs is exactly what can make them unappetizing to many insects: their strong scent. All plants' scents attract or repel insects to some degree. Herbs go one step further: They share their protective aromas with the plants growing right next to them.

The powerful scents of most herbs don't actually repel insects from attacking neighboring plants. More accurately, scientists believe, they mask or absorb the other plant's insect-attracting scent. This can confuse would-be predators and make them move on to a less-protected stand.

Favorite Combinations. The trick to taking practical advantage of this phenomenon is choosing the right herb for the plant you want to protect. Borage, for instance, has a reputation for discouraging only one pest, but that pest is the voracious tomato hornworm. Basil can also help protect tomato plants, so many gardeners surround their tomato patch with a decorative border of this fragrant herb to discourage insect pests. Planted in pots or hanging baskets just outside doorways, basil can also help keep flies away.

Here are some other herb-pest combinations: sage and rosemary to deter imported cabbageworms and carrot flies; horseradish to protect potatoes from Colorado potato beetles; and tansy to repel Japanese beetles, spotted cucumber beetles and squash bugs.

Garlic tops the charts as a botanical pest-control measure. It takes up little space, and, like its close relatives onions and chives, garlic can be planted throughout the garden to help protect many types of plants. For instance, garlic is especially good at keeping aphids and Japanese beetles away, so it is recommended for planting under rose bushes and near broccoli.

Any good herb book can add many more suggested companion plantings to this list. Such a book is essential if you are serious about herbal pest control.

How To Use Them. After you decide which herbs you want to use, remember they will be most effective if planted right beside the plants that need protecting. This can be done either by alternating the plants in a row or by arranging herbs in a checkerboard or zigzag pattern among other plants.

Herbal mulches, sprays and teas also help chase bugs. You can spread herb leaves on the ground around vulnerable plants. Or you can liquefy herbs in a blender with water, add two or three drops of non-detergent soap, and spray your plants with the resulting mixture.

A few herbs, like nasturtium and white geranium, actually attract pests. These herbs can be used as expendable members of the garden to lure harmful insects away from your more valuable plants. It is up to you to gather and destroy the pests that congregate on the helpful herbs.

Herb experts advise gardeners to approach herbal pest remedies with an open mind and a desire to experiment. They warn that repellent plants may not perform consistently, and their use is far from foolproof. As with many alternatives and supplements to chemical pest control, the use of herbs requires extra time and effort to observe, create and maintain the natural balance of your landscape.

King Tut

Nov. 4th marks the anniversary of the discovery of Egyptian King Tutankhamen's tomb. Considered one of the most important archeological discoveries of modern times, the tomb was found in Luxor, Egypt, by English archeologist Howard Carter on November 4, 1922, more than 3,000 years after Tutankhamen's death.

Egypt's child-king Tutankhamen became pharaoh at the age of nine and died, probably in the year 1352 B.C., at the age of 19. His is thought to be the only royal Egyptian tomb that escaped the plundering of grave robbers. The riches of the tomb can be found in Egypt's National Museum in Cairo. **H**
