


monster.

The monster, a jail annex on East Broadway at Idalou Highway. Not to be totally closed minded, there can be some positive involved in this proposal, however, in this case, one single negative outweighs the positives. That negative in reality is a positive for East Lubbock as our community plans has no place for a jail, prison, half-way house, sewage plant or additional cotton mills. East Lubbock already has it's share of building that distrect from our nature! beauty, that create health hazards, that create foul ordors and cause heavy traffic. If a new jail or annex is required, look within the immediate area of the existing facility, there is ample space between Main and Fourth Street

East Lubbock's future plans call for facilities that will enhance our image, that will provide services or recreation for the community. Although jobs are also high on our community list of needed items, building employment facilities next door or in our backyards is not desired or wanted. Driving around the Loop, land is abundant, therefore, large buildings, plants and health hazard racilities would be ideal in that location. Just because the city or county owns land within our East Lubbock residential area, does not mean they have the right to build whatever desired on that land. We, the people, that must deal with a facility on a daily basis must have a voice in what is placed within our community. We, the residents of East Lubbock, want our community to be known for more than crime, cotton gins and a jail.

Plans are being forumlated to remedy the abundance of vacant land situated within East Lubbock. Several new homes (not low income either) have been built, the Kingdom Hall, Mrs. V's Hair Salon and the remodeling of South Plains Funeral Home have improved East Broadway. A new church is slated for Quirt and the East Lubbock Development Association (ELDA) has several projects in the works. If the city or county wants to build in East Lubbock, then build a hospital, city or county office complex, or encourage fast food outlets and small businesses to locate in East Luboock.

East Lubbock, we must stand and be recognized, not by one or a faw, but as a majority. We must find the time, remember the date, time and place of meetings to stop another monster from gaining a "toe hold" in our community. Remember, how sat idle while drugs became rampant on our community streets. Remember how our lack of participation and support created the vast amount of vacant land. From these two examples alone, all can readily see how difficult it is to rid a community of a monster, once a "toe hold" has been gained. Let's act NOW, before yet another monster is entrenced within East Lubbock.



Health Editorial:

How You Can Care For

Your Child's Teeth

Dr. Heenan Johnson, III

As soon a your baby's teeth appear, you should clean them with a piece of gauze or damp washcloth after feeding. When the rest of the teeth have come in, brush them gently with an extra soft, children's tootbrush. You may have a fight on your hands, but it is well worth it to your pocketbook and your child's health in the long run. One tip that helps is to have your child lay his cr her head in your lap so you can see the teeth better and stablize head movement.

Remember that babies who sleep with a bottle of



Dr. Heenan Johnson, III milk, formula or fruit juice in their mouths can suffer from Baby Bottle Tooth Decay. This decay appear as black or brown teeth rotten down to the gum line. Use only cool water in the bottle at bedtime or budding teeth may become severely decayed.

You may wonder: "Why are baby teeth so impor-

tant?" Even though primary (baby) teeth eventually fall out, they do serve a very important function. Baby teeth reserve space for the adult (permanent) teeth, so if a tooth is lost too early, the permanent tooth replacements could grow in crooked.

There are many ways to prevent early decay. beginning with regular checkups. But if a cavity should develop in a primary tooth, be sure to have it filled. As rough as kids play, if he or she should knock a tooth out, place it in cool milk or water and get to the dentist within a half an hour. Do not clean the pieces of gum tissue off the tooth. If you can do this, the tooth can be replanted in your

child's mouth.

This writer has had people ask when should they bring their babies to the dentist? There are different answers depending upon who you ask. Some dentist feel 3 to 4 years of age. While others title about 1 years of age. This writer feels that when your child is about 1 to 2 years of age, it's time for his or her first check up. Early visits can prevent minor problems from becoming major ones. Don't wait until there's an injured tooth to introduce your child to a dentist. Make the first visit a positive one.

By all means, don't threaten your children into behaving by saying: "If you don't be good, he's going to live you a shot." This closs far more harm than good.

Education of Migrant Children Protected By Federal Judge

Migrant farm workers in Washington state filed a class ention law suit challenging a school district's misappropriation of federal migrant education funds. The workers also challenged the district's failure to provide equal access to services for migrant children, and its failure to allow parents of migrant children, and its failure to allow parents of migrant children meaningful opportunity to participate in the planning. operation, and evaluation of the school's migrant education program. The lawsuit was filed in 1985.

"These problems are not unique to Washington, Our office has received a number of complaints about local school districts that use migrant education money to pay for basic instruction and equipment for the children, and do not allow the parents to become involved with the education of their children," said TRLA staff attorney Stephan C. McIntyre.

On March 28, 1988 the federal court had heard the case entered a consent decree on behalf of the children and parents. The consent decree provides that federal migrant money be used only for the special needs of migrants, not their basic education. Basic education was defined to include all education education and necessary transportation.

The court decree also requires: the training of migrant parents and the Parent Advisory Counsel documents be translated, an annual needs assessment prepared by the school for the review of the PAC, and that migrant children have equal access to all school facilities and services.

"The children of migrant farm workers in Washington

and West Toxas must receive equal treatment from their schools. The federal migrant money cannot be used to fund their basic educational needs which are the responsibility of the school district, not the lederal government. It is a crime to steal from the future of these kids," said






