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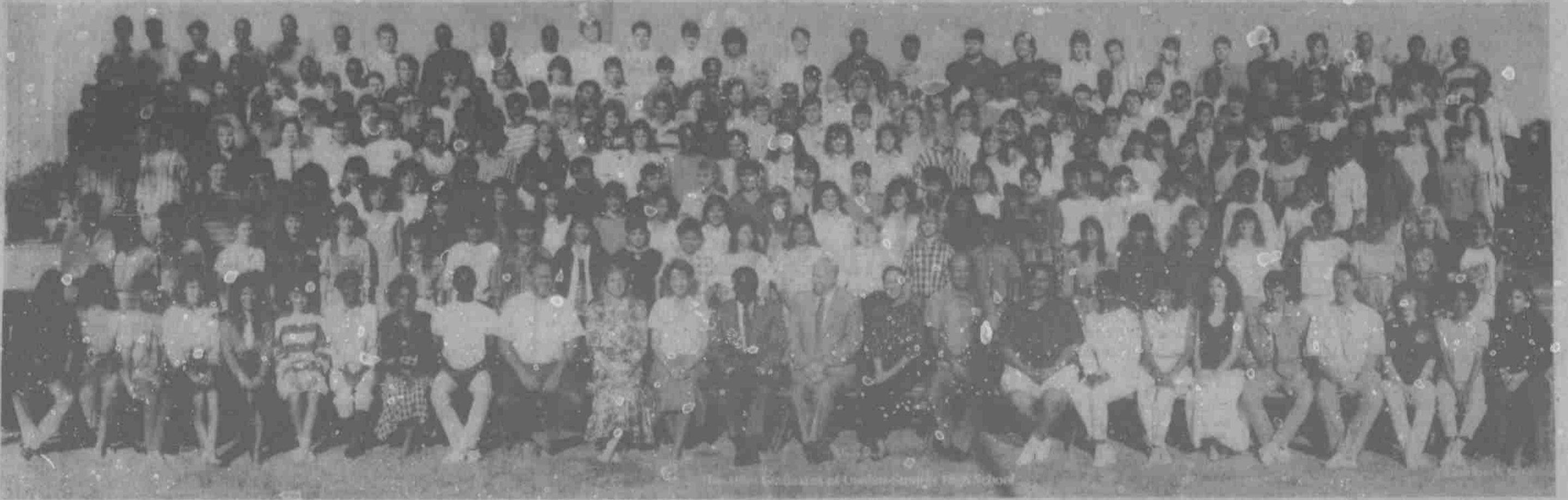

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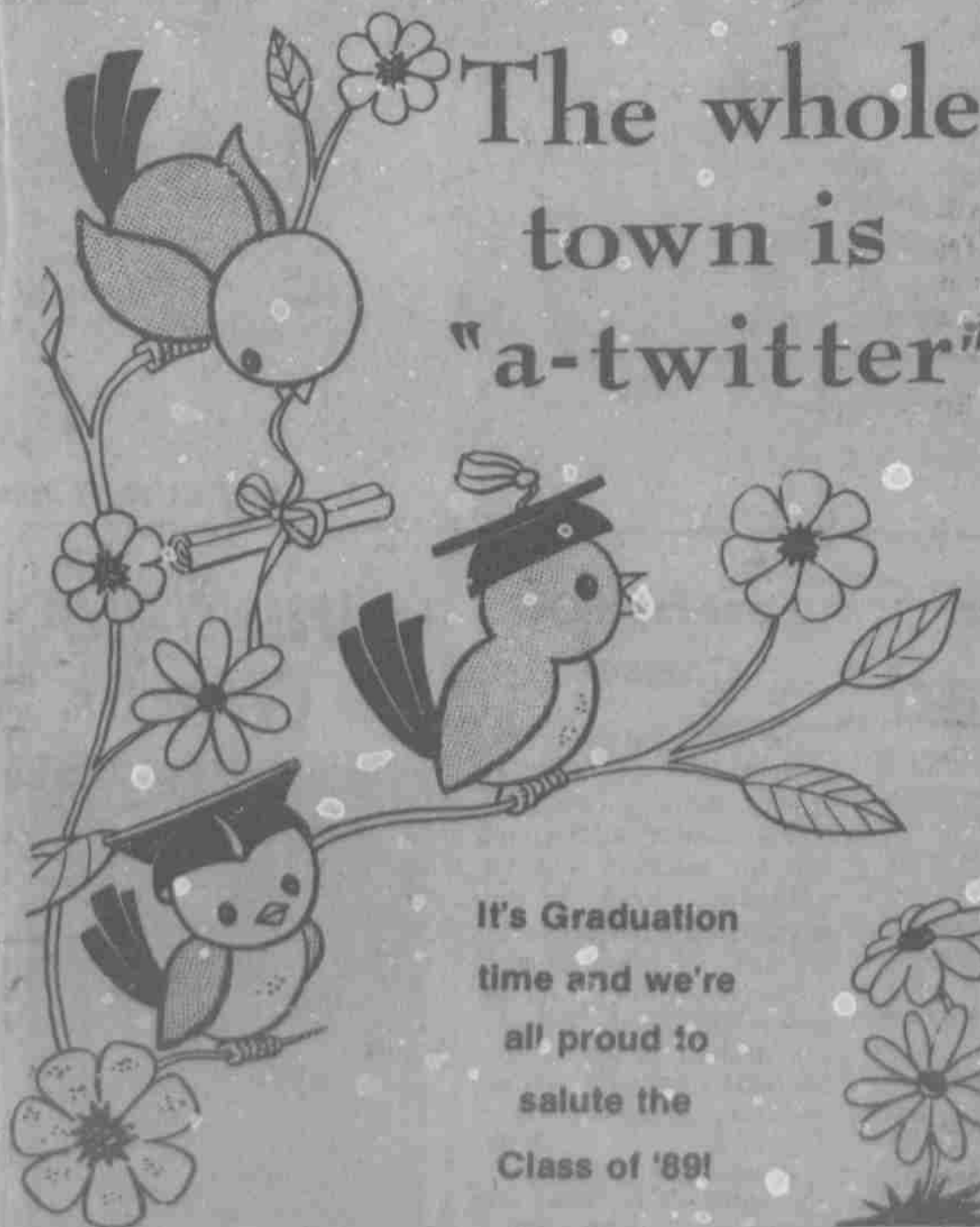
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South Plains Funeral Home Honors Mother Of The Month For April

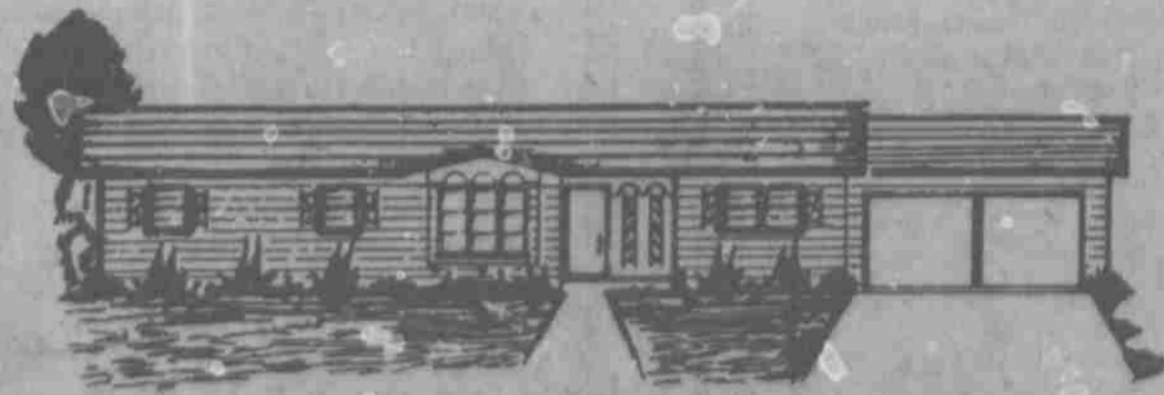

It Needs To Be Said

Citizens of East Lubbock, "why do we continuously fail victim to half trues and misleading information?" Stop for a moment and think, what is the real reason East Lubbock has no fast food outlet except Church's? Why or what makes obtaining big money to build a business east of Avenue A such a risk? What is the real reason behind building low income homes in East Lubbock, why couldn't they have just built homes like they have done in other areas of our City? What is the truth behind only three Blacks on the Police force at one time and only one fireman? Why of all the people arrested for being involved with Damon Richardson, only Blacks have been jailed? What is the status of Dunbar and Estacado High Schools?

There are other issues that the truth has been "white washed" and the citizens of East Lubbock have not been told the so called "bottom line." Yes, there have been explanations given for each issue and more often, there are several reasons, but are they the real reasons. For example, "no fast food outlets because of our low income and a lack of traffic. That sounds good, but is it the truth? There is a Kentucky Fried Chicken place on University that is not near a community as big as Parkway and it's near 82nd, which starts rural Lubbock. That location is very similar to Parkway Drive, therefore, our traffic and numbers will justify a Kentucky Fried Chicken requirement. Can someone give the real bottom line on why no fast food outlets in East Lubbock? If we knew the real reason, maybe in time, we can over come it.

The same applies to other issues, if we knew the real bottom line, a collective effort could be made to correct the problem. A close look at our Black population of high school age will reflect insufficient numbers to justify two 4A high schools less than 3 miles apart. Even with busing students, Dunbar has less than 500 and Estacado has less than 1,000, while Monterey and Coronado both have well over 1,500 a piece. East Lubbock, we need to know the bottom line about our high schools.

The Damon Richardson case should have alerted East Lubbock that our crime problem is directly attributed to West Lubbock. There is no way the Whites of Lubbock will allow any Black to make the kind of money Damon was supposed to have made without some Whites getting their share. The community, in the majority, knew what Damon was doing, therefore, it was no surprise he was caught, tried and convicted, but we have yet to hear the bottom line and who are the Whites?

And, just what is a "low income community?" Is 10, 15, 25 or 50% of our East Lubbock community making less than \$25,000 combined income a year? What percent of our single people make less than \$15,000 a year? And our numbers that are on welfare, what is their actual income? As previously stated, East Lubbock citizens need to know the "bottom line". We are continuously label, yet, we have little concrete proof that the labels are indeed based on facts. We tend to assume because the Whites say it is true or that's the way it is, but are we being told the truth or a "white wash" version of the truth.

More East Lubbock citizens need to look around, listen and ask questions about those issues that just don't add up correctly. Sometime back, this writer wrote about reading between the lines, well, how many of you read what this writer does? For reasons unknown, East Lubbock is being victimized with negatives by far too many and the bottom line is never mentioned. We, of East Lubbock, need to find out the bottom line so we can prevent whatever is up their sleeves. We need to become more involved in City affairs and we must demand the "bottom line" from the horse's mouth rather than second hand information, rumors and heresay. Those that choose to step out front as community representatives,

must be capable and qualified to tell the difference between the horse's mouth and the other end. They must have a "jaundice eye" about everything and everyone, because the future of East Lubbock is in their hands. East Lubbock has sufficient numbers to accomplish any task if they are given the proper information and time in which to act. East Lubbock has big, broad shoulders, we will grumble, raise hell and become down right disturbed with the truth, BUT, in the long run, East Lubbock will bare down, grit their teeth and make the best of any situation. Therefore, let's get to the bottom of all the clouds that is holding us back, let's lay all of them on the table and get on with making East Lubbock the best it can be.



AN EDUCATOR'S OPINION

Tomorrow's Curriculum

This coming Wednesday marks the first anniversary of the stock market crash.

October 19, 1987, will always have a place in economics textbooks. I believe it will also have a place in education texts. For America learned a lot that day. More than a few Americans awoke to the fact that America's fate is linked to the fate of all nations. What happens to the yen, to the franc, and to the lira affects what happens to the dollar and, in turn, affects what happens to our plans for our children and our hopes for our nation.

Other lessons followed. Not least among them was that the education of our young people must promote international understanding as well as national pride.

On October 19, 1987, America learned that we will do a disservice to students if we relegate them to a curriculum too narrow, too provincial, too deeply rooted in stale assumptions that the new global economy has made obsolete.

During the past two decades, we have seen the dangers of curricula that do little to foster international understanding. We have also seen the results: graduates who do not understand their neighbors on the next block, let alone their neighbors on the next continent. Graduates who draw a blank when asked in what countries we find Soweto or Gdansk, Manila or Phnom Penh, Hiro-

shima or Nuremburg. Students who can't locate other countries on a map, let alone discuss and defend their own political and economic systems.

A curriculum that will develop this understanding cannot be rooted solely in the classics of Western civilization. We must not, of course, jettison the traditional curriculum. But we must expand it, stretch it, supplement it. That's tough work.

If we are to complete that work and thoroughly restructure curricula, we'll need bold innovation. We can begin that work in the experimental learning labs that NEA is creating in at least one school district in every state. But I'd also like to see America's teachers take the lead in forging an international consortium among educators—an alliance for

global understanding specifically designed to broaden the curriculum we now offer our students.

We need such an alliance precisely because we need curricula that enhance global literacy and so better prepare our students for the challenge of guiding America through the 21st century.

I know of no better way to show that America learned well the lessons of October 19, 1987. That we remain a nation whose greatest strength is our capacity to bounce back from adversity. Indeed, to transform adversity into opportunity.

Health Editorial:

Sickle Cell Anemia

Sickle Cell Anemia is a hereditary type of chronic red blood cell anemia which occurs almost exclusively in blacks and whites of Mediterranean origin. The name is derived from the shape of the red blood cells as they appear when viewed through a microscope which is sickled or crescent shaped. The normal adult red blood cell is genetically altered to produce a sickled red blood cell.

In some individuals, there is the possibility of this person having the sickle cell trait, but may not manifest clinical evidence of sickling unless there is a condition of severe hypoxia (lack of air or oxygen in air).

Only by blood test can an individual if they have this sickle cell trait or if they have sickle cell anemia.

Clinical features of sickle cell anemia are as follows: more common in females, but occurs in males and usually becomes clinically apparent before age 30. The patient is weak, short of breath and easily fatigued. Pain in the joints, limbs, and abdomen, as well as nausea and vomiting, is common. Persons affected with sickle cell anemia are under the care of their physician and may take antibiotics to prevent infections which can cause sickle cell crises. It is important that a person with sickle cell anemia who has to see other doctors, example: eye doctor, dermatologist or dentist, that you let them know your condition, because any type of procedure that involves blood or bleeding can involve bacteria leading to infection. One of these doctors will contact the doctor treating you for sickle cell and discuss your case and what procedure will best prevent sickle cell crises.

The sickle cell molecule undergoes gelation or crystallization when it is deoxygenated (without oxygen), and this physically distorts the red blood cell, producing the sickle shape. These sickle shaped cells then "logjam" and produce stasis or stationary blood flow in the smaller blood vessels.

There is no specific treatment for this disease except transfusion during a crisis.

The prognosis or outcome of treatment is unpredictable. This writer would like to point out that sickle cell anemia is not a contagious illness. Sadly, many patients with sickle cell anemia die before the age of 30 years, but those patients with only the sickle cell trait have a better prognosis and may live a

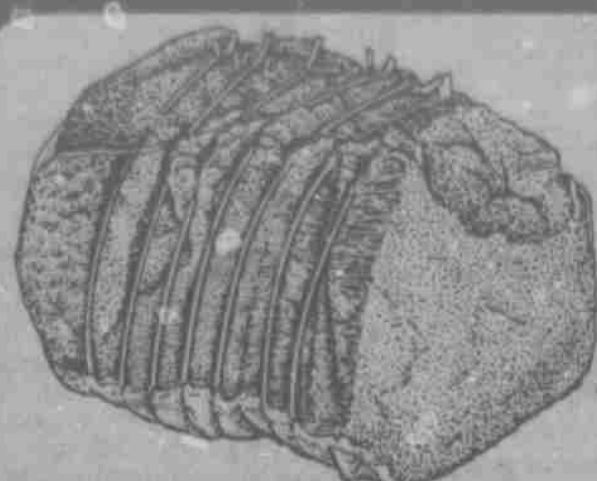
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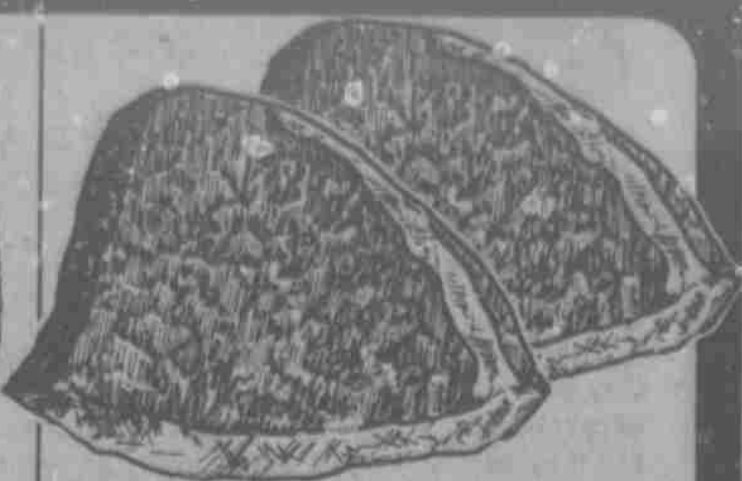

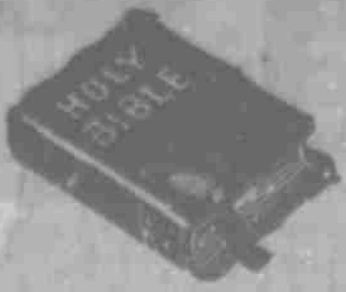

Haycock tells the story of workmen in New York City who were down in the financial district digging the excavation for a skyscraper, a sixty story bank building, but they came on some quicksand.
